

Aides Weigh Need for Major U.S. Units to Save Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The United States may soon have to choose between watching the Communists win in South Viet Nam or sending in major U.S. combat units. The time for such a decision has not arrived but top American officials in Saigon are looking at the odds closely. A possible middle ground is that Saigon's new military government will recover the initiative from the enemy guerrilla army.

The United States has hopes that this can be done. Ranking American observers say military setbacks are the result of a neutralized South Viet Nam with no American troops. "We could wait for a few years on that basis before reintroducing South Viet Nam with our country," a Hanoi official said recently in nearby Cambodia. Diplomats are weighing the advantages and disadvantages of using U.S. combat units. The main advantage, many say—could be regarded as an

American diplomat who refused to be identified said: "I think there would be some important advantages. I think American combat troops coming here would have an important psychological effect in other parts of Southeast Asia—Indonesia, for example. It would be a clear indication that America intends to carry out what it says, regardless of the risk." "Furthermore, I think it would weaken the Red Chinese position with the Soviet Union. China contends that 'wars of

liberation' in the Viet Cong style would be a worse blow than if the Americans hadn't been there in the first place. American participation like that would mean actually administering the country in some ways—a job I don't think we could handle." "We have no reason to think we do better in Viet Nam than the French army did in their war, which ended in disaster in 1954." "Suppose, for instance, an American infantry regiment

Nixon Indicates A Changed Mind

Lupton Declines High Post with Goldwater Staff

HARTFORD (AP)—The executive director of the Connecticut Republican Citizens Committee has declined the offer of a high level position with the national Goldwater-for-President movement. Lupton explained that he turned down the post because he feels he can be of more assistance to the Republican party by remaining in his present job. "It was my overriding judgment that the most important thing I can do for the party at the present time is to remain with the citizens committee and continue pushing the campaign to increase Republican strength in the major cities," he said. He pointed out that the campaign to improve the Republican position in big cities is "just really getting under way. That it would not be a good idea to leave my post at this time." Lupton made no specific comment about Senator Goldwater's candidacy but it is generally known that he is privately favoring the conservative lawyer as the party's presidential nominee. The citizens committee, which is still awaiting formal recognition from the GOP State Central Committee, has pledged to remain neutral in the fight for the Republican presidential nomination until a nominee is chosen at the convention.

Kennedy. Goldwater called it "that hate theme" and said it is the "most overdone, the most untruthful attack in the history of this country." The Arizona senator, campaigning for the Republican presidential nomination, said today he "was sorry to see that Mr. Johnson fell into the trap of the hate theme in referring to President Kennedy's assassination in the State of the Union message." He said that is the theme stressed by Communists and radical columnists. "I don't think that President Johnson is going to lead, or really," Goldwater said.

Romney Boasts Boom in State, Asks Big Budget

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Gov. George Romney, citing what he called a "booming" economy in Michigan, asked the State Legislature today to approve spending a record \$624 million next fiscal year. Romney, who has announced he would accept a draft for the Republican presidential nomination, proposed the 1964-65 budget "State of the State" message to the Legislature. His proposal is \$1 million more than the present budget of \$605 million. The program is designed to meet two basic objectives, Romney said: "To protect and enlarge human rights, and to serve human needs." The Republican governor, who became Michigan's first GOP chief executive in 24 years when he was elected in 1962, went before the Legislature just two days after he made himself available for a presidential draft. He did so in Washington before the National Press Club, though insisting he was not

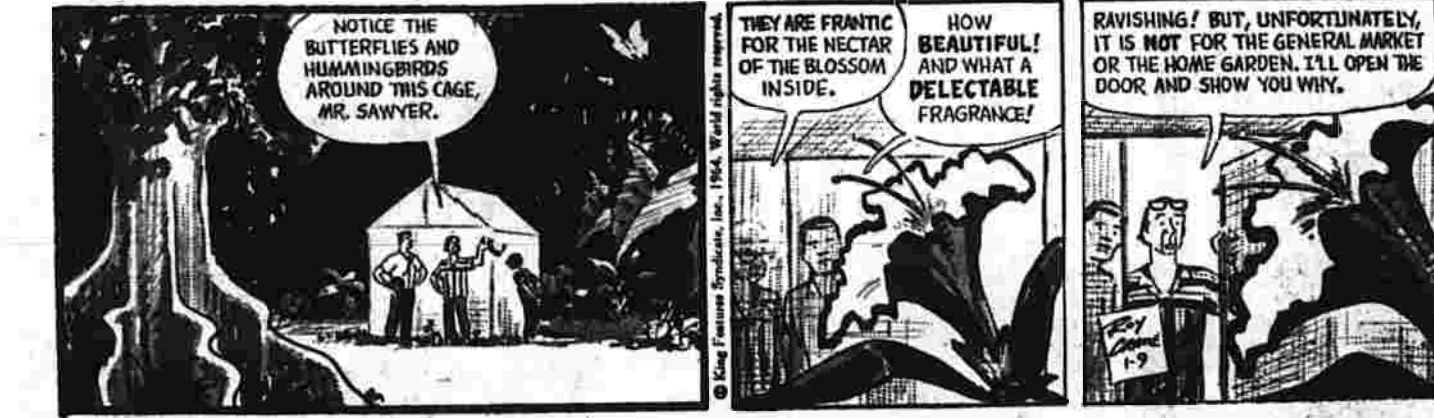

Transit District Decision Delayed a Month by TDC

The decision of the Town Development Commission (TDC) on whether to recommend Manchester membership in the Greater Hartford Transit District will have to wait until its next meeting, Feb. 10.

The Transit District headed by the Capitol Region Planning Agency (CRPA), has already been approved by six Hartford-area towns, and will soon be organized as a stand-by, watch-dog agency, ready to step in and assume the duties and facilities of any failing bus company in the area.

Despite proddings by Raymond Dunn, chairman of the CRPA's transit study committee, the TDC voted to postpone its decision until its separate members have studied the many ramifications of the 1961 State Legislature enabling act which permits the creation of the district.

TDC Chairman Alfred Werber explained the delay succinctly when he said, "Manchester has the reputation for proceeding slowly — we may not want to break the precedent."

Approximately 2,900 cubic yards of sand (mixed with salt) was used to cover the town's streets, sidewalks and public parking lots.
