down the dam's face. The rescue team had to blast open the chamber steel door, twisted out of shape by the torrent of flood-water.

The nation was in deep mourning last week when the dam burst, and the catastrophe mounted throughout the country.

Mayor Secor, president of a Communist group in the Italian village, said that he was watching engineers at the dam as they worked to repair it.

He noted that the Communist newspaper L'Unita in Rome had sent a helicopter to the dam on charges of publishing false news that the dam was in a geologically dangerous area. The newspaper was acquitted.

Giacomo Corina, a Christian Democrat leader, said the mayor of Enns, a strict community on the hillside above the reservoir, had warned residents six days before the dam burst that it was in a geologically dangerous area.

Another physician, Dr. Silvano Toscani, said she also appeared to be suffering from the first symptoms of pneumonia and because of this it was not immediately possible to determine the seriousness of the fractures.

He described DeLazario as being in "fairly good condition," recovering from shock, cuts and bruises.

About 200 persons from Mt. Toccoleone were evacuated by helicopter. Many others returned to their homes.

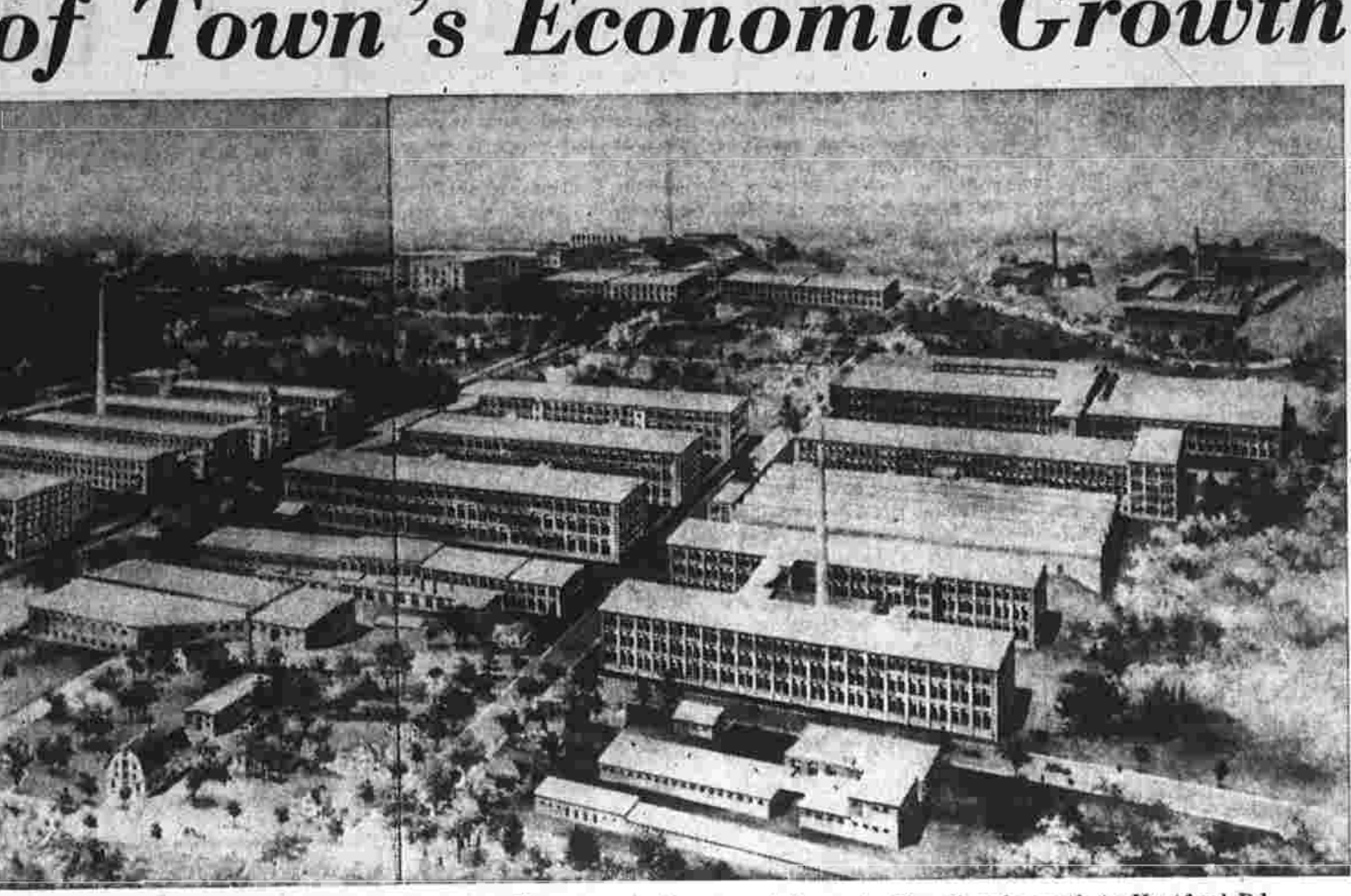

School Board Bid to Bypass Manager on Budget Rejected

Among the many town charter changes considered, and turned down, by the Charter Revision Commission (CRC) last week, were two submitted by the board of education. One of the board's requests was that a budget of the board of education be submitted to the board of directors directly, and not be reviewed, prior to its submission, by the town manager. A subcommittee of the CRC felt that such action was not advisable since it would eliminate the "check and balance" feature now established by the town charter. The other request by the board of education was to change the town charter to permit adoption of the education budget prior to that of other operations of the town government. The CRC, in considering the request, felt that the present town charter now permits such action. A third request considered, but not recommended, by a subcommittee of the CRC, would change the town charter to include a department of finance in the town government. The subcommittee felt that this would be inadvisable, since "it would reduce the responsibilities of the directors, or increase the responsibilities of the general manager. It felt, also, that 'The directors now function as a board of finance in respect to budget evaluation, and adoption, as one of their prime responsibilities to the voters.'"

United Fund Member American Red Cross Marking 100th Year

This year a gift to your United Fund is also a gift to your American Red Cross, which is celebrating its 100th birthday. The work of the Red Cross is perhaps the best known of any of the fund's 11 participating agencies, because of its long and extensive impact on American life.

Of its many services, one of the most active and far-reaching is the Blood Program. This program has the overall responsibility for arranging visit sites, appointments for donors, and the collection of blood for the regularly scheduled visits, as well as for emergency needs. Last year about 1800 pints of blood were collected in the Manchester area. Another phase of the Red Cross program is its service to members of the armed forces and to veterans in counting and referrals and in giving financial assistance, helping with emergency communications, as well as other services tailored to the specific needs of the individual or his family. Last year 106 separate cases of this type were handled by the local office, located at 139 E. Center St. The Red Cross First Aid program not only gives training in the techniques of giving aid, but also supplies aid teams at large public gatherings, such as the 4th of July fireworks display and the mid-July football games. The Red Cross Water Safety program is carried out under an arrangement with the Town Recreation Department. All instructors must first be certified by the Red Cross, and participants in swimming classes who qualify are given certificates from the Red Cross office. Also available through the office are free manuals on safe boating procedures and books for parents on the techniques of teaching swimming to children. Other Red Cross service groups contain numerous willing and enthusiastic workers: The Motor Service handles the

transporting of workers and donors to Bloodmobile visits, and delivers blood to Manchester Memorial Hospital from the Blood Center; besides arranging transportation for emergency donors as needed. Red Cross Gray Ladies twice weekly spend the day working at the Newington Veterans Hospital, where they assist patients in many ways: Shopping, reading, doing errands and escort duty, and helping them with X-ray and therapy treatments, to name a few. Staff Aides are volunteers who have some clerical knowledge, and work mainly at Bloodmobile visits helping with registration of donors. The Casten Corps is a group of 15 women who plan, prepare, and serve meals to the Blood Center staff on Bloodmobile Day, and prepare light refreshments for donors. The Home Nursing group is concerned mainly with the planning and supplying of materials for the home nursing course, which is taught to the senior home economics class at Concordia Hospital School. This program last year resulted in 25 students being certified. Remember, the work of this vital United Fund agency can continue in Manchester only in proportion to your United Fund pledge. Business Bodies

Watkins Bros. Inc., home furnishing firm at 935 Main St., Tuesday marked its 89th year in business in Manchester.

The firm, also associated with Watkins-West Funeral Service, is now celebrating its 89th Birthday Sale for Manchester and area residents. It was on Oct. 8, 1874, that two young sprouts, Charles G. Watkins and P. Ernest Watkins, brothers, found themselves in the undertaking business as they entered into furniture making with their custom-made caskets. The boys did not have any money, according to the records, but a note endorsed by their mother was acceptable to a Mr. Pinney from whom the Watkins purchased their undertaking business. Their first caskets were made to measurement and sold wholesale to Hartford undertakers.

Their first site of operations was a little white house on Walla St., (which still stands) acquired from William H. Cheney and Sons. From this small beginning, Watkins Bros. went into the furniture and undertaking business. In 1876, the factory and showroom of Watkins Bros. moved to Main St. at the corner of Charter Oak St. Then, in 1891, the Watkins block was built at Main and School Sts.

C. Elmore Watkins, president of Watkins Bros. Inc., joined the company in 1904. The business was incorporated in 1912.

In 1934, Watkins Funeral Service moved to 142 Center St. and ten years later, Ormand J. West was named funeral director. The funeral service was soon known as Watkins-West and later expanded its modern facilities under Mr. West, who has recently added the most up-to-date radio communications system of waist band radios so as to keep in constant communications with the funeral service office. The new communication unit is operable within a 25-mile radius of Manchester, he said today.

The home furnishings store on Main St. today is a long way from the early days of the Watkins Brothers business, especially when one realizes that, back in 1891, when four wooden buildings — which everybody said was bigger than the town would ever need, could today be placed inside the present structure.

Growth through sound merchandising has brought a long list of returning customers to Watkins Bros. stores in Hartford and Downtown Manchester, Watkins Bros. is well-known throughout New England as a leading home furnishings firm.

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'Arrest and Trial'

Ben Gazzarra Lured Away from Broadway

One of the theatre's brightest younger lights waved goodbye to "Strange Interlude," one of the 1963 Broadway season's brightest triumphs (and an all-star dedicated effort to benefit the Actors' Studio Theatre project) to go off to Hollywood and television... and him a holdout at that!

What had gotten into that boy, Ben Gazzarra?  
"Well, I liked the whole premise of 'Arrest and Trial,'" he said of the new ABC-TV Sunday night (8:30 p.m.) double helping of justice in which he starts as Det. Sgt. Nick Anderson (seen primarily in the first half) with Chuck Connors as the defense attorney dominating the latter half.

"It was conceived of as the first non-Western, 90-minute dramatic show, you know. And it's a far cry from just a whodunit. It probes for the reasons behind, let's say, the anti-social acts and still adds up to entertainment."

"I felt this would be television I could feel proud to be associated with... and then marvellously everything else worked out too."  
By "everything else" he meant that his beautiful actress wife, Janice Rule, was offered a movie role she liked at the same time. "So, we lived at Malibu Beach in the summer and now we're in Westwood. Yes, with a swimming pool. Katie (his elder daughter, five years old) has learned to swim." Elizabeth (three-and-a-half) says she wants to learn, too, but she's... playing it cooler. "Daddy, I'm afraid, though, you'll have to hold onto me." Daddy, who was in New York on a quickie promotion trip, couldn't wait to get back.

But it's the family (and of course, also the series) he's quick to point out. The swimming pool bit alone would never keep them that far from Broadway. "We're keeping our apartment on Riverside Drive where the rooms are big and there are eight of them and the rent is still low because we've lived there like forever. (In fact it was Janice's apartment before we even met)."

"As for 'Strange Interlude' I didn't walk out on it really, you know. The whole idea was a limited run because all of us had other commitments," (among the rest of us were indeed such busy people as Jane Fonda) "but the others were able to manage extensions whereas I had to get started on the series."

"Working with Chuck Connors? Well he's just my type anyway, a real dead-end kid." Then he cut the ribbing, which was really more of a hard-boiled to the tail one's days as a big league ball player known for crowd pleasing "hamming" tactics. "Since then Chuck has become even better known as a Western hero. The original half dozen shows were completed but had not been released but Ben's serious next comment has been borne out. "Chuck," he said, "is going to surprise you. He'll prove real powerful!"

Both, incidentally, were originally New York boys... but Ben got the acting bug as a

youngster at the Madison Square Boys Club. He got as far as his second year at City College when the acting virus really took over and he entered the Theater Workshop of the New School for Social Research. Next he was accepted by Lee Strasberg at the famed Actor's Studio, as one of a group of fledglings who turned out to be eagles. A short year later he, the late James Dean, Albert Salmi and Paul Richards (who's also seen on ABC this season in "Breaking Point") opened off-Broadway in "End As A Man." It hit the critics so hard in the middle of their rave mechanisms that the play graduated to "on-Broadway success."

Next came "Hatful of Rain," where everybody was tough. "We got into Philadelphia late at night for the tryout," he recalls, "and the room-clerk asked 'Who cast this play, the parole officer?'"

The stage version of "Cat On a Hot Tin Roof" came next, then his first movie, recreating his "End As A Man" heel. Other notable movies followed including: "Anatomy of a Murder."

"I much prefer our live-tape technique on 'Arrest and Trial.' Film is slow and I can't stand inactivity," and though he didn't realize it, Ben was proving his point by pacing up and down his hotel living room.

"Don't misunderstand me, though. No corners are cut. I understand each 90-minute segment cost about a quarter of a million dollars. If we need a night scene there's none of this shooting in the daytime with filters; we go on location around Los Angeles... at night."

He's having some happy reunions as his old stage cronies fly out for guest shots. Anthony Franciosa has already appeared. Pat Hingle is slated.

But the cronies are all very well... it's Janice that really counts. "I don't think I could have taken this on without her. She's my severest critic and she's a wonderful woman besides. I called her up at six this morning from New York to tell her I loved her. I forgot it was the middle of the night in California."

"Her acting?" (For the past several years it's been honanahs from the critics every time she appears). "Well," he said thoughtfully, "you can have more than one 'severest critic' under the same roof. 'she's grown incredibly in the last few years. She's now a very fine actress.'"

"Oh, you make a lot of money, Miss Ritter, would I spend it in the sanitarium?" Actually, Miss Ritter has spent a good part of her career turning down money. She has a \$10,000 a year salary, but she has other things she considers more important—such as her sanity and her career.

"For years," she says, "I had a running fight with Hollywood about type-casting. It cost me a small fortune. I kept turning down parts and the 'Plumstones' cost \$10,000 per half hour to make. Even if that is twice as high as it really is, we're still way under it."

"It all started with 'All About Eve.' I didn't really play a maid, but I wore an apron, so they thought I was a maid. Well, anyway, every producer went of the hook, every producer went of the hook. I finally had to stop it and say, 'No more.'"

TV Personalities

Robert Russell Bennett

Robert Russell Bennett, one of the country's outstanding composers, arrangers, and conductors, has been associated with the NBC-TV Network's "Project 20" since its start in 1954.

He has written and adapted music for "Meet Mr. Lincoln," "Mark Twain's America," "The Real West," "Life in the Thirties," "The Jazz Age," "The Great War," "The Innocent Years," "The Twisted Cross," "Call to Freedom," "Nightmare in Red" and other "Project 20" programs.

In 1952, Bennett undertook his first important TV assignment when he orchestrated the Richard Rodgers score for "Victory at Sea," the 26-episode Naval history of World War II, and conducted the NBC Symphony in its performance.

Bennett is a man of dual personality in the world of music. A prolific composer of serious music, he has written a three-act opera ("Maria Malibran"), two one-act operas ("The Enchanted Kiss," "An Hour of Delusion"), seven symphonies, three concertos and other major works.

On the lighter side, Bennett has spent more than 20 years on Broadway writing the orchestral arrangements for musical comedies and revues. — more than 300 of them, including "Oklahoma," "Carousel," "South Pacific," "The King and I," "The Flower Drum Song," "The Sound of Music," "Kiss Me Kate" and "My Fair Lady."

Over the past three decades, Bennett has arranged more than 5,000 popular songs, orchestrating for such noted Broadway tunesmiths as Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, Vincent Youmans, Rudolf Friml, Arthur Schwartz, George

Gerashwin and Jerome Kern.

Bennett was born in Kansas City in 1894, the son of George Robert Bennett, trumpeter and violinist in the Kansas City Philharmonic, and May Bradford Bennett, who taught piano. At nine, he wrote his first arrangement, and at 11 conducted a local orchestra for picnics and county fairs.

In 1916 he went to New York to work in the copy department of G. Schirmer. He began transcribing for private individuals, then organized and conducted Army bands during the first World War. He arranged much of the music of the day for publishers, Harms among them, and in 1922 began arranging the music for the pit orchestras of Broadway shows.

In 1926, Bennett went to Europe to study as a pupil of Nadia Boulanger, teacher of many of the world's eminent contemporary composers. He stayed there until the end of 1928. He was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship and, in his first four years in Europe, produced more than 20 compositions ranging from two symphonies to a collection of piano sketches.

Bennett returned to New York in 1930 to arrange music for Broadway stage hits including "The Band Wagon," "Of Thee I Sing," "The Cat and the Hat," "Face the Music," and "Roberta."

In 1935 he went to Hollywood, where he spent four years composing and orchestrating the music for more than 30 movies. Since 1940, he has gone to Hollywood now and then to work on feature pictures. It was during one of these interludes that he made the orchestration of "Oklahoma" that won him an Oscar in 1955 from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

Bennett and his wife live in Manhattan. They have a married daughter and one grandson.
