# Study Suspended Pending Decision

Systems analyst Bruno DeMarco's study of the town highway department has been suspended pending a meeting of the town directors liaison sub-committee, probably sometime in January.

The suspension, announced yesterday afternoon by General Manager Richard Martin, came shortly after highway superintendent E. C. Turck informed DeMarco that Turck could no longer work with him.

The highway study was halted after consultations with Robert M. DeMarco and DeMarco's Co., performing the annual town audit and DeMarco's actual employer for the study and the directors sub-committee, set up earlier this week to mediate between DeMarco and General Manager Martin.

Sub-committee members include Democrats Robert Stone and Frank Blanton and Republican Harlan Taylor.

The study was named after DeMarco announced to town directors last Tuesday, that he was unable to work within the town's financial structure, and after General Manager Martin replied he would not suspend the study.

The highway study was brought to a halt Tuesday when Turck complained that he could no longer work with DeMarco because of the pressure DeMarco was bringing to bear.

Turck said that he had been told to accept his recommendations or resign.

General Manager Martin learned of Turck's resignation and inquired into the Municipal Building as to why Turck was picking up the highway department pay checks.

Subsequently Martin began a round of telephone calls to inform the sub-committee members of the suspension of the study.

# This Year's 'Amahl' Tries for Freshness

By RUTH E. THOMPSON  
"Believe me, it's still Never-Land. It may be a new production of 'Amahl and the Night Visitors' but don't get the impression there are jarring changes. Quite the contrary. Over the years little extra touches have evolved. What we've tried to do is go back and by starting again capture the freshness of the original 1951 production but with added dimension. We've had our problems but they could have been worse."

Speaking was Kirk Browning the soft-spoken, prematurely-graying director of the NBC Opera Company trying to say what you should and shouldn't expect of the 1963 edition of the first opera especially commissioned for television . . . and which will be colorcast Christmas Night from 9 to 10.

"For example the original sets, by the great scenic painter Berman, were two-dimensional. But the new sets give us a new depth because they're three dimensional. They're based on the original but the idea is still to give a misty feeling of antiquity, not a particular period researched to the last prop. Berman, however, originally used considerable ornamentation to give feel to the flat surface. That of course we no longer need. The colors, too, are softer . . . but not the costumes of the three kings. They're vivid; a child's eye view (Amahl's eye-view) of grandeur, larger than life."

He spoke fondly of all the youngsters who had played and outgrown the starring role but he was lyrical about the current incumbent, "Kurt Yaghjian is just great. He's a wonderful boy and a wonderful Amahl."

It was a fate so nearly interlocking it would do credit to a fiction writer that got Kurt the part in the first place. Gian Carlo Menotti, composer of "Amahl" was in Cincinnati in the early fall to hear a performance of another of his works, "Death of the Bishop of Brindisi" when he became struck by the voice and appearance of a 12-year chorister, Kurt Yaghjian.

"He recommended we audition him. By the time we did Menotti himself had gone off to France for the premier of his newest work. But the boy stood out. We all took to him. There were potential problems but we crossed our fingers and cast him."

Kurt comes from a musical family and has studied the piano for six years, the harp for two. But the story has still another twist. By interesting coincidence his father, Haig Yaghjian has since been named Associate Conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra filling the post vacated by Herbert Grossman who is conducting the new "Amahl . . . starring Kurt."

A non-musician himself, Kirk Browning nonetheless is a protégé of NBC Opera's venerable

# 'Wild Kingdom' Topples Myths

 NEW YORK (AP) — Giraffes are capable of throaty growls; chameleons don't change color to camouflage themselves, and bulls do not react wildly to the color red.

Last Sunday, on an NBC program aimed at younger audiences, a man named Martin Perkins demonstrated conclusively that many ideas about animals are myths.

He showed a sound film he shot in Africa that recorded the voices of reputedly mute giraffes. He placed a chameleon on a number of backgrounds including a sporty red plaid, and the creature remained the same brownish green color. The bull obviously reacted to the movement of material, not its color.

Perkins' weekly program, "Wild Kingdom," has been fascinating the public for two seasons. But Perkins, director of the St. Louis Zoo, is a television veteran whose "Zoo Parade" was a popular Sunday afternoon program for nine years, until 1957.

Over the years Perkins has taught thousands of youngsters how to handle animals, feed them, and avoid frightening or hurting them. Tomorrow, the program will show experiments on the intelligence of monkeys.

On a recent trip to New York for a TV guest shot, Perkins and his wife traveled with minimum luggage, but were accompanied by two alligators in specially built wooden containers, a friendly toucan named Growler, and a black and white condor with a 9½ foot wingspread.

Fortunately, Mrs. Perkins is as fond of members of the wild kingdom as her husband, and doesn't mind sharing — when necessary — a hotel suite with them.

Although Perkins and his wife are on friendly terms with many of the rare and exotic zoo animals, they have only three house pets — kittens.
