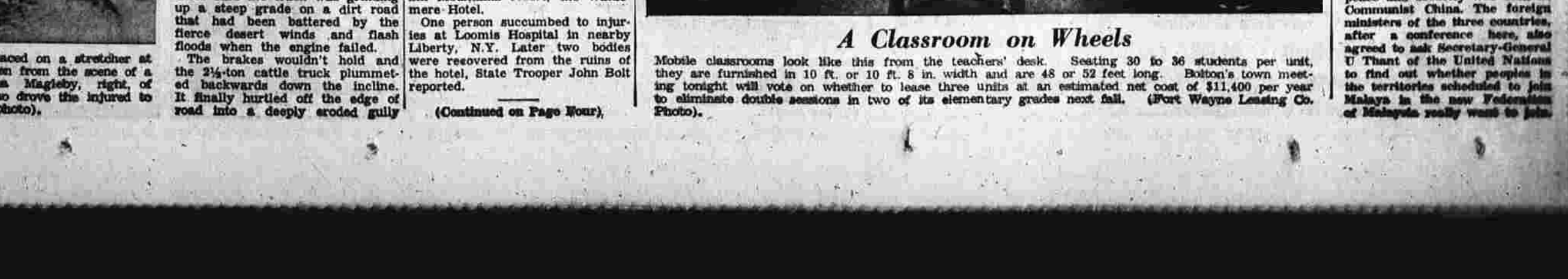
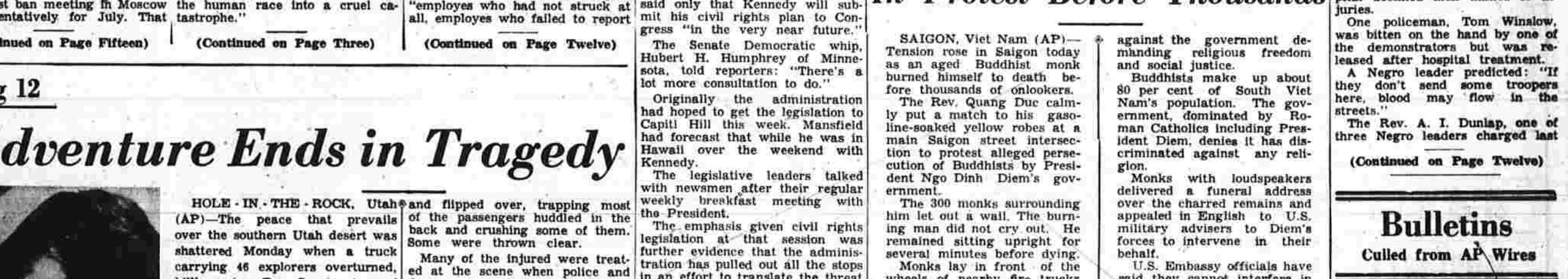
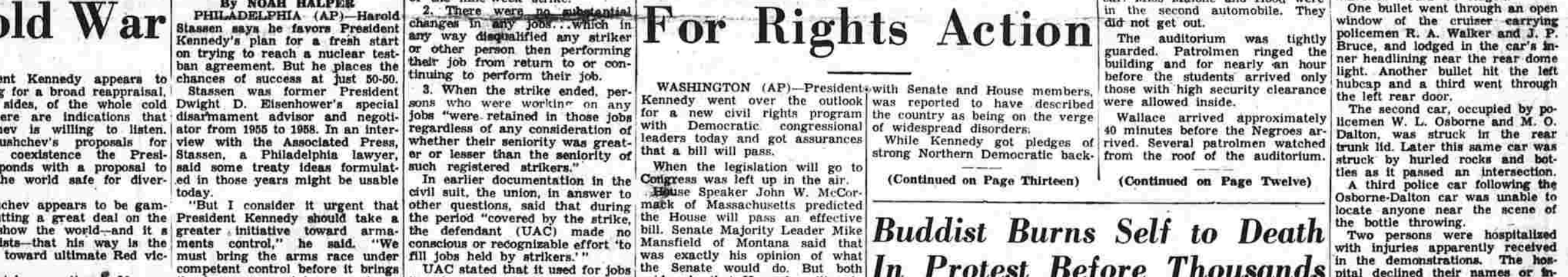

General Assembly Best Remembered For Ending Political Insurance Fund

HARTFORD (AP)—The 1963 General Assembly will probably be best remembered as the session that abolished a 25-year-old political patronage fund financed by commissions on state insurance policies.

The Insurance Fund investigation and the reforms legislation that resulted from it was unquestionably the major story of the five-month session that was held to close last night.

It was a story that made headlines across the nation because one of the key figures involved was State and National Democratic Party leader John M. Bailey. And although the investigation itself was launched by Republicans over the objections of Democrats, the outcome proved just as damaging—if not more so—to the public image of the Republican Party as it did to that of the Democrats.

Some political associates of former GOP State Comptroller Fred R. Zeller, who once controlled the fund, were shown to have collected more than \$100,000 in insurance commissions over a four-year period.

No one person on the other hand, got more than \$16,000 from the fund in the time the Democrats took over in 1959.

Although no one ever charged that the system, the rights of the legislature itself to investigate the matter was challenged in the court.

This was only one of the many facets of the probe that produced all the drama of an otherwise routine session.

There were other controversies, including a second investigation into the legislature itself, but these were nearly all minor and, in some cases, were resolved in the course of the session.

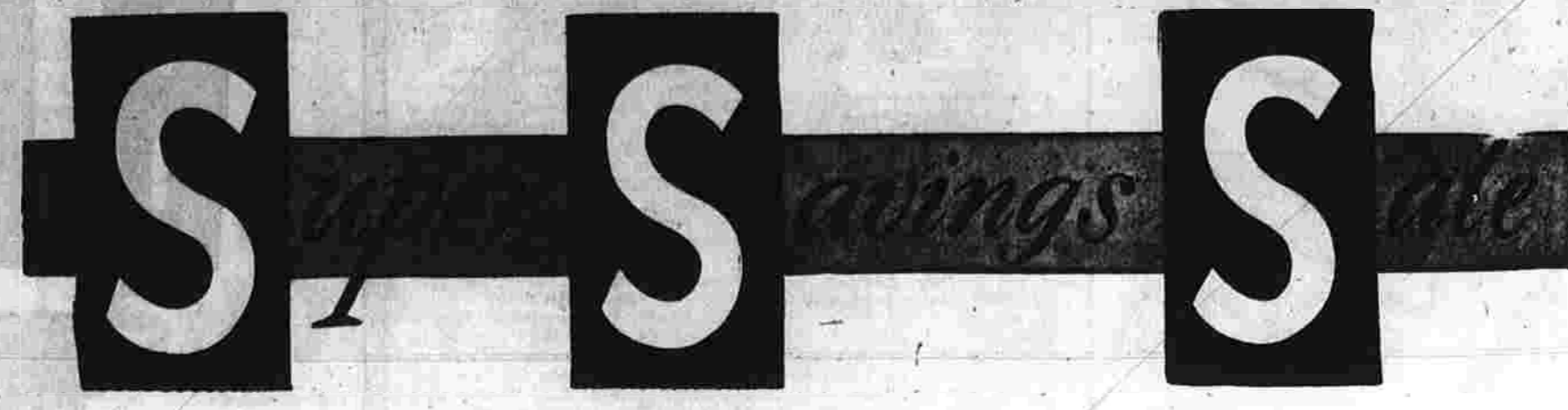

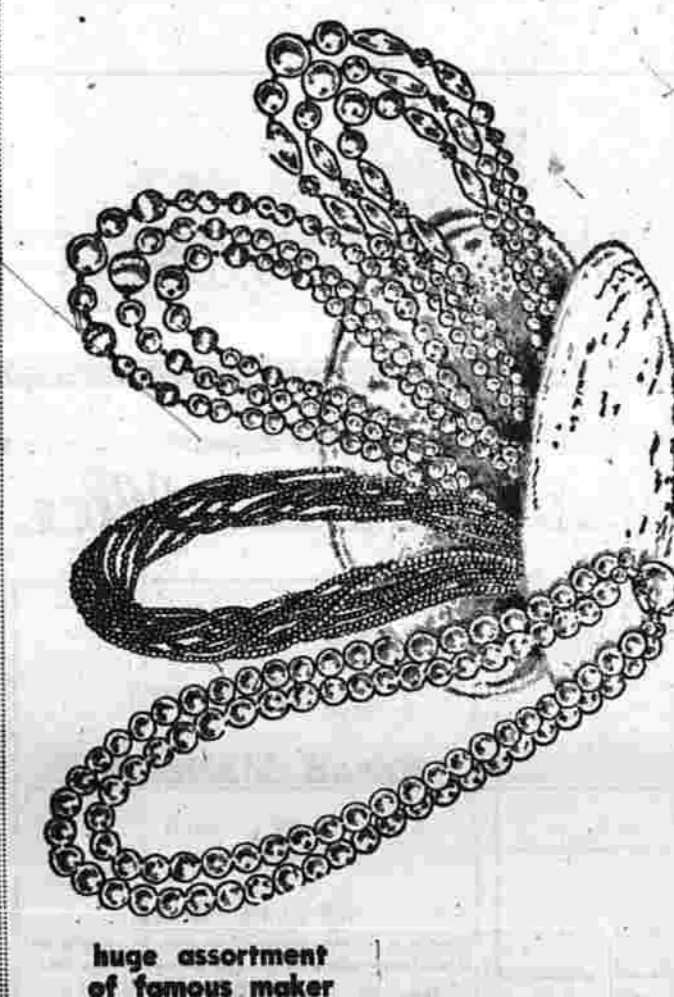

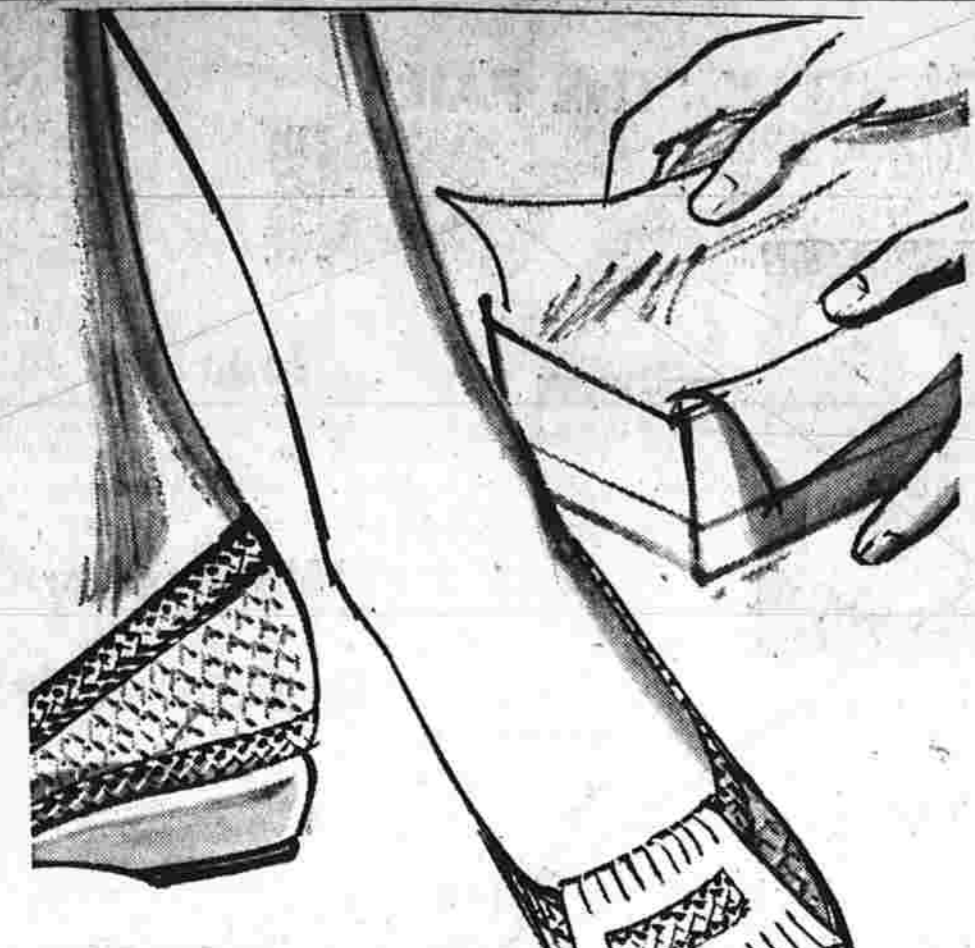

Federal Aides Took Year Off For Thinking

Princeton, N.J. (AP) — Smack in the middle of busy careers, nine important federal government officials got a year off to think.

The year is about over now. How have they held up?

Twins were born too one of the nine. New friendships formed. President Kennedy heard about the project and met with the nine men in Washington.

Donald A. Wehmyer, 41, a legal adviser with the State Department, measured the year in a word—brooding.

"As a member of the State Department," said Wehmyer, "I was inclined to weigh things in terms of political impact. But after being exposed to new thoughts and ideas and problems, I think I'll be a little more tolerant of the other fellow's point of view."

This path to new perspectives was paved by Princeton University and a \$5-million gift to the university's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs.

The donor, asking only anonymity, planned the money program in 1961 to expand the Woodrow Wilson program. The program branched out last year to provide fellowships for federal officials at mid-career.

The nine were selected from 28 candidates representing 12 agencies and divisions of the federal government. They range from Dr. C. Wayne Bill, 34, director of the nuclear technology division of the Atomic Energy Commission station in Idaho, to David H. Green, 37, director of employee relations at the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard.

The fellowships provided a year's tuition of \$1,400 and relocation allowances to move their families to Princeton. They continued to draw their regular federal salaries.

It looked like a once-in-a-lifetime thing, mused George R. Miller, a fellowship winner from the Department of the Interior. "A wonderfully challenging way to get away from the day-to-day pressures of the job and take stock."

There are no grades, examinations or credits—but plenty of lectures, seminars and homework, including piles of outside reading. Most took courses in economics, sociology, history and political science with heavy outside reading in philosophy, science and the newspapers.

There were also about 35 skill sessions with people ranging from Allen W. Dulles, former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, to former New Jersey Gov. Robert B. Meyner.

"We'd sit for hours, sometimes over beer and pretzels, and pick their brains," said Wehmyer.

Dr. Gardner Patterson, director of the Woodrow Wilson School and no stranger to government service, figures not only the students but the federal service will reap benefits from the program. Eight fellowships will be offered next year.

"There are some kinks to be ironed out," said Patterson. "It may take five years to gauge the impact of this year."

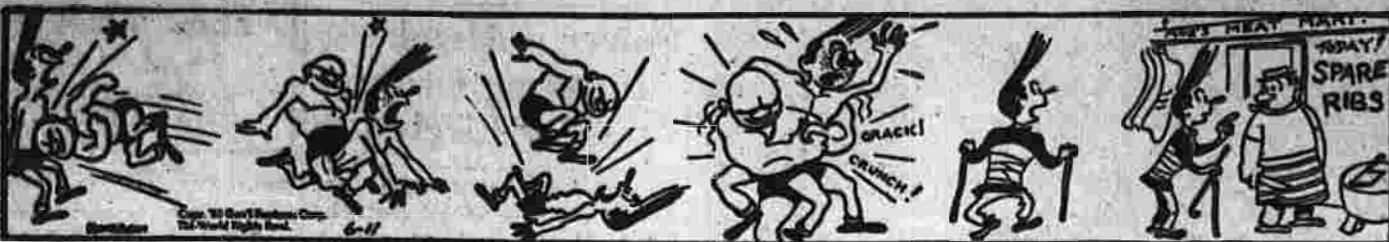

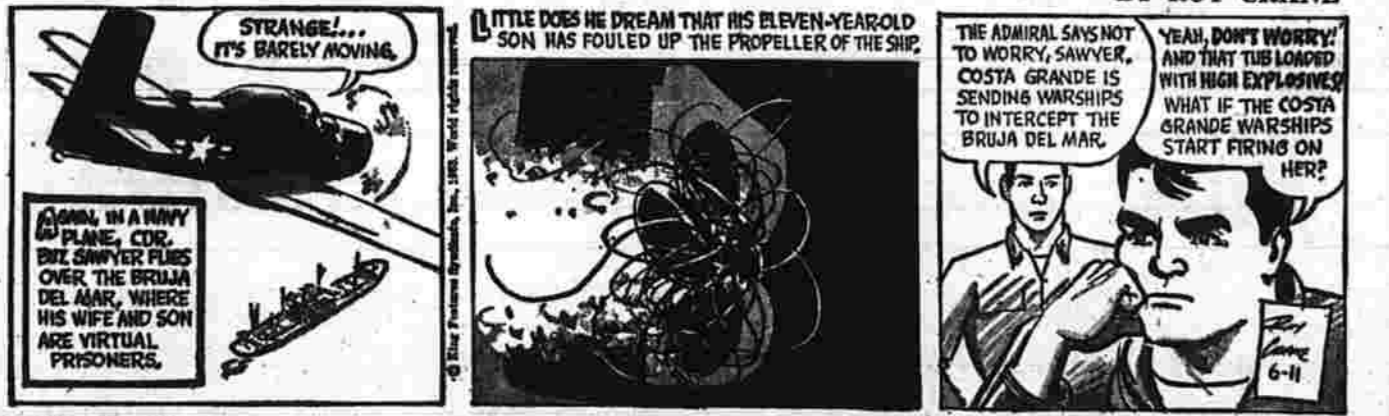

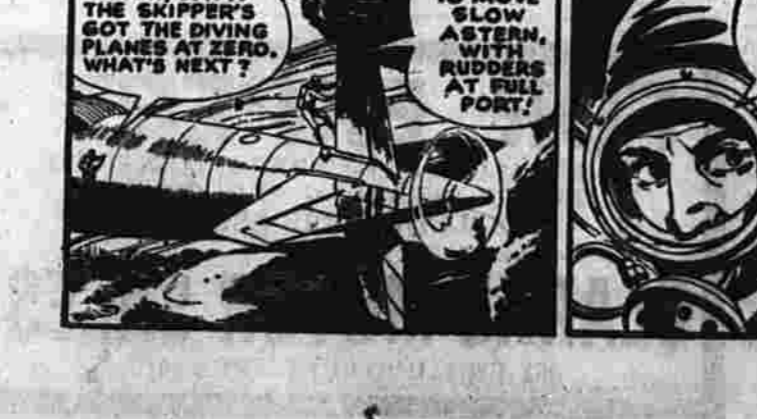

Halt Called In Mercury For Gemini

WASHINGTON (AP)—Space chief James E. Webb announced today that there will be no additional Project Mercury orbital flights.

Webb said the Senate Space Committee that the decision against Mercury flight was reached this morning at a conference with Associate Director Robert Seamans Jr. and Deputy Administrator Hugh Dryden.

Project Mercury directors and the seven original Mercury astronauts that agreed this year Mercury flight be attempted, this one of about 100 hours.

But Webb said plans and preparations for another Mercury flight would slow development of the Gemini program, the first flight which is now expected early in 1969.

Examine Conscience, Kennedy Asks Nation



WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy has warned the nation that discrimination against Negroes has lighted 'fires of frustration and discord' that threaten the peace and safety of the country.

The President outlined a broad legislative program he will propose to Congress next week. He said it will be based on the proposition 'that race has no place in American life or law.'

Kennedy appeared Tuesday evening on radio and television in a fireside civil rights lecture to Americans of both North and South only hours after Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace bowed to federal pressure and stepped aside to let two Negro students register at the previously all-white University of Alabama.

When Americans are sent to Viet Nam or West Berlin, we do not ask for whites only, he said. It must be possible, therefore, for American students of every American origin to have the same educational opportunities that are available to all.

Kennedy, declaring that America faces a moral crisis as a country and as a people, said he will ask Congress to make a civil rights commitment 'it has fully made in this century.'

The President said he will propose legislation that would: 1. Prohibit stores, hotels, restaurants and theaters from discriminating against Negroes. 2. Allow the federal government to take a more active part in court suits aimed at desegregating public schools. 3. Afford greater protection for Negroes' right to vote.

Acknowledging the new laws are not enough, Kennedy said, however, that in too many parts of the country...

Macmillan Persuades Aides To Stand by Him on Scandal

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan held an emergency Cabinet meeting today and reportedly persuaded his shakier ministers to back his handling of the Profumo vice scandal.

None of the ministers would speak publicly about the meeting and, in fact, none of them looked very happy about it.

But the usually well-informed British Press Association said it was evident that the meeting was a harmonious one and that there may well be a unanimity of view.

These facts leaked out:—The Cabinet received the report of an inquiry into whether resigned War Minister John Profumo violated security in his relations with Soviet spy captain, Eugene Ivanov.

Decisions were reached on tactics to restore Conservative majority confidence at its lowest ebb since the 1955 crisis which brought down Sir Anthony Eden, then prime minister.

A new public opinion poll, taken since the storm broke, showed a further steep decline in public confidence in the Conservative government and its government.

Two Men Shot During Riots In Cambridge

CAMBRIDGE, Md. (AP)—Two white men were shot and at least four other persons were injured during a riot in Cambridge, Md., Monday.

The riot broke out in a small race riot erupted in the small Baltimore suburb Monday night when a group of white youths followed an equal number of Negro demonstrators into violence when a crowd of students attempted to march in the streets.

The Negroes had been protesting their second march on the town's courthouse and jail protesting the sentencing of a Negro boy and girl. The 15-year-olds who had been arrested several times for participating in racial demonstrations were scheduled to be delinquent for an indefinite period.

A handful of city police tried to keep the two groups separated, but the whites swarmed across the street toward the marchers as they walked along to class.

Campus Friendly To Negro Students

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—Two Negroes—a girl and a boy—went to their first classes at the University of Alabama today and white students greeted them with friendly smiles in an atmosphere of tranquility.

Three white youths followed a group of Negro demonstrators into violence when a crowd of students attempted to march in the streets.

Both left their respective dorms shortly before 8 a.m. A Negro girl, apparently the first to be admitted, was waiting for the marshals, was waiting for the marshals, was waiting for the marshals.

Two white women went with her. A third joined them as they crossed the campus streets, hotels, restaurants and theaters from discriminating against Negroes.

One Guardsman also was in the line. He did not appear to be a member of the Alabama National Guard. He was wearing a uniform and carrying a rifle.

Buddhists Mourning As Diem Asks Calm

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Millions of Buddhists gathered in front of Buddhist pagodas today for memorial services for a monk who burned himself to death in protest against President Ngo Dinh Diem's religious policies.

About 80 per cent of South Viet Nam's 15 million people are Buddhists, but the government is dominated by Diem's Catholic family.

Buddhist leaders, committed by their religion to non-violent action, threatened to call on lay followers to join in demonstrations which they would probably follow.

Duration of the official strike was not announced. It was feared these would produce more incidents.

Police said the assassin was probably 100 feet away from Evers. He was wearing a dark suit and a hat.
