### From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Mrs. Leonard F. Rackowski of 704 Central St., says, "The recipes for Cabbage Soup and Green Bean Salad were given to me by my mother, because she thought this country from her native Poland. My family likes soup and I serve it year round. They prefer homemade soups, and cabbage soup is one of their favorites."

**Cabbage Soup**  
 3 pounds pork butt of loin end  
 2 quarts cold water  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 1 pepperoni  
 1 large can sauerkraut  
 1/2 medium head cabbage, shredded  
 1 whole onion  
 1 small can pea soup, undrained  
 Cover meat with water and add salt, pepperoni and bay leaf. Bring to boiling, decrease heat and simmer for two hours. Remove and drain sauerkraut and add with remaining ingredients to soup stock. Continue cooking for 40-45 hours.

**Green Bean Salad**  
 1 1/2 pounds cooked green string beans  
 1/2 medium Bermuda onion sliced  
 1/2 cup mayonnaise  
 2 tablespoons wine vinegar  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon black salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 Mix beans, onion and onion. Make dressing with oil, vinegar and spices and mix with beans and onion. This may be served hot as a vegetable or chilled as a salad. Fresh lettuce and creamed string beans may be used.

 1 family size package cherry gelatin  
 2 packages frozen strawberries, or 1 quart fresh berries, sweetened  
 4 cups water, or enough water and sugar to make 4 cups  
 18 ounce container of sour cream  
 Drain berries and save juice to mix with water to make gelatin.  
 Mix gelatin and berries. Pour half the mixture in one and one-half quart mold over sour cream and chill until firm.  
 Keep remaining mixture at room temperature. Spread sour cream over top of chilled gelatin.  
 Slowly pour remaining gelatin mixture over sour cream and chill until firm.  
 This recipe serves 12 and may be used as a dessert, and topped with mayonnaise and fruit salad dressing.

### Phoebe Snow Back on Track

HOBOKEN, N.J. (AP)—Phoebe Snow did not get back on her feet today as she returns.

Phoebe was the glamor girl of American railroading, a passenger train whose name symbolized elegance and luxury.

Her corporate master, the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad, has called Phoebe as an unwarranted extravagance.

Today, the railroad, under new management, put her back on the track.

To railroad buffs she looked grander than ever, her coiffure, dress and long legs reupholstered, repainted and repolished.

Phoebe was still listed on the timetable as the Erie-Lackawanna Ltd., running from Hoboken, N.J., to points west.

Railroad officials were reluctant about the reclamation. They resented stinging criticism from railroad patrons and sentimentalists after Phoebe's demise.

But one said, "Obviously, we hope to attract new business."

Only last week, the Chicago & North Western Railway retired its deluxe Chicago to Minneapolis "400," latest casualty in a long string of famous trains.

All were victims of the public's abandonment of rail travel for the more flexible automobile and jetliner.

Of the famous name trains which have died, the Phoebe Snow was the first to attempt a comeback—thanks to William White, Erie-Lackawanna board chairman.

White, who rose to prominence in the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railway before its 1961 merger with the Erie, was called in a couple of months ago to see how new health into the financially ailing Erie-Lackawanna. He ordered the once-glorious Phoebe re-established and returned to the rails. The train's name was chosen by an advertising man around the turn of the century. He hit upon

### The Doctor Says

**FLUCTUATIONS IN CHILD MAY MEAN LITTLE**

When is a fever not a fever? If an adult has a temperature of over 98.6 degrees (one degree above normal) we would agree that he had a slight fever.

This rule cannot be applied to infants and small children. In the first place, if a rectal temperature is taken, 98.6, not 98.4, is the normal reading. Also, if the infant is in his first two weeks of life, he may have a rectal temperature of 101 and not be sick since the rise in temperature may be due to the fact that his temperature-regulating mechanism has not yet stabilized.

If the surrounding air is hot due to artificial heating in winter or a hot spell in summer, this, too, may cause the elevated temperature.

Another factor might be loss of body fluid. The newborn infant loses fluid rapidly through his skin and kidneys. Try giving the baby more milk. If he takes it readily he is not sick, and his temperature will come down. If he refuses more milk, he may have an infection and should be seen by a doctor.

Even in children who are old enough to run around, an elevated temperature is not a thing to be taken lightly. It has been very active. Fortunately most active children who do not complain of anything don't have a temperature taken. This is a perfect example of "what mother doesn't know won't hurt her."

Q—My youngster has a pharyngeal dust or cyst in his neck. Should it be removed?

A—In some children the embryonic development of the oral cavity is incomplete at birth and as a result there may be a cystic swelling in the neck. Associated with this there may be a slight intermittent discharge of mucus. This is a perfect example of "what mother doesn't know won't hurt her."

Q—My 5-year-old son has pneumonia and the doctor says he can't get it out. He has been on antibiotics twice a day from May to October every year as long as he lives. He also uses a sun-protective cream and must wear a wide-brimmed hat all summer. Is there any other treatment?

A—This congenital hereditary disease is relatively rare. It is due to a defect in the way the body is associated with the excretion of a large amount of a pigment called porphyrin in the urine. This gives the urine a red color. The victim's skin is extremely sensitive to light and they may be an increased growth of facial hair. In some persons this disease the teeth may be red or red-brown.

It is essential to protect the skin from sunlight or any other source of ultraviolet rays. Since ordinary window glass filters out these rays your son will not need to be protected when outdoors with the windows closed. Treatment is normally unsatisfactory. Some patients are benefited by removal of the spleen.
