

Tool and Die Department Added Five New Instructors On Tech School Staff

When the Howell Cheney Technical School opened Sept. 4 to begin the second year in its new plant on W. Middle Tpk., five new instructors and a Tool and Die Department had been added to its operations.

Although the new instructors are new to the school, and most are relatively new to the teaching profession, all have a wealth of practical experience and educational background which should prove invaluable to the students in their classes.

Each has a provisional teaching certificate, but in addition, all are attending inservice courses in education at various teacher colleges around the state. At the end of three years of planned study and successful teaching experience, they will qualify for permanent teaching certificates.

The new teachers and their assignments include Joseph F. Chenette, blueprint reading; Harold M. Collins, electrical department; Eugene E. Lescroart, machine department; Robert J. Puntaville, Tool and Die Department; and Robert Rinas, Automotive department.

Chenette formerly taught classes in blueprint reading at the Otis-Walcut Technical School in Torrington, Conn., and was a contractor in the greater Hartford area, specializing in custom-built homes. During the war years, he was an assembly supervisor at Pratt and Whitney Aircraft.

A graduate of St. Michael's High School in Montpelier, Vt., Chenette attended St. Michael's College and the University of Montreal, and is presently attending the evening division at the University of Hartford, majoring in mathematics.

The father of four sons and two daughters, Chenette resides at 13 Elm St., East Hartford.

Harold M. Collins, residing at 27 Park Ave., is a married man and the father of two daughters, 8 and 18 months and a 7-year-old son. This is Collins' first teaching assignment. Most recently, he was employed by the International Pipe and Concrete Corp., Newton, as chief electrician and a supervisor of maintenance.

A Manager Corps veteran of the Pacific Theater in World War II, Puntaville served a four-year apprenticeship at the Royal Typewriter Co., also attending part-time extension courses at the old Hartford Trade School. He has since had job experience with several other companies.

In discussing the new department, Puntaville explained that tool and die is an advanced course open to support classroom who have successfully passed more basic machine courses.

Of the 18 boys in the class, he said 15 are juniors or seniors and three are post-graduates, beginning the advanced 13th year of study required of all students at the college.

While the undergraduates alternate weekly between shop practice and theory or "related" courses, the post-graduates spend all day in the tool and die department, sharpening their skills. 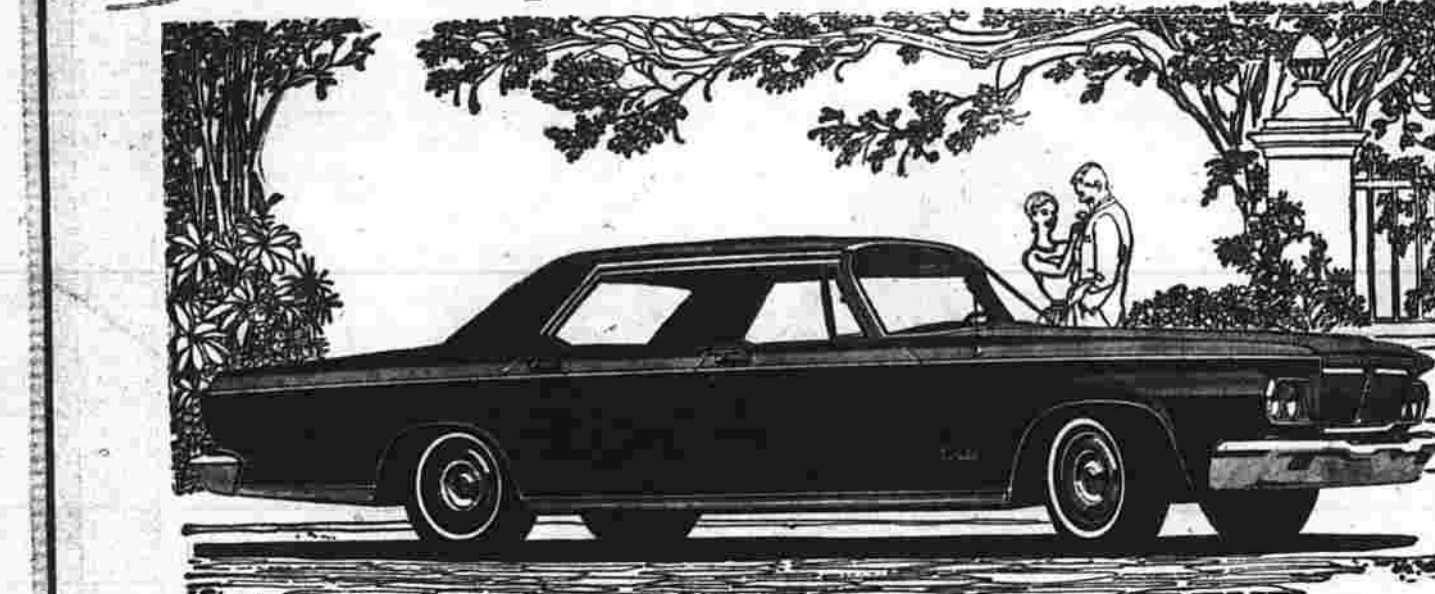

Chief Claims Many Areas Need Walks

Chief of Police James M. Heardon, in response to a request from General Manager Richard Martin of his opinion "as to where sidewalks should be constructed in the interest of public safety," has submitted a list of streets which appear to be most hazardous at this time.

Chief Heardon stated that "any highway or street with vehicular traffic, leading to or by a school, is potentially dangerous to school children, and, at all times, to pedestrians. Such highways or streets should have bordering sidewalks."

The streets listed by him as being in this category are Kenney, Hackmatack, Woodmont, Woodside (west of Terry Rd.), N. School St., Union (north from Kerry St.), East Hartford Rd., west of McKee St.; McKee, from Center to W. Center; W. Center, west of McKee St.; Adams, between McKee and Olenet; and W. Middle Tpk., from Dermost to Snow. Adams to Ellison, and west of Broad St., also, Broad St., from Center to W. Middle Tpk.; Hilliard, west of Fleming Rd.; Woodland, from Broad St. to Woodland Nurseries; W. Middle Tpk., from New State Rd. to Hilliard; and the areas in the vicinity of Cheney Tech and East Catholic High Schools.

Also, Woodbridge, from E. Middle Tpk. to Green Rd.; Parker St.; Green Rd.; Vernon, north of Lydall; Lydall St. (which serves Salters Pond recreation area); Walls, east of Spruce; Autumn; Charter Oak; Highland; Ferguson Rd.; and Spring St., which serves Mt. Nebo Field and Globe Hollow swimming pool.

A sum of \$48,400 was set aside in the 1968-69 town budget, for sidewalk repair. It has been the consensus of opinion of the board of directors, the board of education, and town residents, that the figure is far below the amount of money needed to pay for necessary construction and repair.

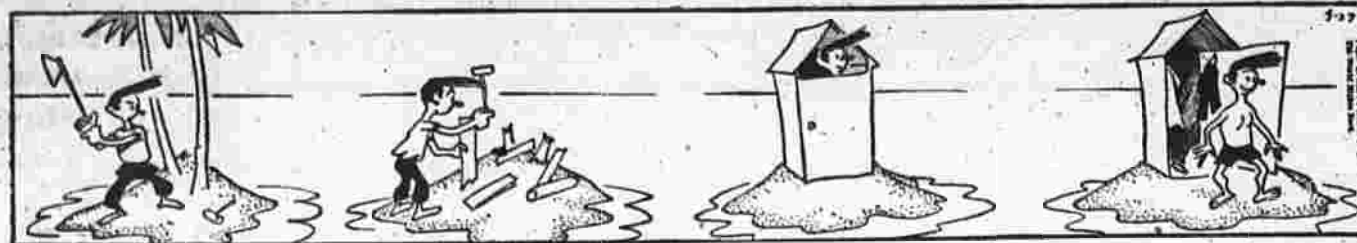

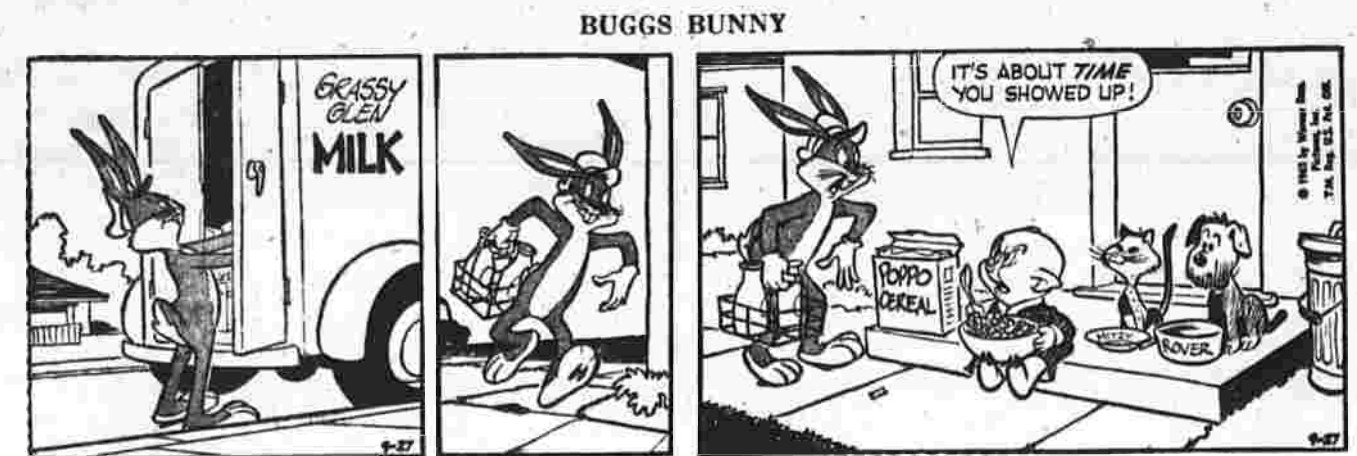

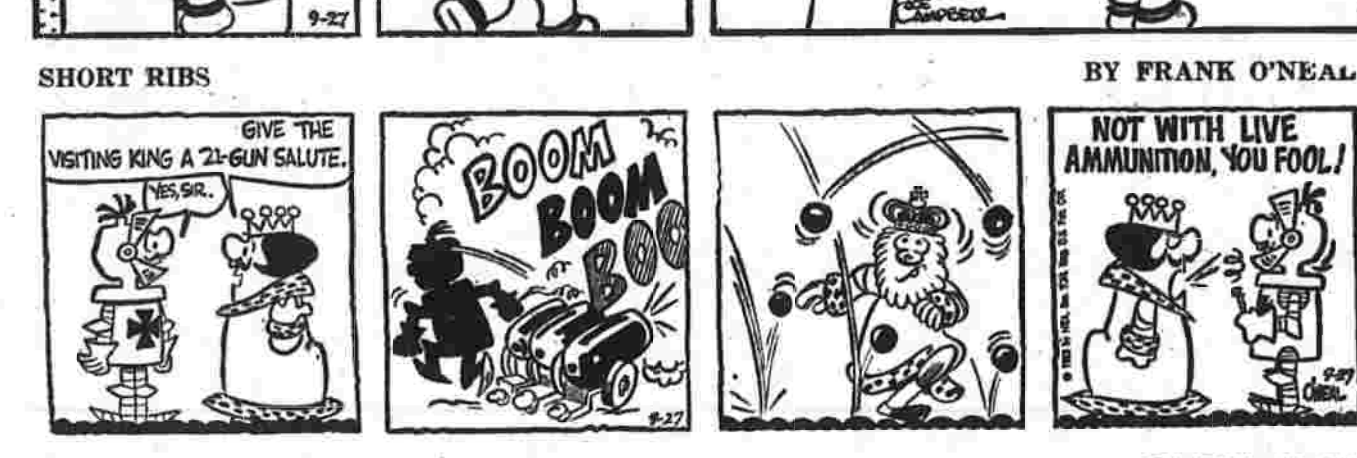
