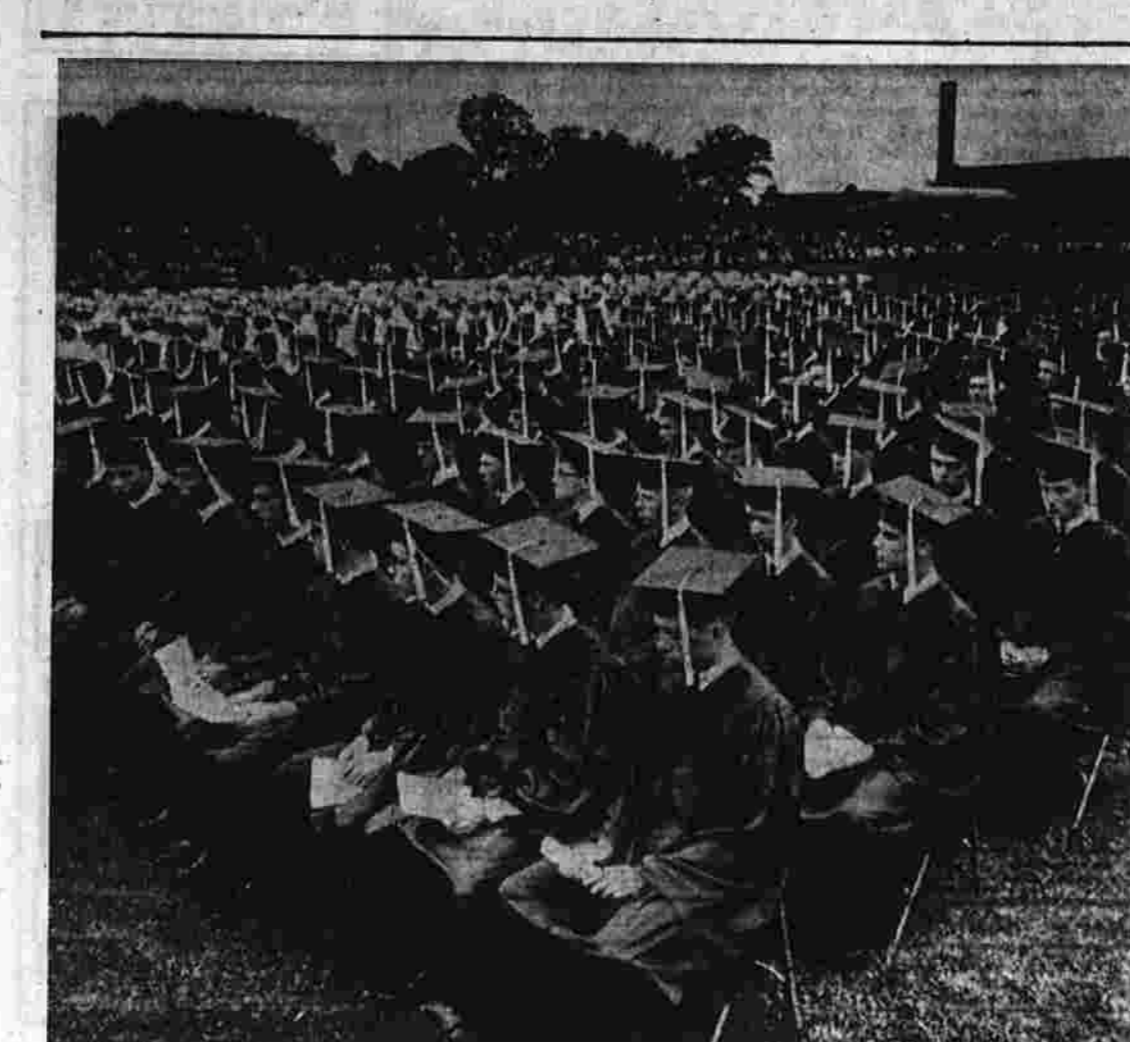

ALBANY, Ga.—Negro residents remaining massive demonstrations after months-long respite, reported a letter, angry and frustrated.

TAMPA, Fla.—Negro youths ignore racial negotiations by elders, begin demonstrations in Tampa and nearby St. Petersburg.

JACKSON, Miss.—First Negro policeman hired, mayor working on compulsory school plan to cut number of possible demonstrators.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy has asked Congress to approve a massive federal vocational training and education program designed to aid economically deprived Negro and white Americans.

MARTIN DRINKERS' LOSS ROMED (AP)—Olives had it hard this year. The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization reports that the Italian harvest was probably the worst since 1955.

One bill would expand the manpower development program authorized last year, a second would step up the vocational education measure now being con-

gress without an adequate education and training is far higher than the proportion of whites," Kennedy said, "In these times of problems is restricted to Negroes alone."

Among other things, the President called for:

1. A new \$70 million program to teach adults to read and write so they can take advantage of federal retraining programs.

2. Expansion of funds for special boarding schools to train out-of-school jobless youths.

3. Lowering the age for youth apprentice training allowances from 18 to 16 and raising the proportion of training allowances for young people from 5 to 15 per cent.

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz said the manpower bill would cost \$100 million in the next fiscal year. Secretary of Welfare Anthony J. Celebrezze put a \$200-million price tag on the two other measures.

Next week, the House Judiciary Committee will start hearings on the President's civil rights package with Attorney Gen. Robert F. Kennedy as the lead-off witness.

The economic implications of specialization will most certainly affect all of us. Although many people view a 35 hour work week of the future with the idea of increased leisure time, a shortened week will require of each individ-

ual increasing specialization. Already the skilled worker has shown his effectiveness in industry. Typing and shorthand have long been useful in business, and now it is the electric typewriter and the dictaphone. What will be the future tomorrow?

Our specialized knowledge may come from working experience of our jobs. While delving deeper into any one problem, the individual has an opportunity to master the art of learning, an invaluable art in our changing society. In new situations, we must use new ideas of our own. Ultimately, we, as individuals, must use our specialized knowledge to analyze and surmount obstacles.

Thus, the baseball parallel is representative of our need for specialization. All players must step up to bat, but out in the field, a good player is one who knows his particular job. So, too, as we go forth to meet new challenges, let us

ing we learn: Through learning we may learn. Through education and observation the speaking of beauty and meaning becomes a part of the unity of life. In art, unity is achieved by the blending of the widely varied aspects of color, form, line and tone.

Only in this attempt at comprehension, can we, living ever to the new Pope as a distinguished journalist.

Going out into crowds and visiting workers did not come as easily to Pope John. But the new Pope has shown the same feeling getting close to the people.

In Milan, his birth place, he is familiar to workmen in the city factories, many of them strong-holds of Communist unions.

The new ruler of half a billion Roman Catholics is identified with the progressive group in the Church hierarchy. He is expected to continue with new vigor the Ecumenical Council called by Pope John.

As archbishop of Milan he spoke of the Church as the protector of the poor and the guardian of social justice.

And he shared with Pope John a desire to see the reunion of Christendom. "In one shepherd with only one pastor."

Pope Paul has the dignity and physical presence that often goes with being a pontiff.

He is a diplomat, an administrator and a man of culture. His friends say he possesses tact and gentleness combined with piety.

As cardinal, he served as the secretary of state in the Vatican. He occupied a high pastoral post. During his eight years in that northern Italian industrial metropolis, he established a reputation as a defender of the Church's role in the 20th century.

Pope Paul believes in converting Communists rather than fighting them.

In a pastoral letter in 1956, when the cold war was at a bitter peak, he wrote: "Let us be religious and unbigamous who gather behind Marxism know that somebody still loves them strongly. This world's division of the crucified God think of them as they, love them, await them in His name."

On social questions he once said: "The weather changes should not be the reason for the Church for private property in its essential forms, its constant vigilance, often stern but always right and fatherly warnings on the more and social dangers of selfish wealth, on the necessity of a more just distribution of economic goods, on the beauty of a human and social mission of a dignified and generous contribution to the elevation of the working classes."

"The social doctrine of the Church has never denied the function of private enterprise provided this does not mean human dignity and the legitimate aspirations of those who take part in the productive process."

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For the knowledge and character

One of three brothers, Pope Paul was born Sept. 26, 1897, at Concesio near the north Italian city of Brescia. He was ordained to the priesthood in the Brescia Cathedral in 1920. He entered the Vatican diplomatic service soon after that, advancing to the post of prosecretary of state in 1952, under Pope Pius XII.

Pope John announced in the company of January 1963 that he had wanted to make Montini a cardinal. But he said Montini deserved to be a cardinal, he said, because he had served in his post, a year later, however, Pope Pius sent him to Milan as archbishop. He received the red hat of cardinal four years later, in December, 1958, under Pope John.

Both of Pope Paul's brothers are living.

Lodovico Montini, the eldest, is 64, and a lawyer. He served as a member of the Italian Chamber of Deputies through three parliaments and was elected to the Senate in the last election, April 25. He is married and has seven children, three boys and four girls.

The younger brother, Francesco Montini, 62, is a physician. He is married and has two daughters.

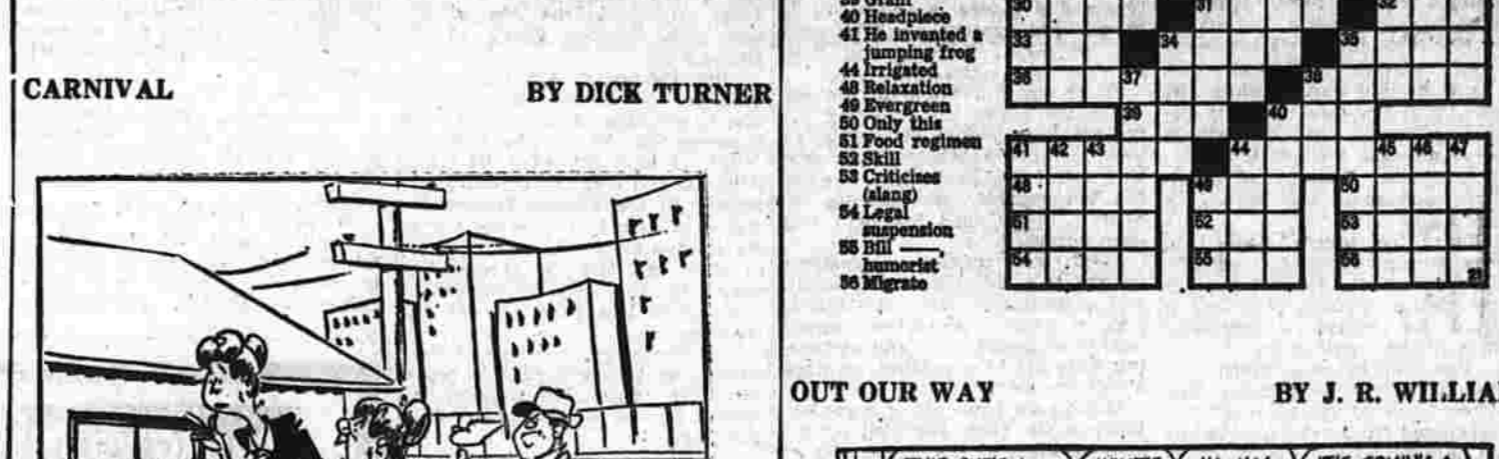
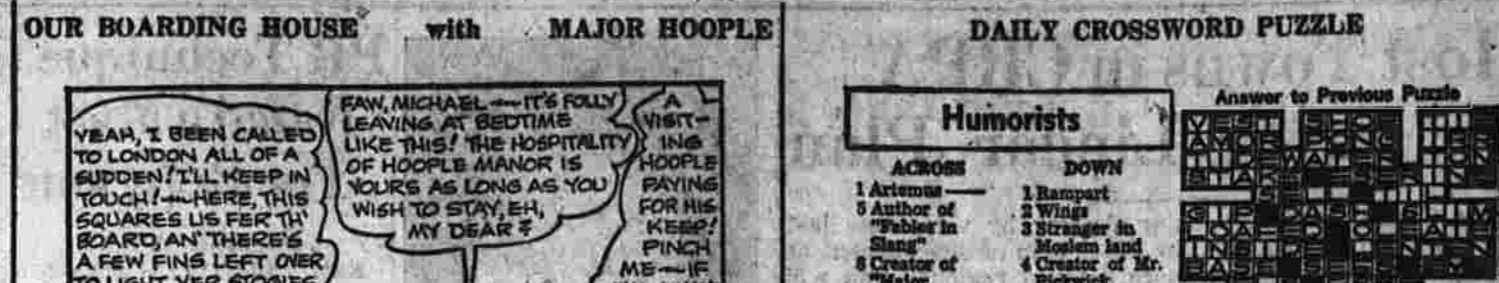
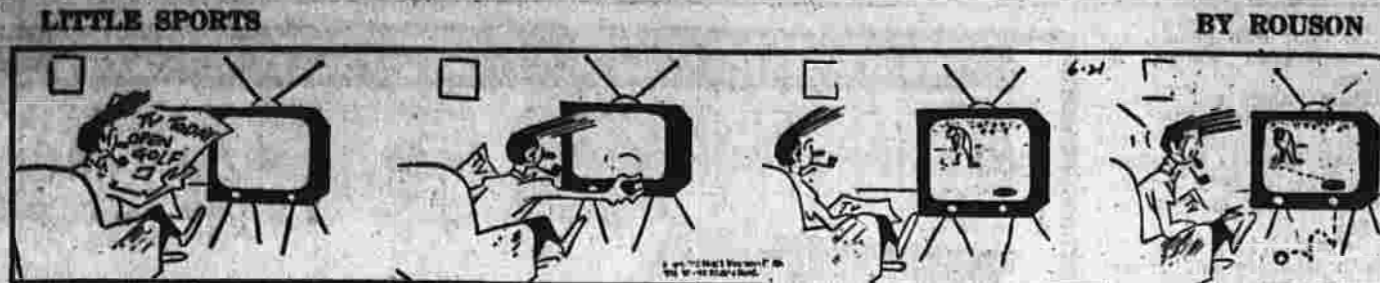
