Annual Reports By Departments

PENSION BOARD As of June 30, 1963 there were 113 active members in the Retirement Allowance Fund, an increase of 16 over the previous year.

At the start of the 1962-63 fiscal year, 23 persons were receiving pensions, five persons were retired and two died, making a total of 41 receiving payment on June 30, 1963.

The board has recommended a change in pension ordinances to permit the inclusion of the town clerk in the plan.

At the end of the fiscal year, the plan had funds of \$788,512.56, consisting of \$33,672.91 in cash and \$754,839.65 in investments.

The Hartford National Bank and Trust Co. is trustee for the fund.

The Town Pension Trust Fund had nine pensioners at the start of the fiscal year. Since then, one has died. A total of \$12,403.90 was paid out in pensions.

Remaining in the trust fund as of June 30, 1963, is \$1,851.05 in cash, plus \$73,281.30 in an investment fund, for a total of \$75,132.35.

DIVISION OF CEMETERIES During the fiscal year, \$55,831 was allocated to the Division of Cemeteries for salaries, utilities, supplies and equipment for the maintenance of trucks, mowers and trimmers to service 70 acres of cemetery grounds and roads.

Local spent to maintain the East, West, Buckland and Beth Shalom cemeteries was \$3,682.

The Perpetual Care Trust Fund was increased by \$12,500, bringing its total to \$211,183. These funds are kept separate from general funds.

During the year, the department served 346 funerals; 216 in East Cemetery, 20 in Buckland Cemetery, 5 in the West Burial Ground, and 1 in Beth Shalom Memorial Park. The figure is less than last year, and required 2,988 man hours of services.

Most of the new section prepared in East Cemetery, in the spring of 1960 to accommodate 600 burials has now been sold, and another section near it is in the planning stage.

The department notes that while 4 to 8 grave spaces were in demand in 1960, today's preference is for two-grave lots.

PARK DEPARTMENT The fiscal year 1962-63 was a time one for utilization of Manchester Park facilities, according to the report of Horace F. Murray, superintendent of parks.

During the period, 129,999 persons participated in the way of another 68,608 for ice-skating, 9,621 used Center Springs Lodge, 8,012 for skating, 4,897 for picnic and 48,330 attended community events.

Skating days consisted of 56 at Center Springs Annex, 38 at Charter Oak Rink, 26 at Center Springs Pond and 16 at Robertson Park. The latter was first opened for skating on Dec. 27, 1962.

A total of 77 skating days were available at Center Springs Park.

Tree operations of the park, consisting of removing 50 dead or dying trees, 47 removed for street widening, 269 pruned and 624 sprayed for control of Dutch Elm disease.

In addition, the department planted 88 trees on public streets and property.

ENGINEERING DIVISION The town engineering division, an arm of the department of public works, is primarily a service organization that works in conjunction with other town departments in affecting studies and construction improvements.

During the fiscal year 1962-63, the project that aroused much interest was the construction, last fall, of a soft cement base in a portion of Howell St. This section was chosen for the test because of the predominance of truck traffic in the area.

After a severe winter, the base has proven highly satisfactory, because of its economy as well, will be given consideration for future projects.

During the spring of this year, the engineering division prepared a highway study and report, which consists of a condition and cost study of all town roads, setting up a future road program.

A study is now under way to increase the efficiency of snow plowing and sanding operations.

The town's storm sewer program was continued during the year with the installation of sewers on Summit St. and in the Leonard-Eliot St. area. Designs are now being drawn for storm water sewers in the Porter-Litchfield St. section and on Parker St., north of E. Middle Trpk.

Work was also done during the year in conjunction with the following projects: Basketball court and road in Center Springs Park; Globe Hollow Swimming Pool improvement; Harrison St. Garage improvement and alteration; E. Middle Trpk.-crossroad Dr. intersection, and Parker St.-Woodbridge St.-Green St. intersection.

Both reconstructed to provide proper channelization.

Results of the latter two projects are very encouraging, and have brought on studies to improve other town intersections in the summer, it is reported.

DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION The Manchester Development Commission reports that future plans and programs are being developed in association with the Chamber of Commerce.

The Commission has become a member of the Connecticut Association of Municipal Development Commissions. The state group is a medium for exchange of ideas, policies, administrative procedures and general information relative to industrial development, and also for the promotion of legislation favorable to such development.

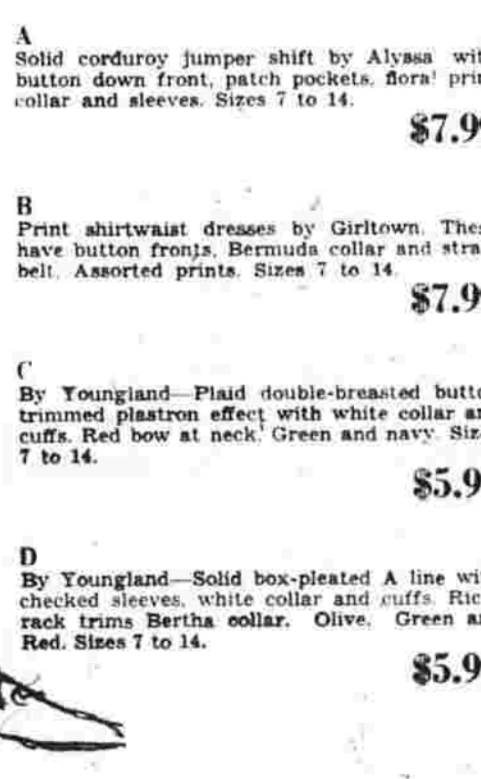

Timing is the ability to do the right thing at the right moment, the quality that tells Benny, for example, exactly how long to pause before turning an exasperated face to the audience and exclaiming, "Well!"

Gracie Allen has retired but those old Burns and Allen television shows are still aired and Benny is their ardent fan.

"Nobody has Gracie's timing," Benny said, "and when I see those shows today I'm constantly amazed by it. Remember, she had one of the toughest jobs in the world, doing non-sequitur lines. They came right out of the blue, and there was nothing to lead into them. They just didn't make sense. It was a terrific job to handle them. But she'd Ooh and Ah around and come up with them exactly right."

The Doctor Says

MEDICAL PUZZLE-POWERS FAST PULSE-JITTERS PROBLEM

Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Q—My pulse is never less than 100 beats a minute. With the least bit of exertion or excitement it goes as high as 140. This makes me jittery. What should I do?

A—Although this is a somewhat elevated pulse rate, it does not necessarily mean that you have a heart disease. What we will have to find out is whether you are jittery because your heart is fast or if your heart is fast because you are jittery. The first step would be to let your doctor get an electrocardiogram (ECG) and a basal metabolic rate (BMR). If your BMR is high, you may have a toxic goiter. The ECG would help your doctor determine whether there was something wrong with the electrical conduction system that controls your heart rate.

If both tests turn out to be normal, perhaps a short course of medication to calm your nerves would get your pulse back to normal and break the vicious circle of worry, fast pulse, faster pulse, more worry.

Q—In January I had a miscarriage after being pregnant four months. This would have been our first child. Ever since then I have had a choking sensation in my throat and it appears to swallow. Even the weight of the bed covers on my neck seems to choke me. My doctor says this is caused by nerves. If so, how can I calm these nerves without resorting to tranquilizers?

A—The loss of a baby must have been a great shock and disappointment. This may, as your doctor suggests, be the reason for your choking sensation, but perhaps the swelling and your nervousness are caused by a goiter. A toxic goiter may even have been the cause of your unfortunate miscarriage.

If you have a goiter, proper treatment of this disease will greatly improve your chance of carrying your next pregnancy to full term.

If after a painstaking examination to rule out goiter, your doctor reassures you that your trouble is nerves, this firm reassurance may be all that you need. On the other hand, if he wants you to try a tranquilizer for a week or two, be guided by his advice.

Q—Please let me know what food or liquid not to eat or drink for high blood pressure.

A—Many persons who have high blood pressure are also overweight. If you belong in this category, make reducing your first objective.

If your blood pressure is high in spite of normal weight, you should be on a low-sodium diet. This means that you should use one of the salt substitutes to replace table salt, and avoid anything that is already salted.

You should, therefore, eat no canned foods, except canned fruits, no smoked foods, spiced meats, sausage, or ham. If you get pretty tired of this—as most people do—perhaps your doctor will give you one of the newer drugs that reduce blood pressure.

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USSR Tells Insurgents Violence Still a Tactic

Thunder from Moscow's heavy propaganda artillery, heralding the new phase of the cold war, has the sound of a counterblast to the Red Chinese and to the leadership of Communists throughout the non-white world.

A supercharged Soviet campaign appears designed to convince Communists in Asia, Africa and Latin America that Premier Khrushchev's "peaceful coexistence" policies promise to open the way to the only safe path to power. It implies that these policies actually mean international political and economic warfare to isolate the "U.S. imperialists" and hasten the West's decline.

Mao Tse-tung gave his own offensive a push last week with what Peking radio labeled his statement calling for the national liberation of the world to unite against racial discrimination by U.S. imperialists and to support the American Negroes.

Mao's statement likely to have impact in Africa, by implicating the Kremlin of withholding help from revolutionaries in underdeveloped areas. Mao insisted that "people who have triumphed in the struggle of those who are still fighting for liberation."

The Chinese offensive reaches into three continents. The Chinese there the "three As"—Africa, Asia and Latin America, the Chinese are building a new front against U.S. imperialism.

Moscow's response has been a propaganda drive appearing to pledge to money Communist leaders in those areas who might be dismayed at the suggestion that the Kremlin will still support violence where violence is feasible.

MOSCOW (AP) — A little man with aluminum gray eyes and a black mustache got out of a big car at Berlin's Reichsbank in 1949 and was whisked into an important conference with Adolf Hitler. This honored guest was Vyacheslav Molotov, Soviet foreign minister and right-hand man of Stalin.

Where is he today?

On extremely rare occasions, a little man with aluminum gray eyes and a gray-white mustache strolls with his wife in a park, not noticed, not wanting to be noticed.

That happens to those who lose out in the Soviet Union.

Molotov, 72, lost out in one of the most dramatic struggles of Soviet history. In 1957, four years after Stalin died, he made the mistake of trying to drive out of power a rising man named Nikita Khrushchev, who for over a quarter of a century was one of the big figures in shaping the government and foreign policy of the Soviet Union.

Molotov, who was transferred to Vienna as representative to an international committee dealing with peaceful use of atomic energy.

It was a setback for a man who had traded cold stars and colder words with the great U.S. speaker and diplomat, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Truman, Churchill, Ernest Bevin, Dulles, Gen. Marshall.

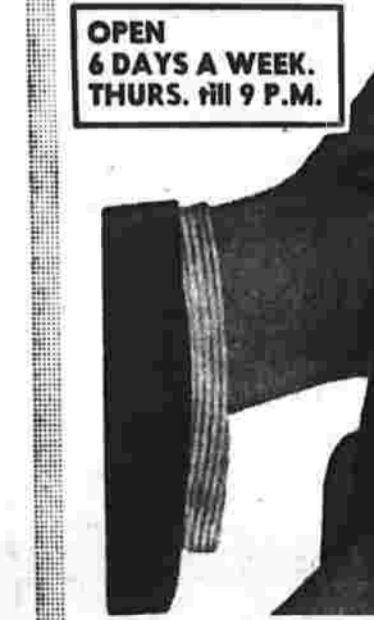

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Supreme Court to Get Cases Of Redistricting in November

By STANLEY REIBEREN
 WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Supreme Court is expected to hear arguments in the next few weeks on the constitutionality of legislative redistricting in the 50 states.

On Nov. 12 the court will hear arguments in cases involving the constitutionality of the redistricting of Virginia, Maryland, New York, and Alabama.

The court's decision—expected later in the session—may tell the other states and the other federal courts just what the Supreme Court expects them to do.

Although the Supreme Court is expected to hear arguments on a March 26, 1968 decision, said the federal courts have jurisdiction.

significant because it seems to answer two questions most often asked about reapportionment:

1. Is the "little federal system" legal? These are legislatures which are like Congress in that they have one house appointed by population and the other by geographic units.

2. If a house is appointed by population, how strictly does it have to follow population? To other factors—geography, tradition, area—are a right to be considered?

Reports from Associated Press bureaus throughout the country show that 21 state legislatures, under the provisions of the court's 1962 decision and the drive by the states and suburbs, have taken some steps to redistrict since the 1962 decision.

But, in the eyes of the critics, these often have been no more than token steps. AP bureau reports show that federal suits mandating fair apportionment have

been filed in 29 states, 18 of them in states where the legislature has taken steps.

So far, the survey shows there have been little change in the balance of power. Rural areas still dominate most state legislatures.

Two states reapportioned themselves in such a way as to reduce the size of their legislatures. In Ohio, 47 members were reduced to 37 members in 1967 under a long-standing law. Since every county has at least one seat in the assembly, the decrease had to make the vote of a small county count for more than before.

The Wyoming Legislature increased membership of the House in 1966 and decreased membership of the Senate, but gave the more populous counties more representation in the House.

The reapportionment picture is further complicated by the fact that the governors of Illinois, Indiana, Rhode Island, and Wisconsin vetoed reapportionment bills

passed by the legislatures. In these cases, the conflict was largely political, with the governor belonging to one party and the legislature controlled by another.

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Krauses Back Home After Alaska Trip

"Returning from Alaska one has a lasting memory of beautiful, snow-clad peaks, river-like glaciers, high foamy waterfalls, lovely tundra flowers and wonderful, friendly people. We saw many types of wild life ranging from 'blowring' whales to grizzly bears."

These memories were expressed by Mr. and Mrs. Ward Krause, their son, Billy, and their daughter, Janice, of 27 Walnut St., who returned Sunday after a two-month indoor trip to our 48th state covering 12,000 miles.

Their route to Alaska headed west to Duluth, Minn., then north to the Trans-Canada Highway and continued west through Canada. They traveled this route to Banff and Jasper, Alberta, where they stopped at these two national parks.

From Jasper the Krauses headed north to Dawson Creek, Alberta where the Alaska Highway actually begins.

"Our lot, for the most part, was mud while traveling the highway. It rained hard for the first three days. In fact, it rained so hard that the mountains across melted causing overflowing streams and rivers. As a result, a 30-mile section of the highway washed out. We were among the lucky travelers, being just north of the wash-out area. Others were not so fortunate, and were stranded for four days while the road was repaired. The only thing these people could do was to camp along side the highway."

Reaching Dawson City in British Columbia was a welcome change. Here the Krauses met with one of the few re-

maining gold miners of '96, who showed them his mine, and they tried their hand at panning gold in the Bonanza Mine.

From here they continued west, finally crossing into Alaska. At this point they had been on the road approximately three weeks.

After a stopover in Fairbanks the family took a side trip up to Circle, Alaska, which is just south of the Arctic Circle, and the northern-most point on this continent that can be reached by car.

No trip to Alaska is complete without a visit to McKinley National Park. There the Krauses saw a great deal of native wild life, and spent many hours studying the various kinds of tundra flowers. Though clouds obscure the great mountain from view most of the time, the Connecticut visitors were again lucky. The clouds broke for a short time treating them to a rare sight of the peak.

South of McKinley is the little town of Valdez nestled at the foot of the mountains on the beach of a fjord-like harbor. From here the travelers put their canoe into the water and went out to see one of the glaciers that flows into the sea.

The stopover in Anchorage was at this point, a welcome relief for the Krauses. A very modern

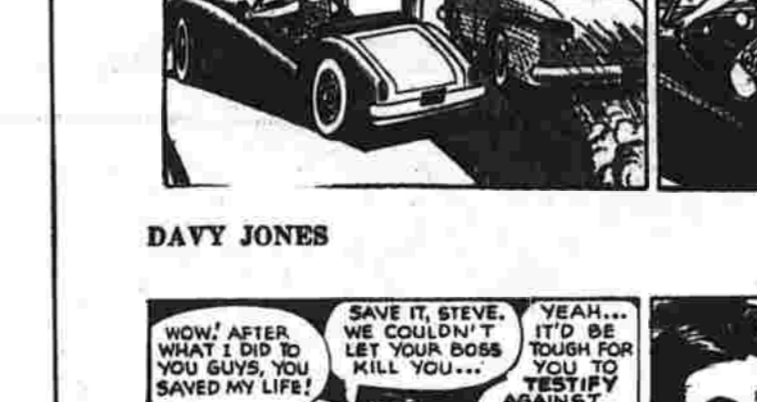
