Crown of Andes Sold at \$154,000

LONDON (AP)—The jewel-studded Crown of the Andes, which crowned the Virgin of Popayan Cathedral in Colombia for three centuries, was sold today by an American syndicate to the Amsterdam diamond firm of Asscher for \$154,000.

The sale at Sotheby's Auction House took 50 seconds. There was a great deal of disappointment from the 300 spectators who had hoped for prolonged, spirited bidding.

The crown, weighing 54 1/2 pounds and studded with 453 emeralds weighing 1,251 carats, had once been coveted by Czar Nicholas II of Russia. He never got it because war broke out in 1914.

The crown first was placed on the statue of the Virgin because the settlement had been spared from a plague.

In 1908 an American syndicate organized by the late Warren Piper of Chicago bought the crown from Popayan.

The proceeds of the sale built an orphanage in the Colombian city.

The syndicate now is headed by a New York lawyer, Oscar H. Sussman.

World War II kept the crown off the jewel market, but it was exhibited last summer in Toronto in 1958. Denver in 1960 and Birmingham in 1961.

It has spent the last few months in Sotheby's dark Bond Street vaults.

14,700 Acres Stripped

KNOXVILLE—About 14,700 acres have been strip-mined for coal in the Tennessee Valley, the roughly one two-thousandth of the total area. Current strip-mining in the valley is at the rate of about 1,000 acres a year.

Quemoy Rebuilds Surface, Fortifies Under Ground

QUEMOY (AP)—There's a coast from underground. They've just opened a 2,000-seat theater—underground.

A granite hillside conceals an apartment for the Generalissimo and Mrs. Chiang Kai-shek. It has a staircase that leads deep into the heart of the island's command post.

The only above-ground activity is the release of huge tar shells and other incense-like contraband to deft Nationalist propaganda back to the mainland.

Import Rice

The peasants on Quemoy have always been grudgingly poor. After the bombardment they had even less.

"Every necessity of life had to be imported for both the island and the troops," said Ma Gen. Liang Hung, a retired officer who heads the civil administration on the island.

There was no roll call on the question that has been dangling since 1922 when the Central Conference of American Rabbits said: "Women cannot be justly denied the privilege of ordination."

Something more than a score of federal delegates stood when "no" votes were asked. Convention officials said more than 900 delegates are attending the convention but nowhere near that number was present when the resolution was presented by Jane Evans, the federation's executive director, for a standing vote.

None of the three branches of Judaism specifically prohibits ordination of women but tradition never has allowed it. Two women have served as rabbis, without ordination: Mrs. William Ackerman of Meridian, Miss. and Lady Lily H. Montalvo of London. Several women have completed the required courses for rabbinate at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion but have not been ordained.

Convention officials said more than 900 delegates are attending the convention but nowhere near that number was present when the resolution was presented by Jane Evans, the federation's executive director, for a standing vote.

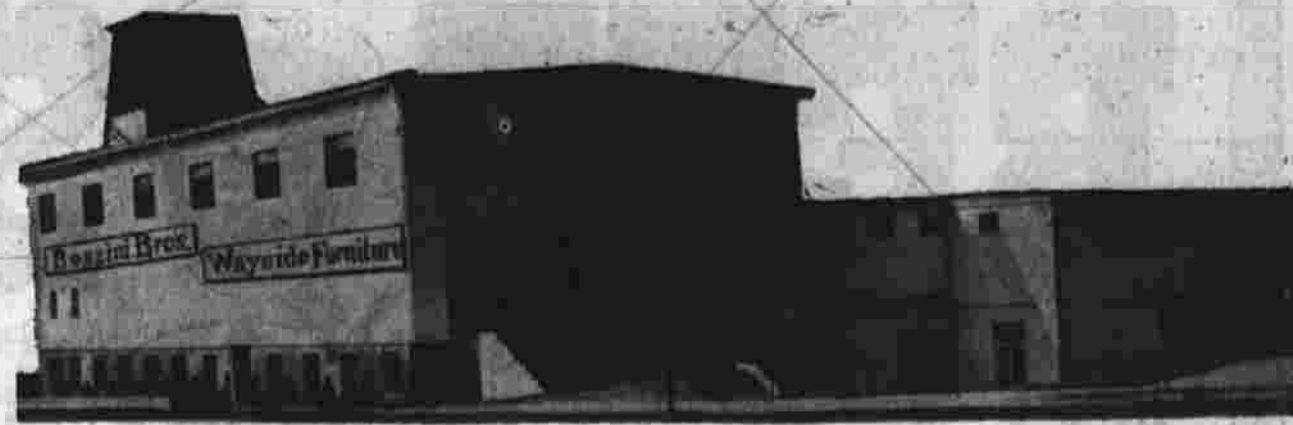

Board May Revoke Smoking in School

Student smoking at Manchester High School may soon be banned by the board of education. At the board's meeting last night several members voiced the opinion that a current board regulation permitting smoking on a restricted basis should be questioned. A "constant educational program to discourage pupils from smoking" was carried on in the schools.

At the close of last night's discussion, the matter was placed on the board's agenda for its next meeting, slated for Dec. 4 at the suggestion of Bezzini Schaeffer. And at Schaeffer's request, the board agreed to ask for the help of the board of health in providing smoking education in the schools, by requesting Dr. Nicholas Marzabro, director of health, to come before the board at his convenience. The board's action stems from a recent letter from the advisory board of health, re-

the high school handbook issued to all pupils is as follows: "Any student allowed smoking privileges must be 16 years of age and in a 10th, 11th, or 12th grade room; must have on file in the office a form containing parental approval and in his possession an MHS smoking permit; and may smoke only in a designated smoking area during the last five minutes of his lunch period.

"Smoking at any other time or place on the school grounds is prohibited and is subject to disciplinary action and loss of the smoking privilege."

Dr. Walter Schardt and Atty. William Collins both voiced the opinion that smoking permission should be outlawed altogether. "I should like to see we know now that smoking is a health problem and a habit-forming, we should not condone it in the schools," Collins said. "Current hospital costs were \$1,094.66 for five cases, compared to \$382.68 for two cases last October."

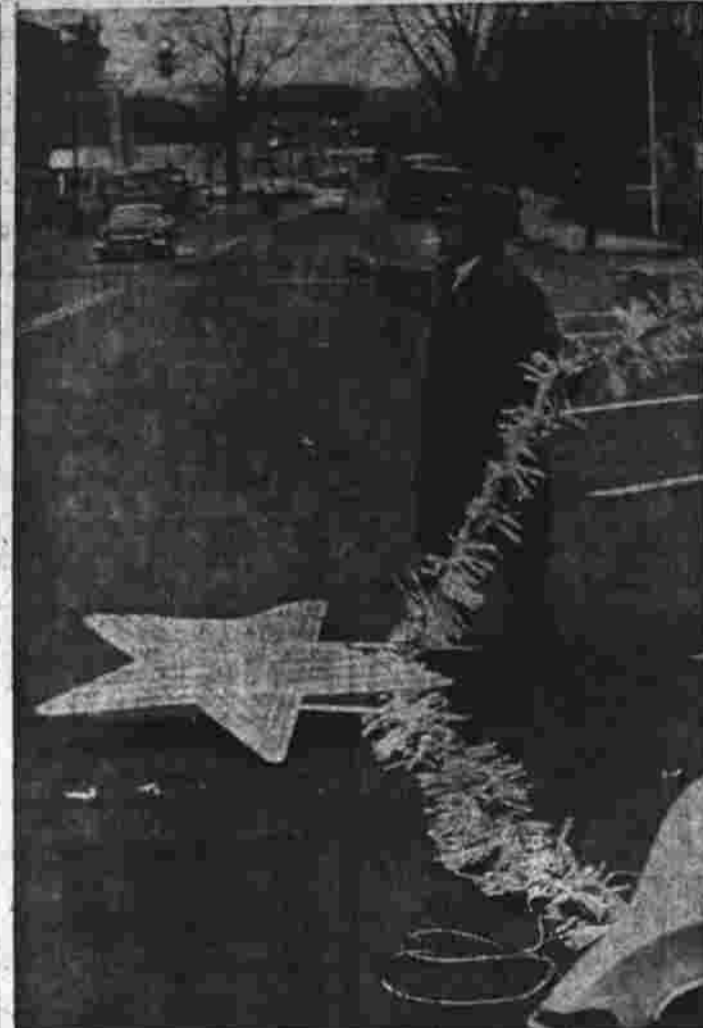

Cultural Trade Continues Brisk

WASHINGTON (AP)—American-Soviet cultural exchanges continue at a brisk pace despite the Barghoom affair. State Department officials estimate that about 300 Russians are now in the United States and some 120 Americans are in Russia under the exchange program that is designed to promote mutual understanding between the two countries.

Even while Yale professor Frederick C. Barghoom was in military confinement in Moscow's Lubianska Prison, a U.S. Navy ship paid an unusual good-will call at the Siberian port of Nalidoda.

Her recipe for Salmon Cream and Pot De Creme may be made with a blender. The mayonnaise can, however, be made in either a blender or mixer.

1. 1/2 cup boiling water
 - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 - 1/2 small onion
 - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup heavy cream
- Put potato in electric blender and add lemon juice, onion slice and boiling water. Cover and blend on high speed for 40 seconds. Turn off blender and add mayonnaise, onion, paprika and salt. Cover and turn on high speed until vortex forms. Then gradually add heavy cream. (If vortex does not form at once, stop blender and push contents toward center with rubber spatula.) Blend no longer than 30 seconds. Pour into a quart mold and chill. Serve with mayonnaise.

1. 1/2 cup milk or cream
 - Heat milk or cream to boiling point. Put other ingredients in electric blender and add hot milk. Immediately turn blender to low speed and blend for one minute. Pour into serving cups. Chill until firm.

OTTAWA (AP)—Prime Minister Fidel Castro's Cuban government is going to ask the death penalty for two Canadian pilots, Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson told the House of Commons Wednesday.

Pearson said the pilots are to go on trial in public Saturday on charges of smuggling arms and explosives into the security of the state. He said his government is following the case with concern.

The men, Ronald Patrick Lipsett, 32, Kitchener, and William David Milne, 31, Montreal, were arrested Oct. 24.

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—President Chiang Kai-shek's Kominlang party promised today to hold general elections and reorganize the central government when the mainland is recovered.

The promise was contained in the platform adopted at the party's ninth national congress. The party pledged itself to "carry out the policy of anti-communism and restoring Russia" and to unite China at home and abroad "to hasten the destruction of the Peking regime."

It also pledged to uphold the United Nations charter. Nationalist China's last election was held in 1947, before the Communists conquered the mainland. The remnants of the national assembly elected then still act as the national legislature. They elect Chiang president every six years.

SAIKON, South Viet Nam (AP)—South Viet Nam's new revolutionary government will establish a commission to investigate crimes committed during former President Ngo Dinh Diem's tenure of office.

The commission will be instructed, an announcement said, "to investigate all crimes committed by private persons or agencies of public services who took advantage of their official position to oppress and detain people unlawfully, torture and rape, or murder nationalist elements opposed to the Diem dictatorship."

The period to be investigated will run from Oct. 26, 1956, when Diem was given supreme power by a referendum, to last Nov. 1, when he was overthrown by a military coup.

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexico today began celebrating the 200th anniversary of the birth of Father Junipero Serra, the Franciscan friar who for 54 years spread the gospel and civilization from the South Mexican state of Tabasco to California.

The nationwide homage will include a solemn mass at the Shrine of Guadalupe Sunday, when a petition for his canonization will be sent to the Vatican.

The friar, born on the Spanish island of Mallorca, arrived in Veracruz in 1769.

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the news from Washington: SMOG ON THE HILL: Sen. Hubert Humphrey put a stethoscope to congress and diagnosed that it is a victim of "a civil rights smog."

Humphrey, assistant Senate Democratic leader, said that since the battle over civil rights legislation is over, the problems of managing the Congress will be over.

"Until that day," he warned Wednesday, "leaders can implore and deplore, but there will not be much improvement."

With time running out, there's little likelihood the measure will be acted on this year.

DIARMAMENT: The House approved Wednesday by a 285-133 vote a bill to authorize \$10 million a year for the U. S. Disarmament Agency.

This is the same amount the Senate approved but only two-thirds of what the agency had requested.

The Disarmament Agency chief William Foster had testified that such a slash in the agency's funds would mean a 40 per cent cut in its research contracts. He contended that long and careful research preceded both the limited nuclear test-ban treaty and the Washington-Moscow "hot line" communications agreement.

The bill goes back to the Senate where adoption is likely.

ALABAMA CHARGES: The Justice Department has charged Alabama officials with back up charges that department lawyers contacted state officials, consorted with sex perverts, contributed to the delinquency of minors and fomented insurrection.

The allegations were communicated to the department in a telegram from Robert D. Wilkins, former of the Dallas County, Ala. grand jury investigating the Justice Department's activities in connection with racial strife in Alabama.

The grand jury plans to visit Washington Monday with the intention of questioning Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy.

Atty. Gen. Burke Marshall ruled the department's civil rights division, said in a telegram to Wilkins and Chief of Police Blanchard Jitka that he is willing to meet with the grand jury "to learn what ever facts you or any member of the jury has concerning these charges."

But he said, "It is hard to believe these charges are seriously intended since no names, dates or other identifying data are given."

HOME RULE: Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy told a House District of Columbia subcommittee he can see no reason for opposition to self-government for the nation's capital.

He gave a legal opinion and his own support Wednesday to an administration bill to give Washington an elected mayor and council and a non-voting delegate in Congress.

The capital now is run by three appointed commissioners with Congress passing the funds and appropriating the funds for it.
