The commission last night also voted to request an additional \$500 for next year's budget.

Israeli Chief Puts Emphases On Defenses

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector (AP) — Israel's new prime minister, Levi Eshkol, has warned the Arab states the No. 7 objective is to strengthen the security of this 15-year-old state.

Thus Eshkol, whose tripartite centrist coalition Cabinet was approved by the Knesset (parliament) last week, served notice he intends to pursue the toughest policies of his predecessor, David Ben-Gurion, who resigned for personal reasons.

Where Ben-Gurion, 74, was inclined to be subtle and cautious, Eshkol, 67, made it clear he did not expect to be pushed into the sea by his Arab neighbors. While Ben-Gurion was notable for his Arab states are bickering in their efforts to unite, Eshkol saw a danger in this unity.

"We cannot foresee at this moment how the internal struggle in the Arab world will develop, but in view of the aggressive policy followed by the leaders of the Arab countries today and their activities in acquiring and developing the most modern types of offensive armaments—which are designed for the destruction of Israel—we must maintain a state of constant security preparedness."

"The government will give first priority to the strengthening of security. It will endeavor to acquire and develop the most modern equipment. Required for the security of the state and its people."

This equipment will include U.S. Army Hawk air defense missiles, which the Israelis have agreed to buy from the United States. The Israelis want a supersonic missile to combat what they say is a dangerous buildup of air-strike power in the United Arab Republic.

Eshkol, like Ben-Gurion before him, believes that only a strong Israel can prevent war in the Middle East. Indeed, one of the last acts of the outgoing Ben-Gurion Cabinet was to approve an additional 10 million Israeli pounds—\$1.3 million—allocation for Israeli defense. What the expenditure was for was not disclosed. A communiqué said it was because of "recent developments."

Eshkol also promised to continue to strengthen and develop the Israeli armed forces, which won victories in 1948 and 1956.

The new prime minister also promises his administration will encourage immigration from all countries, a project close to the heart of Ben-Gurion. Under the former premier, Israel's population increased from 800,000 to more than two million.

You Should Know ... Dr. Douglas Smith

Since he came to Manchester about four years ago, Dr. Douglas H. Smith, 407 Woodbridge St., has developed an interest in community development which led to his appointment last month, as one of the town's three representatives to the Capitol Region Planning Agency.

With little more than two weeks behind him in his CRPA post, Dr. Smith feels understandably hesitant about discussing the agency's role in the town.

Broadly speaking, he says, "The CRPA does have an important advisory capacity, to offer guidance to member communities in making their own town plans."

The need for such guidance is evidenced by the lack of continuity in zoning between towns. Dr. Smith says, "One town may be zoned for residential use along its boundaries, while its neighbor has designated immediately adjoining land for industrial use."

Writing rationally to the region requires the CRPA not only to be a clearing house for information about each town's zoning, but also to provide an overall plan by which the member communities may orient themselves.

When Dr. Smith came to Manchester to join the staff of the expanded Manchester Memorial Hospital in 1969, his concern for community improvement was largely unobscured.

He had had a taste of such matters through his father-in-law, the town engineer of Mountain View, W. J. Smith, and his wife, then Miss Jean M. Campbell, while a pre-med student at the University of Syracuse, where she was working in nursing education.

In Mountain View, the town is strong in commercial and industrial development. The town fathers have initiated "aesthetic zoning," requiring non-residential developments to have pleasing, grassy areas between differing land uses, as a protection to all town residents.

"It costs a developer a little more," Dr. Smith says, "but I think in the long run even the developer finds it pays off."

While the zoning board of appeals frequently makes such aesthetic stipulations as part of permission for special land uses, Dr. Smith would like to see some basic requirements included in the zoning regulations.

"It will be difficult to enact in Manchester, such proposals get a good deal of opposition. The planning commission is preparing zoning regulations now, and we hope to get some aesthetic zoning included."

Dr. Smith has been a member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce's beautification committee, and has talked with the TPC about inclusion of some such regulations in the new zoning ordinance up for approval later this year.

U.S. Testing New Tactics In Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (AP) — South Viet Nam is proving to be a valuable laboratory for combat-testing new U.S. ideas in special military equipment.

It also is giving the Army, Marine and Air Force a chance to work out under shooting-war conditions "new tactics and techniques for using helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft in guerrilla-type wars."

The thousands of U.S. military men advising and training the South Vietnamese forces in their work against Communist insurgents form a growing corps of the seasoned veterans returning to Vietnam in effort to bring down the pro-Western governments.

The Pentagon's program to develop a new year for special purposes is carried on by the Advanced Research Projects Agency (ARPA) under the name "Project ARIA." ARPA has two research and development teams in South Vietnam.

The emphasis is on simplicity, durability, ease of maintenance and adaptability to the terrain, driving aircraft in support of the communities of the Burmese, and the British in their 11-year campaign which ended in suppression of Malayan Communist insurgents in Viet Nam. The ARPA effort has been directed, among other things, to improve detection of vermin in efforts to bring down the pro-Western governments.

Manchester System Participates School Accreditation Aim of 2-Year Study

By BILL OOE

In September Manchester will become part of a unique educational experiment. The school system and 15 other selected from throughout the state, together with the Department of Education, for the first time will attempt to spell out what Connecticut means by "good schools."

These groups are beginning a two-year study and testing of accreditation standards for all Connecticut schools, which the state department has prepared.

If and when the standards are finally adopted, they will compel all schools to meet to be "accredited," or certified, by the State Board of Education as offering standards of quality equal to those of the state.

Rather than merely setting minimum conditions, the standards would certify that the schools are doing as good a job as possible in the multiple areas of a diversified program.

According to William J. Standen, state commissioner of education, the project will be aimed at identifying those schools that are good enough to qualify for accreditation, and to help design the opportunities for education in public schools.

Under state laws, a school is accredited by the state board in order to accept tuition. But under the proposed plan, the entire school system would be judged by the standards set by the state board.

Next May, local committees will complete their studies and recommendations to the State Department of Education. The standards will be further studied and approved by the state board after which they will be submitted to the State Board of Education for final approval.

The Board of Education feels one of its major responsibilities is to ensure that the schools charge the towns with the responsibility of maintaining a certain level of education. What good schools should be, and how to get them, is a question which the state commissioner has stated varies in the ability of each town to pay for schools. Standards, therefore, would not act as a guide to financing schools, but as a guide to educational quality.

One area, however, where the standards would be particularly strict is on the quality of the staff. The standards call for a staff of 120 would be needed to handle the state's 10,000 students in grades 10-12, estimated at slightly over 2,500.

Under the budget plan, the state would not pay for the cost of a new gain of six teachers for each year, with a total of 111, Rogers said.

He estimated the staff-pupil ratio will be just about 1 to 20.

How will the standards be tested? Much participating school systems will be selected for a study. The study will be conducted by a committee which will work with a state project group to develop a system which will test the standards as they are applied to the schools. 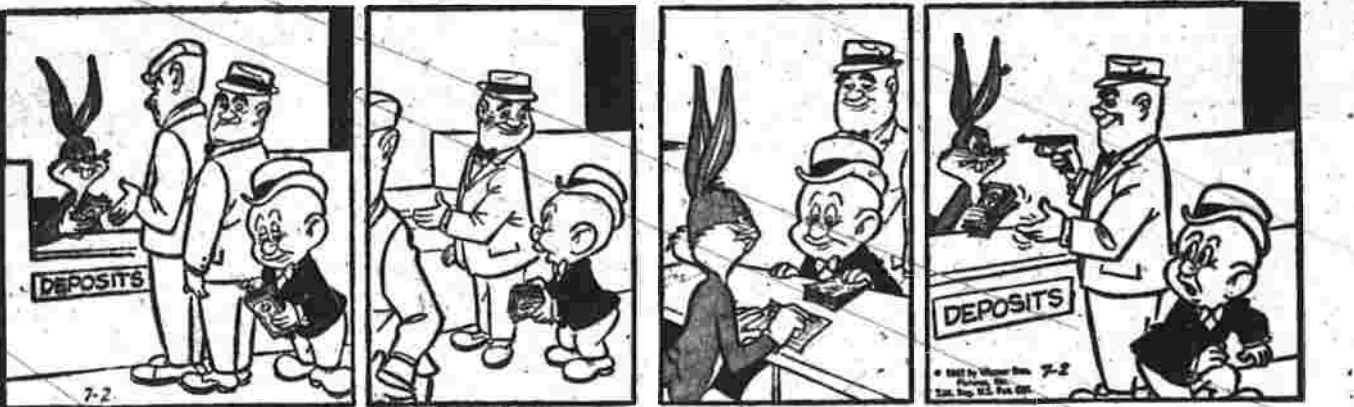

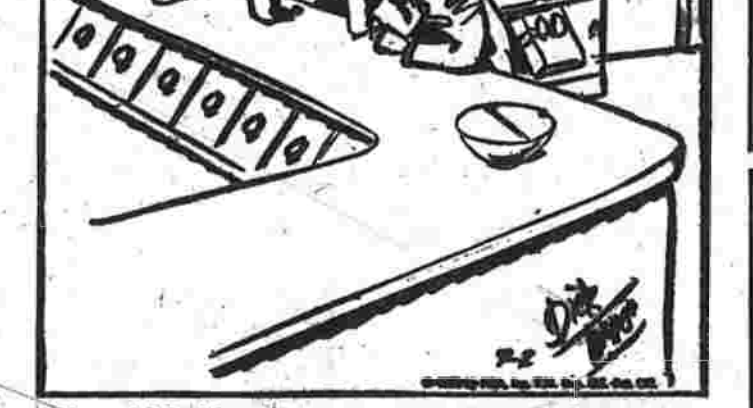
