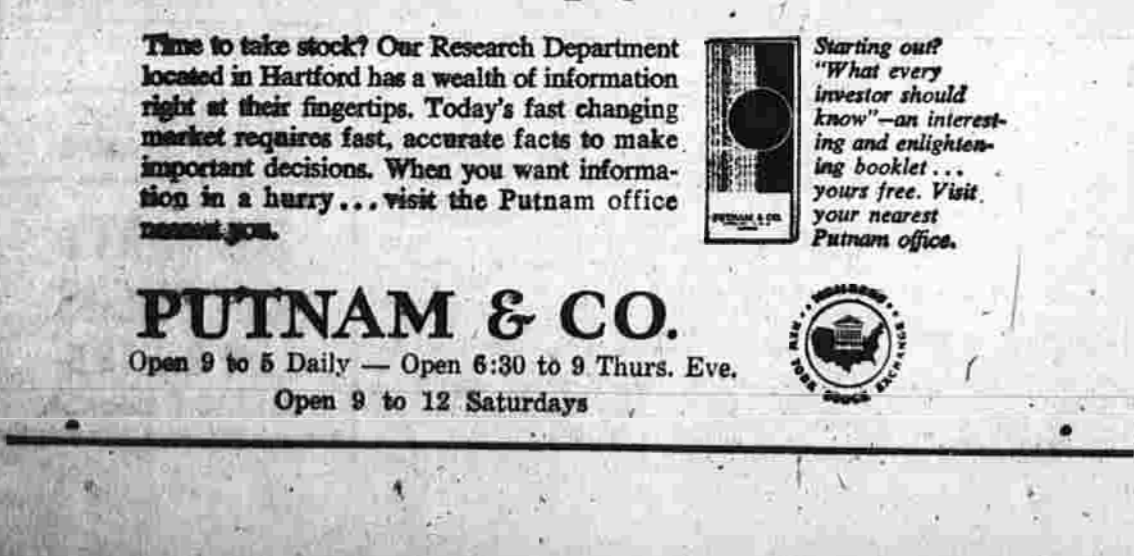

#### Deeply Religious Boy Slays Mother

LEXINGTON, Mass. (AP) — A 16-year-old boy described as "deeply religious" was held today in the slaying of his mother.

Police said the only explanation Douglas Sprague gave for the slaying was: "I didn't like her. She was nagging me all the time."

The boy walked into police headquarters yesterday, police said, and told startled officers he had slain his mother while she lay napping.

The body of Mrs. Carolyn Sprague, 40, was found in a bedroom of her ranch style home.

Medical examiner Vincent Dirago said death was caused by multiple blows on the head.

Dirago described the boy as a "deeply religious" and said he never had been in trouble though he had run away from home several times, most recently to California.

The boy's father, Raymond Sprague, an accountant who was at work at the time of the slaying, said: "He's my son. He's sick, he needs help and I have to give it to him. I don't know what life holds for him now."

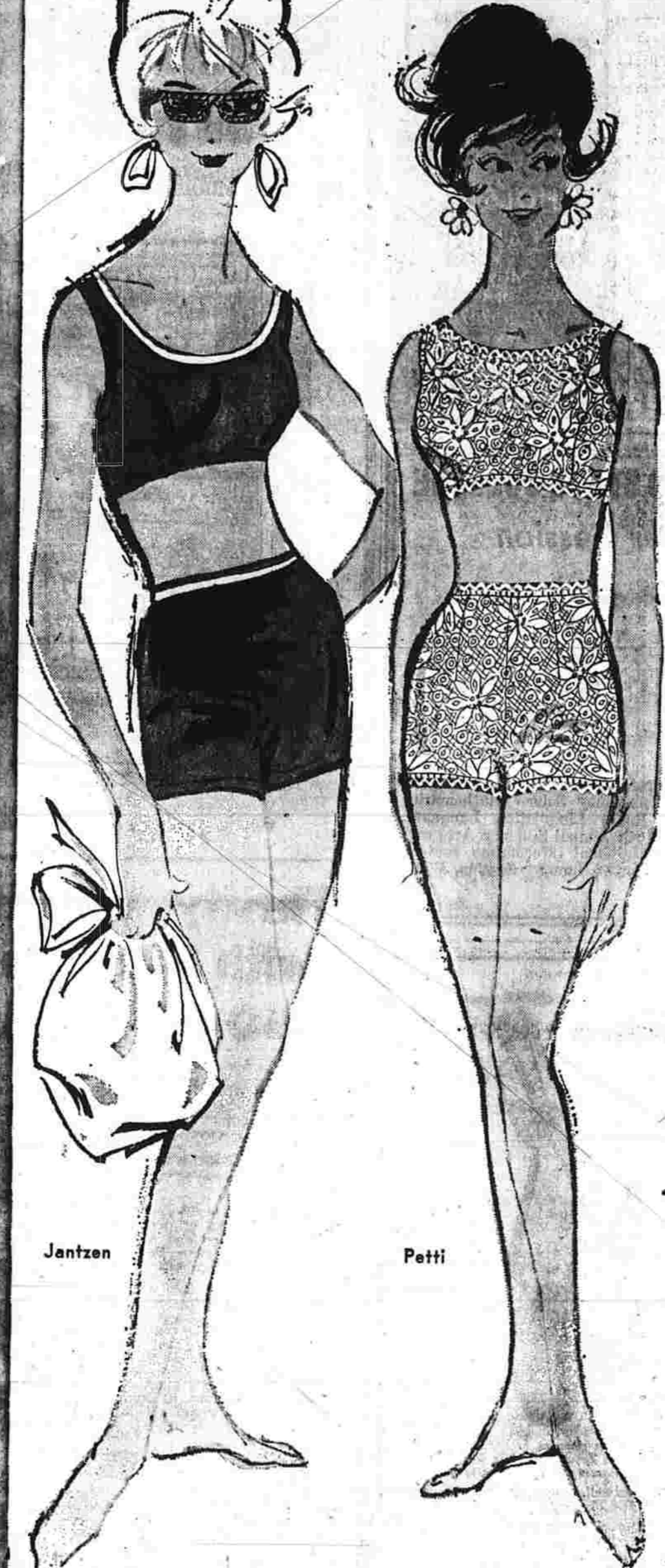

### Served as Medical Corps Sergeant Pope Brought to the Papacy Diplomat, Pastor Experience

He left the army in 1918. Re-assigned to the Bergamo diocese, Archbishop Roncalli gave in 1923 the first "students' house" in Italy to aid public school children.

Pope Benedict XV called Father Roncalli to Rome in 1921 to recognize the Italian Society for the Propagation of the Faith, a nationwide mission-supporting activity that reached down to parish level. Father Roncalli wrote a new constitution for the society.

Four years later, Father Roncalli became a titular bishop. That same year, 1929, Pope Pius XI sent him as a Vatican diplomat to Sofia, Bulgaria. The job went so well that he was raised in five years from apostolic visitor in Bulgaria to apostolic delegate there.

Bishop Roncalli's experience in the East planted the seeds of his love for people of all nations and creeds and his overriding concern for Christian unity, later manifested by his Ecumenical Council in 1963.

In 1935 he was made a titular archbishop and became apostolic delegate to Turkey and Greece. The Vatican diplomat, serving in predominantly non-Catholic lands, sought constantly to put visitors at ease.

Not a habitual smoker, he would light the first cigarette at official dinners to signal others that they needn't be afraid to smoke in his presence.

Archbishop Roncalli was in Istanbul in 1940 when war once again spread across Europe. Greeting a visiting French priest the day after Italy entered the war at Germany's side, the archbishop embraced his guest and said: "Our nations are at war, but we feel more than ever brothers and we shall work for peace."

In recognition of his diplomatic skill he was appointed papal nuncio to France in December 1941. It was a delicate post. Relations between France and the Vatican were strained. Many wartime French resistance leaders were angry because the previous nuncio had lived in Vichy, capital of defeated France.

Archbishop Roncalli mended the situation so swiftly that in three months France saw philosopher Jacques Maritain in the Vatican to resume normal diplomatic relations.

During his time in Bulgaria, he began renting for his annual vacation a villa in an area where he had played as a child in 1905. In boyhood and manhood he would often climb above Villa Scott and its formal gardens. He enjoyed the isolation of an old tower there.

Baroness Scott gave him the villa as a present when he became Pope. The Pope in turn gave it to a Bergamo order of nuns. A representation of the villa's tower appears in his papal coat of arms.

Pope John was said to have recalled that northern tower and its memories while walking in the Vatican gardens one spring day in 1969. He stopped and stared for a long while at a 9th century tower down the walk, one of three watchtowers built to guard against the Saracens.

The Pope had the tower modernized and an air-conditioned

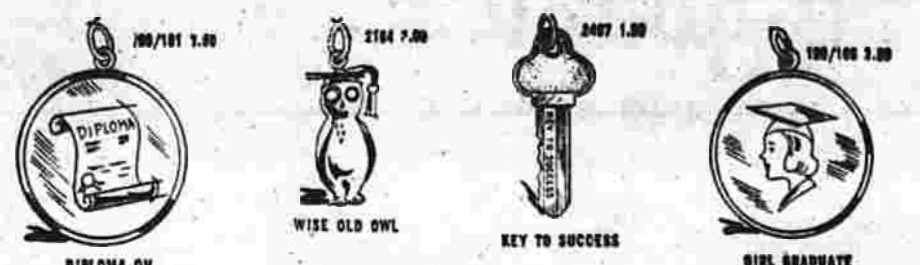

**Town Hires DeMarco For Highway Audit**

Bruno R. DeMarco of New Britain, a systems analyst, was approved last night by the Democratic majority of town directors to conduct a comprehensive administrative audit of the town highway department.  
 The three Republican directors voted against the hiring.  
 They contended that such an audit should be the responsibility of the department itself, not an outside source; that the \$9,000 cost is an unnecessary expense; and that DeMarco was ineligible by attending a Democratic caucus Monday night.  
 GOP Director Harlan Taylor argued that the first recommendation for improving the department should come from the general manager's office.  
 The action to hire the analyst by a 6-3 vote upon a motion from Atty. Richard C. Woodhouse, a Democrat, followed about an hour and a half of discussion, largely political and at times acrimonious.  
 Deputy Director of Public Works Chester Leamon was asked to explain his views toward the proposed audit.  
 Langley said he objects only because, according to DeMarco's initial recommendations, he may not be a part of the operation when the audit is completed. He said he has been aware for some time that the department is in need of improvement, and that the audit may be necessary.  
 DeMarco has said he will recommend that Langley be reassigned to the manager's office to a new position involving administration of special projects. The public works department would be eliminated.  
 Atty. David Barry, a Democrat, said Langley's decision will serve as recommendations to town directors, not orders.  
 DeMarco will be paid \$200 weekly, not to exceed \$9,000, and will complete the audit by June 1968.  
 Langley also said, "I frankly think I've personally devoted a great deal of my time bringing this department up to where it is now." He said the criticisms over the sweeping operation for example are made in all towns of Manchester's size.

**Few Present At Hearing Back Housing**

About a dozen people, most of them residents in Manchester's housing for the poor project, agreed last night that plans to expand the project were "a very fine thing."  
 A public hearing on the proposed location of the new 100 unit housing addition—to be south of Woodland Gardens and Hartford Rd.—brought only a few scattered residents on the possible improvements that could be made in the buildings themselves, not just on the architect's drawing boards.  
 The location was chosen, according to Robert Vennart, chairman of the Manchester Housing Authority (MHA), because it was convenient to churches, bus transportation and other facilities, and because "the price is much better than any other place we investigated."  
 The new 100 units will bring the total to 200, which is 50 short of the total the Federal Housing Authority has allocated to Manchester at present.  
 The authority did not investigate a North End location for the new housing, co-chairman Raymond Andlino said, because that area is not free sufficient land in time for the present project. The last 50 units could be built in that area, at a later date.  
 Only about 12 of the 175 acres south of the present project will be developed for housing, MHA member Mrs. Mary Rose says.  
 The new project will probably include fewer if any two-bedroom apartments, which the MHA has had to fill arbitrarily with people who have preferred smaller units, and which were only included in the project, according to the MHA, because the federal authority thought they could be rented to younger families if there were not enough elderly applicants.  
 "There were three times as many elderly applicants for the first 100 units as there were openings, however."

### No Hope of Survivors In DC7 Airliner Crash

Rosemary Eberling of Clayton, Ala., whose staff sergeant husband, Charles, was on the doomed plane, said she had a premonition Monday morning "that something bad happened."

Mrs. Eberling, mother of four, said: "All I can do is sit, wait and hope for the best."

Seven family groups apparently were wiped out or left with only one surviving parent as a result of the crash.

Passengers included the wife and four children of M. Sgt. Michael F. Almon, attached to the Army's Alaska Support Command; the wife and four children of Almon's brother, M. Sgt. Robert D. Scott, stationed at Elmendorf AFB. Almon's wife and two children of Almon, Q. C. Robert E. Smith, also stationed at Elmendorf.

Scott's wife, Madeline, of Panama City, Fla., was en route with their children to join him.

Also aboard the plane were S. Sgt. Joseph I. Whippley, 38, an Army medical companion for 18 years; his wife and two teen-age daughters; Army SPS Frank B. Mann, 25, his wife and 10-month-old daughter; William G. Parsington, a civilian working for the Air Force, his wife and three sons; and A. J. Mement, another Air Force civilian employee and his wife.

Moment, of Brockton, Mass., had been in the Army five years, was last stationed at Ft. Sike, N.Y., and was en route with his family to a new assignment.

Whippley had been stationed at Ft. Bliss, Tex., and was being moved to Fairbanks, Alaska. Mrs. Whippley, 35, hailed from Pittsboro, Ohio.

In Yonkers, N.Y., Jack V. Cuppa, whose son, Army Pfc. Richard Cuppa, 21, was aboard the ill-fated craft, said: "My wife and I have been sitting by the radio all day, hoping to hear good news about the plane."

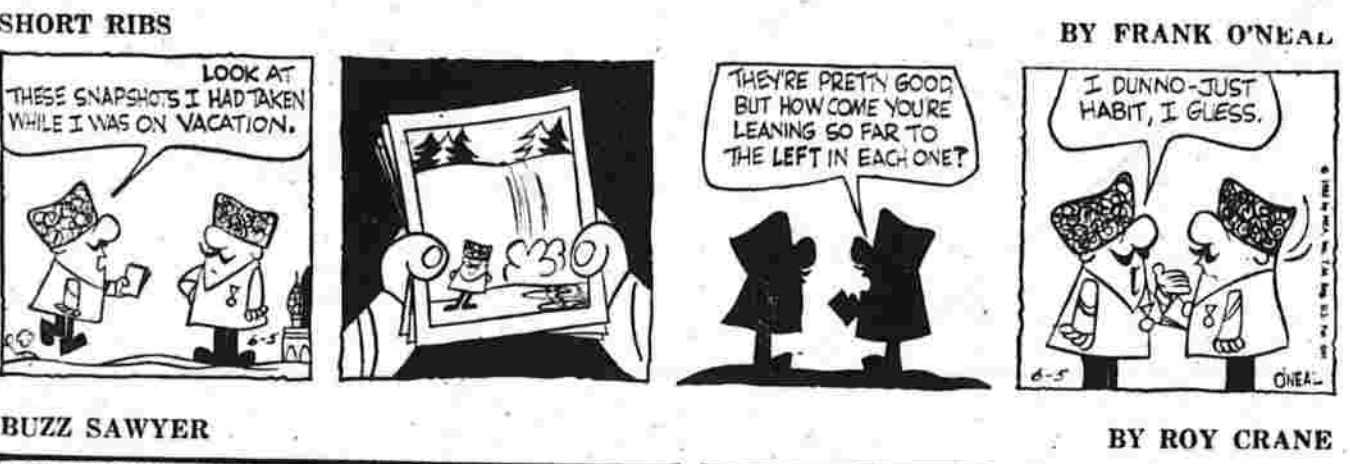

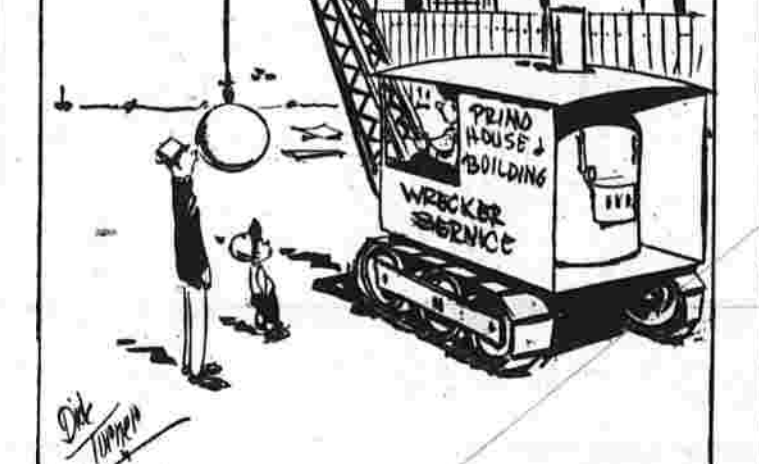
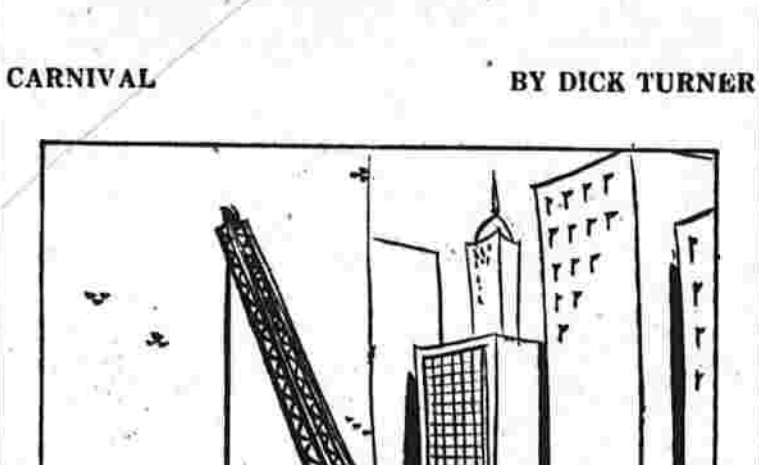

NEW YORK (AP)—Stromberg John (Boog) Powell, a Paul Bunyan with freckles hasn't chopped down any trees but he's popping up many a pitcher while keeping the Baltimore Orioles in the thick of the American League pennant race.

Providing Baltimore with a consistent home run threat, the 4-foot-3, 235-pounder hit a home run in the second inning when Felix Torres staged and moved around as the Orioles cut down the New York Yankees 3-1 Tuesday night and regained first place.

Powell, a 22-year-old left-handed batter who has learned to harness his Bannanay strength, drove his two-run shot off 23-game winner Ralph Terry in the fifth inning. It was his ninth homer of the season and 27th run belted in to go with a respectable .292 batting average.

This is a large step ahead for Powell, who hit only 243 while collecting 15 homers and 83 RBIs in his rookie year last season after coming out of the minors with a .247 batting average.

Powell's home run gave the Orioles a 1-0 edge over New York. The Chicago White Sox dropped Erie third place, one game back in Baltimore, by hitting the Los Angeles Angels 1-0 as Dan O'Connell pitched a three-hitter.
