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VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican Ecumenical Council will hold its third session next fall to continue its work of modernizing the Roman Catholic Church and seeking Christian unity, officials announced today.

Council officials announced the approximate dates for the next session—Sept. 14 to Nov. 20 next year—and disclosed the names of 43 bishops elected to seats on the 12 commissions.

The U.S. episcopate, second in the world with about 180 bishops, was given the largest number of seats on the new commissions—six.

The six are Bishops Gerald McDevitt, auxiliary of Philadelphia, religious commission; John Comber, superior general of the Maryknoll, N.Y., missionaries, missions; Loras Thomas-Lewis, Rockford, Ill., seminaries and schools; Alton James Babcock, Grand Rapids, Mich., laity, press and entertainment; Charles Helming, Kansas City—St. Joseph, Mo., and Ernest Primeau, Manchester, N.H., Christian unity secretary.

At no time in our history has the entertainment world been of less importance than in the four days—perhaps even the week that began a week ago today. Even the Mecca of entertainers—Broadway—was darkened and it mattered not whether the stage was the Winter Garden in New York or the Whitton Auditorium in Manchester—they were all alike.

Yet it remained for one part of the entertainment sphere—television—to contribute a great portion of the country's information on the unbelievably tragic circumstances that started in Dallas and ended on a lovely green slope beneath the stars of Hollywood.

The "magic box" which referred to as an "after school" by many folks (including long-suffering wives on full Sunday afternoon) finally came out of its long and arduous journey from the back of public service and news programs and its complete addition to making a book, television became a true window on the world.

All the bizarre facts of the nation's lowest hour were revealed there, including perhaps the most unfathomable of all, on-the-spot coverage of a murder. Nothing, nobody, no other media could match that for on-the-spot reporting.

There were other scenes, of course, from the sad return of the president's son and old, to the funeral, the funeral procession through the capital streets and finally the resting place at Arlington.

The writer, an amateur critic for a while, watched all three major networks in operation and found each one outstanding. In fact, each did so well in reporting and in a remarkable amount of "digging" that brought out the facts, pictures and special reports.

While those 30 hours (Friday to Monday) were the nation's saddest hours, they undoubtedly stand as television's greatest.

The Charter Revision Commission (CRC) has rescheduled its next meeting to Monday, Dec. 9, at 8 p.m. in the Probate Court Hearing Room of the Municipal Building, to provide the recommendations of its staff to the board of directors for consideration.

A proposed timetable calls for the board to meet Monday, Dec. 9, at 8 p.m. to decide which of the proposed changes merit action, and to set the date for a public hearing, after which the questions will be acted upon at an anticipated April referendum.

The CRC will probably hold several more meetings in the interim, to make necessary transfers of all executive powers from the general manager to the board of directors, for a review by the board of directors every five years, of the general manager's performance; and for a director of public works and a planning director, both to be appointed by the general manager.

Pension Plan Amendments Go to Directors Tuesday

Future town pensioners will receive monthly payments one quarter larger than they are presently eligible for, with no increase in their contribution to the pension plan, if the town's directors approve a series of amendments to the pension ordinance next week...

The proposed provision of a \$30 minimum pension payment would apply to the present as well as future pensioners. There are about eight pensioners who now get less than \$30 per month who would get the new minimum.

The amount of the monthly pension payments in either case will depend upon actuarial projections determined for the pension board. This amendment would cost the pension plan no additional money, but instead would effect a redistribution of pension payments to retired employees.

The rapid growth of the town's assets will permit the town to assume the increased cost of the benefits, Atty. Higgins believe. The change will have the largest impact on present town employees receiving the pension payments by the directors.

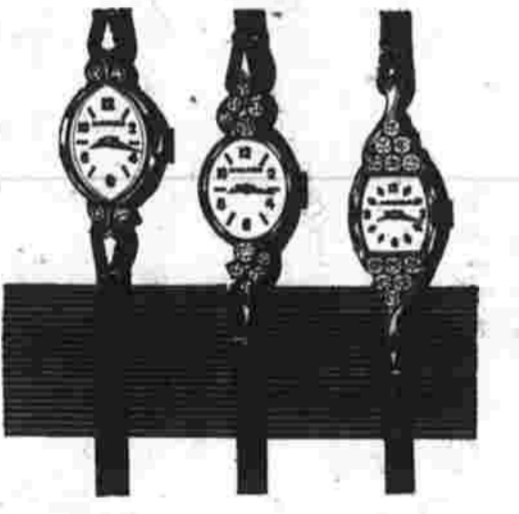

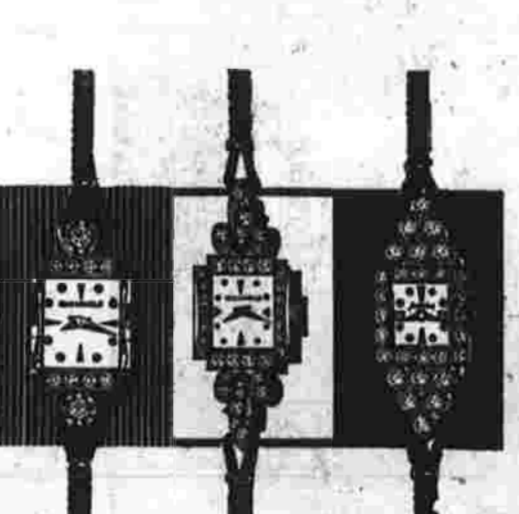

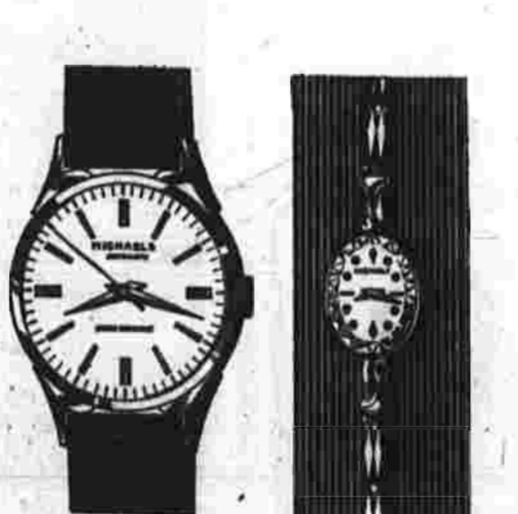

Johnson is keeping in touch daily with the congressional leaders, Hatcher added.

The President also received an intelligence briefing on presidential aide McGeorge Bundy. Johnson is relying on Bundy, top White House adviser on national security affairs, instead of a military aide, to keep him posted.

With the military, Johnson discussed operating procedures and told them no change is contemplated in the machinery for coordinating the operations with the White House.

Johnson scheduled a conference with Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara on pending legislation with Lawrence D. Sanders, Johnson's assistant for liaison with Congress, and Hester F. Peckham, deputy White House counsel who specializes on domestic programs.

Johnson announced to the press that he is not going to resign.

Johnson's health is good, a great deal more so, he declared. "Yesterday, I am recovered, but tomorrow is our day that we shall win the election before."

Johnson plunged into the work with a heavy schedule today which included a meeting with chief military, diplomatic and intelligence advisers.

Speaking of his illness, Johnson said in a radio and television address Thursday: "I am committed to you as the best American leader I have ever known."

He also said that the neighboring launch pads now being built for the moon exploration program — pads which Kennedy

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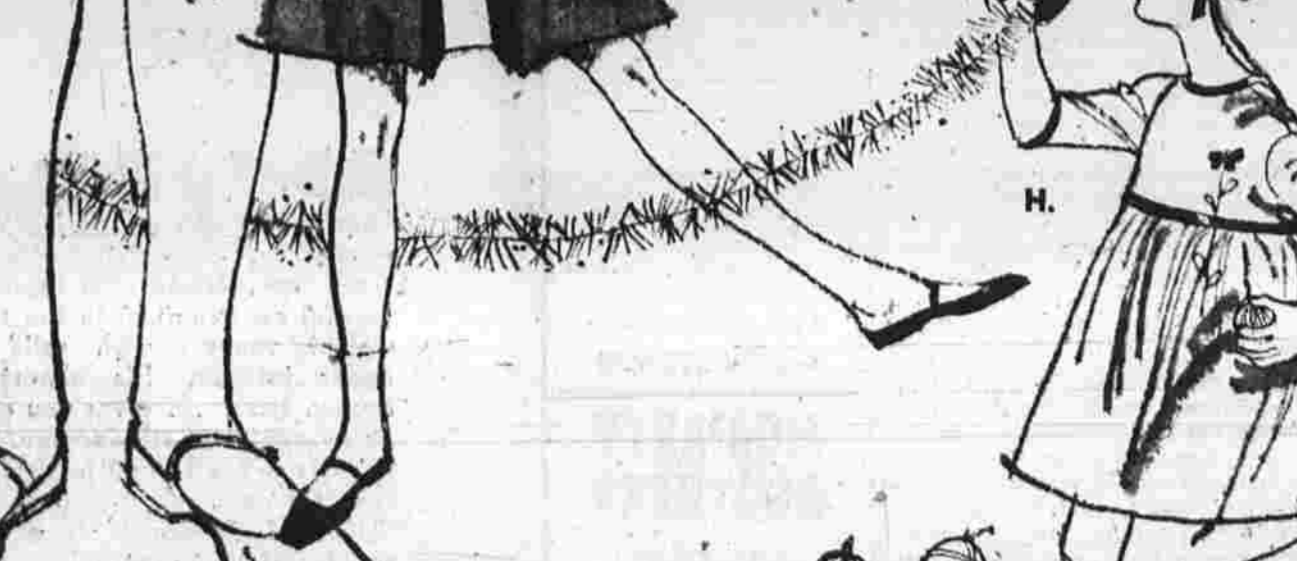
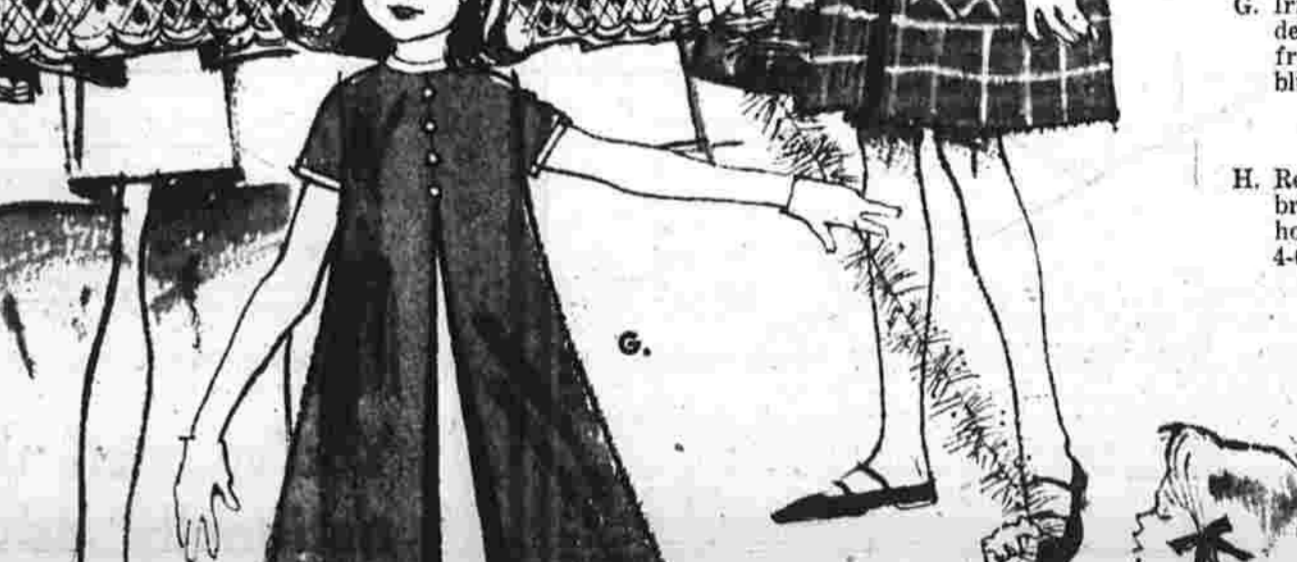

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and who, therefore, keep falling at everybody else because the nation's policies he himself initiated had not worked. The other night Mr. Acheson had selective criticism for everybody who has ever disagreed with the way he, Acheson, set up our European policy in 1945. Only Truman's name came out all right. Eisenhower was a villain at least part of the time, Kennedy had been woefully disappointing, and such theorists as George F. Kennan, of course, have been unimpeachably beyond the fringe because they have disagreed so totally with Mr. Acheson's formula for defeat in Europe.

In Mr. Acheson's mind, he set us out on the right trail when the decision was to choose a military alliance with one half of Germany over the reunification of an independent, neutral Germany, whether as a neutralist or as a member of a special regional power politico alliance called NATO instead of relying upon the United Nations and when, from the start of that alliance arrangement, we indicated our own belief that, one day, the countries in Europe, our half of Germany, would be the most to be treated and promoted as an ally.

The President's Debut

President Lyndon B. Johnson has now made a kind of double debut in the role which was thrust upon him by the assassination of President Kennedy. He has appeared formally before his former colleagues in the Congress and he has put himself before the American people in a television broadcast.

Two things appear clearly from these combined appearances. One is that President Johnson plans to try to carry out the program proposed by his predecessor with no equivocation and the other is that President Johnson is very much himself and no mere shadow of the Kennedy name and manner.

It should not have a surprise that the man who has done so well before the cameras should speak forthrightly on the civil rights question. He has done that before. What does seem significant, however, is the fact that he gave it high priority, and in words which permit no misinterpretation of his challenge for action squarely to Congress.

He said "We have talked long enough in this country about equal rights. We have talked for a hundred years or more. It is time now to write the next chapter and to write it in the book of laws."

He called also in his address to Congress for prompt action on a tax cut, and indicated clearly that his administration will follow closely the outlines of his predecessor's foreign policy, support for United Nations, and other measures associated with Kennedy.

If the content of the talk, and in fact some of its phrases, were reminiscent of Kennedy, the delivery of it was decidedly by Johnson, although a greatly softer and subtler Johnson than the man of the Senate he used to be.

The very brevity of the speech, slowly spoken though it was, helped to reaffirm the image of Johnson as a man of action, and the tone and language of it suggested repeatedly the call for action.

His appeal was emotional and homesy, not intellectual and philosophical as was the appeal of Kennedy's speeches. So was his talk to the nation yesterday in which he sought to reassure shaken American citizens and to call upon them to purge themselves of debilitating hatreds.

Not everyone's every political persuasion found the talks by the President equally gratifying, perhaps, but the new President impressed everyone with his sincerity, confidence, and competence. One could hardly ask more of a President who had assumed office even under ideal circumstances.

In Praise of His Own Folly

The human mind is a wonderfully pliable thing, and thus it is that former Secretary of State Dean Acheson can go to stores and deliver a Brien McMahon Lecture in which he speaks of the necessity and desirability of a "united Europe" . . . having within it a united Germany" and make such a speech without seeming in the least bit aware of the fact that the policies advocated and instituted by a man named Dean Acheson have had much to do with perpetuating and freezing both the division of Germany and that of Europe.

There is no more encouraging, disheartening, spectacular than that of the theorist and policy maker who never realizes that he has himself in the big policy calamity of his time.

Fire District Lines May Undergo Change

Manchester's board of directors may take the first step toward the eventual reduction in the area served by the Town-Fire Department at their meeting Tuesday.

On the agenda for the meeting, scheduled for 8 p.m. at the Municipal Building, is a hearing on a request that the district fire lines be changed on the proposed boundary change.

General Manager Richard Martin suggested, at an Oct. 1 directors meeting, that the town fire department move out of the existing sections in the north of town.

The proposal came in response to two changes in the Eighth District, which provides fire protection and ambulance service in the North End of town.

1. In September, the directors of the Eighth District voted that they had voted to increase from \$21 to \$25 the fee for each fire in the town fire district that the Eighth District firemen covered.

At present, the Eighth District firemen cover only the northern section of Manchester; the town fire district includes all of town south of Middle Tyke, and land to the east and west of the District north of the Tyke, as well.

An arrangement between the two fire districts, W. Clifford Mason of the town department and President Lawrence of the Eighth District, provides that the Eighth District firemen serve some town district homes, since the district is better located to provide the fire service.

In the past, the Eighth District directors had assessed a \$20 fee for each fire covered.

This arrangement was necessary because the official district boundaries could only be altered as far as the district sewer lines. The second factor which influenced Martin was:

2. The 1968 session of the General Assembly granted the district a bill which permits the extension of its borders to provide fire service, or sewer, without the vote.

Thus, it is now possible for the two fire departments to re-district themselves into a more logical pattern.

On the agenda for the Tuesday night meeting are public hearings on three items:

1. An additional appropriation of \$7,000 to the town engineer for personnel.

The engineering department is in need of three additional personnel. Martin is asking that the town department accept the necessary \$7,000 will be used to cover the salaries of three additional personnel, and a clerk.

In addition, Martin says, the engineer is handling some of the work that had been assigned to the office of the deputy director of public works, whose position has been abolished, and all of the work from the planning department.

2. An additional appropriation of \$1,500 for a new car for the engineering department.

Also to be financed from a transfer of funds from the public works department budget, the appropriation will be used to purchase a 1968 truck with a new station wagon.

3. Also for public hearing is a proposed amendment to the town employee's pension ordinance.

The directors will consider a report from Rep. Bill Taylor, Director of Public Works, that Bruno DeMarco, the systems analyst who is studying the town highway department, be discharged.

Taylor made the proposal in a letter distributed to the directors at their Nov. 8 meeting, but added that action be deferred until December.

Under the terms of his contract, DeMarco may be discharged by the town directors for any reason. Taylor believes that DeMarco's study is not proceeding as the directors had originally intended.

Although a study of the traffic problem at Manchester Memorial Hospital is pending, the directors will be asked to institute condemnation proceedings so that the town may acquire property at the northwest corner of Main and Haynes St. Haynes St. is at present the primary access route to the hospital, and has been considered for widening since the tragic Hartford Hospital fire of 1961.

The directors asked, at a special meeting, to consider the hospital problem, that condemnation of the corner property, the only purchase that would require such legal action by the town, be begun even before the traffic study is complete.

Martin said today that to begin the condemnation did not obligate the town to go through with it should the traffic study produce some other recommendation.

Martin will also ask the directors to:

(A) Approve the reappointment of Francis P. Handley to the Manchester Redevelopment Agency.

(B) Authorize an application for state aid grants based on the construction of the Keasey St. and Highland Park School addition.

(C) Accept Tim and Thirud St. as town streets.

(D) Renew a lease with the Carter Chevrolet Co. for a and

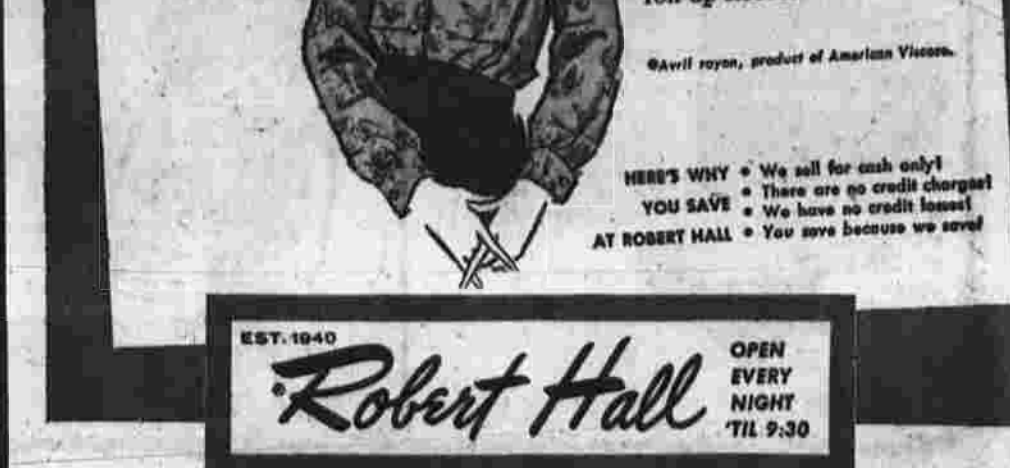

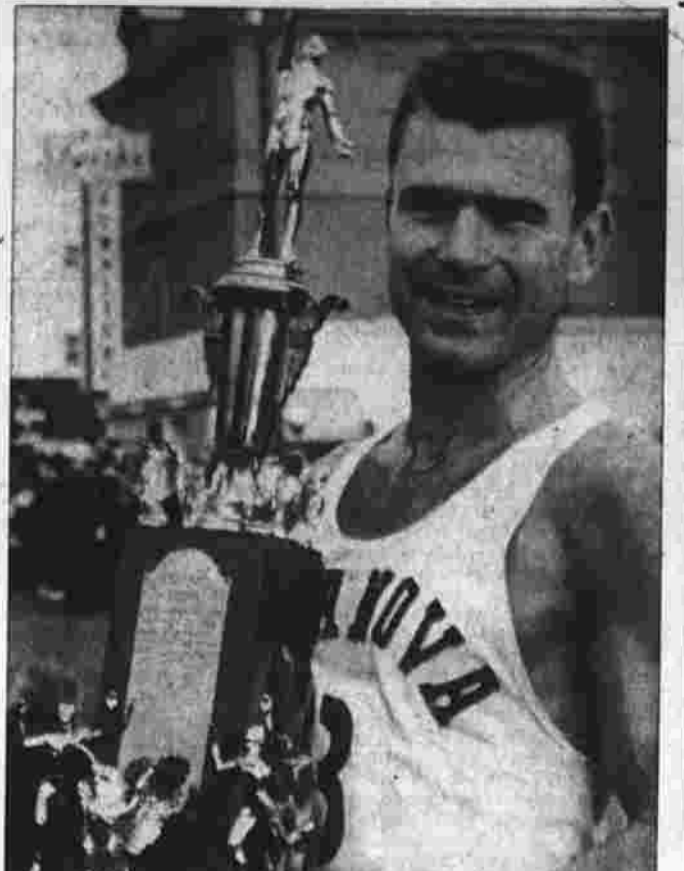

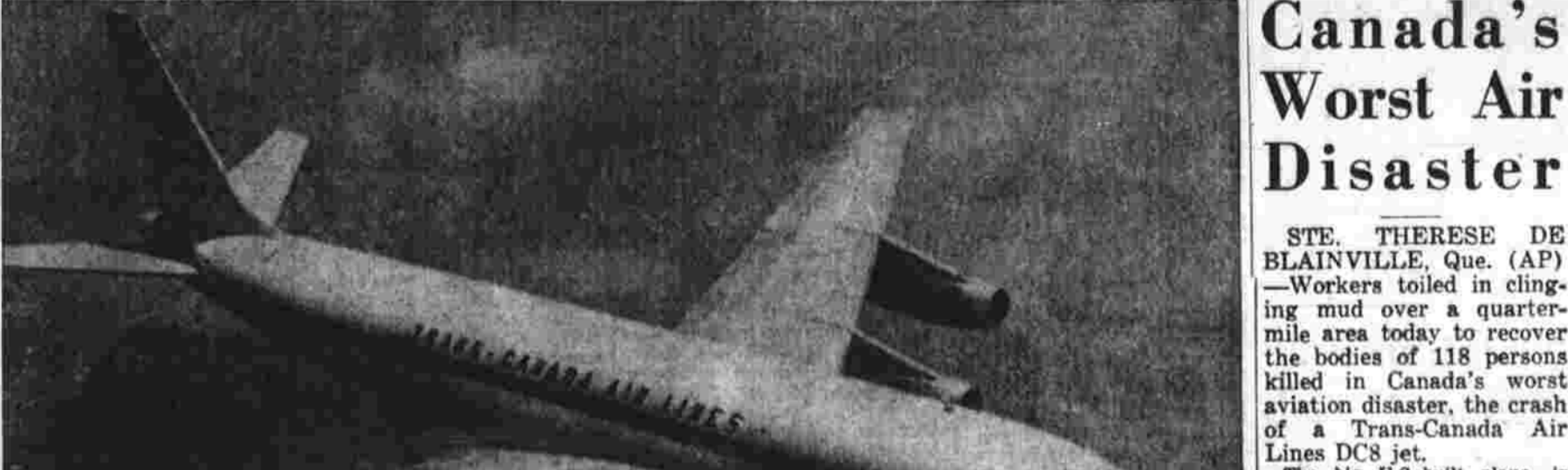
