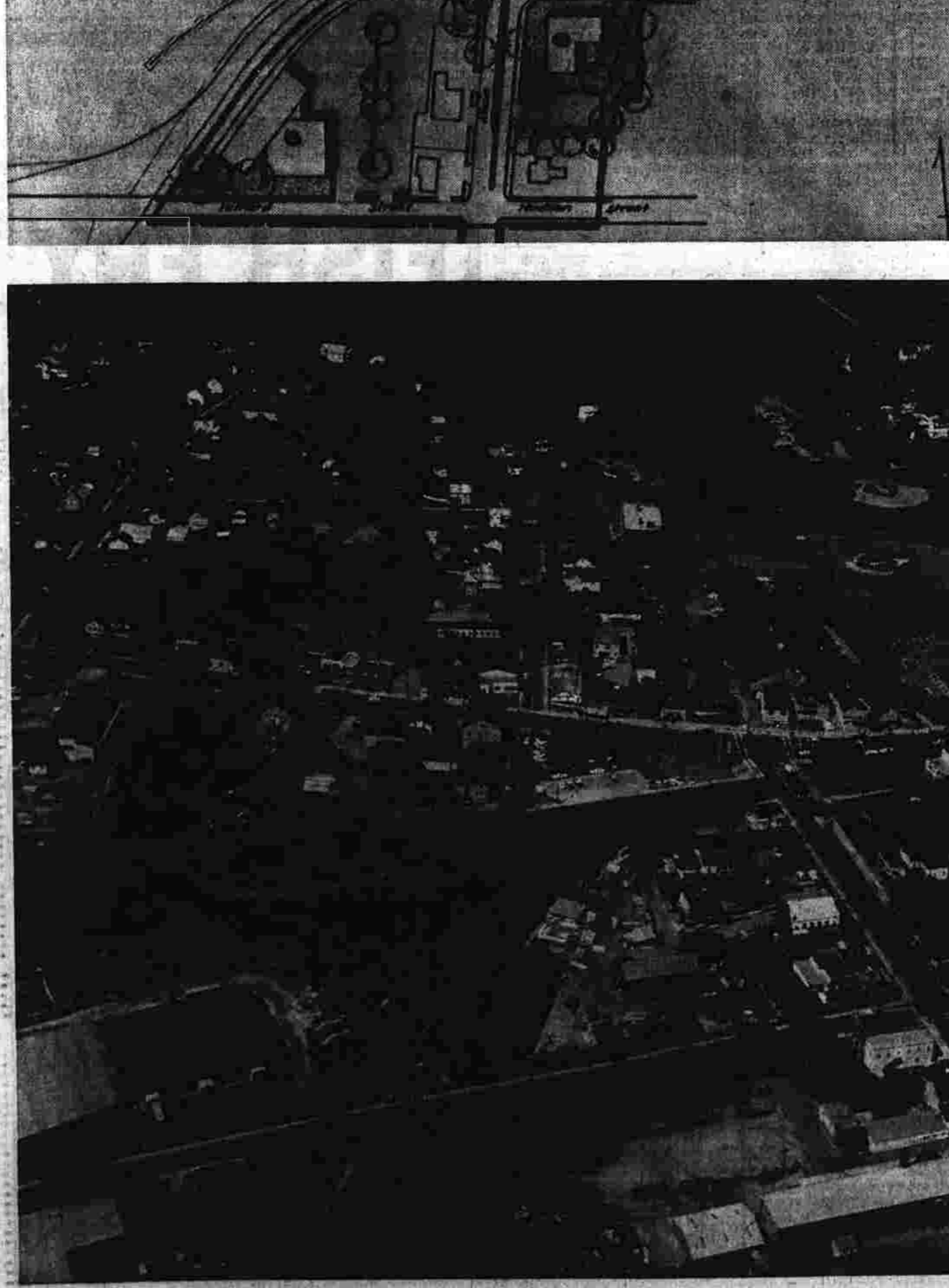

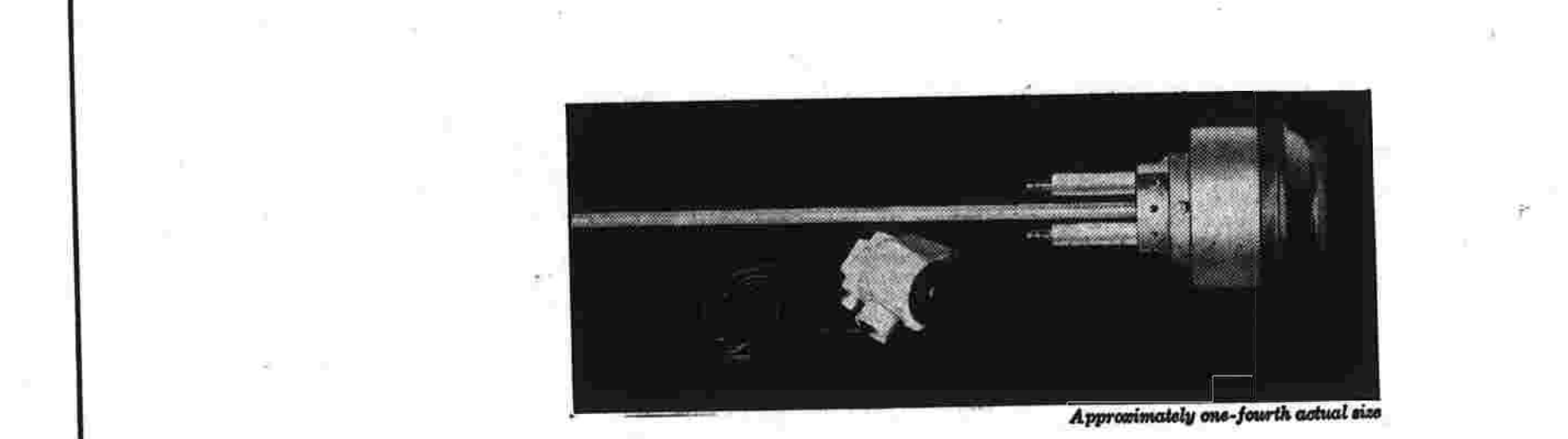

Turkington Opposes Shift In Town Executive Officer

At last night's informal meeting between the board of directors and the Charter Revision Commission (CRC), Republican Director Harold A. Turkington opposed the CRC's recommendation that the chairman of the board of directors (mayor) become the town's chief executive officer.

Turkington said, "I am opposed to the suggestion that appointive powers be vested in one member of the board."

He added, "The mayor is only a part-time employee, as we all are, and is not elected to the post of mayor by the people, but by the rest of the board. Appointments should be made by the whole board, and not by one member of it."

CRC member Leonard Saunders replied, "In all the references that we studied, the power of appointment was vested in one person."

He added, "We don't feel that the general manager should be making appointments to policy-making bodies."

Turkington asked CRC member Beison Schaffer, "Is it your intent that the executive not be the general manager?"

Schaffer replied, "Yes."

CRC Chairman Atty. Plegier explained, "We didn't attempt to take away any powers from the general manager, but we felt he belonged there."

The most significant thing that the CRC has the authority to do is to place policy-making functions with the board of directors, where they belong."

"Historically, in this country, we've had the mayor as the chief executive officer," he added, "the body which represents the electorate should act to govern the town."

Atty. Plegier added, "In some cases, because of state restrictions, we have been unable to go as far as we wanted in restricting the general manager's powers, but perhaps we can do so at some future date."
