Last year Mills' group com-pletely blocked the program from getting to the full House for a vote, which was the problem this year, too. Last year an effort was made to get the pro-gram at least through the Sen-There a watered-down version of Kennedy's original request was put to a vote and defeated. It was watered-down because Kennedy backtracked on legisla-

For instance: This year he sked for tax cuts and tax re forms. He made it a more important program than medical care. But the going got rough in Congress and Kennedy backtracked on the reforms in order to get the cuts. In the Senate last year, with Democrats outnumbering Republicans 64 to 36, the medical eare bill was killed by a 52-48 vote, with 21 Democrats (17 of them Southern Democrats) joining 31 Republicans to beat it. Voting for it were 48 Democrats and only 5 Republicans.

Even at the very start of this year, before Kennedy sent his program to the Capitol once more, McCormack expressed the typical politician's optimism, carefully hedged.

He said last January he was "very hopeful that a medical bill will come out and pass" but added that he could not predict whether it would happen this year or next. In the Senate last year, with


