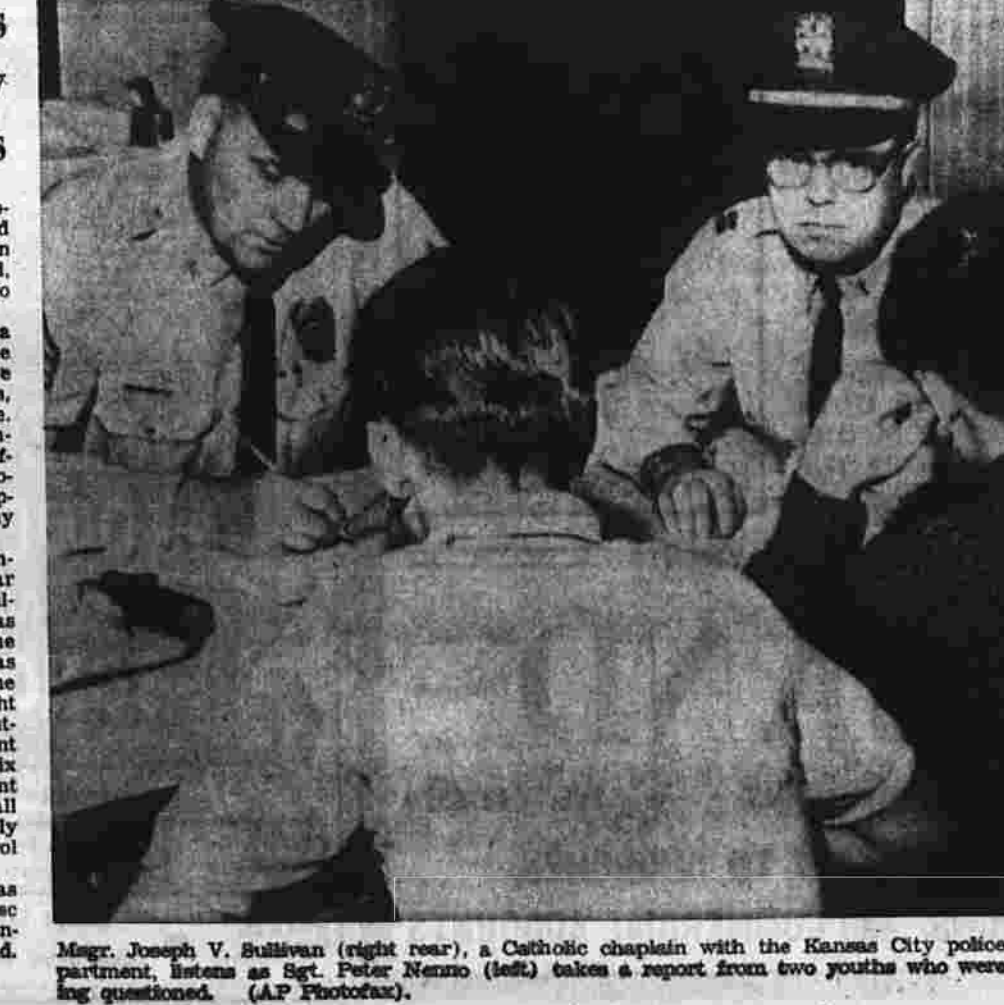

Adenauer has lived his political career in the framework of responsible parliamentary democracy. Under his strong leadership, this form of government has lasted longer than the Weimar Republic, which followed World War I, or Adolf Hitler's "Thousand Year Reich."

Adenauer, who will be succeeded as chancellor by Erwin Lemmer, has been a man who has publicly opposed claims as the crowning accomplishment of his rule the friendship treaty he signed last January with President de Gaulle of France. Germany, he says, has at last become reconciled with its traditional enemy. Adenauer's critics dispute his opinion. De Gaulle, they say, is supporting West Germany's relationship with the United States and France. Adenauer has little interest in

Members Saturday received copies of the bylaw amendments and are expected to vote on them. The dissenting group described the existing bylaws regarding membership as "impractical, unrealistic, unfair and unjust."

ALPOA had to approve their membership application as presently required by the bylaws.

The dissenting group's key proposal is that membership to all applicants who own lake property, provide the real estate taxes, agree to abide by the bylaws and pay their dues.

snipers near Algaza and Fort National.

Barber forces under Hocine Ali Ahmed and Col. Mohamed Oudjif withdrew into the Bab el Oued mountains before an army force of three light French tanks, artillery weapons and four tanks equipped infantry battalions occupied Michelet Saturday.

In Algeria, Ben Bella promised to pardon all but the ring-leaders of the revolt, which was largely based on opposition to the one-man rule. He urged rebel soldiers to lay down their arms.

The army was so confident of its position that it pulled most of its troops out of Michelet Sunday.

In considering the operation at an end, the officer said, "Most of these troops clearly are not needed here any more."

The only losses were two soldiers killed and two wounded by the rebels, he said.

The Barbars, numbering about two million in a mostly Arab nation of 19 million, had sought Ben Bella's overthrow and rebel representation in the government.

In Michelet, where only a few days ago Ali Ahmed vowed to topple Ben Bella, soldiers chanted in a Soviet prison on charges of spying, it is expected to say his first Mass in his home parish in Shennouba, Pa., sometime this week.

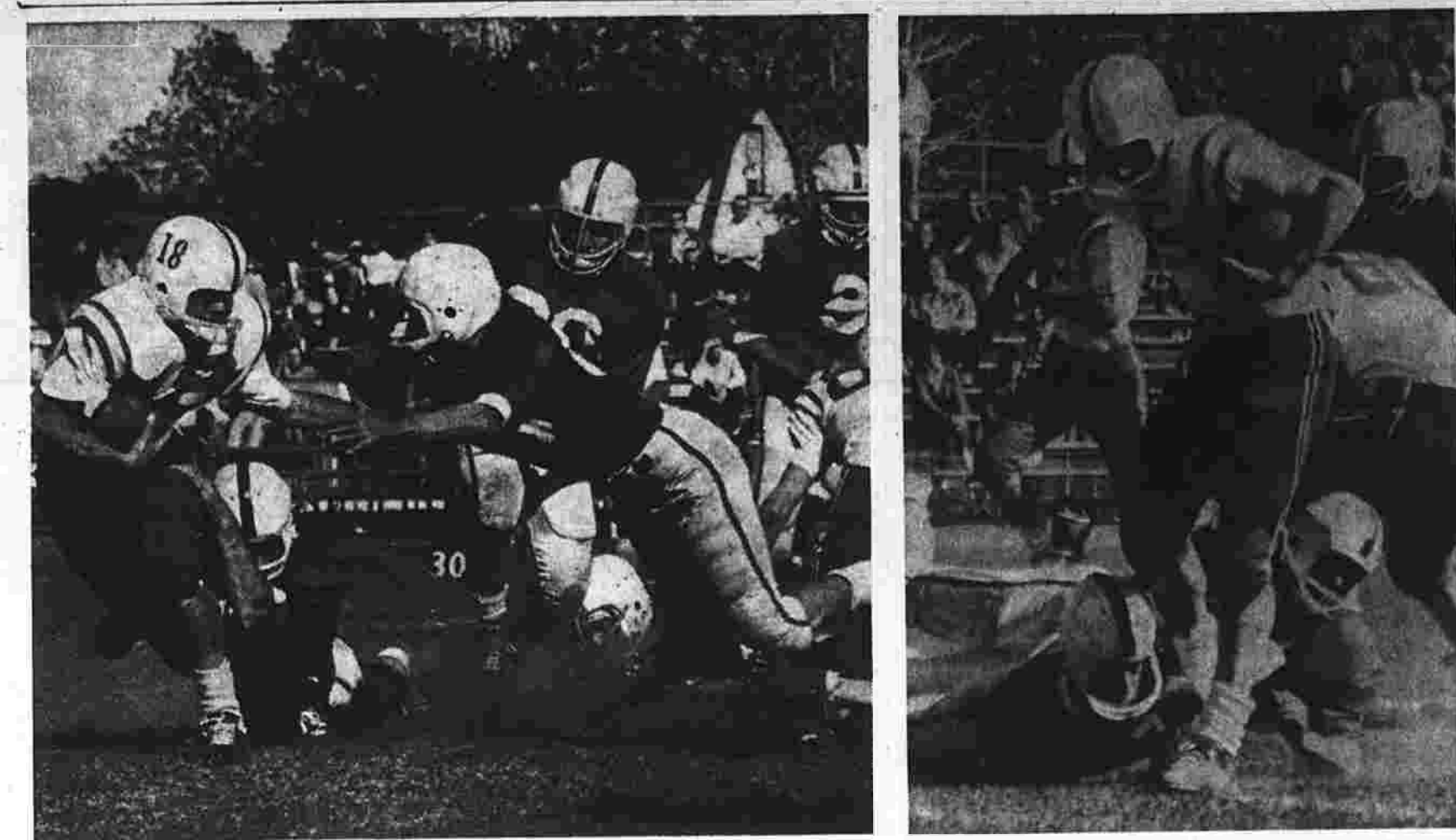

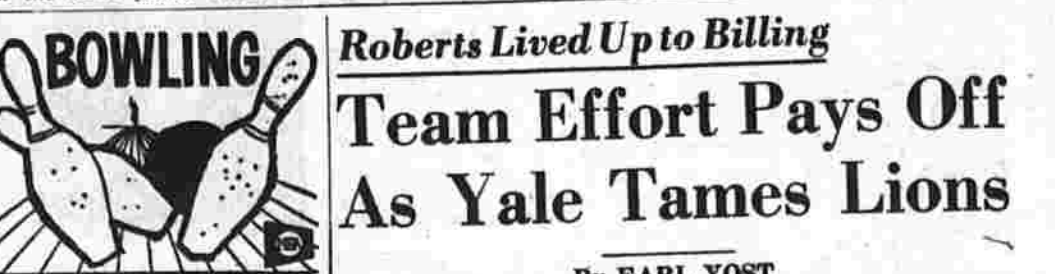
