New Slides Threaten in Alpine Area

BELLUNA, Italy (AP)—More than 10,000 men worked today to collect bodies of the dead in the Vaiont Dam disaster.

Policemen moved out more than 200 persons whose villages were endangered by the threat of new landslides.

Estimates of the dead ranged up to 2,000 believed killed when a massive landslide crashed into the dam's reservoir Wednesday night and sent flood waters roaring over the dam and down the Piave River valley.

Most of the victims were still buried under the tons of mud and rock that turned the lovely Alpina valley 60 miles north of Venice into a wasteland.

"What Do the Simple Folk Do?" Well, quite a few of them have been visiting Bushnell Memorial this week to hear this musical, "Camelot." And what else do they do? If they're like the writer, they enjoyed themselves.

Native Nutmegger Bill McGuire and his real-life wife Jeanne Caron fill the lead roles of King Arthur and Queen Guinevere, and do an adequate if not sensational job.

Although it's unfair and unfair road company principals who play in Broadway hits suffer from comparison to the originals, McGuire and Caron, in this regard, suffer off at least even with the now-famous Richard Burton in his portrayal of the shy, bumbling but good-hearted King Arthur. (By the way, can anyone imagine Burton in a role which calls for him to be a shy around women?)

Miss Caron is not Julie Andrews—but who is? She gives a pleasing performance as the queen who changes from pixie-like young girl to participant in an ill-fated romance with Sir Lancelot.

Perhaps it is Sir Lancelot who is the super-complicated Lancelot that suffers most in comparison to the original. Although he handles the role fairly well, he does not possess that certain magic intangible that made Robert Goulet into an overnight Broadway star.

All three, however, do justice to their meaty roles as come veteran Fellows.

The story of "Camelot" is well-known. It's been nearly three years since it opened on Broadway. But in case anyone missed it—it is a tale of a handsome knight who saves King Arthur's hope of ruling the world of war and bloodshed, substituting a round table around which all the knights can settle problems by group action or the love affair between his beloved Queen Guinevere and his best friend, Sir Lancelot.

The scenery and costumes are magnificent. The well-known Lerner and Loewe songs have lost none of their luster.
