Congress Seen Voting ICC Rail Arbitrator

JFK Asks End to Country-by-Country Immigration Quotas

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy urged Congress today to grant sweeping immigration quotas which put a ceiling on the number of people who may enter the United States annually from particular countries.

To replace country-by-country quotas, Kennedy recommended that immigrants be admitted on a basis that would give first priority to those with needed skills, and to those related to individuals already living in the United States, and to those who first apply for immigration visas.

In identical letters to Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and House Speaker John McCormack, D-Mass., Kennedy said that immigration quotas allotted by country are "without basis in either logic or reason."

The president said that the quotas are unjust because they are not based on the needs of the United States, but rather on the needs of the countries of origin.

Because there is no heavy influx of immigrants from northern Europe, Kennedy said, approximately 90 percent of the immigrants who first apply for immigration visas are from that area.

He also criticized James Rogers, NECAP (North End Community Action Project) and AFREM (Action for Equality Movement).

The Rev. James Wade, president of AFREM, charged today that NECAP member interposed with negotiations last Sunday between AFREM and the movement of Federal's Home Service Station.

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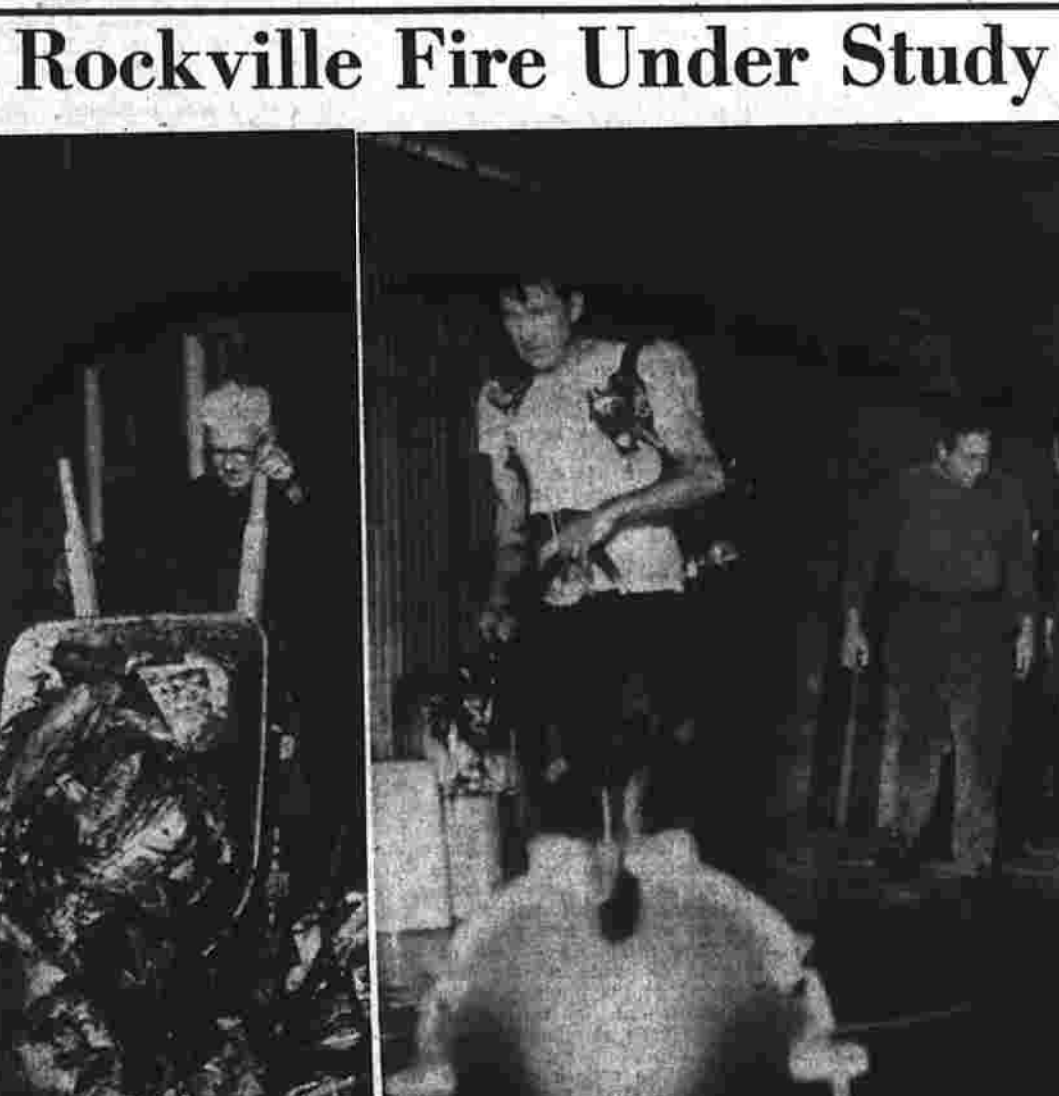

Rockville Fire Under Study

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic congressional leaders talked over the railroad labor dispute situation with President Kennedy today and reported afterward that prospects look good for Kennedy's legislative plan to avoid a strike.

In talking with newsmen after their weekly White House breakfast, however, the party chiefs stressed clear of any predictions that Congress will complete action before 11:30 a.m. Thursday. That is the hour at which the carriers have announced they will not retroactively new manpower cutting work rules into effect.

The congressional attitude of the Congress leaders on that score strongly indicated that administration still faces the job of achieving some sort of agreement with the carriers. Congress does its work. The unions of on-train workers say they will strike the minute the rules are applied.

By Speaker Wm. McCORMACK, Massachusetts said every effort will be made in the House for an agreement as possible on the presidential plan to refer the whole dispute over what the railroads call "featherbedding" to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

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Cambridge Aides Confer at Capital

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cambridge aides met today at the capital to discuss the terms of an agreement between the city and the federal government regarding the Cambridge Housing Project.

The meeting was attended by representatives of the city and the federal government, including Mayor Robert F. Wagner and U.S. Housing Administrator Robert F. Kennedy.

The agreement would provide for the construction of 2,000 new housing units in Cambridge, Massachusetts, over a period of five years.

The city and the federal government have agreed to share the cost of the project, with the city contributing 20 percent and the federal government contributing 80 percent.

The agreement also provides for the city to provide the land for the housing units, and for the federal government to provide the construction funds.

The meeting was held at the White House in Washington, D.C.

Nasser Calls Syria Fascist, Rejects Union

CAIRO (AP)—President Gamal Abdel Nasser says Egypt, Iraq and Syria cannot unite as long as the British-Syrian pact remains in force.

Nasser said that the pact is a "fascist" pact and that it is "a disgrace to the Arab world."

He said that he would not sign the pact, and that he would not allow Syria to join the pact.

Teachers Make Study Of Ninth Grade Math

Robert Kudra of 78 N. Elm St., a mathematics teacher at Hill Junior High School, is helping to write a course of study for ninth grade general math students in what is thought to be the first inter-town curriculum study ever conducted in Connecticut.

Other towns working on the study include West Hartford, Farmington, South Windsor, West Hartford and East Hartford. In addition, Glenside, which is making the group study, maintains liaison and keeps ideas with the group.

The purpose of the study is to revise the math program traditionally offered in the ninth grade in order to make it more challenging and meaningful to the student who sees little value in formal math, leads to comprehension or becomes frustrated in the conventional math class, and consequently becomes a potential school dropout.

According to Kudra, "These people see little value in the study of decimals, percentages, and other math, which is traditionally offered in the ninth grade. Some of it is material they have already had trouble with earlier grades, and they are baffled and bored by it."

Kudra said the curriculum study group is the outgrowth of individual towns' dissatisfaction in attempting to cope with the problem by themselves.

An regional meeting of school superintendents last spring in West Hartford was discussed, resulting in the decision to form a cooperative study group and tackle the problem on a more comprehensive scale than was possible on an individual basis.

The curriculum group is made up of one member from each of the six cooperating towns. They include Robert Browne, chairman of the curriculum study, Kudra; Gerald E. Hogan, West Hartford; Mrs. Marjorie Miller, Farmington; Mrs. Patricia Elliott, West Hartford; and Joseph Knudsen Jr., South Windsor. All are supervisors or teachers of math.

In addition, Vernon Graham, math coordinator for West Hartford schools, is working both with the group and with Glenside, which is making a parallel, independent study.

The group meets daily in the East Hartford board of education building from 8:30 to 9:30. Bob Kudra says many days they operate in an effort to make as much progress as possible in the month allotted for the study.

Kudra said the group began by gathering and pooling all the best books and other materials available from each town as listed in the State Department of Education.

Miss Elizabeth Glass, math coordinator for the state department, and other experts in the field spoke to the group, contributing ideas and helping them sort the scope of the study.

Next, they set out to reorganize the entire ninth grade curriculum, starting with concepts, usually presented in small, logical steps toward the student.

One of the first things they learned, Kudra said, was that there is too much material to be covered in a single year, so the study has been expanded in broad outlines to cover both the ninth and tenth grades.

Next, the group went back and began to plan in detail the work of the ninth grade. Mr. Far, Kudra said, they have formulated three large units—Orientation (an introduction to math), Number Sense, and An Introduction to Algebra.

Each unit contains step-by-step lessons for the student, as well as guides for the teacher, explaining the purpose and philosophy behind them.

Through the group will only have time to complete three units in detail by the conclusion of the study. They intend to meet next winter and see how they are working out in practice, and will ask permission of local boards to continue the work later.

Kudra said he is very excited over the possibilities of the cooperative approach to curriculum planning. "I think it is the only sensible solution," he said, "because the field of math is expanding so rapidly, individual towns find it almost impossible to keep up with a new knowledge."

He concluded that the study has been a "tremendous educational experience" for him, too, giving him new insights which should prove invaluable in the classroom.
