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Zoners Hear Bids Oct. 21

The recent surge of apartment construction in Manchester is showing signs of continuing into the winter months, with three requests for zoning variances for apartment houses or group dwellings on the zoning board of appeals Oct. 21 at 8 p.m. on Oct. 21 at the Municipal Building.

Three of them were built or planned by one of the applicants before the ZBA this month. Colonel Court Associates. All are located in the core of the town, two are complete and the third is in the first phases of construction.

The largest of the present planned apartments is an 18-unit garden-type development being headed by Warren Howland, for the southwest corner of E. Center Street and Francis St., in Residence Zone A.

Howland must have both a special exception, as required for any group dwelling construction, and a variance to allow the 18 units be built.

The land in question has land sufficient for a 17-unit apartment development, based on the requirements of the zoning regulations.

The application is being re-submitted, after Howland was earlier denied an application for a permit apartment development at the same location.

Colonial Courts Associates is asking a variance for a five-unit apartment building at the southeast corner of Wadsworth and Huntington Sts., and John Pomilio and Sons Inc. is asking a variance for a four-unit apartment on Congress St. south of Baymont St.

Both require variances since both are in Residence Zone B, where apartments are normally prohibited.

Also on the agenda, William Freeman is asking permission to have two dwelling units on one parcel of land at 189 Oak St. in Residence Zone B.

In 1962, the ZBA granted Freeman permission for a dwelling unit in an existing building in the rear of the property.

When Freeman asked for extension of permission in 1964, the ZBA denied his request. Now he is asking that they reconsider.

Richard Moriconi is asking for a variance to build a two-family home on St. Lawrence St., east of Stone St., in Residence Zone A, where prohibited by the zoning regulations.

He also is asking for a variance to allow the building to be closer to the east side of the lot than regulations allow.

Two requests are from applicants who want to build closer to the street than regulations allow.

One is from the National Dairy Products Corp., asking a variance to build a loading platform closer to the road at 113 Summit St. than the regulations permit in Residence Zone B.

The Town Planning Commission changed the 26-foot established building line in front of the building on Summit St. at 113 Summit St. last month.

If the ZBA grants a variance of the 26-foot building line the zoning regulations require the loading platform to be 10 feet from the street.

The other request is from John McInerney, who is asking a variance to build an attached garage to a house at 41 Duval St. in Residence Zone A, that will be closer to the street line than the regulations allow.

The addition, a porch, would be 10 feet from the street, it would replace a porch which has been torn down which was only 18 feet from the street.

John Binkley is asking a variance to build an attached garage to a house at 41 Duval St. in Residence Zone A, that would be closer to the street line than the regulations permit.

The S & H Co., constructing new doctors' offices at 297 E. Center St., in Residence Zone C, is asking a variance to construct two ground signs that would be closer to the street line than regulations allow.

The sign would be placed against a stone wall, which the applicants are building along the front of the lot.

Players must participate in at least half of the scheduled club nights to be eligible for this award.

Whatever sharp, spike-like observation may greet the Republican Council's recommendations for revision of delegates make-up for the Republican State Convention—let us hope they will be balanced off, though one might find, running some of them down toward the left analysis and consideration, some minor traces of political influence.

The one big answer that does have some validity, in my opinion, is that which concerns the balance between the two parties, the Republicans and the United States, and some kind of insidious rivalry and mutual challenge which exists between the two top bulls in any kind of herd, the two philosophy professors in the same college, the two great team players on the same street corner, the two teams all eyes and ears toward the other, the two great nations in the world, and, almost inevitably, and certainly most instructively, immediately began the process of sensing each other, measuring each other, feeling each other, probing each other, and hating and despising each other.

Each of us has had friends on our side, but each of us has also had to encounter, again and again, some obvious indication that the friend concerned in this particular case, through Tuesday, Oct. 22, if the United Fund Drive is to play its own full chance of success, its own campaign, its own drive, takes the pains and time to see that its various households in Manchester is visited, solicited, and, if necessary, marked off the work list, one way or the other.

The other requisite part of a successful drive for the United Fund is the success of the reactions of the people behind the residential doors of Manchester.

Most of us, over the years, developed routines for all kinds of appeals. In a smoky, gray-walled room of the hospital, Macmillan had prepared cheerfully for the operation. There was a full physical examination, blood tests and X-rays. He spent much of Wednesday conducting state and political business with callers.

Lady Dorothy Macmillan spent an hour with her husband at the hospital Wednesday night. As she left she said: "He is in excellent form."

Macmillan argued that to attempt to make it while a sick man would have exposed both Macmillan and the party to embarrassment.

Macmillan qualified as a World War I officer in a Guards Regiment. Like others on his list, he pays \$2.64 a year membership plus the cost of any treatment his charges would incur.

Lord Hallahan, another leading contender, surprised the Conservers by declaring he knew in advance of Macmillan's illness. He called it a blessing in disguise, as it removed from Macmillan

Deputy Prime Minister Richard A. Butler emerged today as the favorite to succeed stricken Harold Macmillan at the helm of the British government and the Conservative party.

As Macmillan was prepared for surgery today in a London hospital, his party's leadership crisis moved toward an open trial of strength between Butler, 60, and two chief rivals.

The rivals are Lord Hallahan, 66, science minister, and Harold Maudslong, 46, chancellor of the exchequer.

The battle was being fought so far mainly on the fringes of the party's annual conference, which opened in Blackpool Wednesday in an atmosphere of confusion caused by Macmillan's unexpected illness.

In the Tory headquarters hotel there were intense consultations. Shortly before entering the hall a letter of praise from President Kennedy for his part in bringing

of Commons, elder statesmen and party bosses talked in the corridors and private suits. There were whispers, secrets, maneuvers and bargains.

Medical authorities in London expected the operation on Macmillan to be successful. But as the party conference, the conviction grew that he would resign as soon as party leaders settled on a political heir.

The feeling was that even if Macmillan recovered quickly, he could neither stand the strain of a campaign nor project an image of vigorous leadership. Macmillan will be 70 next February.

Butler, designated by Macmillan to lead the government in his absence, will be in a position to display his authority and talents publicly almost daily. Grass roots leaders indicated a preference for Butler by having him to address a mass rally of party workers Saturday as a substitute for Macmillan.
