# Board Votes \$230,000 For New Firehouse

Seven town directors last night unanimously approved an additional appropriation of \$230,000 in finance construction of the new central firehouse, in the wake of taxpayers' objections to the building's location in the Municipal Building.

 After a re-elected Kennedy or his successor would have until 1965 to face the problem again, he would have the opportunity to push resolutions certain to split and embarrass the Democrats and likely to rebound to his own national reputation as a liberal crusader, on occasion.  
 But, aside from our sympathy for the lighted opportunities of the New York governor, and aside from our resentment over the fact that the Democrats should suddenly close off the resolution process just when they themselves would be on the defensive, for a change we think it may be a good and sound long range proposition to have the government set of the resolutions-making business. Come the day when the Republicans are in the White House and the Democrats are in the Senate, the Governor's Conference and seek to put it back into the resolutions-making business as each one more note for the record, the way the Democrats once engaged their resolutions committee in 1963 by abolishing it.

**Boredom Could Be Fatal**  
 This seems to be, in British life, an era in which things not done are suddenly being done, and the shock of it is raising some fundamental questions. Are the playing fields of Eton all they used to be? Is it still a great and glorious habit for the British to maintain the institution of royalty?  
 Something happened to British royalty the other day that had not happened before, certainly not in modern memory. At the Manchester Guardian praised it. "For the first time in living memory a British sovereign has been born in the streets of London."  
 The booby was primarily intended for King Paul and Queen Frederica of Greece, whose much discussed visit had been made controversial by the insistence of British leftist elements in agitating for the release of political prisoners still being held in Greek prisons for their role in the rebellion the Truman Doctrine helped put down 16 years ago.  
 But the booby washed over toward Britain's own Queen Elizabeth and the crowds did not seem to care or regret or retract their sentiment. So apparently, by going through with the coronation of a ceremonial visit, the British monarchy suddenly exposed itself to public derision, and, subsequently, to basic questioning about whether this royalty business is still necessary or advisable.  
 The Manchester Guardian, however, goes to all out for the conservative side of things, questioning it in the following rhetoric:  
 "Is the monarchy still a benefit to Britain? Most people would probably say yes, though perhaps with some reservations. Something has been done to rid royal functions of their mobbery, but the court and its trappings are still a conservative influence. At a time when even the Conservative Party says that Britain must be modernized, does it help that the Crown remains surrounded by hereditary aristocrats or by a very wealthy? The royal round of racetracks, grouse moors, banquets and laying foundation stones has not much in common with a scientific and social democracy."  
 Booby in the streets echoes, it would seem, into a more discreet, but also querulous grumbling up in the ivory towers.  
 No one would really do away with royalty, right at the moment. But one does detect the subtle suggestion that it began being just a little less royal.  
 A reappraisal of royal visits of the monarchy in a changing society—might be timely," the Guardian says. "State visits lately have been too many and too formal. They are a costly embarrassment... the exchange of visits with lesser European royalty has no political value... diverts the police from their proper job, and aggravates London's intolerable traffic problem."  
 The suggestion that a mere traffic problem should have the right of way over royalty is notice of something even worse than boobying—just plain boredom.

**Gag Rule By Abolition**  
 It stands clear enough, we think, that the main, special and urgent reason why the Democrats among the nation's governors now assembled down at Miami Beach have voted to abolish the resolutions committee of the Governors' Conference is that they do not find this a good year for collective shooting off of gubernatorial mouths.  
 Republicans are always for the "out." The Democrats are now the "in" nationally speaking.  
 Resolutions need to be laid aside when they are on the attack. The Democrats, being in office nationally, have to be on the defense.  
 Were there a Republican administration in Washington, and the same present large Democratic majority among the governors, we would have the Democratic government adopting resolutions by the committee.  
 But the tactical situation is that there is a Democratic administration in Washington, and a Democratic majority of governors, and the key factor which is tactical situation is that the Democratic majority would inevitably have to split itself between Southern reactionary and Northern liberal if it got into action on legislative or executive matters.  Up to now union leaders—in the face of approval of job elimination by a presidential commission and the Supreme Court—have refused to yield. This is understandable.  
 The leaders, elected by their union members, are paid to fight for them and their own jobs depend on their members' support. They can truly say they're doing it for the union.  
 It might have been very sore instead of this plan, he had asked Congress to force a settlement by compelling railroads and unions to submit to compulsory arbitration, a device unions and management both detest.  
 That would be making use of government power. Kennedy in his message to Congress Monday also expressed dislike for settling disputes through compulsory arbitration.  
 But the very plan he worked out for the government set of the out, is in effect compulsory arbitration although he didn't dress it with that name. He made it sound much milder.  
 Since the ICC can hand down injunction to prevent a strike if the unions resist the decision, the result is that the unions will have to accept the ICC's findings. That's compulsory arbitration.  
 True, the decisions are supposed to last only for the temporary loss of the ICC's authority. After that, supposedly, the decisions will have no effect and railroads and unions will be free to settle their differences themselves.  
 But if then a strike threatened again, the President would again step in by asking the ICC's authority be renewed for another two years or he'd try some other method. But he wouldn't let a strike happen.  
 The ICC's almost total problem will be the manpower. The railroads want to cut expenses—and presidential commissions and the Supreme Court have said they have a right to—by wiping out jobs which, otherwise, have been rendered unnecessary by modernization.  
 The railroads want to eliminate thousands of jobs, mostly those of less than \$10,000 a year. Under Kennedy's proposal men whose jobs are ordered eliminated by the ICC are to be transferred to other ones or, if they are laid off, are to get severance pay, like 80 per cent of their regular salary for three years, or their benefits.  
 Suppose that, for the two years before the ICC's authority ends, they've been laid off or removed to other jobs. When the ICC then

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz, head witness for the administration plan, sat puffing on his pipe as the chairman and the railroad officials had their exchange.

"We have been given a week to consider a problem of such tremendous importance," Harris began. "There was a time when problems of this nature would arise that did not present the complications they present today."

Meanwhile Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen drafted a resolution aimed at keeping the trains running until Congress has time to act.

And various legislators of both parties voiced appeals that the railroads hold off on new work rules which a carrier spokesman said Tuesday would go into effect at one minute after midnight Tuesday as planned.

The five railroad unions have said in the past they will stage a massive walkout the moment the new rules—which would eliminate thousands of jobs—are passed.

Two congressional committees worked at full throttle on President Kennedy's recommendations for settling the dispute. But there were many doubts the measure could reach the White House for Kennedy's signature in time to beat the deadline.

One hope was, however, that the railroads' announcement of their intention to go ahead with the bill, which calls for putting the dispute into the hands of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

In Cleveland Roy Davidson, grand chief engineer of the independent Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, said Tuesday he couldn't think of "a worse place

He charged that the ICC is "management-oriented and has no grasp of labor-management relationships and principles."

Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., acting chairman of the Commerce Committee, said the union officials probably would be heard tonight.

He promised the committee would here management representatives after the Senate adjourns today, even if it means a night session.

In his testimony Wirtz said only collective bargaining and legislation can provide a completely satisfactory solution.

He said the administration bill is the best possible and has three big virtues: It would prevent a rail shutdown, provide for disposing of the issues, and serve collective bargaining as the preferred method of settlement.

House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana was among those calling Tuesday for more time to consider the measure "if we are to avoid a course that might be destructive of the best interests of the public laborer."

He made the comment after AFL-CIO President George Meany has urged Congress to adopt a resolution asking that the existing work rules be maintained for at least 90 days.

**Shares on Sale For Restoration Of Pipe Organ**

St. Peter's parish in Hebron, organized in early colonial times, has a fascinating and well known history. The present building, one of the oldest Episcopal Churches in the state, was beautifully designed and has a delightful music which has kept this venerable building an outstanding and historic landmark for over 320 years.

Among one of the most noteworthy furnishings of the church is the organ, built by the master craftsman William Allen Johnson in 1890.

Johnson was one of the foremost organ builders of the last century, and there are but a few of his instruments left in their original condition and location. For 100 years the Hebron church organ has had congregational singing, accompanied the special music which is part of St. Peter's rich heritage, exalted the joyful and comforted the sorrowing. It has been sought out by many interested persons who have heard of its beauty.

This organ, constructed through-out with mechanical action, has outlasted many other old organs. The life of a contemporary instrument with its great number of electrical components, is estimated at 30 years without major (and expensive) reconstruction. Mechanical action organs have very little perishable material, and can last indefinitely with proper care.

St. Peter's organ, however, has never had any sort of complete and thorough restoration, and time has taken its toll. The pipes are starting to split; many metal pipes are bent and broken; the wind chests need complete renovation to correct leakage resulting from warped and cracked wood. Finally, the organ has to be regulated and tuned throughout. Since the instrument is of basically sound construction, and has exceptionally fine tone, it is well worth restoring, it is said.

John Wessel of Brattleboro, Vt., has been contracted to do the work. Wessel, a native of Holland,

**Cambridge Accord Start of a Solution**

(Continued from Page One)

The meeting "nobody in this community should ever forget Gloria Richardson. I think you all know you owe her a debt of gratitude."

Mrs. Richardson, 42, Cambridge native, had tears in her eyes as she took a standing ovation from 500 Negroes who crowded into a small church.

"When you compare what we got with Birmingham, Ala. and Jackson, Miss., Cambridge has made great steps," Sawyer said.

Brig. Gen. George M. Galston said National Guard troops would remain here to enforce militia law until Cambridge has had time to absorb the meaning of the agreement.

Guardsmen were ordered into Cambridge June 14 by Gov. J. Miller Talbot after a riot of violence left three white men shot, stores burned and whites and Negroes fleeing.

The Guard was withdrawn July 1 only to return July 19 after another night of terror. Six white persons were shot and wounded before order was restored.

A racial truce, worked out with the aid of the Justice Department, is in effect in Cambridge, Md., today, but Negroes in Charleston, S.C., have rejected concessions while merchants offered in an effort to end demonstrations in that port city.

In Charleston, where more than 700 Negroes have been arrested in the last six weeks, merchants agreed to desegregate their facilities and give equal employment opportunities to Negroes. Hours later, after a mass meeting, Negro leaders said great marches would be intensified.

The Rev. R. J. Glover said the merchants seemed to be acting in good faith, but he objected to the fact that names of the 62 firms were not disclosed. Negroes want to know "who will integrate and who will not integrate," he said.

The City of Charleston reportedly offered some concessions to desegregate earlier in the day. Mayor Palmer Galliard "resisted" details, Glover said only that the city offer is being studied.

One speaker at the mass meeting said protest marches would not cease "until all doors are open."

Civil rights demonstrations brought more arrests in New York and Baton Rouge, and a smoke bomb in Birmingham, Tenn. Birmingham has a major racial trouble spot several weeks ago, repaired its segregation-ordinance.

Sheriff C. E. Patten said he used the extra police to break up a face-to-face encounter between Negroes and white persons at the courthouse square in Birmingham.

The crowd was threatened with water hoses but they were not used, the sheriff said. Two persons were arrested, he reported.

Charles Haynie, a spokesman for the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, said seven or eight Negro children were burned by acid thrown by several white men during the demonstration.

The sheriff's office denied that it happened. Officials at two clinics said they did not treat anyone for burns.

Somerville and Fayette County became a civil rights hot spot during a voter registration campaign in 1960. Angry white farmers set up a tent city, saying property owners had evicted them from their homes for trying to register.

At Baton Rouge, about 80 Negroes scuffled with six policemen trying to keep them from using a public swimming pool. One of the officers suffered cuts over the eye and on the arm during the brief melee. Five Negroes were arrested.

In New York City, more than 140 pickets were taken into custody at construction sites during an "spreading drive" for the erection of more Negro and Puerto Rican in the building industry.

Some leaders let pickets lines to discuss the protest movement with Democratic Mayor John Lindsay. He promised to investigate their complaints. Lindsay also agreed to establish a six-man "bifacial committee to review job appointments."

Elsewhere in New York, leaders of six civil rights organizations planning an Aug. 28 march on Washington said they will seek to have President Kennedy receive a formal presentation of their demands before noon on the day of the march.

A juvenile court judge in St. Augustine, Fla., ordered six teenage Negro sit-in demonstrators taken from their parents at the parents refused to pledge that the children would obey city laws. A court official said they cannot be placed in foster homes, the children probably will be sent to state schools for delinquents.

The Army began moving its last 200 troops out of Oxford, Miss., where they have been on guard at the University of Mississippi since rioting last fall after the admission of a Negro, James E. Meredith.

At Miami Beach, Fla., the national government conference sent the civil rights issue to a committee for study. Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson asked the governors to provide "not a Regu-
