become a Catholic. If the other objects, "the Pontifical Privilege" allows their marriage to be dissolved after the one is converted. The converted Catholic is free to marry again. The privilege is named after St. Paul because the concept is derived from his letter to the Corinthians.

Another faculty permits bishops to allow illegitimate youths to enter the priesthood. Bishops are also allowed to grant permission to Catholics to read books on the index of reading matter forbidden by the church when the books are used for research or study purposes.

Most of the powers, including the one concerning the index, previously were obtained by bishops for 5 and 10-year periods on application to the Vatican. The applications usually were approved and renewed as a matter of course. Several of the faculties were granted by the Vatican only on individual application by a bishop.

"Pope Paul's decree means the bishops will have the faculties on a permanent basis, eliminating even the formality of Vatican administrative control. The decree included permission to bishops to:

- Allow a priest to say Mass twice on a Sunday.
- When the archbishop had finished, the Pope indicated his approval and gave his blessing.

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Agent Wags History?

The most frightening aspect of the service that retired Army Major General Julius Kahn, reduced in his capacity of publicity agent for West Germany, was not merely that he undertook, for a fee of some \$400,000, to help West Germany retain and strengthen its image with the United States.

The event more frightening than is suggested by the way General Kahn, testifying before a Senate investigators last spring, in testimony just described, described one phase of his work.

"Most of our time and effort," he began, "is spent in advising our clients how to act consistently with the image and message of them here in the United States."

In other words, General Kahn, as publicity agent, decided what image of West Germany and of the West Germans was "expected" here in the United States, feeling that which is ever new, ever fresh, and which is the most magnificent hope.

Sabu Dies at 39, In Jungle Films

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Sabu, the elephant boy whose jungle exploits fascinated a generation of moviegoers, died at 39.

Victim of a heart attack, the Indian-born actor died Monday at his home in nearby Chatsworth. His full name was Sabu Bhadani.

Best remembered for his role in "The Tigris and the Euphrates," Sabu got his start when the late producer Sir Alexander Korda spotted him during the filming of "Elephant Boy" in 1937.

He came to the United States in 1938 with the movie, "Dharma," and appeared in many other films, mostly of the jungle genre.

Sabu served as a sergeant in the U.S. Army Air Corps in World War II and became an aviator. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

Survivors are his widow, former actress Marilyn Cooper, son and a daughter.

But one can still hope for memorial possibilities which come closer to the full spirit of the man than even the pointing of American thrust power into the infinite worlds of space.

Memorials in the hope that such memorials completely fitting and inspired uses may be found for the name everybody wishes to remember in honor, let's not overlook it by making a monument insignificant and meaningless use of that name.

Let it be reserved, in some degree, for something that will really express this nation's feeling about John F. Kennedy.
