7 Vehicles Crash On Foggy Rt. 15

EAST HARTFORD (AP)—Thick early morning fog caused a seven-vehicle pileup and one of the worst traffic jams in years today on the Wilbur Cross Highway.

The crash occurred at 5:45 a.m. in the southbound lane about a mile east of the Charter Oak Bridge toll gate. Six tractor-trailer trucks and a passenger car were involved.

State Trooper William Traynor of the Hartford Troop said the crash was touched off by a minor rear-end collision between a truck and a car in the left lane.

One truck slowed down and touched off the chain collision. The car was caught in the middle of the line of trucks, which was picking up speed in the lane.

The planned man suffered the most serious injuries in the accident. He is James Webster, 36, of Brooklyn, N.Y. Police said he appeared to have a broken hip.

It took rescuers over an hour to remove Webster from his truck. The left side of the cab was crushed.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Ginny lashed Florida's upper East Coast with gales today as she swept a little closer to land.

The Weather Bureau said Ginny probably would whip ashore within the next 12 hours. When it did, Forecasters Gordon Dunn said, "there could be no major damage."

Ginny's peak winds of 75 miles an hour barely touched her as a hurricane.

Although the Weather Bureau wasn't firm on when Ginny would go next, a course 90 to 100 miles offshore parallel to the Florida Coast was predicted.

After a brief pause during the night about 100 miles east of Cape Canaveral, Ginny started northward at 2 miles an hour. But the danger wasn't quite over and the Weather Bureau maintained a hurricane watch from Cape Canaveral to Brunswick, Ga.

Run up to 40 miles an hour battered the upper Florida coast and gales whirled offshore from central Florida to South Carolina.

With a halting series of starts, stops and backwards sprints, Ginny moved near the night of Wednesday for a transfer.

Hungary Buying American Corn

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government has cleared the way for sale of 1.2 million bushels of corn to Communist Hungary.

The larger issue of wheat sales to the Soviet bloc remains confused.

Cabinet officers huddled Wednesday with a Soviet trade delegation and failed to iron out the chief obstacle to completion of the wheat deal—high shipping rates charged by American shippers.

There is a growing feeling here that the problem can be resolved only by a White House decision, not through negotiation.

The corn sale to Hungary was resolved smoothly because corn and other grains are exempted from the condition that wheat shipments be charged by American shippers.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—As the United Nations celebrates its 18th birthday today, much stress is being placed on relaxation of international tensions and a spirit of optimism in U.N. debates.

Those who have observed the U.N. during these 18 stormy cold war years agree that there has never been a more cordial East-West relationship.

But so far the charge has been mainly in climate. There has been no breakthrough on basic problems, such as disarmament.

The United Nations itself still faces many critical problems, including long overdue structural changes and mounting financial woes.

Many of these reflect the changing world picture, marked by the emergence of new Asian and African nations. The U.N. now has 113 members; it had 51 originally. It has 33 from the 1960 in the Congo. These forces, made up of units contributed by small countries, take the place of the big power police force envisaged in the U.N. Charter.

The big powers have never been able to agree on organization of the projected force and the idea has been shelved.

One consequence of growth has been a shift in the balance of power within the organization and a much greater emphasis on the problems of colonialism and the developing countries.

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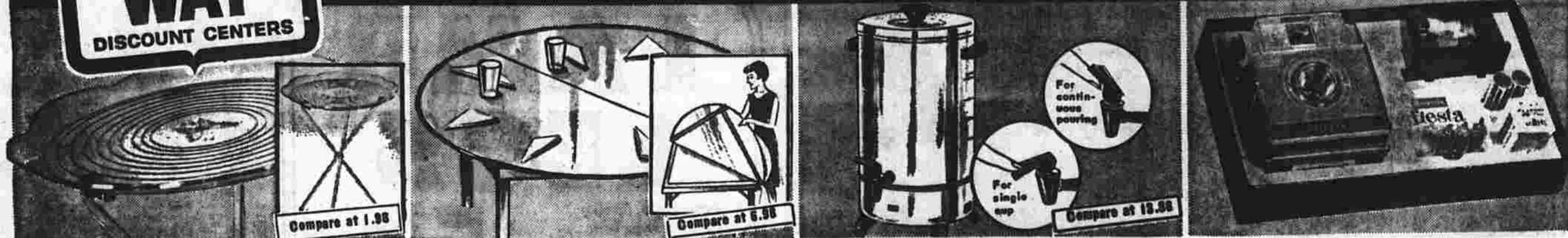

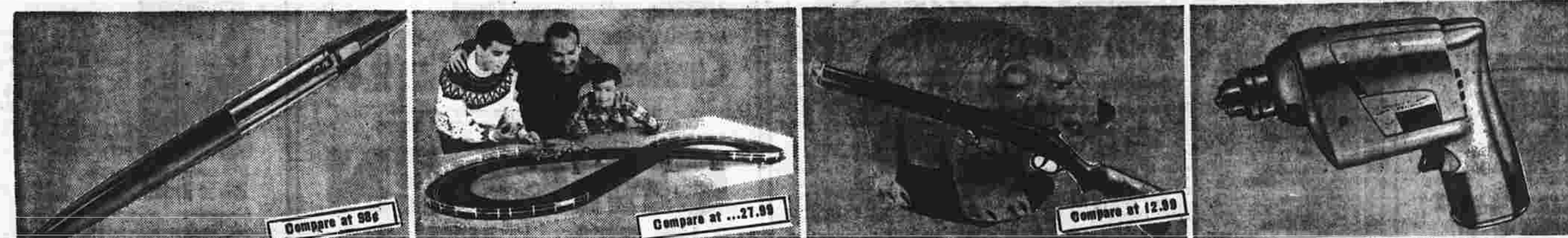

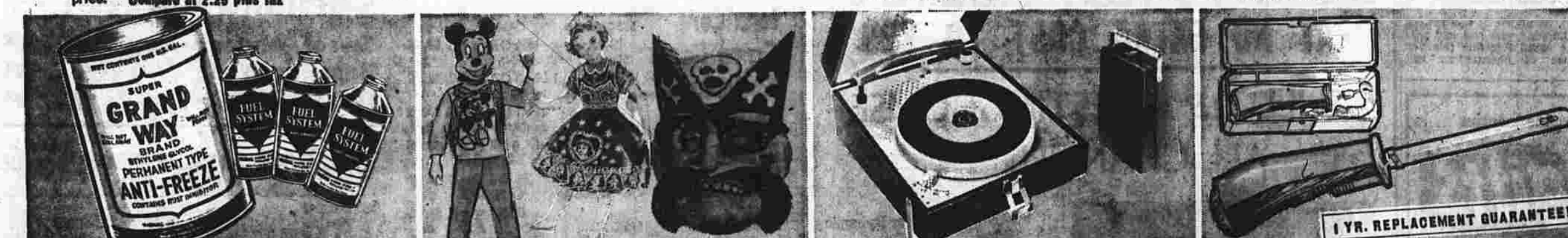

### Rockville-Vernon PUC Delay on RR Jolts City Officials

City officials attending a hearing in Hartford yesterday were shaken when they learned that the proposed location of the freight station on the road to Rockville redevelopment.

The hearing, considered by the PUC, was held to obtain PUC approval of a request by the New Haven Railroad to discontinue and abandon the freight station and the area around it, and to sell the station to the city, two parcels of land there.

The area of concern centered around the freight station, which last year, serviced 14 local industries and business firms. Plans are to relocate the station at a site near Church, Pleasant and Phoenix Sts. in Vernon.

PUC Chairman Eugene S. Loughlin, who presided at the hearing, questioned the distance between the present station and the proposed site. For example, he asked why the new station was planned closer to the center of the city.

In an answer, Loughlin is sending representatives to Rockville on Monday morning to check three locations: The present freight station, the site at West St. and Phoenix St., and a third area at West St. and Church St.

The railroad has said it will provide the facilities at West St., according to Atty. Donald S. Caldwell, counsel to the Rockville Redevelopment Agency. Caldwell conducted the agency's portion of the hearing.

He said, "If the PUC approves this sale on condition that the facilities at West St. be further discussed between the city and the railroad."

Caldwell said, "I feel the commission was greatly impressed with the needs of the city as far as redevelopment is concerned, and that it will do everything in its power to see that the city acquires this property."

The case for the city was established when Caldwell called as his first three witnesses, Lester J. Baum, agency chairman; Leo B. Flaherty Jr., and Robert J. Garabedian, president of the Rockville Redevelopment Agency.

Baum told the commissioner that the city had the support of the federal government hinges on the acquisition of the railroad property. He stated that the background of the renewal project.

Flaherty reported that city residents had approved both redevelopment and the bonding issue connected with it. Garabedian gave the results of a survey conducted by the city last January for the redevelopment agency. He said that 50 questionnaires mailed to local industries and businesses, 30 replies were received.

He indicated that 10 of the 30 used the freight facilities but only three felt they would be inconvenienced if the facilities were removed. One respondent suggested that inconvenience would result if the station was moved a short distance from the center of the city.

Thirty-four felt that growth in the center of the city is hampered by the location of the freight station, four felt that it was a problem, and one was doubtful.

In commenting on the proposed sale, Thomas O'Brien, chairman of the railroad, said that for the first time in its history both the railroad and city have jointly asked for abandonment of a site.

O'Brien called two railroad officials to testify, Nicholas Plesh, general manager, and Joseph F. Dalby, chief of the property division.

O'Brien said that in 1962, a total of 507 cars were received in Rockville. All but 70 of the cars were sent to private industry under contract to the proposed station move. Eight cars were loaded by the Plant-Farm Corp. last year.

Freight cars moved to private industry went to: Ellington, Vernon Farmer's Shoeing, 2811 and 2813 Lambert Co. 7, according to Walsh.

A statement showing the number of cars on public delivery tracks in Rockville reveals a drop in traffic. In 1961, 123 cars were unloaded; in 1962, 79 cars; and for the period Jan. through August of this year, 50 cars.

During the three-year period supported by the railroad, the first eight months of this year, the 17 best industries in the city received in 1961, 34 in 1962 and 19 in 1963.

Others include: Rockville Redevelopment, 1961, 1962, 11; 1963, 8; Amerbell Corp., 1961, 7; 1962, 10; 1963, 4. Other patrons include: D. D. Anderson, Connecticut Light and Power, City of Rockville, Clay Products Co., Connecticut Bulk Feed Service, Williams Food Center, Farmall Oil Co., General Cigar Co., Gottlieb, Hartford Builders Supply Co., King-Edgar-Bleed Co., L. L. Lamburger, C. H. Mason Co., Nelson Corp., Rockville Post Office, Rockville Woodworking Co., Southern New England Telephone Co., Tubor Bushnell Co., Town of Vernon, Town of Ellington.

Another statement provided by the railroad disclosed the less-than-expected tons handled at Rockville. The figures include tons received and tons forwarded. In 1961, a total of 127 tons was received with a monthly average of 10 1/2 tons. A total of 82 tons was handled in 1962, a monthly average of 7 tons.

Caldwell said he did not think there would be much delay on the part of the PUC in reaching a decision. "It is impossible to forestall the delay to the redevelopment program."

ton less than three months after becoming ambassador at the height of the Diem's crackdown on Buddhist leaders demonstrating against the government.

Since then there have been some changes in U.S. policy, including the announcement earlier this week that U.S. aid has been cut off to special Vietnamese military forces not actively engaged in battling the Viet Cong. Also, shipments of U.S. surplus food to Viet Nam are to be reduced.

In announcing that one of the matters to be reviewed by Lodge and Kennedy is the strategic hamlet program, Robert McGlothy, State Department press officer, said:

"We have had indications for some time that the strategic hamlet program may have been somewhat overextended in the delta area south of Saigon. We understand that wherever necessary corrective measures are being taken."

The United States has spent about \$25 million on some 1,000 fortified villages. Their aim is to protect the widely scattered Vietnamese peasants and deny them a base for the guerrillas.

In Washington Wednesday Brig. Gen. Frank S. Osmanski, assistant chief of staff for logistics for the U.S. Military Advisory Command in South Viet Nam, said in a speech that the accident in little more than two weeks involving Americans in South Viet Nam.

REDD MUST PAY. BOSTON (AP) — Terrible tempered Red Auerbach has five days to pay the disputed \$200 fine assessed against him following a Boston Celtics exhibition game. Walter Kennedy, new president of the National Basketball Association made it clear yesterday that the fine will stick and said there was precedent for the levy. Auerbach claimed fines have never before been levied for exhibition game infractions. But Kennedy said a study showed similar penalties had been levied in the past and "consequently your appeal to this office is denied."
