School Stand Gave Wallace Size in South

By BILL THOMAS MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—As an Alabama political figure, Gov. George C. Wallace may have emerged from the University of Alabama more as a fighter than ever before. His schoolhouse door stand against the admission of three Negro students to the university, although unsuccessful, is the reason for a greater prestige. Wallace still clings to the hope that, somehow, he will convince the federal courts that the three Negroes were illegally admitted to the university, where Confederate officers trained a century ago. Recently, the university board of trustees, of which the governor is an ex-officio president, asked the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals to set aside the District Court order which put the Negroes in school. Much of the praise in the state for his refusal to leave the schoolhouse door until federalized National Guard troops marched onto the campus is based on the absence of mob violence. Wallace had sealed off the university with state troopers, and had National Guardsmen on standby duty before they were called into federal service. Discouraged by the support, the governor has announced his intention to withhold Alabama's electoral votes from President Kennedy in next year's election. He traveled to Jackson, Miss., to help organize a competing independent electoral drive there. If the two states, and possibly others, do not support the national Democratic party again, Wallace may head a states rights presidential ticket. The goal of an unpledged electoral campaign would be to force the election into the House of Representatives, Wallace has no illusions that he could be elected on a third party ticket. But he may have other political ambitions—perhaps the U.S. Senate, or a second term as governor starting in 1971. The state constitution prohibits the governor from succeeding himself. Sen. John Sparkman, Democrat, comes up for re-election in 1969, but Wallace couldn't oppose him then. The governor is disqualified by law from occupying any elective state office for at least a year after the expiration of his term in 1967. If Wallace has designs on the Senate, he will have to wait until then. Later this fall, Wallace had "matured as a statesman. He laid aside some political considerations and reached full political maturity. Alabama newspapers generally cheered Wallace. The Montgomery Advertiser, which disagreed with the wisdom of the schoolhouse door stand but conceded the governor was obligated to carry it out, said, "Among Southern governors, he has a very distinctive position and will be very much in demand over the country as a speaker."

Group Directs Gripes About Poor Housing

 NEW YORK (AP)—"My baby was bitten by a rat last night—the third time. The landlord says we don't have rats."

"The ceiling is about to fall in the bathroom. We're afraid to take baths."

"I have seven children. Last winter we had no heat. Now we have no water. I've been to one agency after another."

"The calls pour in—nervous recitations of how families are trying to live in incredible squalor and privation in America's largest city."

"The women handling the five constantly ringing telephones feel pity, anger but no despair. Not anymore. They know they're doing something to help these victims of colossal landlordism and cumbersome municipal bureaucracy."

"Thirty women volunteers of 'Call for Action' are pioneering a new kind of joint public-private enterprise by broadcasting and private citizens."

Radio station WJCA, headed by crusading president Dr. Peter Straus, announces Call for Action information service regularly on the air.

As the calls come in, the women refer them to the right agency among the nearly dozen concerned with enforcing city housing laws.

"But we don't stop with straightening out which agency—and they overlap pitifully," says Mrs. Louise G. Cowan, co-chairman with Mrs. Samuel Hartwell. "We keep running records on the status of each complaint. We follow up with phone checks and make on-the-spot inspections. We go to court to see how the cases are handled. And we keep files on landlords. We can put out at random cards that show an owner has paid 30 fines, which is still cheaper than fixing the ceilings or getting rid of rats."

Only once has the five-day-a-week service been interrupted. That's when they were forced to move to new quarters because the city's department of buildings said they were violating the building code by using their hotel apartment space for commercial purposes.

Straus commented wryly that he was pleased to find the department enforcing the code. "We only wish that the thousands of New Yorkers in our slum neighborhoods whose appeal to the building department so often go unheeded could get the same kind of attention."

Call for Action was started when WJCA was running a hard-hitting seven-part documentary on the housing situation. "Why not?" asks Peter Straus. "Private citizen efforts fail because they have no means of putting on the public heat. Communications media efforts fail because they're not sustained. But a radio station and a group of determined women working together anywhere in the country seems unbeatable to me."

Ex-Envoy Asks Staff Cuts in U.S. Legations

WASHINGTON (AP)—Look into any U.S. embassy in the world, except perhaps in areas of Africa where things are not too comfortable, and what do you see? Attaches, administrators, lobbyists, military men, informants, specialists and men taking up loose ends—far too many people.

This, at least, is the way things seem to Ellis O. Briggs, 63, who has set Washington afire with his observations about the diplomatic missions he served for 27 years. He expressed his views in an interview, and also in testimony to a Senate subcommittee on national security staffing and operations, headed by Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash.

Even senators who did not share Briggs' views on non-professional ambassadors and the Peace Corps—both of whom he commended the retired diplomat for his ability and candor. Sen. Jackson said, "Ambassador Briggs is a pro in the very best sense. He has had the confidence of three Republican administrations and three Democratic administrations."

Many ambassadors, Briggs says, could do with half or less of their staffs. In nearly every case the people are loyal, conscientious and hard working. "It's just that there are far too many of them," Briggs says. "They clutter up the premises."

Briggs added that about 30 percent of the over-stuffed embassies are headed by political appointees as "inexperienced in diplomacy as in directing an army corps, a fleet of warships or an air force."

Most Cabinet departments—especially Defense, Commerce, Treasury, Agriculture and Justice—have people in the embassies, and so do other agencies "all the way from one end of the alphabet to the other," he said. The average U.S. embassy, Briggs says, is grossly over-stuffed, particularly by agencies other than the State Department. State Department officials shied away from any direct answer to Briggs' comments. They did say that the State Department has not sent abroad unless it was felt they were necessary.

Briggs declined to name embassies he considers over-stuffed, but he said that he had not seen the big influx of personnel because some posts are not in comfortable climates. The seven embassies where I served as ambassador and some others I know about, have about twice as many people as they need."

Briggs calls Maine his home but he lives in Hanover, N.H. He began teaching school in Istanbul shortly after graduating from Dartmouth in 1921. A few years later he joined the Foreign Service career, serving in Liberia, London, Geneva, Havana, Chile, Washington and China. He has been ambassador to the Dominican Republic, Uruguay, Czechoslovakia, Korea, Peru, Brazil and Greece.

At the Senate hearing, Briggs encountered strong defenders of the Peace Corps, and conceded that it might do good in countries where it was invited. But generally, he said, one gets the impression the corps' team cry is: "Yoo-hoo, yoo-hoo! Let's go out and wreak some good on some natives."

Briggs said the United States should quit "playing musical chairs" by shunting around its ambassadors in the entire world. (Howard Jones, ambassador to Indonesia) who has been at his post for as long as five years. The average, the last time I looked it up, was less than a year and a half.

One way to cut down embassy staffs, he said, is for state of foreign aid missions to pull out when projects are finished.

"When you terminate a program you don't automatically get rid of the Indians," he said. "Some try to remain indefinitely, using up loose ends, as they explain it to you."

He said that in Santa Clara, where he lived, "this macabre spectacle is set up two or three times a week."

Citizen Unit Doubtful Of North End Plan

About 10 members of the Citizens Advisory Committee met at the Municipal Building last night to hear the first public airing of proposals for the renewal of Manchester's North End.

"At a City's Redevelopment Agency (MRA) Executive Director Edward Rybovick showed four plans—and the one that he finds most satisfactory the CAC thought the least practical."

The four plans on view last night, and available to interested townspeople from Rybovick at the MRA office on Main St., show planned patterns of land use and traffic circulation.

"They differ most in street plan, involving the relocation of N. Main St., North School St. and N. Main intersection."

Main St. is extended on a line to the north, to form an intersection with N. Main St., relocated north to run on an existing line behind Whittier Library, the YMCA and the bank branch office, and with N. School St., whose lower end has been moved east.

The result is a conventional four-way intersection considerably north of the present juncture of Main and N. Main Sts.

Imagining the renewal project complete as the MRA would like to see it, a pedestrian standing in the center of the new intersection would look around and see:

"To the west, along relocated N. Main St., modern garden type apartments filling about 4 1/2 acres on the north side of the street, and a small local shopping area isolated in its parking lot—like a miniature shopping center—on the south."

To the south, down Main St., is the railroad crossing, now far enough from the intersection so as not to hinder traffic, and on the east side of the street, a small commercial concentration, including a North End Post Office.

To the east, along relocated North Main, are the spruced up backs of the bank, the Y, and the Whittier Library on the south side of the street, and on the north the open expanse of Robertson Park.

Before any of this gets underway, should be developed until the residents had been consulted.

Sweeney thought that the CAC did not have the right kind of information to satisfy the North Enders. Rybovick tried to find out what he thought they would want to know.

"Who is going to pay for sewers, water lines, road relocation?" he asked.

Rybovick said that the means of paying for sewers had not yet been determined, that the privately owned Manchester Water Co. contribute to water relocation, and that the town would pay for construction through the federal grant for urban renewal.

Probably approved in most North End residents' minds is the question "How will the renewal project affect my property?"

Rooply, the assessor in an area where streets must be relocated, it must be torn down.

"I would be in favor of relocating North Main St. from the Whittier Library west including the present commercial buildings on the west corner of North Main and North School St."

"It also means removal of the buildings on the south side of North Main St. for west of City's Lumber Yard."

Land uses in the area, as recommended by the MRA, include residential, commercial, light industrial and public areas.

The CAC had scheduled a meeting July 17 to talk about the proposed renewal plan, and to consider developing its own alternative, before breaking into committees to talk to the North End residents.

The action was voted at last night's meeting of the committee in acknowledgment of the growing resentment of the use of motor boats on Columbia Lake.

The committee will urge townspeople to attend the adjourned special town meeting on July 20 which was to have re-elected town ordinance on control of motor boating. The action was originally planned for the special town meeting on June 22 but was tabled because the governor had not yet signed the bill which would have given the town the necessary authority to begin planning for the project and whatever future action may be possible. The session will be held at the home of Mrs. Roy Ferguson on Columbia Lake.

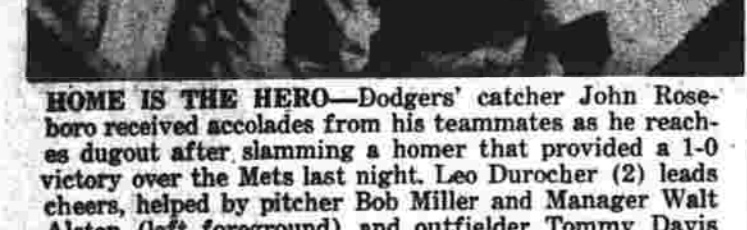
