Cuban Delegation Boycotts Address

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—President Kennedy noted today the apparent pause in the cold war and called for new U.S.-Soviet cooperation, including a joint expedition to the moon. He also urged new efforts to ban weapons of mass destruction from outer space.

The President addressed the U.N. General Assembly, which Thursday heard a policy declaration from Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko. Kennedy matched the moder ate, conciliatory tone set by Gromyko and hailed by U.N. delegates as a welcome change in the international atmos-

lowing an unusually mild policy speech by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, heartened diplomats weary of bitter exchanges between the two big powers. Gromyko welcomed the conciliatory nature of Kennedy's speech, but reserved comment on specific proposals, pending study He also conveyed to Kennedy the "warm personal greetings" of Premier Khrushchev at a reception after the President's speech. Gromyko's remarks seemed support the growing hope that the Soviets, seared by the Cuban crisis and differences with Peking. are more interested in East-Wes amity than in rocket-rattling. Kennedy told the 111-nation as sembly the world may hav reached "a pause in the cold war." He set out basic U.S.-Soviet lifferences, but called for further steps in easing cold war tensions, specifically by pooling U.S. and Soviet space research and experence for a moon shot. Delegates praised the tenor of Kennedy's speech and echoed his

call for peaceful settlement of East-West differences. There was considerable specu lation why Kennedy suggested the joint moon expedition. Some dele-gates expressed the belief that Kennedy feels the United States cannot beat the Soviets to the
