

Miss Joan Emelia Swanson of Williams Rd., Bolton, has been preparing for her forthcoming marriage and eventual residence in Greece by learning to make Greek dishes from recipes sent to her by her fiance's aunt, Mrs. Olga Hondrosides of Bolton, Mass. Chicken Soup with Avgolemono Sauce and Greek Easter Cookies or Koulourakia, are two of her favorites.

Chicken Soup with Avgolemono Sauce
1/2 cup rice or vermicelli
1 quart chicken stock
Salt and pepper
2 eggs
Juice of 1 1/2 lemons
Cook rice or vermicelli in chicken stock, salted and peppered to taste, for 20 minutes, or until cooked. Remove from heat.
Separate eggs and beat whites in large bowl until stiff. Beat yolks, add lemon juice, mix and fold into egg whites.
Just before serving soup, combine egg-lemon sauce with chicken soup as follows: Ladle a small amount of hot soup, very slowly, into the egg mixture, beating all the time. Continue adding soup stock to reach until about half the soup is used up. Pour remaining soup, mixing all the time, into soup and sauce in the bowl. For a more tangy flavor, serve 1/2 lemon more tangy flavor, serve 1/2 lemon more.

Greek Easter Cookies (Koulourakia)
1/2 cup butter
1 cup milk
2 teaspoons baking powder
2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream sugar, butter and vanilla thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add milk and flour alternately, beating vigorously until well blended. Work with hands until dough is smooth. Sprinkle flour on board before rolling.
Roll out into 12-inch strips. Twist two ends together and form a six-inch braid. Sesame seeds may be sprinkled on board and rolled into dough as twists are formed.
Brush tops of cookies with beaten egg and bake on greased cookie sheet for 20 minutes in 400 degree oven. This recipe makes about 28 cookies.

The Doctor Says
ADD FUNGI TO GERMS AND VIRUSES AS DISEASE CAUSE

Medical science has conquered many of the more deadly infectious diseases caused by bacteria and viruses. This has been accomplished through vaccination as in the case of smallpox, sanitation as in the case of typhoid, and antibiotics as in the case of middle ear infections, to name only a few. But even these diseases pop up from time to time when we let down our guard.
It would appear that we can never really become complacent because in recent years there has been a gradual but steady increase in another kind of infection—diseases caused by fungi or molds.
About 50 different kinds are harmful to man and at least 12 of them are real killers. Fortunately, germs that with almost any kind of infection in a population result in the development of a relative immunity and the more deadly diseases begin to appear in a milder form. This has already happened in the case of histoplasmosis.
A fungus disease known as cryptococcosis, once a rarity, is now becoming relatively common, but it seems to attack chiefly persons who are already weakened by some chronic disease such as leukemia, sarcoidosis, diabetes or tuberculosis. The causative mold of cryptococcosis is found in soil that has been contaminated with pigeon droppings. When such soil becomes dry, infective dust may be carried by the wind and inhaled by human beings.
This disease may settle in the lungs or in the skin but most commonly it makes its way to the brain where it causes a severe meningitis much like the meningitis occasionally caused by the tubercle bacillus.
The disease was uniformly fatal until the antibiotic, amphotericin B, was discovered. It will hold its own until the body can build up an immunity.
For this reason early diagnosis is important and medical scientists are looking for ways to diagnose the disease before it gets a head start. To this end a skin test, not yet discovered, would be a great boon to man. Meanwhile your doctor will have to rely on spinal puncture and other methods.
Q—I have been told that persons with Alzheimer's disease are old before their time and that they may be senile when they are 50. Is there a cure for this disease?
A—As we grow older there is some deterioration in all the body systems. When this affects the brain, primarily the condition is known as senile dementia. When a similar condition occurs in persons under 50 it is called presenile dementia or Alzheimer's disease. Hardening of the arteries of the brain may be a contributing factor. The chief manifestations are loss of memory for recent happenings, failure of judgment and odd or unpredictable behavior.
It is true that there is no cure for this disease but it is very important to make sure that the condition in a given individual is really Alzheimer's disease and not a curable disease in which the symptoms are similar. Your doctor should, therefore, make careful studies to see whether the symptoms may not be due to pernicious anemia, brain tumor, bromide poisoning, or thyroid deficiency.
