TV Notebook

By DICK KLEINER Newspaper Enterprise Assn. NEW YORK — (NBA) — The lovely Diana Hyland has had a big year — starring on the top television shows and making her first movie — but she still isn't sure she likes being an actress.

"I never wanted to act," she says. "It all happened quite by accident. I was at Cleveland Stadium and some photographer took my picture. It got into a magazine, a movie company saw it and the next thing I knew I was an actress."

"It happened so accidentally that I've never become part of the acting stream. I'm not an actress — I'm just a girl who has a job acting."

She lives in a New York apartment and commutes to Hollywood when she has a part. Most of her friends are non-actors. And, she says, she has a very un-actorlike theory that "there are other things in the world besides acting."

"I'm frequently tempted to do other things," Diana Hyland says. "I'd very much like to join the Peace Corps. I almost took a job a while ago with Brazilian Air Lines. What I want is to do something worth-while with my life. Oh, I realize that entertaining people is contributing something — but is it enough?"

She thoroughly enjoyed making her first movie. She plays Mrs. Norman Vincent Peale opposite Don Murray in "One Man's Way," a film biography of the famous minister. It was a good part and a safe one, compared to some of her earlier experiences.

Miss Hyland has found acting a tough career; she has been in several bruising scrapes. Filming a Wagon Train episode, her dress caught fire and she was burned. On an Alfred Hitchcock show, she was tossed down a flight of stairs and came up black-and-blue. Filming another show a camera rolled over her foot. The camera weighed around 2,000 pounds.

Maybe that's why she isn't sure about being an actress. It isn't a very safe life for a young girl.

Hume Cronyn is one of our finest actors, so it comes as something of a shock, to hear him say:

"If I could, I would never work on Broadway again."

He is, of course, going to work on Broadway again. And soon. He'll be Polonius in Richard Burton's "Hamlet."

"Broadway," Cronyn says, is too nervous, too frantic. There are too many things working against the actor — the competition for too-few parts by too-many actors; the realization of the high cost of the productions; the foul-smelling back

Bennett Cerf Is Punster Without Fear

By RUTH E. THOMPSON "You mean some people think John Daly still tweaks his ear to stush us?" Tall, tanned Bennett Cerf — moonlighter deluxe (full-time book publisher, part-time panelist, pundit, lecturer, columnist) — looked aghast in amazement.

"Now they trust our taste," beamed Daly's chief batter on CBS-TV's "What's My Line," now going into its 15th year. "Any give and take (and/or squeal) is right out in the open. I guess that signaling was developed for a fellow who'd dropped off before I got there."

And the nearly irreplaceable Bennett didn't get there just yesterday.

If you figure it's been nearer forever, you're right. The other three beat him by only a year. Moderator Daly and columnist Dorothy Kilgallen hold absolute seniority having been on the very first show. Arlene Francis checked in as of the second program and Cerf was seated in May of 1951.

How to account for this perpetual gold mine? It started when the imaginations of Mark Goodson and Bill Todman caught fire as party guest wondered, "Do you suppose you could guess a man's occupation by looking at him?" They worked over a format for 350 hours, 8 of them on the title alone.

"If I could figure why 'Line' is such a hit," a rival producer told me admiringly, "you can bet I'd do likewise. But like a work of art, it's deceptively simple. The gimmick is great, sure, but flops have had good gimmicks, too. Of course Daly and the panel are really something. Ever notice how let-down you feel if Daly or a couple of the regulars is away?"

That proves faithful watching, right there, because Daly has missed only four shows in the 14 years, during many of which he was also top news commentator as well as vice president of another network.

Cerf, president of Random House, said, "I always try to schedule my lectures (and he averages 30 a year) so I can be back in New York Sundays."

He sighed, "But of course if it came right down to it I'd give up television too, if I had to, because I'm first of all a publisher." Then he brightened, "However, as it is everything ties together. People who watch

Bay of Pigs Revisited

"They are 1,500 against thousands. The beach they are on is hemmed in by swamp. They have no air cover. They are running short of ammunition. How can they win?" These are the words of Chet Huntley of NBC News as he describes the April 17, 1961 events at Bay of Pigs, Cuba, for the "NBC White Paper" program "Cuba: Bay of Pigs" to be telecast Tuesday from 10-11 p.m.

"Cuba: Bay of Pigs" is one of two "NBC White Paper" TV specials on United States foreign policy in Cuba prepared by Creative Projects, NBC News. The second program, "Cuba: The Missile Crisis," will be presented on NBC-TV Sunday, Feb. 9 (10-11 p.m.). Included on the Feb. 4 program will be large segments of films of the invasion which have never before been seen in this country. The films were

obtained from such varied places as Canada, West Germany and East Germany and will show the 2506 Assault Brigade training in Guatemala and the subsequent events of the invasion itself. During the battle scenes, Castro will be seen as he takes personal charge and directs his troops.

The first-hand accounts that the Cubans relate for the full-hour special will cover the various phases of the invasion operation: in Florida, where the invasion brigade was recruiting; in Guatemala where it was trained; on the beach of the Bay of Pigs where it began its invasion; and inside Havana, as well as the provinces and the mountains where underground and guerrilla forces prepared — in vain — to participate in an uprising designed to coincide with the invasion.

Telling their own stories will be:

The leader of the Cuban Democratic Revolutionary Front (FRENTES), Aureliano Sanchez Arango. As one of the original five leaders of the organization, he was among those first approached to work with the ultimate overthrow of the Castro government. In September, 1959 — seven months before the invasion took place — Dr. Sanchez Arango resigned from the FRENTES, taking his supporters with him.

The guerrilla commander who waited in vain for supplies and military equipment, Captain Evelio Duque, commander of one of the main columns of anti-Castro guerrillas fighting in the Escambray Mountains throughout the Fall and Winter of 1959. His forces numbered almost 1,200 at the peak of their activities while they waited for aid. In July, 1961, he escaped to the United States, following the burning out of his mountain stronghold by Castro's militia.

The man whose coffee plantation was used for training the invasion brigade, Roberto Ale-

Down 'Ol' Man River': A Threat to Fantasies

"By general standards, we have produced the most atypical travelogue in television history," says Ted Yates, co-producer of "Our Man on the Mississippi," full-hour NBC-TV documentary scheduled for tomorrow from 10-11 p.m.

"We don't have a single picture of New Orleans at sunset, the balconies at Natchez, or Mark Twain's birthplace," admits Yates. "In fact, we have avoided nearly every famous landmark along its banks and bluffs."

What viewers will see, he informs, is a hard, colorful picture — with appropriate and characteristic comments by David Brinkley — of what the legendary "Ol' Man River" is really like.

Taking precedence in the program over the Mississippi itself, will be the people who live along its banks and who, in effect, have made the river what it is today. Among the many to be seen and heard are:

Leander Pezes, a political figure of Plaquemines Parish, La., who is reconstructing a Spanish fort in the bayous to imprison any possible integration demonstrators.

Richard Bissell, author of "Pajama Game" and "Say,

Darling," who lives on a houseboat on the river near Dubuque, Iowa.

J. Kahlke, octogenarian proprietor of a firm once known as the "General Motors of the Mississippi steamboats."

Ralph Richman, who makes a living catching grasshoppers to sell to fishermen at a dollar a quart.

As for the river itself, says Yates, it is a "has-been whose importance rests mainly in nostalgia. Evil sounding and smelling Diesel tow boats move a staggering tonnage of bulk commodities up and down the river, and, on weekends, several million outboards buzz around. But what the old river towns want today is not the river. They want super-highways, airports, and factories."

"The program is apt to shatter some of the Mississippi River fantasy we hold for fact," Yates concludes. "But it might also introduce a new river — not a commonplace river, but in all ways a remarkable river."

The background score for "Our Man on the Mississippi" was arranged by noted jazz guitarist Charlie Byrd. Excerpts of a rare 1920 Fletcher Henderson record is played in one sequence. Included is a solo by New Orleans clarinetist George Lewis.

Coins Loot Found In Depot Locker

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—Detectives looked in a locker in the Bridgeport railroad station last night and found a coin collection valued at \$30,000.

It was part of the loot taken from the home of Arthur Almbinder of Wantagh, N.Y. last Monday night, police said. Also taken was jewelry valued at \$20,000 and \$4,700 in cash.

Six men have been arrested in connection with the robbery. Some of the jewelry and \$2,350 of the money have been recovered but the rest of the loot is still unaccounted for, police said.

Patrick Chenero, 44, and Thomas Hill, 18, both of Monroe, a town north of Bridgeport, were arrested Saturday night. Chenero is the father of two youths already accused in the robbery. Chenero and Hill were charged with receiving stolen goods.

Police said Hill brought some of the loot to the Chenero home. Chenero's son, Michael, 18, and Michael Orfino, 23, of Bridgeport, were arraigned last week on charges of being fugitives from justice. Young Chenero was turned over to police in New York. Orfino refused to waive the extradition proceedings.

Another son of Chenero, Patrick, 20, was arrested in Mineola, N.Y. last Tuesday with Frank Richey, 21, of Bridgeport. They were charged with first degree robbery.

The coin collection was recovered when two Nassau County, N.Y. detectives, Sgt. John Farley and Lincoln Wangerlin, received anonymous phone calls that the collection was in the locker and the locker key was hidden in the men's room of the railroad station.

The detectives had been staying in Bridgeport in the investigation of the Long Island robbery.

GOP Hits Conkling

HARTFORD (AP)—State Finance Commissioner George C. Conkling is a "shadow governor," says Connecticut Republican Chairman A. Searle Pinney.

Pinney said in a weekend statement that Conkling has tried to do things of "questionable legality" that have "obviously been in opposition to the best interests of the State of Connecticut."

Shuttle Plane Burns, 10 Die

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP)—A crippled South Central Airlines passenger plane crashed and burned immediately after take off today, killing all aboard the twin-engine craft. Ten persons were believed in the plane.

An eye witness said the plane was about 200 feet in the air when its left engine failed and the plane turned over on its left side and plunged to the edge of the runway.

Several persons ran from the airport and tried frantically to tear off the plane door but heat drove them back.

"We were trying to get the door open but it was too hot," said Miss Jo Ann Rowell, a secretary. "We could see two people inside. They were burning."

Miss Rowell said she went outside the terminal when she heard the engine falter. She said she knew then there was trouble.

The plane, one of eight owned by the shuttle airline which serves small cities in Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas was Flight 510 which originated in Ocala. It was en route to Jacksonville.

An airline spokesman said the plane was carrying 21 passengers and one crew member.

Quarter of N.Y. Pupils In Boycott—'A Fizzle'

50 Per Cent Participation Was Expected

NEW YORK (AP)—An estimated quarter of New York City's million pupils boycotted the nation's largest public school system today demanding total racial integration.

The participation in the one-day demonstration was about half that anticipated by boycott leaders. The chairman of the board of Education, James B. Donovan, called it "mostly a fizzle."

Children remained away from classes because of "a regular campaign of intimidation," Donovan asserted.

Donovan did not report the amount of absenteeism among the million-pupil school system.

A boycott spokesman, however, estimated participation at 282,000 children, about half what the movement leaders had anticipated.

There are about 440,000 Negro and Puerto Rican children in the public schools.

Efforts to keep the children away from schools were like offering them candy and ice cream, Donovan said.

The Citywide Committee set up "freedom schools" in churches throughout the city to keep the pupils off the streets.

Dick Gregory, the Negro comedian, flew here from Atlanta, Ga., and told one of the classes of his experiences in the racial movement in the South.

A spot check indicated poor attendance at the one-day schools.

Even at the public schools with almost empty classrooms there was some attendance by Negro and Puerto Rican children.

"We just wanted to come to school," said two Negro boys among the 570 pupils attending Haaren High School, a boy's high on the West Side of Manhattan. Its enrollment of 1,800 is about equally divided among white, Negro and Puerto Rican.

But the city's 850 schools remained open in the face of the demonstration—even those institutions with high absenteeism and some teachers marching in the civil rights picket lines.

Shortly after class bells rang, authorities reported about 2,700 pickets outside 300 schools. This

Tax Primer 5 When Marriage Fails

(Fifth of 10 Articles)

Along with its human wreckage, a marriage broken by divorce or separation leaves a host of tax problems and confusion. This article will tell how to handle alimony and support payments on 1963 tax returns.

A man who itemizes deductions may deduct alimony or separate maintenance payments as they are defined in the tax law.

He may not deduct payments which have been specifically designated as support for minor children.

Whatever money is deducted by the man as alimony or separate maintenance is, however, taxable income for the woman who receives it.

Child support payments, since they are not deductible for the man, are not considered taxable income for the woman.

To be deductible, alimony and separate maintenance payments must satisfy each of the following tests:

They must be required under or incident to a court decree of either divorce or separate maintenance or under a written separation agreement or a support decree.

They must have been either paid in discharge of a legal obligation based upon the marriage or family relationship, or required by the support decree, or made under the separation agreement and because of the marriage or family relationship.

They must have been paid after the decree of divorce or separation, or after the separation agreement.

They must generally have been what the law calls "periodic payments."

(It is true that certain installment payments of a total fixed amount of alimony may be deductible even though they do not technically qualify as "periodic payments." But you must check carefully to see whether such installment payments of a specific total sum are in this category.)

What is meant by "periodic payments?" They may be either payment of fixed amounts for an indefinite period of time or payment of an indefinite amount (like a percentage of salary) for a fixed or indefinite period. They need not be made at regular intervals.

Generally, fixed payments for a fixed period of less than 10 years are not periodic payments and are not deductible. The only exception to this is where a contingency, such as death or re-

Viet Cong Raids American Billet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Two Communist guerrillas were killed and one U.S. officer wounded today in the first Viet Cong raid on an American military compound since 1959.

Maj. Gen. Charles J. Timmes, commander of the U.S. Military Advisory Assistance Command in Viet Nam, flew to the mountain city of Kontum, 260 miles northeast of Saigon, to present the Army Commendation Medal to the soldier who killed the guerrillas, Spec. 4 Gale D. Filim of Fowler, Kan.

The award is the highest that Timmes is authorized to give without reference to a higher command.

The grenade attack was made at 4:30 a.m. on the headquarters of a detachment of 130 U.S. officers and men in Kontum. It was the most daring Viet Cong exploit against an American unit since terrorists in 1969 invaded a movie performance at an American billet and killed a U.S. major and a sergeant with grenades and machine-gun fire.

Filim was on sentry duty because the Vietnamese Civil Guards stationed at the compound had deserted. It was believed they might have been involved in the plan to attack the compound.

Under cover of darkness, four guerrillas cut their way through a barbed wire fence around the compound.

While one guerrilla stood guard at the fence, three others ran toward a building housing field grade officers, who range in rank from major through colonel.

Filim opened fire with his rifle but the intruders made it into the building and each tossed one grenade.

One grenade went off in the room of a U.S. officer, wounding him and setting the building afire.

As the terrorists ran for the fence, Filim opened fire again. They shot back but missed and Filim killed two of them. The other two guerrillas escaped in the darkness.

The wounded officer, whose identity was not announced, suffered burns, cuts and scrapes but was not in serious condition. He was taken to a field hospital at Nha Trang.

On Saturday night a bomb blast outside a Saigon bar killed

Space Experts Sift Tapes To Trace Ranger Failure

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Space scientists sifted through coded tapes today in a search for the reason why spacecraft Ranger 6 plunged into the moon in the Ranger program. The cost to date: \$168 million—figured at \$28 million a shot.

Ranger 6 was the first of the costly spacecraft to complete its historic rendezvous—and six television cameras aboard wouldn't function.

Experts at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory here, who controlled the spacecraft's voyage, hope to find out what went wrong by Feb. 28—the probable date of the launching of Ranger 7.

Laboratory directors went ahead with plans for Ranger 7's flight—an identical photo mission—pointing out that the Ranger series is designed to

gather information needed for manned U.S. landings planned later this decade.

The fruitless journey of Ranger 6 was the sixth straight failure in the Ranger program. The cost to date: \$168 million—figured at \$28 million a shot.

Ranger 6 was the first of the costly spacecraft to complete its historic rendezvous—and six television cameras aboard wouldn't function.

The camera system was considered one of the simplest mechanisms on the 804-pound spacecraft.

It was turned on by a command flashed from the ground. There was also an automatic timer aboard to do the job.

Security Boss Takes Life in German Jail

DORTMUND, Germany (AP)—Ewald Peters, Chancellor Ludwig Erhard's chief security officer, hanged himself during the night in the jail where he was being held on suspicion of war crimes, the state prosecutor's office announced today.

The prosecutor's office said Peters used a bed sheet for a rope and tied it to the window of his cell.

Peters had made the security arrangements for Erhard's trip to visit President Johnson in Texas last December as well as for his recent visits to London and Rome. He was arrested in Bonn last Friday after he returned from Rome with the chancellor.

He was being held in the Bonn jail on suspicion of taking part in mass killing of Jews in the Soviet Union during World War II.

Peters was one of two leading members of Erhard's government accused of war crimes. The government is investigating Communist charges that Refuge Minister Hans Krueger committed such crimes during the Nazi occupation of Poland. Krueger resigned Saturday, saying he had committed no crimes but did not want to damage the government.

Details of the charges against Peters were not made public. However, a government official said he had been the head of a police unit.

He had been investigated in 1960 by the Central War Crimes Office at Ludwigsburg but not

PROPOSES TUNNEL
GROTON (AP)—Marine contractor Clarence B. Sharp of Groton has proposed construction of a 10-mile tunnel under Long Island Sound between Rocky Neck and Orient Point, Long Island, as an alternative to the proposed 23-mile bridge crossing from Orient Point to Napatree Point south of Westerly, R. I. Sharp, well known as a bridge sub-stage builder, says a tunnel between the two points would cost an estimated \$70 million against an estimated \$280 million for the bridge. Residents of Watch Hill, R. I., and Groton Long Point are fighting plans for the bridge proposed by the Tri-State Bridge Committee.

LINERS HIT PIERS
NEW YORK (AP)—Two ocean liners, including the world's largest, crashed into their piers today while docking without the aid of strike-tugs. In both incidents, damage to the ships and piers was slight and no one was hurt. On her first attempt the Queen Elizabeth, biggest passenger craft afloat, knocked out a small portion of the pier's roof and broke windows on a movable cargo door. The second try was successful except for a minor broadside bump. The Italian liner Cristoforo Colombo, carrying 525 passengers from Italy, struck her Hudson River berth, damaging two steel girders on the pier's upper deck. Shortly afterward, the liner tied up successfully.

SHIPPING TIED UP
BOSTON (AP)—A strike by ship watchmen, employed to guard cargoes, tied up shipping in Boston harbor today. The walkout halted cargo work on 13 ships, including one which was ready to load wheat for the Soviet Union. About 275 watchmen were involved. Their walkout killed some 1,500 longshoremen and 400 other dock workers. James Boylan, business agent for the union, said the issue is the number of paid holidays and seniority provisions.
