It is bad enough that any American, white or Negro, should conclude that the way to "improve" the workings of the democracy is to hamstring its processes.

It is worse still when those who commit this grievous error should be "politically correct" almost automatically when their interference with orderly life is curbed.

Such errors were heard from "the desk" whose avowed aim was to disturb hearings by the House Un-American Activities Committee into unauthorized student travel to Cuba.

When a violation of order is the stated goal, police action is the only order is invited. Such action will surely follow. Indeed it must, if we are to keep democracy as a peaceful mechanism.

The automatic stamp of "brutality" has an empty sound when uttered in such circumstances. It amounts to contending that one should be left alone to disrupt democracy and that anyone who is interrupted in this mischief is by that fact the victim of "un-democratic" brutality.

There is no stronger position as one who demonstrates Negroes who have chained themselves together to bar work at building sites, or tied themselves to cranes and other machinery.

Such things are extremely costly in how they expose police who whose minimum responsibility at such times is to remove them as obstacles to work which reasonably must proceed.

There is police brutality in this country—in all sections. But it is a thing of excess, and needs in every instance to be proven.

The charge is not one to be leveled as a matter of course against an officer who has no choice but to remove a screaming demonstrator from a congressional hearing room, or a chained group of Negroes from the path of construction trucks.

### Wonders of the Universe

#### Rockets May Be Used To Sample Moon Dust

A novel scheme to collect lunar surface dust without going to the moon has been proposed by astrophysicist Dr. Louis M. Levitt, of the Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Hill Hall, Hartford and Donald E. Gault, who has proposed the launching of sound rocket probes to travel in an altitude of 100 miles to capture thin dust clouds before falling back to earth.

The proposal is based on measurements made with Vanguard III Telemetry information from the satellite which indicated that an increase of 4 in the average number of particles in space was experienced during the Apollo moon shot of November 13 to 14, 1968. Three days later on November 16 to 18 there was another dramatic increase in the number of particles—this time by a factor of from 7 to 20! One possible cause of this increase was the dust cloud which was stirred up from the lunar surface.

Where do meteors come from? Astronomers realize that about ten times a year the earth passes through a stream of dust particles which are known as meteor showers. These can be seen in flares that streak across the night sky and disappear.

Evidence accumulated in the past century indicates that meteor streams are the remains of comets which have come into the inner solar system from the deep-freeze of interstellar space and are now being disturbed by the gravitational forces of the major planets.

Many scientists have indicated that when a meteoroid strikes the earth's surface it produces a dust cloud which is ejected from the impact site. This dust cloud, in turn, produces a meteor shower as it passes through the atmosphere.

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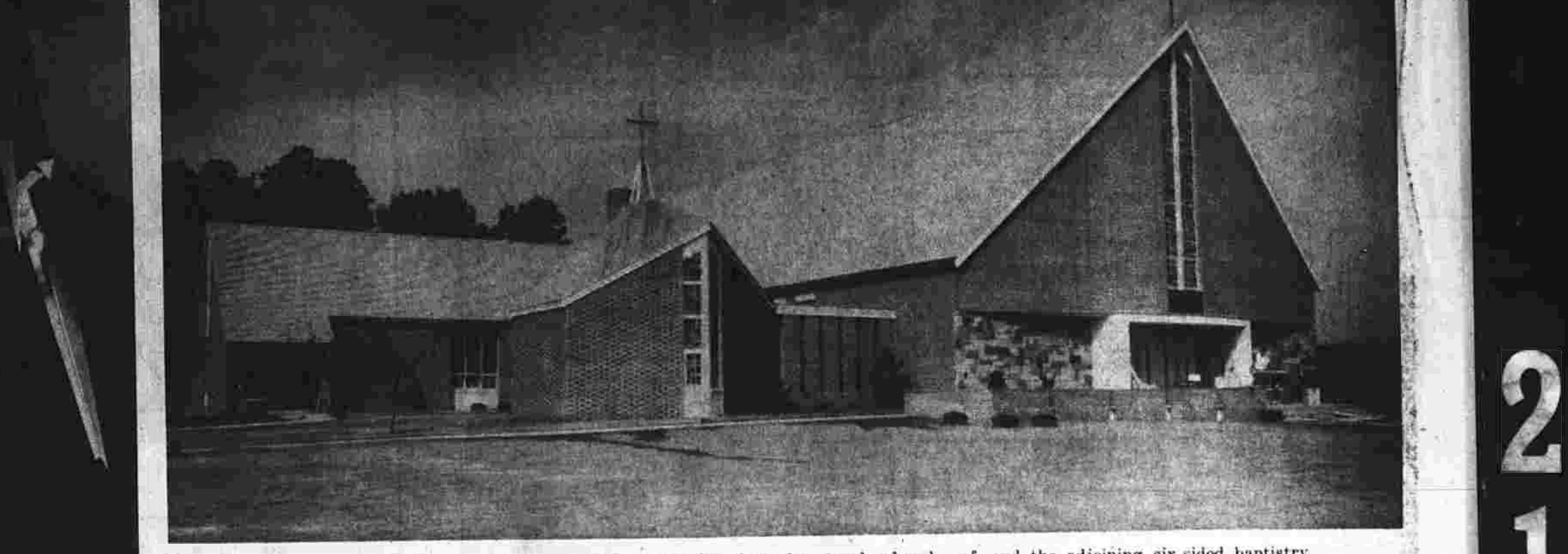

### St. Margaret Mary's Dedicated

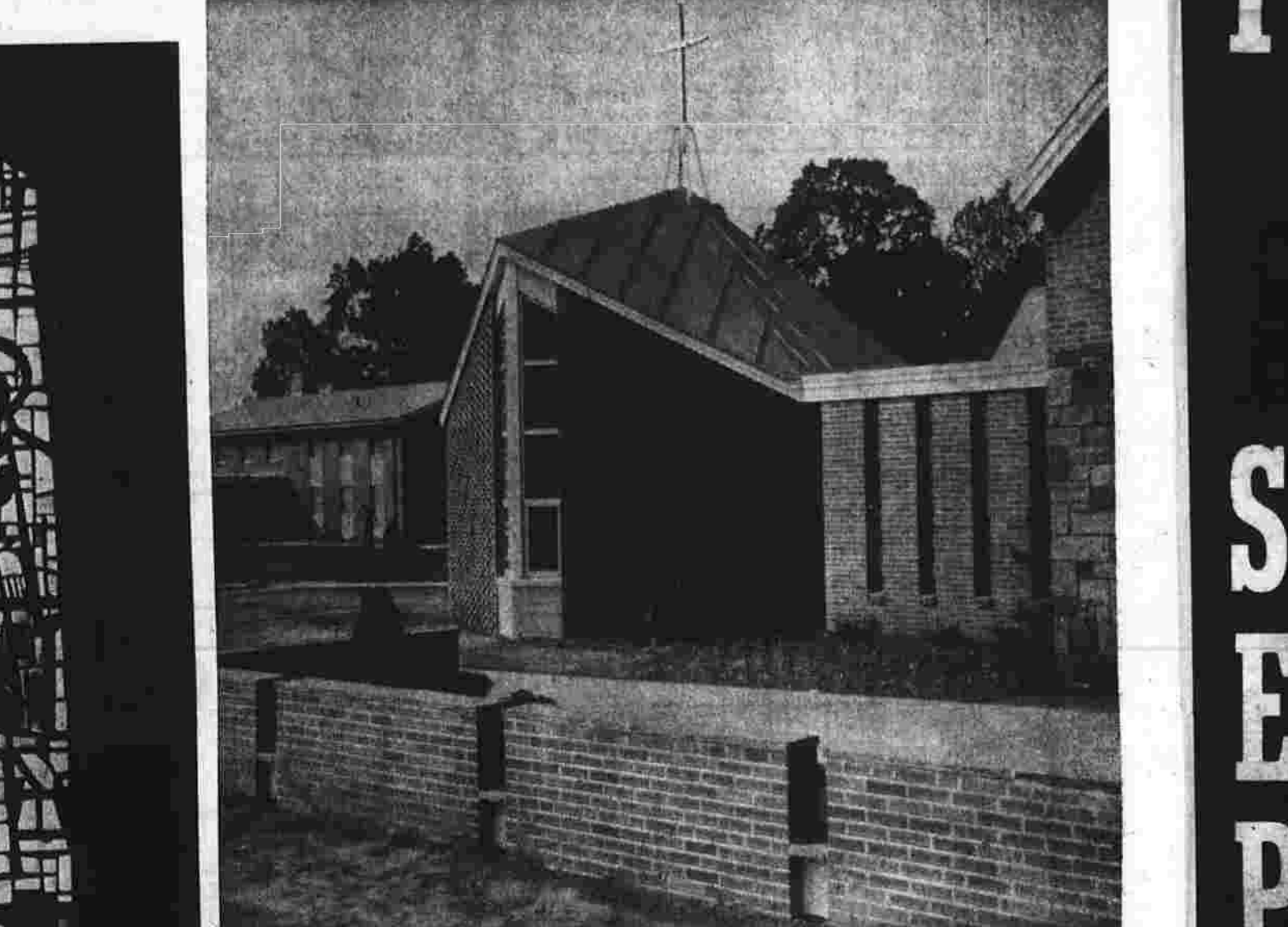

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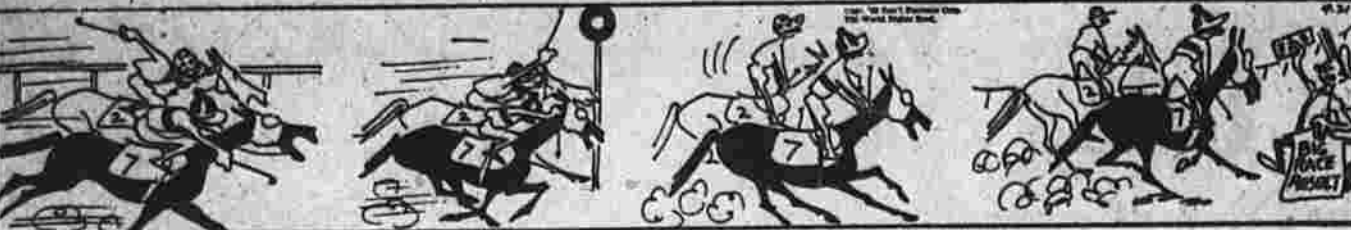

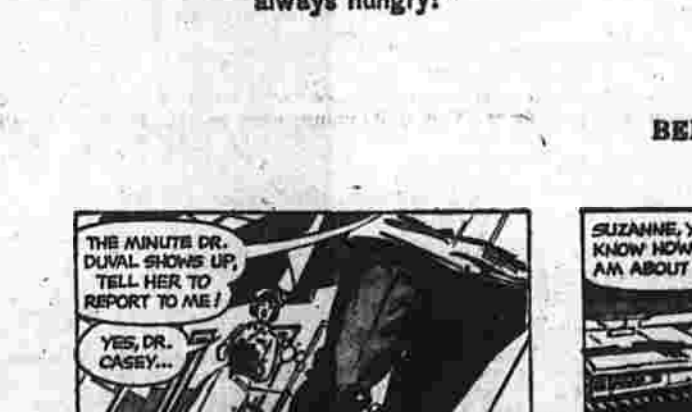

Davis' performance in the first inning on the front end of a triple play, which put the Dodgers in the fifth and sixth innings on a 2-1 lead, was his best since July 25.

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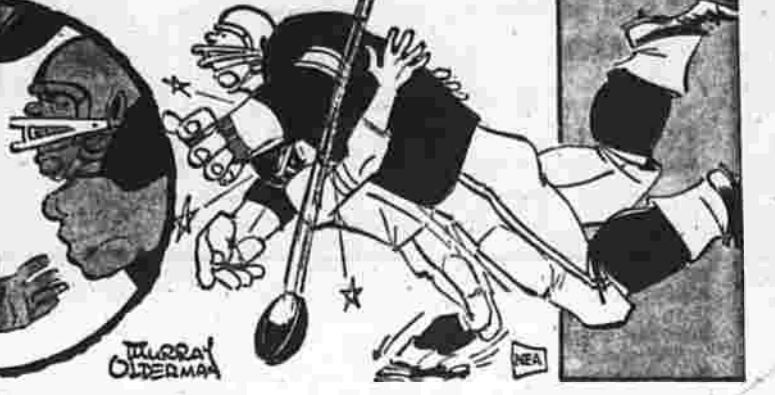

# Gene Barry Lands Millionaire Cop Role

Though he's put away his Bat Masterson cane, that smoothie Gene Barry is bowing back on the home screens as a lady killer—modern dress but just as sharp—in "Burke's Law" (Fridays at 8:30 p.m. on ABC-TV) though when it comes to murder, it's most likely one of the lascivious ladies who's doing the perpetrating because Amos Burke is on the right side of the law.

(About a dozen great celebrities will highlight each show but like Amos, keep your eye on Rhonda Fleming, Martha Hyer, et al because it's often the likes of these fair damsels who do other folks in.)

Network programming (at least on ABC) has grown up a lot with a season diversified enough to make room at last for something that's been sadly lacking...the kind of elegant mystery-spoofery the movies did so well in the '30s and '40s.

"And our productions look like very expensive motion pictures. Even the backgrounds are plush; Beverly Hills, Holmby Hills, Malibu Beach." Barry knows whereof he speaks. His money is where his words are (his own production company has a major financial interest).

This Amos Burke promises a lively season's viewing. He certainly is quite a character—a bachelor, millionaire policeman who rides to work in a chauffeured rolls Royce. The late Dick Powell portrayed Amos for one performance in "Who Killed Julia Greer" and wanted then to build a series around him but had to forget it because his health had already begun to fail.

Barry, who says of himself, "M-Squad would never have been for me, nor would a straight Western," nearly didn't bother to read the script.

Much as he enjoyed Bat, "Two years tied to a series was enough...so I gave myself two years to do what I wanted." What he wanted to do—and did—was exercise his excellent musical comedy voice as well as his acting talents first in a one-man show, plus a little musical comedy and play-acting first in the United States then in South America. Like Amos, Gene is sufficiently well healed to take off, what with an orange ranch and other Barbety Enterprises working for him at home while he was away. Of course since then as has, gets... he made a mint on the tour, too. (Bat having preceded him to South America, there were welcoming crowds averaging 15,000 greeting him at airports when he arrived, a friend of his tells me).

"Wow, this is for me," is what he said when he was finally cornered into reading the Burke script.

"Why? Well, Amos has what I always look for, what Bat had. I always ask myself is humor inherent in the script or can it be imposed? If there's a twinkle in the role, then it's for me. Anything that's too real is Dullsville."

Barry, whose acting range is wide (and who admits he still feels the atomic scientist he portrayed in his first movie in 1951 was still his best acting job) went on to explain that though he's against "golden rules" after a time a certain style "which is not imposed from without, but which evolves from within" gets to be something the public as well as the performer

gets to expect. "The public is your true rating system," he says. "People feel betrayed if the switch is too drastic... they'll stay with you through an occasional bad show if they've already identified with a series."

Gene is probably going to enjoy being a modern-day city slicker for another reason too. Though he's a native New Yorker, who went straight from the Chatham Square School of Music into Broadway musical comedy, he found when he returned to do a play in New York last year that the critics in the big city "now look on me as a Western type fella."

Though the record of one triumph after another doesn't show it, Gene insists his early career had enough rough moments to scare him but good. The job uncertainties of all stage actors really got him "when we were expecting our first baby and I opened four shows in Philadelphia without ever opening in New York."

In fact the polished, elegant Gene is currently advising that "first baby," Michael now 17, to stay away from acting. "I opened the door to a summer job in the production end for him, but he made it on his own. Of course he's going to college come fall, but if he continues his interest in show business I sincerely hope I've talked him out of acting." Younger son, Frederic is only 10... and apparently pop hasn't tried to brainwash him yet.

Of course, the kids might decide to take another look at their youthful dad's success and do as he does, not as he says. His summing up thoughts for me were: "I bite off a lot. I'm not satisfied with the golden rule alone. I'm looking forward to playing the London Palladium next spring." Which should make it quite a Barry year in Britain. "Bat Masterson" is just getting there (kept out until now by quota restrictions) and "Burke" bows, too. "I like them both," Barry mused about his roles, "they both make me feel a little larger than life. It's a good feeling."

It is indeed, from an audience point of view too, "a good feeling"... just watching the Mastersons and the Burkes makes us all feel "a little larger than life."

## TV Personalities

Joseph Cotten

What could be more unusual than a Brooklyn paint salesman who had a Southern accent... unless it was a potato salad tycoon who became one of America's best known actors.

Unusual as it may seem, that is precisely the course of events charted by Virginia-born Joseph Cotten, host of NBC-TV's Monday night feature series, "Hollywood and the Stars."

Shortly after graduating from high school in his hometown of Petersburg, Va., Cotten was so sure of his acting potential that he convinced his father to advance him tuition and board for a year at the Hickman School of Expression in Washington, D. C.

A year at Hickman and an optimistic Joe Cotten headed for New York and an unsuccessful round of producers' offices. He then took a meat-and-potatoes job as a paint salesman in Brooklyn, but soon deserted this in favor of a get-rich-quick potato salad scheme, which found expression in the Tip-Top Salad Co. (Joseph Cotten, president and treasurer).

He moved to Miami and joined a little theater group of players from the University of Miami. As the lead in many of the group productions, Cotten early in life achieved the role to which all actors must aspire—that of a drama critic reviewing his own plays for a local newspaper.

In 1930, Cotten decided to try New York again. A letter of introduction to David Belasco got

Cotten a job as a assistant stage manager and understudy to Lynn Overman in "Dancing Partner." In 1931, Cotten became leading man at Boston's Conley Theater, and a few months later he got his first break on Broadway in "Absent Father."

While doing "The Postman Always Rings Twice" on Broadway, Cotten met Orson Welles with whom he later joined the Federal Theater. When Welles established the Mercury Theater, Cotten went with him and played the lead in several productions. A successful radio series followed and then Welles called his friend to Hollywood to play a leading role in the film "Citizen Kane." Then Cotten starred in Welles' next two productions, "Journey Into Fear" and "The Magnificent Ambersons." After other important films and stage plays, Cotten made his TV

debut in 1954 in "The High Green Wall," a filmed TV version of an Evelyn Waugh story. Then he narrated "The Diamond Jubilee of Lights," a two-hour all-networks program. Cotten and his wife, Patricia Medina, recently concluded the play "Calculated Risk" after 222 performances in New York.

Upon his return to Hollywood, Cotten refused a variety of offers including films abroad, preferring to spend some time at his Pacific Palisades home. However, within a few weeks after his arrival he was signed by producer David Wolper to narrate the new NBC-TV series, "Hollywood and the Stars" (Mondays, 9:30-10:30 p.m. NYT, starting Sept. 30).

Cotten is a dedicated horticulturist and spends much of his free time gardening. He also has a valuable collection of figurines, etchings and paintings.
