

Zoo Curator in Utah Killed By African Puff Adder Bite

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP)—The city zoo's curator, Jerry De Bary, 37, died today after hours of agony from the bite of the deadly African puff adder snake.

De Bary was bitten Saturday night when he suffered a dizzy spell after opening the snake's cage to clean it. He threw up his arm to catch himself and the snake struck. De Bary died at 6:30 this morning.

The venom attacks the nervous system, causing muscle spasms and paralysis. De Bary's heart stopped temporarily several times. Breathing was nearly impossible at times. A respirator had to be used, and a tracheotomy had to be performed in order to assure an easy opening for air.

Puff adder snake serum was flown by Navy jet from the San Diego, Calif., zoo. More was ordered from Southern Rhodesia. The puff adder is a native of South Africa and that's where the serum is made.

Sister Mary Gerald, superior at Holy Cross Hospital where De Bary was treated, telephoned her sister, Peggy Forester, in Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia, for more serum.

But De Bary, a native of Switzerland, died before it arrived.

As far as could be determined De Bary was the only person ever to be bitten by an African puff adder in the United States. Marlin Perkins, director of the St. Louis zoo, was bitten by a first cousin, the gaboon viper, 25 years ago and survived.

Perkins said, "I know what tremendous pain is involved. It is one of my most vivid memories. The pain is extensive and intense. It felt like a big weight on my chest and I wasn't able to breathe. And it felt like acid was eating inside me."

An associate described De Bary on Sunday as being conscious and "talking calmly," although in severe pain.

Charles Shaw, curator of reptiles at the San Diego zoo, said the adder is one of the world's deadliest snakes and the most lethal snake in South Africa.

De Bary was working in the snake house alone. For some unknown reason he became dizzy after he opened the glass door of the puff adder's cage. He fell forward, but he threw his arm to catch himself. The adder sank both its fangs into his left forearm.

U.S. Sues Unions

HARTFORD (AP)—The government has started legal proceedings against the Hartford Building and Construction Trades Council of Hartford and vicinity and 11 union locals to stop them from carrying on alleged illegal activities at the Springfield Sugar Co. refrigeration warehouse under construction in Suffield.

A complaint against them has been filed in U.S. District Court by Bernard L. Alpert, regional director, First Region of the National Labor Relations Board, it was learned today.

It stemmed from charges of unfair labor practices that were lodged with the NLRB by Morris & Associates, Inc., Raleigh, N.C., the construction contractors who have been erecting the warehouse.

The unions are not currently certified as representatives of Morris employees and have not filed any charges that Morris has unlawfully recognized or assisted any labor organization, it was alleged.

The charge claimed the unions have threatened and coerced persons engaged in commerce and subcontractors to prevent them from doing business with Morris & Associates.

Also, it was claimed, the unions have picketed to prevent neutral employers and employees from dealing with Morris and have asked employees of subcontractors not to work for their employers at the Suffield job.

Further, it was claimed, various "coercive telephone statements" have caused the cancellation of contracts with four subcontractors—Freedman Roofing Co., Springfield, Mass.; B. J. Harland Electrical Co., Longmeadow, Mass.; Northern Heating & Supply Co., Newington, Conn.; and Keltman Floor Co., Wellesey, Mass.

Sought by the government is a court order against the picketing and other activities.

HARTFORD (AP)—The Connecticut Turnpike has produced a surplus of income over debt service charges for the fourth straight year.

State Finance and Control Commissioner George Conitt predicted as he released the figures for 1963 Saturday that this year the overall financing deficit will finally be eliminated.

Fuel Problem Stalls Saturn Super Rocket

CAPE KENNEDY (AP)—A fueling problem in the first stage today forced a 48-hour postponement, until Wednesday of an attempt to launch the Saturn I super-rocket which is intended to orbit the world's heaviest satellite.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration called off the shot after the launching crew tried nearly three hours to correct a block in a fuel line which feeds liquid oxygen to the booster stage.

The trouble cropped up at 8:45 a.m. Earlier, a leak in a second-stage hydrogen fuel line had delayed the firing 35 minutes and pushed the launch time past the intended 10 a.m. liftoff.

The space agency statement said the obstruction in the first-stage fuel line apparently was a flange which had been used in a recent test and which had not been removed as intended.

No other information was immediately available on the trouble.

A successful launching possibly could give the U.S. a lead over the Soviet Union in the race for space rocket power.

National radio and television networks planned live coverage of the launching.

Earlier this month, Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, deputy chief of the space agency, said "we are drawing very close" to the Russians in rocket power and "as soon as the Saturn satellite has been placed in orbit we will have relieved this deficiency in weight-carrying ability we've labored under so long."

The rocket, 164 feet tall and weighing 562 tons, is the first in the Saturn I series with a live lift-off.

U.S. Brands French Move 'Unfortunate'

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Nationalist China denounced France's recognition of Communist China tonight but refrained from severing diplomatic relations with the French government.

A formal protest was dispatched to the government of President Charles de Gaulle in Paris.

The action by the Nationalist Chinese came after an extraordinary session of the Cabinet.

There had been hints that the government might break off relations with Paris.

Government officials in talks with newsmen denounced the French move as unwise, unfriendly and illogical. They said it would weaken the world front against communism and damage the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization.

The announcement that France was extending recognition came as no surprise to Taipei. But Red China's agreement to extend recognition to France dashed Nationalist hopes for a possible means of saving face.

Nationalist officials had held to the aim hope that Peking would delay recognition of France because of its long announced opposition to a two-China policy. This is the diplomatic recognition of both the Communist and Nationalist governments.

PARIS (AP)—France officially recognized the Communist Chinese regime in Peking today. Peking radio made a similar announcement.

The French announcement said the two governments had agreed to establish diplomatic relations and to exchange ambassadors.

Peking radio said France and Red China have agreed to appoint ambassadors to each other within three months.

In Washington, the U.S. State Department called France's recognition of Peking "an unfortunate move."

NEW YORK (AP)—In 1942 when Columbus sailed the ocean blue, times were hard but problems were simple—rough weather, uncharted courses and mutiny.

Early Sunday, a replica of the Santa Maria, Columbus' flagship, set out from Flushing bay on a five-mile journey through the borough of Queens.

Aided and abetted by 99 assorted experts—11 more than Columbus' reluctant heroes—it made port a parking lot on the World's Fairgrounds, in late afternoon.

LBJ Offers Plan To Help Suburbs

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson extended a helping hand today to fast-growing suburban communities swamped by demands for "new classrooms, uncounted miles of new streets and utility lines, and an unprecedented volume of water and sewerage facilities."

He asked Congress to provide federal grants and loans to local governments and private developers so that future expansion won't be carried out, as it often has in the past, "in a sprawling, space-consuming unplanned and uneconomic way."

This was the major new proposal in the President's message to Congress on housing and community development, but he also had a few new wrinkles in the older, established programs such as public housing and urban renewal.

These variations included plans to buy and rent existing housing for public housing purposes and new aid for those

ousted by urban renewal projects.

Johnson outlined to Congress a comprehensive program to achieve the goal he set shortly after taking office last fall: "A decent home for all Americans."

He called for expanded public housing and urban renewal, and new programs to help provide homes for farmers and migratory farm workers.

In the first major housing legislative proposal since 1961, Johnson renewed some old demands of the late President John F. Kennedy.

He called for creation of a Cabinet-level department of housing and community development and urged Congress to act swiftly on a mass transit bill, already passed by the Senate and awaiting House action.

Johnson promises Negroes that his administration "will continue and strengthen its efforts to translate the pledges made by Kennedy in his 1962 order against discrimination in federally assisted housing "into meaningful practice."

However, he didn't mention any plans to extend the order to conventionally financed housing, as some civil rights advocates have urged.

On the two biggest programs in the housing field, Johnson:—Asked authorization of 50,000 additional public housing units for each of the next four years. The 1961 act authorized 100,000 units spread over three years.

The President also asked authority to lease 10,000 existing housing units a year for four

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Spy Orbs Detect ICBM Take-Offs

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson disclosed today that two U.S. military spy-in-the-sky satellites have succeeded in detecting a number of intercontinental ballistic missile launchings, from both Florida and California.

The satellites successfully detected launchings not only of liquid fuel Titan and Atlas boosters, but of the much more compact and swift-climbing solid fueled Minuteman, Johnson said.

Using secret infrared heat-seeking devices, the orbiting spy satellites were sent into orbit in 1963.

President Johnson's disclosure made it clear that the Defense Department aims to de-

velop even more sophisticated spy satellites to be sent into orbit in 1964.

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Mutinious Troops Disarmed By British in East Africa

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP)—British troops kept peace in restive East Africa after disarming mutinious native soldiers in the young Commonwealth nations of Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda.

British and African officers questioned the rebellious troops in the three neighboring countries, trying to find out if there was a master plan behind the upheavals. All erupted last week in the wake of the Communist Soviet coup that toppled the Sultan of Zanzibar.

A spokesman at the British East Africa Command post in Nairobi said no evidence has been found to indicate the mutinies were part of an overall rebellion, but investigations were continuing.

The mutineers in Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda were all former members of the Queen's African Rifles who had served under the British flag until the three territories gained independence. After independence, some British officers remained at the three governments' request to train and command the troops. The mutinies stemmed from demands for removal of those officers and for higher pay.

A spokesman in London for Britain's Commonwealth Ministry denied Soviet charges that Britain plans to invade Zanzibar to overthrow the revolutionary regime. The spokesman said Britain never had any intention of intervening in Zanzibar.

Soviet Premier Khrushchev warned that any forcible acts toward the leftist regime on the spice island would bring "dangerous consequences." The Soviet statement omitted the usual rocket rattling and made no mention of Tanganyika, Uganda or Kenya, whose African leaders had been urged to help keep order.

More than 3,500 British troops maintained order in the three East African nations after light-ning weekend moves that caused the deaths of four African soldiers. Three were killed when commandos quelled a new mutiny Saturday at a barracks outside Dar es Salaam, the Tanganyikan capital. The other was killed when British troops put down an uprising Friday night at a camp in Kenya.

Seventeen persons were killed in Tanganyika last Monday in the wake of the mutiny.

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Woman Missionary Killed By Rebel Arrow in Congo

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP)—An American woman missionary has been killed and another wounded by rebels waging war on Christian missions in the central Congo government province of Kwilu.

The central government said it had documentary proof the rebels, led by former Education Minister Pierre Mulele, are supported by Red China.

The government declared a state of emergency in Kwilu Province and rushed 400 soldiers into the region. It said important measures would be taken, "the nature of which will be revealed at an opportune moment."

Irene Ferrel, 45, of Eagle Butte, was reported killed by a rebel's arrow during a raid on a Baptist mission at the village of Mangungu, 300 miles southeast of Leopoldville.

The Congo Inland Missionary in Leopoldville reported that Ruth Hage, 38, of Wellington, Ohio, also attached to the Mangungu station, was wounded. Latest reports indicated she was still in the area.

The guerrillas killed three Roman Catholic priests last week. Seven American missionaries and two children were removed by U.N. helicopters Friday from Kandi, in southern Kwilu, after guerrillas burned their station.

The Rev. Peter Buller of Mountain Lake, Minn., who fled with his wife and two children from their mission 20 miles northwest of Mangungu, said he spotted Miss Ferrel signaling for help last Wednesday when she flew over her mission. She could only be reached from the air by helicopter because there is no landing strip.

"She and her friends were out on the lawn," he said. "Then we got a letter telling us she was dead—killed by an arrow."

Another missionary, Bertha Miller of Glendale, Calif., arrived in Leopoldville Sunday and said planes spotted Miss Hage waving for help.

Miss Miller said she was forced to flee from her mission in Kamayala after rebels set fire to grass in the area and the flames threatened the station.

Mulele's forces were reported to be spreading into the area.

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'Old Soldier' Hailed at 84

NEW YORK (AP)—Douglas MacArthur was hailed by President Johnson on the general's 84th birthday as "one of the authentic American heroes of this century."

MacArthur, who turned 84 Sunday, received a delegation of five cadets from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., in his Waldorf Towers suite. He told them the praise being heaped upon him was "a little extravagant, as far as I'm concerned."

The general of the Army—a five-star title—added: "High honors have come my way, but I shall believe the greatest honor was being a West Point cadet. The Military Academy taught me many things, some of them not within the covers of books written by any man."

As he displayed a congratulatory telegram from the President, MacArthur recalled that Johnson had been one of his officers in the Southwest Pacific during World War II.

"I remember the day I decorated him with the Silver Star," the general said, "for his coolness and courage during an air mission in New Guinea."

"Had I known at the time that he was to become president, I would have looked after his welfare better than I did. But he seemed well able to take care of himself."

Johnson's telegram read: "Your country sends you, with affection and warmest prayers for God's blessing on your 84th birthday. You are one of the authentic American heroes of this century. On behalf of the American people, please accept the

EARN \$1.5 BILLION
NEW YORK (AP)—General Motors Corp. in 1963 earned \$1,592,000,000, a sum never before equaled in a calendar year by any U.S. corporation. Sales, likewise a record, totaled \$1.5 billion, GM reported today. In summarizing what in many ways was an unprecedented year in the automobile industry, GM also reported new high marks in car and truck production, payroll, dividends paid, and profit per share of common stock. The only earnings achievement approaching the GM 1963 figure was the \$1,474,000,000 in net income reported by American Telephone and Telegraph Co. for the 12 months ended Nov. 30. AT&T has not yet given its figures for calendar 1963. In 1962, GM, the world's largest manufacturer, reported its previous high of \$1,459,000,000 in profits and \$1.4 billion in sales.

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Columbia Detergent in Well Problem for Tappans

Stories of detergent pouring into the water supply as heard through newspapers and radio, didn't seem very real to many people until this past week when Mr. and Mrs. Kirby Tappan let it be known they had personally been bothered for weeks.

The Tappans have a 400-foot artesian well at their home. To have soap bubbles run through their water faucet into their sink was startling.

"At first we didn't pay too much attention," Tappan said. "They are most noticeable in our bathtub — I take a shower and they don't show up on much this way, but to draw water for a bath is quite another thing. Mrs. Tappan doesn't like the idea and neither does she like the smell."

The Tappans had their water tested before they used the well at all. It passed inspection with flying colors. A little excess lime goes in around the edge of the pan when water is boiled but this is not uncommon and is harmless.

Then in October they noticed the foam and when it did not clear up, they had a commercial firm come in and test the water again. About three weeks later they got the report that detergent is in their water and that they should not use it for drinking purposes unless it is boiled.

This didn't appeal to either parent, so they stopped using the well except for cleaning and when they were boiling water for drinking water from a Williams' plastic spring ever since.

"No one knows just what caused the situation, but they had a feeling it might have been developed when considerable blasting was being done in the area by the Tappans.
