Wife Left Safe After Abduction

DANBURY (AP) — A 26-year-old Brooklyn, N. Y. man, apparently using a toy pistol, abducted his estranged wife from a friend's home early today, police said. He was captured four hours later. Police said Edward T. Ewing of Green Ave., Brooklyn, took his wife, Phyllis, 24, to the Bronx, N. Y., then returned and left her in Danbury, safe and unharmed.

Police spotted his car in Wilton, about 15 miles away, and nabbed him there.

Ewing entered the home on Starr's Plain Road in Danbury at about 3:45 a.m., police said, brandished the pistol, and forced his wife to leave with him. She had been staying at the home for about a year.

When he entered the house, Ewing was quoted as saying he had "some one way tickets" for the wife.

Constable Benjamin Turner spotted the car in Wilton and notified state police, who converged on the scene and took Ewing into custody on Rt. 7 near a shopping colony.

He was brought to the state police trooper at Ridgefield.

Feud Relaxed By Cypriots, Talk Planned

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—Tensions relaxed today on Cyprus following agreement by feuding Greek and Turkish Cypriots to attend a peace conference in London later this month.

The conference also will be attended by representatives of the British, Greek and Turkish governments in the hope of clearing away differences that led to nearly two weeks of fighting between Greek and Turkish Cypriots.

For the first time since fighting broke out Dec. 21, not an incident of violence was reported anywhere in the island republic.

One potential source of trouble was removed when Turkish Cypriots returned to Greek Cypriot hostages set in a Nicosia suburb Wednesday. The handover was arranged by the United Nations.

Tax Professions, Sullivan Suggests

HARTFORD (AP)—State tax Commissioner John L. Sullivan suggested today the state tax the "business-professional incomes" of such groups as accountants, doctors, dentists, lawyers and other professional folk.

He said this would put them in line with the general state practice of taxing business income and, if imposed, could bring in \$2 million annually if the unincorporated business tax rates were used.

Connecticut law, he noted, forbids them from incorporating for state tax purposes and, other law exempts them from paying taxes under the unincorporated business levy.

The result is, he added, that the state can't touch their business-professional income.

Fidel Celebrates 5th Year of Rule

HAVANA (AP)—Fidel Castro celebrated the fifth anniversary of his revolution Thursday with new attacks on the United States and the usual claims of eventual success for his Communist-ruled government.

Castro's prime minister, charged President Johnson was responsible for a Christmas Eve sabotage operation off the Isle of Pines in which Castro said a Soviet-built torpedo boat was damaged and several Cuban crewmen killed.

He said the operation was handled by U.S. Central Intelligence Agency from Florida.

(A Cuban anti-Castro group claimed today a spokesman in New York said Castro had a weak bid for opposition to the revolution.)

Not an Echo

Barry Joins Race As 'Clear Choice'

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Arizona's Sen. Barry Goldwater declared today he will seek the 1964 Republican presidential nomination because he sees no other announced candidate who "could possibly offer to the people of America a clear choice" next November.

Goldwater said he will file for nomination to seek his third term in the Senate.

"I find no incompatibility in these two candidacies," he said. "The conservative senator is not a statement at his hip but a man who has decided to seek to lead the GOP ticket because of the principles in which I believe and because I am convinced that millions of Americans share my belief in those principles."

"I have decided to do this also because I have not heard from any announced Republican candidate a declaration of conscience, or political position that could possibly offer the American people a clear choice in the next presidential election," Goldwater said.

New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, the only other declared candidate, entered the race almost two months ago.

Goldwater said "I have withheld a decision until now not because of any attempt to be politically coy but because I have been giving every aspect of such a decision the most serious consideration."

Goldwater first told Arizona Republican leaders of his plans in a meeting at his home.

The senator, his right foot still in a cast after surgery, hobbled to the patio of his home to read his statement.

"One of the great attributes of our American two-party system has always been the reflected differences in principle. As a general rule one party has emphasized individual liberty and the other has favored the extension of government power," Goldwater said.

"I am convinced that today the majority of the Republican party believes in the essential emphasis on individual liberty." —Declaring he is no "Me too Republican," Goldwater said he will spell out in detail his position during the campaign ahead.

"I will not change my beliefs to win," he said. "I will offer a choice, not an echo. This will not be an engagement of party goals."

Bid on Peace Seen a Grab For Initiative

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States today branded as "disappointing" Soviet Premier Khrushchev's global package proposal for renunciation of force in the settlement of territorial disputes.

In a statement the United States said, however, it would study the Khrushchev message to President Johnson and other world leaders to find out whether "any constructive steps" for easing world tensions can be developed from it.

In effect, the statement issued by the State Department rejected the package as a whole but kept open the possibility of acceptance of some parts of it, perhaps in a counterproposal.

The brief statement said the United States will confer with its allies on the Khrushchev message.

Diplomats said that the Soviet premier had grabbed a propaganda initiative with the publication today of his message to Johnson and other world leaders.

"This may have been on reason why the statement issued this afternoon actually was sharper in tone than some of the initial private reaction from the officials."

"On the face of it Mr. Khrushchev's message to the President is not an objective statement of the problem of territorial disputes and is therefore a disappointing response to President Johnson's call for progress towards peace."

"However, we will give it careful study together with our allies in order to ascertain whether we can develop any constructive steps which would help in easing tensions throughout the world."

Johnson sent a New Year's message to Khrushchev last Wednesday in which he said that the time for "simply talking about peace has passed—1964 should be the year in which we take further steps toward that goal."

Press officer Robert J. McCloskey issued the statement but said he could not expand on it. Officials said that Secretary Dean Rusk had been in touch with Johnson, who has received a translation of the message at his Texas ranch.

Basically, Khrushchev's message proposes a four-point international agreement denouncing the use of force in settling territorial and frontier issues.

State Department officials said after a preliminary survey that the Khrushchev proposal contains many argumentative elements which the United States will, of course, have to reject. But they added that it would be studied for possible construction provisions which might be able to build something.

Export Wheat Gets Subsidy

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department has approved an application by the Continental Grain Co. for an \$100 million subsidy on 12,862,500 bushels of durum type wheat for sale abroad, presumably to the Soviet Union. The wheat will come from surplus government stocks.

This could be the first sale to the Soviet Union since Soviet leaders indicated last fall they would like to buy U.S. wheat.

The department said it had agreed to a request by Continental that details of the application, including the destination of the wheat and the terms of the subsidy, be withheld until late today.

Among details that were disclosed are these: The Agriculture Department will sell the wheat from its surplus stocks to Continental at 1 cent per bushel.

Pontiff Attends to Final Details

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI came today to the eve of his history-making pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Throughout the Vatican, last minute details of the papal trip were being attended to.

At Rome's Fiumicino Airport the new four-engine DCs that will carry the Pope to Amman if the Pope offers it. The king of Jordan, Saturday was readied for his final test flight.

The Jordanians hung the ancient walls of Jerusalem's Old City with flags. Jordan's government called out a four-battalion security force, including two brigades of tough desert troops, to patrol the papal routes.

In the Israeli sector of Jerusalem, Vatican flags were mingled along main streets with Israel's flag.

The government press office announced about 500 foreign journalists had arrived in Israel to report the pilgrimage.

The Pope's two Holy Land hosts, swapped critical words in Athenagoras of Constantinople (Istanbul), spiritual leader of the 20 million Orthodox.

The Pope and 30 aides who will accompany him joined Thursday night in a two-hour spiritual retreat of prayer and meditation. Today the pontiff continued a special period of prayer, began New Year's Day, for the success of his pilgrimage.

Sen. Humphrey Tops Veep Poll

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—Robert F. Humphrey topped the balloting, but results of a national poll of Democratic county chairmen brightened speculation that President Johnson's running mate may be someone closely identified with the late John F. Kennedy.

More specifically, several Johnson aides suggested today that the results add up to a plus for the potential candidacy of Robert Shriver, Peace Corps director and brother-in-law of the assassinated President.

The poll, conducted by the Associated Press, turned up notable support for both Shriver and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy as among the party's best choices for the November vice presidential nomination.

Humphrey, a Minnesota who is assistant Senate Democratic leader, paced the balloting with 316 votes.

He said "I am honored and flattered by the national poll and always gratifying to have friendly consideration by your fellow Americans. The decision for vice president, however, will be made by the Democratic convention, which I am confident will respect the wishes of this master of President Johnson."

Robert Kennedy, a close associate of the President as well as the assassin's brother, trailed Shriver fifth with 151 votes, trailed Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson and Mayor Robert F. Wagner of New York both regarded as dark horse possibilities.

Some politically oriented Johnson associates said they were struck by the combined strength of Robert Kennedy and Shriver as well as the scattering of votes for Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, youngest brother of the late President, and for Mrs. John F. Kennedy.

He suggested the attack on Kennedy image was most likely to benefit Shriver, who is on much closer personal terms with Johnson than the attorney general.

Some of those close to Johnson report that Shriver already is regarded by the President as the running mate he would find most acceptable under present circumstances.

Robert Kennedy's strength in the poll was viewed by one presidential aide as readily transferable to Shriver.

The attorney general's No. 2 ranking in the poll also was interpreted by some as tending to help any idea that Robert Kennedy of Massachusetts

Budget a New Peak, But Below Forecasts

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson's new budget will be in the neighborhood of a record \$100 billion, but he hopes to cut red ink spending below the 1960, disclosed Thursday night by a White House source, is less than anticipated. Still, it will be a new peak for government spending.

Keeney Street Sewer Poses Problem Anew

One of the factors which precipitated the town officials' decision ten years ago to locate the Keeney St. School to the rear of the 29-acre building site was the lack of a sewer connection in Keeney St. itself.

Whether the same problems will occur in the proposed developments farther to the north is not yet ascertainable. The developments have performed sewage tests which seem to favor septic tank installations, but these may not be conclusive.

The solution to this problem would be a sewer to serve the Keeney St. area, and that could serve the Hilltown Rd. end of the development if it were provided with a pumping station. This is a problem that will be put before the town's board of directors on Jan. 7, when they will be asked to authorize an allocation of \$17,000 from the sewer department reserve fund for the preparation of detailed plans and specifications for a sanitary sewer from Hartford Rd. through Birwell St. and cross lots to Keeney St.

The preliminary work was done when the Keeney St. School was in the works; now it is the detailed drawings that are necessary.

There is an alternative, but an alternative which would require Manchester to adopt an approach to municipal services which it has so far not seen fit to do.

This would be to request the Metropolitan District Commission for permission to run sewer lines west and tie into their facilities in East Hartford. Manchester would have to provide all the sewer installations.
