Harkins Says Diem Did Well In War Against Viet Cong

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—The commander of U.S. military forces in South Vietnam says the late President Ngo Dinh Diem lacked military training but did a good job of waging war against the Communist Viet Cong.

Asked for comment on the rumors, Harkins said in an interview: "That decision is not up to me. Naturally, I would like to see this job through to the end."

The Times quoted qualified sources as saying Harkins' active duty will be extended in June, when he reaches the normally mandatory retirement age of 60.

Harkins predicted that 1964 would be the decisive year in the war.

"Of course, it is not a question of a clear-cut victory over the Viet Cong, but of getting the situation under control that the Vietnamese can carry out."

Age Creeping Up On SAC Sweetheart

By PHIL GUNBY COLUMBIANA, Ohio (AP)—As it must to all airplanes, age is catching up with that master of America's Strategic Air Command, the B-57 jet bomber.

But even if the Stratofortress must give way before long to newer, faster, longer-range aircraft and missiles, the men who have flown her will over the world never will forget her.

For a pilot of almost 16 (his first test flight was Dec. 17, 1947), the B-57's statistics are impressive.

She's 107 feet long and 28 feet high, with a 116-foot wingspan. Those wings sweep back at a 35-degree angle, and under the wings are General Electric jet engines. Fuelled from almost every cavity of its sleek airframe.

It costs \$310 an hour—figuring fuel, maintenance, repairs and personnel pay—to fly her, and she can cruise at over 2,700 miles in 3 hours, 47 minutes.

One of the most visually attractive warplanes ever designed—and still assigned many vital missions—the B-57's body made craft was faster than any fighter in its early days.

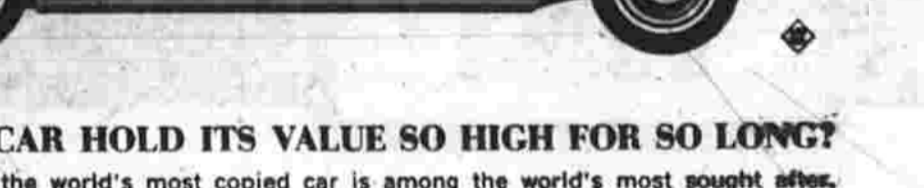

TOKYO (AP)—Japanese railway officials, still under fire from a triple train wreck last weekend that killed 162 persons, said today that obstructions were found on Japan's busiest rail line.

The officials said 20 melon-sized stones and two steel drums were found on rails of the Tokaido main trunk line in Numama City, 120 miles west of Tokyo.

A freight train motorman said the stones and drums were found on the freight on nearby tracks eight minutes later.

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—Charging vote fraud, civilian opponents of strong man Chung Hsiang Park have filed suit with the supreme court asking nullification of his election as president last month.

The Civil Rule party of Yun Po-Sun, who narrowly lost the election, filed the suit. It alleged that at least 40,000 votes cast for Yun either had been declared invalid or counted as votes for Park.

Park's winning margin was 50,000 votes.

LONDON (AP)—One of Britain's most popular television programs, which ran 30 years at the time, will be discontinued after Dec. 28 because of a general election next year.

The British Broadcasting Corp. gave no indication Wednesday whether the program—"That Was the Week That Was"—would be revived after the elections, which must be held by November 1968. But the BBC said it had no intentions of abandoning permanently the kind of satirical commentary on current affairs represented by the program.

LABOR PARTY LEADER HAROLD WILSON, one of the show's regular targets, protested the BBC's decision. "The BBC, an independent corporation chartered by the government, said it made the decision on its own."

ROME (AP)—The 25,000 watchmen at Italian railway crossings were called out on a two-day strike today, leaving many of the interconnections unguarded.

The Italian state railway pressed supervisors to send into duty at major crossings but warned motorists and pedestrians to be wary when crossing tracks.

The watchmen are seeking weekly cost-of-living bonuses.

HALIFAX, N.S. (AP)—The freighter *Sheregarh* sailed from Halifax for Nigeria Wednesday with a million empty beer bottles.

Capt. Bob Wood said the bottles were in big demand in Nigeria, where "draught beer goes down at all weathers."

Wood said Nigerian consider bottled beer something of a status symbol.

MOSCOW (AP)—Marshall Sergei Varentsov, whose name was brought up in the Penkovsky-Wyome spy case, has been expelled from the Supreme Soviet by the Soviet parliament, the official bulletin announced today.

Varentsov was criticized by the court because he had opposed expulsion of Col. Valer Penkovsky from the service.

Varentsov was convicted on May 11 of passing rocket and other military secrets to American and British Embassies in Moscow. He was shot by Greville Wyome, a British businessman, and sentenced to eight years in prison for acting as a courier for Penkovsky.

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Two policemen were wounded Wednesday when a bomb, trapped coffin planted by pro-Castro terrorists exploded in Caracas streets.

Authorities reported that eight black coffins were left on sidewalks in various sections of Caracas. Three contained homemade bombs and the rest were stuffed with propaganda leaflets describing the Dec. 19 Communist congressional candidates have been named from running by President Romulo Betancourt.

The policemen were wounded as they inspected one of the coffins.

Modern Science Puts Heat On Destructive Forest Fires

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States forest fire worst forest fire toll in many years. The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports over 86,000 forest fires in the first six months of 1963—22,000 more than the number reported during the same period a year ago. The area burned is almost double what it was a year ago—up to 2 million acres.

Pennsylvania reports its most severe drought in 24 years. In neighboring New Jersey, many residents are forbidden to water their lawns more than once a week.

A series of dry lightning storms originating in northwest Wyoming and shooting off to the Canadian border have left behind a trail of 200 forest fires in Idaho, another 100 in Washington and Oregon.

Despite the hope of reducing carelessness, the U.S. Forest Service is leaving nothing to chance in research on forest fires around the country, new tools for fighting and controlling fires are being developed.

Innovations now being tested on actual fire lines include an air-conditioned helmet, a two-wheeled motor scooter and a portable lookout tower.

The helmet, weighing 80 pounds, has a refrigerated unit which keeps it 20 to 30 degrees cooler inside. A filter keeps out the smoke. They are used mainly by operators of heavy equipment such as bulldozers, enabling them to work fairly close to the flames.

The two-wheeled scooter is a man to float it across a small stream, while walking beside it. Portable lookout towers are 15-foot-high catlins equipped with eight-foot, telescopic which can be erected in 15 minutes. Black-tin can alone three men.

A realistic training aid is an electronic simulator system now being tried out by the Forest Service at Iowa State University.

In the 24-by-30-foot simulator enclosure, five projectors flash pictures of a raging forest fire onto a curved panoramic screen. A staff man broadcasts imaginary weather and wind conditions.

The trainee, seated at a console, gives orders over telephone and radio. As their commands are received, trucks, planes and other equipment appear on the screen.

When Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., assailed Halleck for publicly supporting the Kennedy administration's modified civil rights bill, it came as no great surprise.

While Halleck wouldn't comment, close associates said he had discounted Russell's assertion as a political speech designed to strengthen Russell's position in Georgia. The speech was made in Dublin, Ga.

Russell for years has headed the anti-civil rights forces in the Senate, while Halleck has played a leading pro-civil rights role in the House.

The Indiana has teamed up in the House with Chairman Howard W. Smith, D-Va., of the Rules Committee, many times to block or slow down economic legislation proposed by Democratic administration.

But Smith's Southern constituency never has received, or expected, the support of Halleck's forces when civil rights legislation was involved.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The already heavily cut foreign aid authorization bill has been sliced again. This time it's a \$2-million risk. By a 51-41 count the Senate voted Wednesday to cut supporting assistance for defense pact allies from \$400 million to \$398 million. This brought cuts on the Senate floor to \$480 million. Another \$327,250,000 was chopped off by the Foreign Relations Committee before the measure reached the floor nearly three weeks ago. At \$1,722,250,000, the aid ceiling for the current fiscal year is now \$107,250,000 below President Kennedy's original request. The Senate's Democratic and Republican leaders have joined forces to try to shepherd the bill past opponents. They cling to hopes of final passage by Friday night. A long argument over various amendments kept the Senate in session until 8:45 p.m. Wednesday. At 7 p.m., only about half a dozen senators were in the chamber and demands for a quorum later only raised the number to about two dozen. TWIST VERBOTEN HONOLULU (AP)—Mormon Bishop John H. U.S. Oilmen Hope to Stay in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — United States oil companies are not packing up for good because the Argentine government is threatening to annul their contracts. They hope to work out new contracts with President Arturo Illia's regime. Some would like to expand. The Texas Petroleum Co. is ready to do business in Argentina, a newly arrived representative said. Other oil companies also are reported contemplating coming in.

The government has announced its intention to cancel contracts with 10 foreign oil companies, most of them American. The annulment had been expected Wednesday. But the action was delayed, a government spokesman said, to give the state-run oil agency time to outline its plans for keeping the oil flowing. U.S. pressure on Illia to reconsider the consequences could have a factor. One possible consequence could be a reduction in U.S. aid. But the government spokesman insisted that the decision to annul the contracts has been made. John B. Diefenbach of New York, representing Texas Petroleum, said: "We have planned for a long time to come to Argentina and see if we can do business. This is not a sudden move." The company pulled out of Argentina in the early 1960s. Diefenbach said a refinery, built by Texas Petroleum in the hands of the Argentine Oil Agency, is now being operated by Esso. He said the company is now in Argentina, owned by Standard Oil of New Jersey. "We came to Argentina 53 years ago. We hope to stay another 53 at least." Wynne said that if there are any problems in his company's contracts that can be straightened out easily. "Our contracts are just," he said. "They have been negotiated in legal terms and do justice to the country." Esso is the only U.S. company engaged in the marketing business in Argentina. The other contracts are for exploration and pumping oil. Other major U.S. firms here are Pan American, Standard Oil of Indiana, Tennessee Gas Transmission of Houston, Tex., and Cities Service. The contracts were negotiated with former President Arturo Frondizi. The Illia government says they are illegal and contrary to Argentina's economic interests.

Ailing Nehru Hints He May Resign Post

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — As he marks his 74th birthday today in waning health, Jawahar Nehru shows signs of increasing frustration with India's difficulties. He has been thinking out loud of resigning the prime minister's job and trying to influence India indirectly the way Mahatma K. Gandhi tried to do— and failed. Some believe Nehru's remarks are intended primarily to shock the lagging followers into reform. But the possibility remains that he might quit.

Recent comments have indicated frustration with the pace of economic development and corruption in his Congress party over the disappointing pace of economic development and the hostile deadlocks with neighboring China and Pakistan. These problems are causing some Indians, including those not traditionally critical of Nehru, to say he is sinking into failure despite all he has done as a leader of India's independence movement in 18 years of government. Nehru's poor health and his talk of leaving the government have encouraged rumors that he is seeking to make his only child, Indira Gandhi, the prime minister and to direct the government through her. As Nehru's health wanes, the possibility also grows of a shadow government of high normal party machinations. Nehru looks to be in failing health despite official assertions to the contrary. His close colleague in the Congress party talk of his having not much time left. Mrs. Nehru continues to push herself. He has been doing so almost continuously for 30 years. Nehru generally is given credit here for building a free united India out of an area that has 14 major languages and now is inhabited by 600 million people. But newspapers and conversations here indicate a pessimistic attitude on the things that have divided Nehru: Peace with India's neighbors, a check on population increase, and a kind of system of political choices instead of a massive Congress party turn by in-fighting while other parties stand idly by.

Threat to Cambodia Newest Worry to U.S.

By JAMES MARLOW

Washington (AP)—President Lyndon B. Johnson's new worry about Cambodia's ties with Vietnam because of the crack-down on the Buddhists by Zhou Enlai.

And he has complained that Cambodia's ties with Vietnam are a disaster for the United States.

In his first State of the Union message to Congress almost three years ago, Kennedy, after listing the problems abroad at home, said "all these pale in comparison to the world's most serious problem: the spread of Communism."

"Each day the crisis multiplies," Kennedy said, "and the United States must stand ready to meet the challenge."

He cited trouble spots in Asia, Africa, Latin America. As the years passed, the troubles multiplied and waned while fresh ones developed.

Last Friday, talking to the Protestant Council in New York, he said the fruits of Communism should be at peace with one another.

But he said: "They are not. Within the last month the world has witnessed active or threatened hostilities in a dozen or more disputes independent of the struggle between Communism and free choice—disputes between Africans and Pakistanis in Angola, between North African neighbors in the Maghreb, between two Arab states over Yemen, between India and Pakistan, between Indonesians and Malaysia, Cambodia and Vietnam, Ethiopia and Somalia, and a long list of others."

He might have mentioned that just one week previously a coup in South Viet Nam threw out President Diem and his brother, both of whom were killed.

But last Friday he couldn't have known what was to happen Wednesday in the day of the Iraqi government was to smash a revolution and later in the day the news of grave consequences that Cambodia may turn its back on the United States.

Worse, it may throw in its lot with Red China. Cambodia, in the southeastern tip of Asia, lies partly against Thailand, partly against South Viet Nam.

It has 6 million people living under the guidance of Prince Norodom Sihanouk, who renounced the Cambodian throne to be the political leader of the Cambodians.
