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DeGaulle Coming to U.S. For Talk Early in 1964

WASHINGTON (AP)—A thaw in the chilly U.S.-French relations appears possible following the announcement that President Johnson and Charles de Gaulle will meet here early next year.

The surprise announcement came from President Johnson after he had spent 15 minutes in private conference with the French president at a reception late Monday for foreign dignitaries who attended President John F. Kennedy's funeral.

Johnson, obviously plunging into the room, asked to be seen by him rapidly, came out from the conference room and said, "We have decided he would come back and talk more early next year. To give it further emphasis he told newsmen: 'Sure, you can quote me.'"

De Gaulle originally had planned to meet with Kennedy, probably in the center of the gravestone of the Kennedy family, but the arrangement had been complicated by the death of the late president.

The tall French president was seen at the reception at the Kennedy funeral, but he has been since he arrived Sunday for the funeral. He was in relaxed, cheerful form.

The announcement of the meeting came amid general speculation that the general's long-talked-of visit to the United States will come off early next year.

De Gaulle never hesitates to make it clear that in any showdown France will come out as a free and independent nation, not as a satellite of America's aid.

make no more political speeches this year.

Since the assassination of Kennedy "there is an absence of anything political to talk about," Goldwater said.

Goldwater said in a statement that during the 30-day mourning period "I shall not participate personally in any public activity in connection with the Republican presidential nomination, nor in any other public activities with the exception of those falling within my official duties as governor of New York State."

Goldwater said that so far as he is concerned, the tragic sequence of events which culminated in the assassination of the Kennedy administration is an issue.

"We want to see what President Johnson will do," he said. "We do not know what course he will take, whether he will change some of them.

"We want to give him all of the room he needs to operate and all of the help he needs. We do not want to be the opposing party to him while he is getting organized in his new job. Let's give him a couple of months to see what he can do."

Chairman William E. Miller postponed Dec. 31-14 meeting of the National Republican Committee and said "total suspension of partisan political activity is called for" during the party mourning.

"I pledge that our party will stand with the new administration in this tragically unexpected process of transition," Miller said.

Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., wrote Sen. Everett Ruess, D-Mass., Monday suggesting that the conference of all GOP senators pledge political silence for the remainder of the year.

Baltimore, Md., is expected to react favorably. Scott is a former Republican national chairman.

His action had the approval of Goldwater and of Sen. Thurston Morton, chairman of the party's senatorial campaign committee.

Scott said he thought the Republicans could be of service to Johnson "by sparing the President the need to divert his attention from matters of national security to a calendar of political addresses around the country during the remainder of this calendar year."

Sen. Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana and Sen. George A. Smathers of Florida, head of the Democratic senatorial campaign committee, applauded the idea.

Goldwater thought it too early to affect the 1969 political picture.

As one credited with strong support in the South, he said that much may depend on what Johnson does about civil rights and other issues.

Asked if the substitution of Johnson for Kennedy as a political opponent might make him more inclined to seek reelection to the Senate, Goldwater replied with a laugh. "I've always told you I was only running for the Senate."

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Salvation Army To Change Ways

LONDON (AP) — The Salvation Army is swapping some of its lambent for electric guitars and is going to "get with it."

Gen. Frederick Coutts, 64, who took over the international Salvation Army movement Monday, gave a news conference a picture reminiscent of Damon Runyon's "Guys and Dolls."

"The whole church of Christ must speak to our own day, our own times," he said. "While the church of the Gospel is changing, I am fully with you that it should be spoken about in the idiom of our own day."

"If I am to replace the 'first' and second and speak to the beatitudes and wearies, then I will do so. You can certainly tell I am going to get with it."

"We have to go with the young folk are. The coffee bar or their other haunts are the places where in an informal way the Gospel will be taken. The War Cry (the army's publication) will be sold in the coffee bars as well as in pubs."

Gen. Coutts, who has spent the past six years in Australia, said the army's streetcorner trumps and drums are not on the way out entirely, but jazz can also attract the faithful. Small groups now are experimenting with electric guitars, he reported, and he sees no reason why more of them shouldn't be used.

But one thing will change. The general said the army is keeping its traditional high-collared blue serge uniform and the women workers will still wear their poke bonnets.

"You would not expect our Anglican friends to change the supplies," he commented.

Riderless Horse An Army Mount

WASHINGTON (AP) — Black Jack, the skittish riderless horse in President Kennedy's funeral procession, is an Army horse.

There had been reports that the animal, led behind the casket carrying Kennedy's body, was the horse tender given to Mrs. Kennedy by the president of Pakistan during her trip there in 1962.

A check with Mrs. Kennedy's press secretary, Pamela Turner, after the horse appeared in the procession to the Capitol on Sunday, brought word that the horse was Sardin.

"After the funeral dark horse participated in the funeral services, Miss Turner was asked again if it were Sardin and she said "it was wrong."

And, while press secretary Pierre Salinger, also told reporters that it was not Mrs. Kennedy's horse.

"The horse is Black Jack, which is an Army horse," he said.

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Roncari Starts Road Repaving

Men and equipment of Roncari Industries Inc. of Grapelyville will begin repaving streets in the Backland section of Manchester tomorrow. It is the first of the \$100,000 road program that the town's directors initiated in September.

Town Engineer Walter Paine said today that if the weather warms, road gangs will complete work on Craft Dr., Drexel St., and Windsor St. from Burrham St. to the town line, by the end of the week.

If the weather continues to hold, the contractor will be able to repave French Rd. from Tower to Brent, Brent Rd. from French to Scholten, Woodhall St. from Brent to Bates, and all of Bates St. by Dec. 6.

Beyond that, the probability of adverse weather has discouraged the town from scheduling any more of the planned work. About 85 per cent of the work will be held over until the spring.

Town directors voted \$100,000 from the General Fund.

Wants Kennedy Coins

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A San Francisco advertising man proposed today that five million 50-cent pieces be struck off in memory of the late President Kennedy.

The pieces should be sold for \$1 to raise money for scholarships, assistance to the family of the Dallas policeman killed in capturing Kennedy's accused assassin and to aid the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, advertising man Al Tuth proposed in a letter to the Examiner.

He said the coins would be minted from freezing to the clothes.

Thermoelectric Cooling Works

CHICAGO — Thermoelectric refrigeration — in which the motor, compressor, condenser, evaporator and refrigerant are replaced by two dissimilar metals and an electrical source — has proven successful in small units.

But, the Refrigeration Research Foundation reports, it has two limitations: Metals now available can develop only about a 50-degree differential from surrounding temperatures, and the cost of cooling is three to four times that of standard refrigeration systems.

11-Story Mural On New Library

NOTRE DAME, Ind. — The \$5,000,000, 13-story Notre-Dame University of Notre Dame Memorial Library is the largest college library building in the world. It has a capacity of 2,000,000 volumes, seats about 3,000 at one time in its reading rooms, and provides offices for 300 faculty members.

An 11-story granite mural, the building's most prominent feature, has "Christ the Teacher" as its central figure.

many live in many mansions under equal discipline and with equal instinct never to deny each other equal rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of the highest possible self-actualization.

Quotation Made Mutual
 One of the many remarkable things about this nation in crisis—and many of the things we have in mind are not only remarkable but creditable—has been the way so many Americans, some of them distinguished by their possession of public office or notoriety from which they offer lofty thoughts, and some of them distinguished by the fact that their good hearts and consciences are the equal of prominence and erudition—the remarkable thing we have in mind is that of how many Americans in the past few days, have been thinking the same thoughts and trying in their different ways to say the same things.

We think that, in all the fervent clamor of people trying to say something significant and yet understood, our favorite memory could be that of James Reston, columnist of the New York Times, quoting Walter Lippmann, columnist of the New York Herald Tribune, in order to drive home a point with which Reston himself was wrestling nobly.

Naturally enough, wanting to get into such a distinguished set, we couldn't wait to quote Reston quoting Lippmann in order to help emphasize what we have been trying to say in these columns.

Reston himself opened by saying that "running through the private and public comments here today (Washington) was a single theme."

This single theme Reston phrased as follows:

"That this decent country has been made to look uncivilized; that there is a kind of rebellion on the part against law and good faith; and that private anger and sorrow are not enough to redeem the events of the last few days."

Reston warmed up toward his quotation of Lippmann by giving a thought from a sermon preached in Washington Sunday morning by Dean Francis Sayre of the Washington Cathedral, who said:

"All of us have had a part in the slaying of our President. It was the good people who crucified our Lord, and not merely those who acted as executioners."

"By our silence; by our inaction; by our willingness that heavy burdens be borne by one man alone; by our readiness to allow evil to be called good and good evil; by our continued tolerance of ancient injustices . . . we have all had a part in the assassination."

Then, writing with his own sense of moral urgency heightened by the new development in Dallas, the number of the alleged assassin, Reston came to Lippmann, in the following:

"The point at issue here was defined very clearly by Walter Lippmann. The decay of decency in the modern age . . . he wrote, 'the treatment of human beings as things, as the mere instruments of power and ambition, is without doubt the consequence of the decay of the belief in man as something more than an animal animated by highly conditioned reflexes and chemical reactions.'

"For, unless man is something more than that, he has no rights that anyone is bound to respect, and there are no limitations upon his conduct which he is bound to obey. This is the forgotten foundation of democracy in the only sense in which democracy is truly valid and of liberty in the only sense in which it can hope to endure."

Or, as we here in this column said immediately after the burst of tragedy, of the victim himself:

"He was a civilized man, who fought against barbarism at home and abroad."

"It was in his character as well as in his action. His hope for and belief in the possibility of a world in which men treated each other as civilized human beings was the dominant theme of his living."

"The degree to which our living still falls short of this idealized state became the mark of his dying."

Reston in the New York Times, Lippmann in the New York Herald Tribune, or The Manchester Evening Herald, we think that all of us have had a part in the slaying of our President. But everything we would be proud to ever said or wrote was already in the hearts of our readers.

We think that, in all the fervent clamor of people trying to say something significant and yet understood, our favorite memory could be that of James Reston, columnist of the New York Times, quoting Walter Lippmann, columnist of the New York Herald Tribune, in order to drive home a point with which Reston himself was wrestling nobly.

Naturally enough, wanting to get into such a distinguished set, we couldn't wait to quote Reston quoting Lippmann in order to help emphasize what we have been trying to say in these columns.

Reston himself opened by saying that "running through the private and public comments here today (Washington) was a single theme."

This single theme Reston phrased as follows:

"That this decent country has been made to look uncivilized; that there is a kind of rebellion on the part against law and good faith; and that private anger and sorrow are not enough to redeem the events of the last few days."

Reston warmed up toward his quotation of Lippmann by giving a thought from a sermon preached in Washington Sunday morning by Dean Francis Sayre of the Washington Cathedral, who said:

"All of us have had a part in the slaying of our President. It was the good people who crucified our Lord, and not merely those who acted as executioners."

"By our silence; by our inaction; by our willingness that heavy burdens be borne by one man alone; by our readiness to allow evil to be called good and good evil; by our continued tolerance of ancient injustices . . . we have all had a part in the assassination."

Then, writing with his own sense of moral urgency heightened by the new development in Dallas, the number of the alleged assassin, Reston came to Lippmann, in the following:

"The point at issue here was defined very clearly by Walter Lippmann. The decay of decency in the modern age . . . he wrote, 'the treatment of human beings as things, as the mere instruments of power and ambition, is without doubt the consequence of the decay of the belief in man as something more than an animal animated by highly conditioned reflexes and chemical reactions.'

"For, unless man is something more than that, he has no rights that anyone is bound to respect, and there are no limitations upon his conduct which he is bound to obey. This is the forgotten foundation of democracy in the only sense in which democracy is truly valid and of liberty in the only sense in which it can hope to endure."

Or, as we here in this column said immediately after the burst of tragedy, of the victim himself:

"He was a civilized man, who fought against barbarism at home and abroad."

"It was in his character as well as in his action. His hope for and belief in the possibility of a world in which men treated each other as civilized human beings was the dominant theme of his living."

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Ship Sails On

Even the smallest itself is steadily becoming, in addition to its mournfulness, a conduct of diplomacy and foreign policy. And it was really no accident that immediately afterward, the new President of the United States should be seen in a performance in which his varying moods—from woe, doubtless—emerge for his previous acquaintances on the world scene to formal, stiff reception to others, normally anticipated."

Here was life going on, seeking to use the very observation of one President's death to heal whatever uncertainties and anxieties it may have caused around the world.

Already, for that matter, in the official exchange of condolences, there has been an obvious prelude of foreign policy. The message from President Johnson to Premier Khrushchev was just as pointed as Khrushchev's own solicitude for expressing his condolences; both men were trying to steady their respective nations and reassure each other against emotional accidents.

In Washington itself, the presence of so many important men created an opportunity it would have seemed folly to let pass. So the new President personally greeted them all, and has been conferring briefly, but intensely, with many of them.

The nation's governors were on hand, too, for the end of one era, and so it was possible to invite them to be in on the spirit and the initial outlook of the new.

There were orders to be given—one a highly desirable sequel to the national tragedy, directing a summary of the evidence in the Dallas assassination and the Dallas murder, to be prepared by an FBI board of competence. There was a message to the members of the armed services. There was what seemed almost a summit meeting of economic advisers. Even in the midst of the mourning, between the death and the funeral, Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge had arrived from his post in South Vietnam, reported, dismissed, and hurried back to his place there. And obviously there were many necessary functioning of the new Presidency which were performed without being publicly filmed or reported.

The functioning had never really stopped. Now, increasingly, it comes into public view. Soon—probably soon perhaps—we will stop being just surprised and grateful that a new administration is functioning at all, and stop being pleased that a new President is starting off so well—and we will begin questioning why things are not being done better.

The terrible wounds will scar over, and, before we know it, we will begin being careless with one another again.

But, if we can't reform human nature by any one bath of sorrow and repentance, let us at least hope that we can make the instrument of our good intentions and our regard for order a better instrument. Let us continue to build up the rule of law, in local communities, in states, in the nation and in the world until, beyond its vital importance, it becomes a source of joy and healing the conditions which breed sorrow, tragedy, and makes of all humanity a house in which
