Medicare and Rights Tests for Johnson

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two tests of President Johnson's ability to compare with President John F. Kennedy's are being made in the Medicare and rights bills.

The Medicare bill face grants two of his major programs. These—civil rights and medical care for the aged—are Johnson's two most controversial programs, as they were Kennedy's. Kennedy never got to first base with either of them.

There had been some preliminary action on civil rights by the time he died. Medical care remained frozen and unpassed in Congress for his entire presidency.

The test of Johnson's leadership with Congress is not in just getting passage of some kind of civil rights and medical care bills. The test is whether these bills, if and when passed, have strength and meaning.

When Johnson took office Congress was already floundering with Kennedy's civil rights bill and one other major program, a tax cut. Johnson at once passed them both as his own, exactly as he had inherited them.

By the time Kennedy died last November he had already lost hope for medical care bill for 1963. Monday Johnson sent Congress his own message on medical care, asking for its passage this year.

But there is one thing to be noted about this Johnson message. He didn't say he was asking for speedy passage of the bill. Kennedy proposed. It seems fair to say he was suggesting a bill somewhat similar to Kennedy's.

The heart of Kennedy's proposal had been hospital insurance based on Social Security payments. Monday Johnson said this "is clearly the best method."

But he didn't spell out any details, whereas Kennedy did in each of his messages since 1961. For instance: 80 days of hospital care with a maximum of \$90 to be paid by the patient.

The Kennedy bill face grants opposition both in Congress and from the American Medical Association. Presumably Johnson will, too, if he tries to get exactly what Kennedy wanted, although he nowhere said he would.

If he can get a truly meaningful medical care bill through Congress this year, it should be a good sign for Johnson's leadership. There are 115 million people over 65 in this country.

In Johnson's less than three months in the presidency this much is clear in any comparison with Kennedy: He is far more persistent in handling Congress for action.

But action is not necessarily achievement. It can, through compromise, turn what looked like a strong presidential program into a toothless tiger. In Congress there are two kinds of compromise.

One, resisted fiercely until made necessary by the strength or reasonableness of the opposition, still manages to retain the original legislation's basic strength.

The other is just a performance—an illusion of action—that yields right and left until the final product is more symbol than substance.

The civil rights and medical care programs should reveal before the year is out how much Johnson has a fight for legislation with teeth or how much he is willing to compromise.

He called himself a compromiser once when he explained: "I never, I try to get some-

Cut in Tax Is for Many Hike in Pay

NEW YORK (AP)—Just as a pay raise is the way most employees are likely to greet the federal income tax cut when it shows up next month in their take-home pay.

For most of them look on the take-home amount as their real pay. They tend to ignore the gross figure the employer pays the worker.

And take-home pay is set to rise, although some juggling will still have to be done by many taxpayers in squaring their final accounts with the U.S. Treasury.

From the gross amount, which the employer doesn't see except as a token figure, the employees withhold money for various city or state taxes, pension funds, Social Security taxes, insurance, hospitalization and other deductions.

But the figure on the check itself or the bill the employer is what many employees regard as their pay.

And when the official withholding rate for federal income taxes drops from 18 per cent to 14 per cent, this money-in-hand is to rise.

For many the "pay raise" will have some temporary aspects, says one illustration.

For a worker in the lowest pay brackets, the 14 per cent withholding will still be too high. And at the end of the year he will have a return coming from the tax collector. But he'll have to wait the money until then—many are used to doing right now.

For those in higher brackets, the 14 per cent withholding will be too small to cover the full amount due. Employees in these brackets, unless they ask the boss to withhold a larger sum, will have to increase the amount payments they make in settling the difference between the total withheld and the estimated tax due. This they declare each April.

And this April the taxpayer will be making out his return on 1963 income along one set of rules and figuring out his 1964 deduction along another set. With all the help the Internal Revenue Service may plan to clear this up for the taxpayer, this April's tussle with forms and scratch pads may be colorful.

But before that the "pay raise" in the weekly check will have gladdened many hearts. The IRS is preparing tables for employers, based on the standard deductions for various family sizes, and using the new withholding rates. Amateur tax buffs may find that pay increased by less than they figured it—or even by more.

But some increase there should be. And then starts the real family discussion: "How shall we spend that pay raise?"

The Freedom Not Taken

Abraham Lincoln would consider the racism of today even more pitiable and degraded in their living than the Negro before Emancipation.

And Abraham Lincoln, in his attitude toward Emancipation, had a double-barreled objective.

One was to give freedom from the obvious chains of the formal and legal ties of the institution of slavery.

This was his solicitude for the direct victims of the institution of slavery.

His second solicitude was for all those Americans who were automatically considered themselves "free," but who were, in Lincoln's wisdom, themselves captive to the ugliness and the degradation of being their own living on the subjugation, the mastery, of other human beings.

In Lincoln's book, the masters, too, were tragic victims of the barbarism of the system in which they lived.

In his policy, then, Lincoln hoped to free both components of that system.

"In giving freedom to the slave," he told his Congress, "we assure freedom to the free."

In all the years since he said those words and performed the act they described, the gift has not yet been made perfect.

And, as the news illustrates every day of our own lives, this nation has to keep struggling to free itself from the degradation of the slave.

And they are still perhaps the most pitiable among us—those who, calling and fancying themselves to be free and American, are still unable to strike the blench and the poison out of their own living, and thus realize, at last, the frustration Abraham Lincoln intended for them too.

War Can Be Beautiful

Not only the good red-blooded people in Soviet Russia who believe in the practicality and possibility of war should be glad that Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky, the Russian Defense Minister, has called in the Soviet cultural leaders and admonished them against letting too much concentration on the horror, futility, or treachery of war creep into their work.

Believers everywhere in the necessity of an occasional war should also be heartened.

In these times of trouble and doubt for the institution of war, there are good many people everywhere who have some instinct to question whether any more war can really be afforded. It has been an invaluable rebuttal to be able to point to the full-blown, unimpaired survival of the military spirit inside Russia, and pointing to that, find in it that absolute compulsion which requires other people to accept the practicability of war too.

For Russia to weaken and change, for Russia to go civilized and pacifist, such a development might undermine the future prospects of war everywhere.

There will be good cheer, then, in military circles in other nations, that Marshal Malinovsky has called in the Russian creative artists and warned them against producing anything which might, in some sickly and sophisticated way, or even in some supposedly humanistic way, take the glory and heroism out of war.

Some of the rules Marshal Malinovsky would apply to treatment of the subject of war might be considered elsewhere.

"The artist," said the Marshal, "cannot confine himself to a position of abstract humanitarianism and objectivism and forget about the lofty objectives of the struggle that were inscribed on our banners."

Deeds of heroism, the Marshal warned, must not be portrayed as if they just happened out of the blue, or out of the impulse of some undisciplined character.

Such an approach, the Marshal said, "falsely suggests that one need not be prepared inwardly and physically to perform such a deed, and that the minimum of the necessary for all the work we do to form the new man."

In summary, the Marshal warned the Russian writers and painters and film producers, even when they look on the seamy side of war they "must do so from a positive viewpoint and must understand that it is expected to strengthen, and not to weaken, our ideological position."

And he warned the Russian people against the importation of writings by foreign authors who might be pacifist, lacking in admiration for "genuine heroism." He wants them to read less of western books on "All the Way from the Front," which committed the sin of making war seem unattractive even before five bombers and nuclear bombs were invented.
