The Battle of Flags

A flag is, among other things, a certain area of cloth, not necessarily very large. But flag incidents are never really small incidents. For that area of cloth always stands for something symbolic, to which people devote affection and pride. It means country; it means equality of one country with another; it always means, to many people, that one country can also be better than any other.

Today, flags have caused trouble, including too much violence, too much shooting, and too many deaths, down in the nation of Panama, which includes in its territorial outlines a Zone which is ruled by the United States.

We rule this Zone for the protection and operation of the Panama Canal. Lightened age, give us some frank analysis of the rough power politics maneuvers by which we got this Zone in the first place. And, in the era following World War II, the era of increasing freedom and awakening nationalism everywhere—the era, also, of Egypt's successful nationalization of the Suez Canal—the people of Panama have been increasingly aware of this infringement upon their own full and free sovereignty, and have been driven or lured, by sheer emotionalism, into recurrent agitation about it.

This has been, within limits, a very civilized period for the United States, in which we have sometimes even managed to see ourselves as others see us. Consequently, they began, with President Eisenhower and his administration, an enlightened and generous effort to improve our relations with the people and the politicians and with the national pride of Panama by giving certain recognition to the basic real Panamanian sovereignty even in the Canal Zone we occupy and govern. And one of the tokens of this symbolic concession to Panama, became our agreement, last year, that henceforth the two flags, that of the United States and that of Panama, would fly together in the Canal Zone.

This basic agreement has been observed. But, for one reason or another, our governor there, Robert J. Fleming, Jr., designated certain precise locations where both flags would be flown regularly, and did not include the American schools in the Canal Zone.

This left an opening for a display of how some young Americans felt about their flag, and their country's claim to the land on that day. American students at American schools in the Canal Zone had been raising the American flag and had not been raising any flag of Panama alongside it.

This display of patriotism on the part of American students thus ignored the high agreement between the United States and Panama. Our authorities reportedly remonstrated gently with our students, and appealed to them, but apparently did not halt the practice.

The Michigan Governor was the last obvious major possibility who had not yet climbed down out of last summer's official indifference. The fact that the value of the Republican nomination for 1964 may have been altered since then, the fact that nobody has any kind of real lead in the Republican race for that nomination, and the elemental advance of time and calendar toward the San Francisco Convention all have now operated to bring out a full line of possibilities. And, with a leader in the position of Governor Romney, such a move forward also is one more basic purpose—that of establishing himself clearly in a position where he can have something definite and influential to say about where the Republican nomination finally does go. For the moment, appraisal of Governor Romney—the erstwhile promoter of the compact car, the successful sponsor of governmental recognition in Michigan immediately after his election—has to place him somewhere safe between party extremes, potentially appealing to almost anybody.

It has to be one other unique distinction given him for starters, one might say that his confession of availability, although he has not yet somehow come out with some special awkwardness.

"I have no way of knowing whether such a demand as you mentioned develops," he answered the inevitable question about a "draft." "It would be premature to assume that it will. It should be, I think, the concern of an American, I would have it to accept. To do anything else would be an affront."

Somewhere, we have trouble understanding how a potential candidate for any office manages to think that it would be audacity, boldness, brass, headhood, impudence, or insolence, or shamelessness, all good synonyms for effrontery, not to take the nomination. Usually, if it ever does come within reach, the best of them reach for it, hold as brass.

Paternal, Or Puritan? This is the worst of all possible times to express cynicism regarding the motives of any campaign against the deleterious and the undoubtedly deleterious practice of smoking. But we'll bet two unmarked packs of Murad's against any carton of tips that the management of that Zone's bank which has just prohibited its employees from smoking is more a Puritanical than a solicitous management.

The management claims that its new rule, which forbids smoking on the job except out in warehouses or cafeterias, is designed to keep its employees healthier and happier and on the job more regularly, thus saving an estimated \$100,000 a year in sick leave.

This is a very good story. And scratch beneath it and we'll bet there emerges some cold Puritan anger, somewhere in the management, over the idea of mere employees daring to have a moment's comfort and relaxation during the time for which they have been hired. This is not the tender care of the paternal institution, but the whip of the overseer, the whip left over from days when working was a privilege conferred by the employer, not a contracting from the employer for something he too needed.

We sense more of a war on business than on tobacco, and even more of a love of regulating other people than a love of dollars. What if, at the end of the first year of no-smoking, employee morale is low, the office dispirited and tired and wan, and the sick leave statistics doubled what they were when the rule was first enacted at the desk, acted as a psychological safety valve?

For this big, frightening report that we are going to be hit with makes absolutely no mention of the No. 1 killer in New York City today. It is Impetuous Dime, which means you have no money. And when you have no money, you start worrying about where to get it and when you do this, pretty soon the cemetery plot salesman makes a small score for himself.

There is no trouble in the world like money trouble. You can't give it up and there is no way to cure it. Because if you are broke into the night time, and you take care of yourself and go to bed early and get a good night's sleep, it doesn't mean a thing because when you wake up in the morning you are still broke, and you are going to stay that way no matter what happens. The only cure for money trouble is a two and a half gainer off the roof.

It is out on loan because the people who borrowed it did not have money of their own. Now this money is loaned out on interest, and it is a known irrefutable fact that a human being is going against pneumonia than going against six per cent interest.
