Swedish Youth Arrives Under ICYE Program

One day last week a huge intercontinental jetliner stood on an airstrip at New York's Idlewild Airport, disgorging its passengers into blistering 97 degree heat. Slowly they emerged, singly, in two's and threes, looking at the unaccustomed glare, until 154 young men and women had alighted. Carl Anders Lundvall of Norrkoping, Sweden, was among them. Together they made up the European contingent of about 200 students from all parts of the world who will be living in American homes and attending schools here during the 1968-69 school year under the International Cultural Youth Exchange program. Lundvall, who is called Anders, says, "I think I will always remember stepping off that plane. It was so hot! And to make matters worse, I had to wear a heavy winter jacket, because my baggage was over the weight limit!"

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Left in the Dark on Details

Military Silent on Ban

WASHINGTON (AP)—Members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff appear to have been left in the dark about details of the administration's proposal for a limited ban on nuclear testing until almost the final day of diplomatic discussions in Moscow. Because of this, up to Tuesday morning, the military chiefs had taken no position on the proposal, which is awaiting initialing by the United States, the Soviet Union and Britain. What their view is at the moment is not known. The majority of the strategy-making group reportedly was opposed to the proposal of a year-long moratorium on nuclear testing for a so-called comprehensive test ban. That would have covered all forms of testing, including underground tests. The position of most of the chiefs then was that a comprehensive ban would have been unenforceable. The proposal at this year's Moscow session was to exclude underground tests, but impose a ban on all tests in the atmosphere, in space or under water. There were some indications that for reasons of broad national policies the chiefs might have been more open to the proposal, even if it lacked complete enthusiasm for it on military grounds. Ben. Richard Russell, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, told news- men Wednesday that Secretary of State Dean Rusk informed his committee that he was not qualified to answer technical questions about the draft of the proposed pact. Therefore, said Russell, it is necessary to have more complete hearings and "we will have the Joint Chiefs of Staff testifying in this committee."

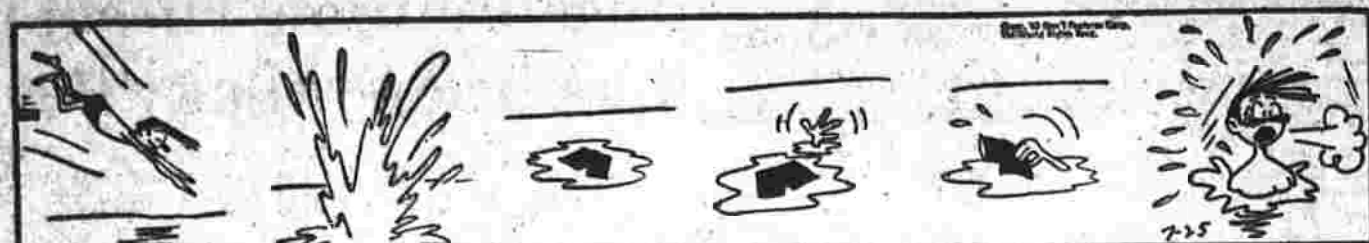
