Events In State: CEA Hails Levy For School Use As a Landmark.

HARTFORD (AP)—The passage of a special tax levy for school purposes in Meriden has been hailed by the president of the Connecticut Education Association (CEA) as an "unprecedented victory for education in Connecticut."

Dr. Frank A. Formica, in a statement issued last night, said that the appropriation Feb. 18 by the Meriden Tax Board of an additional \$188,000 for the school budget marks a "major turning point for education in Meriden and a breakthrough in the long struggle for financing of other Connecticut communities."

The CEA head also said that Meriden is the second Connecticut community in 15 days to vote for a tax levy to increase the bulk of which was for school purposes.

Some \$298,000 was restored to the Waterbury education budget on Feb. 18.

Said Formica: "Meriden and Waterbury are to be applauded for having successfully faced up to major school problems at this time."

Rules, Objectives Listed For Oak Grove Nature Area

The Town Conservation Commission (TCC) has drawn up a list of objectives, rules and regulations regarding operation of the Oak Grove Nature Center, and has sent them to General Manager Richard M. Taylor for his approval. The 10-acre tract, in the southeast section of town, has been set aside by the town board of directors as a perpetual nature preserve, and was placed under the jurisdiction of the TCC. If the general manager approves the rules and regulations for the operation of the preserve (and he has indicated that he will), he must determine how, and by whom, the rules will be enforced. In listing the objectives, the TCC has asked to make clear its recommendation that the use of the preserve will be restricted to Manchester residents, but will be open to children, schools and groups from the surrounding area. (1) To provide an outdoor laboratory for the school children of Manchester, so that classes from any school in Manchester can come to the center to study natural resources and to benefit from direct, first-hand experience with all local resources. (2) To provide facilities to help with the training of teachers, youth leaders and day camp counselors in the greater Manchester area in natural science and conservation through workshops and extension courses. (3) To cooperate with colleges of the area to help with the education and training of teachers, youth leaders and others, by providing facilities at the out-of-door. (4) To provide recreational and study opportunities for Manchester family groups interested in natural history and conservation. (5) To give each visitor to the Center the opportunity to see, feel, hear and know the out-of-door, and sense what it means to the community; and to understand the complex inter-relationships between the soil and climate and between the plants and wildlife that live there. (6) This land shall be open to the public for nature conservation and educational purposes.

(5) The area is to be closed to the public from one-half hour after sunset until one-half hour before sunrise, unless specific permission is granted by the Conservation Commission. WASHINGTON (AP) — A Cuban invasion veteran has de- clared that 168 exiled officers in training with the U.S. armed forces want to quit to fight Fidel Castro on their own.

A total of 210 Cuban brigade officers have been trained by the U.S. military since last March, a Defense Department spokesman said Wednesday night, and of these 171 remain on duty.

Hebron Middle West Letter Topic Of Mr. Keen

The Rev. Harold R. Keen, former rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Hebron, now a resident of Ottawa, Ill., writes to some former parishioners de- scribing some differences be- tween the Middle West and New England. He also notes some resemblances, many of the early settlers having come from the New England area.

But the land there is mostly flat, level prairie type, few trees, black soil, with very few if any rocks or stones. Here and there, he says, there are industrial towns, especially in the river valleys, workers coming from many parts of Europe.

What a good geography lesson. What a nice place to live, hence there instead of the hill, hundreds of beef cattle, pigs, and sheep and acres and acres of corn and soy beans.



During the debate, Rep. Carl Albert, D-Ala., chairman of the House subcommittee on the bill, said the committee was "not in a hurry to vote on the bill."

Rep. Samuel S. Stratton, D-N.Y., offered an amendment to the bill that would require the Air Force to submit a report on the bill's progress to the House.

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

Congress Action Unlikely in 1964 On Redistricting

WASHINGTON (AP) — Outside of some complaining and possibly a committee hearing for the official record, Congress isn't likely to do anything this year about the Supreme Court ruling that congressional districts should be more uniform in population.

"For one thing," a highly placed House Democrat said privately, "we just don't have time this year to deal with such a complicated subject. For another thing, most of us think it's more of our business how the states map out their districts."

Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., of the House Judiciary Committee long has advocated that Congress take the lead in trying to get more uniformity in congressional redistricting.

He said he would try again this year but wasn't optimistic about success.

Another proposal not expected to gain acceptance came from Texas congressmen. They are seeking legislation that supports the Supreme Court decision but reserves present districting until state legislatures can act in the regular session.

The bill would prevent the 23 Texas congressmen from having to act at large this November.

A three-judge federal court at Houston has ruled the Texas districting unconstitutional, but the decision has been stayed pending an appeal.

The sub of Monday's Supreme Court ruling was that congressional districts should be more equal in population than those now are. Currently, they range from more than 800,000 to less than 300,000. Based on the 1960 census, the average would be about 400,000.

Celler's bill would require that the variation in population of districts in any state shall not exceed 10 percent.

The Celler proposal would not become effective until after the next national election in 1970. The states then would have two years in which to enact new redistricting laws where necessary.

Senators, who run from states instead of districts, generally look at redistricting proposals as something that should be initiated by the House and then be handled by Congress at large.

"That's quite a harsh indictment, but unfortunately it's true. Just look around and see what is happening to those who have reached old age ahead of you. Do you want it to happen to you, when it's your turn? It will, unless your community makes a real effort to include its older citizens in its active life."

Flash Fire Kills Eight In Chicago

CHICAGO (AP)—A flash fire set off by a burning mattress swept through a West Side home today, killing seven children and a man who perished in a futile attempt to rescue the four boys and three girls.

The parents of the children and their eight child escaped from the fast spreading flames. The father, detective James Alfred, 37, suffered serious burns and smoke inhalation as he tried in vain to rescue the children from the top floor of the 1 1/2 story brick bungalow. He was reported in serious condition in a hospital.

Alford's wife, Gloria, 35, and the couple's oldest child, Keith, 13, escaped unharmed from the dwelling with only minor cuts. The boy smashed a window on the top floor and Alford was able to get out.

Fire officials said that when they arrived at the home, flames were pouring from all windows and through the roof of the smoke-filled house. The fireman had arrived minutes after the blaze started.

Alford told police and fire officials that the fire started in Robinson's mattress in his room on the first floor. When the fire started, the children were sleeping in another bedroom. She said she and her husband were awakened by dense smoke about 1:30 a.m. and saw Robinson carrying a smoldering mattress into the bathroom to douse it.

Mrs. Alford said her husband smashed a first floor window to get out. Immediately, the flames spread up the stairwell to the top floor.

Robinson ran up the stairs in an attempt to rescue the children. Keith smashed a window on the top floor and leaped to the ground. The smoke and flames spread rapidly through the top floor and Alford was able to get out.





Budget Bid For Welfare At \$61,476

The Town Welfare Department has asked \$61,476 in its budget request for the forthcoming 1964-65 fiscal year, a reduction of about \$7,000 from the 1963-64 allocation.

The request, submitted to General Manager Joseph P. Macey, is the welfare department's expected expenditures during the current budget period, estimated to be \$61,525.

Much of the expected surplus in this year's budget has already been reallocated to other overdrawn accounts.

The bulk of the 1964-65 budget request decrease reflects a drop in welfare payments during the current fiscal year.

The directors budgeted \$47,900 for direct welfare payments this year, but the department expects to expend only about \$40,000.

Expected increases over last year fall in the salary account, where about \$225,000 will be needed to meet the yearly salary increase which has been tentatively set by General Manager Martin, and in the rental account, which must pay for a full year's rental of the Welfare Department office on Main St.

Until last year the department was housed in a town-owned building located where the new central firehouse is now being constructed.

HARTFORD (AP)—After decades of being the minority party in the House at the General Assembly, Democrats are gleefully working out details of a re-appointment plan that would give them control.

The Democratic plan, which envisions a 200-seat House, will be submitted to the U.S. District Court on or before March 2. This is about two-thirds the size of the House at the 1963 session.

When the three-judge panel ruled on Feb. 10 that both the House and Senate must be re-appointed, March 2 was set as the deadline for interested parties to submit proposals.

The court has ordered the state to make whatever changes necessary in House size to assure each citizen in the state an equal vote in electing state representatives and senators. Put another way, this means each senator must represent about the same number of constituents as the House member and a similar balance has been ordered among members of the House.

On March 18 the judge will hold a hearing on re-appointment proposals. Time after the hearing they will be referred to a panel of 11 judges in detail just what must be done.

At a meeting in Hartford last night, more than 100 Democratic Party leaders and party registrars of voters talked over the House reappointment plan. The party leadership is expected to offer to the court's consideration.

It was learned the population unit would be about 12,000 persons per district. This means Hartford and New Haven would have 32 representatives apiece and Bridgeport would have 24. The present system, no town or city has more than two representatives.
