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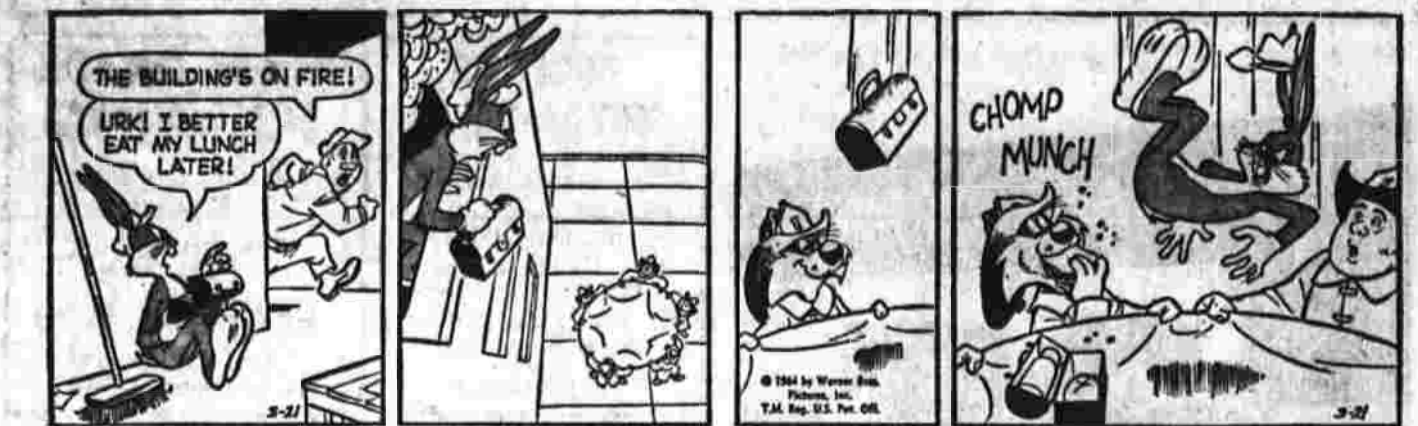

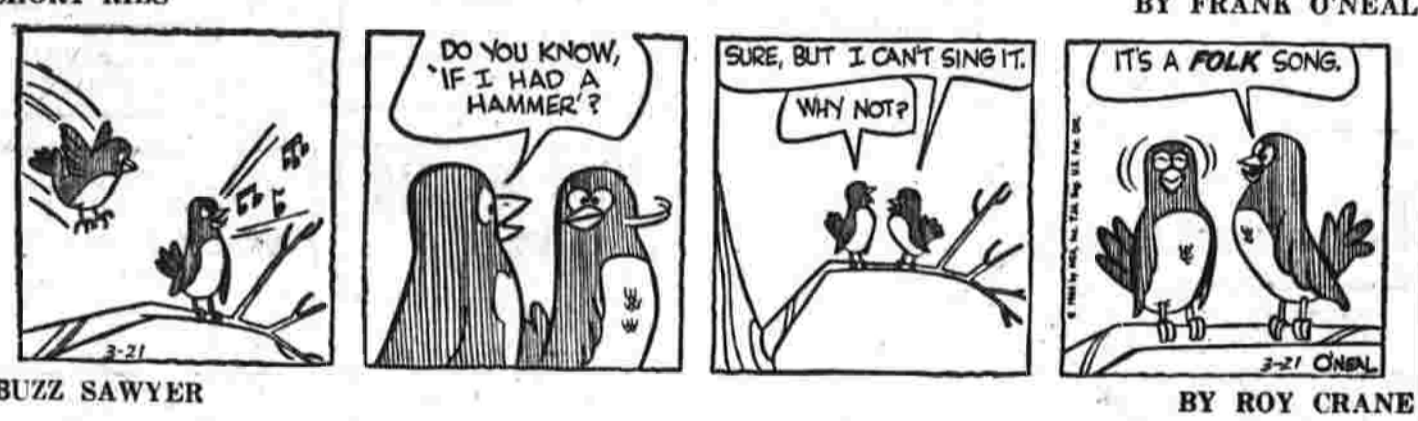

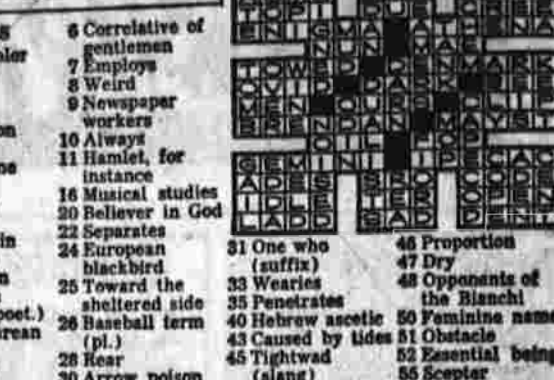

The Beverly Hillbillies

NEW YORK — (NEA) — You can't argue with success, but perhaps it's O.K. to discuss it a little bit. So saying, we will listen to what Paul Hensing has to say about the philosophy behind his two creations, The Beverly Hillbillies and Petticoat Junction.

"I just set out to entertain the people," says Hensing, who wears shoes and a necktie. "Especially the people between New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. I know these people. I'm from Independence, Mo. As a kid, I went to Boy Scout camp outside Noel, Mo., which has no population to speak of. From Noel, we'd go for a 14-mile hike into the country. So I know country people.

"As for myself, I always liked hillbilly humor. When I would listen to Bob Burns, I used to lie on the floor so I wouldn't fall down laughing.

"I love country humor. But I love Nichols and May, too. I think Dick Van Dyke is the best comedian on television. I'd like to do a sophisticated comedy on television, but my doctor says no—I have very high blood pressure."

He is trying to take it easy. He has temporarily abandoned any thought of creating another show. He no longer does anything on Petticoat Junction. He has taken on an assistant — a

former mail room boy named Mark Tuttle — to help him write The Beverly Hillbillies. All those nonfolks back in Noel, Mo., are happy now, with two knee-slappers to laugh at. They have Paul Hensing to thank.

Bert Lawrence is a producer, who has gone from the sublime (producing commercials) to the sublime (shooting programs all over the world).

Lawrence's show, Esso World Theater, is seen in only seven cities, because the sponsor is barred from national sponsorship, he says, by an antitrust ruling. But in those seven cities it has attracted considerable attention.

It is a series of eight, possibly nine, shows which focus on the national theater in various national theaters in such spots as Nigeria, Japan, France, Sweden and India.

Just a year ago, Lawrence was making commercials for Esso. The company liked them, and encouraged him when he proposed his idea for a general program. His firm—"myself, an associate producer, a secretary and some good encouragement from my wife"—now travels all over the world to shoot its unique hour.

Because his firm is so small, the sponsor finances him, paying his expenses and deducting them from his fee. It is an unusual way for a producer to get around the world, but it beats walking.

In a column on Steve Allen recently, the statement was made that his show was seen in "relatively few cities."

Steve takes polite umbrage at that characterization. He points out that the 45 stations that carry his program can hardly be called "relatively few." He is right, of course.

While 45 does not a network make, it's still a good group. And, judging from Steve's success with this show, there will probably be more.

8 Comedies Among New Fall Shows

NEW YORK (AP) — The Columbia Broadcasting System, after weeks of planning and revisions of plans, has formally announced its fall schedule. It includes 13 new programs and 11 time-changes for returning shows.

If CBS is a trend leader, next fall's schedules on all networks should be a barrel of fun: Eight of the 13 new shows are comedies, and all are half-hour shows.

New programs include "Living Doll," a comedy with Julie Newmar playing a beautiful robot, and "Bill and Martha," with William Bendix and Martha Raye, another comedy. These will fill the Sunday night hour opposite NBC's "Bonanza," one of the toughest competitive spots in television.

Other comedy shows are "Many Happy Returns" on Monday night, about a man who works in the complaint department of a store; "The Cara Williams Show" on Wednesday, a husband-wife series; "The Munsters" on Thursday, a series about a family that look like Frankenstein monsters, with Fred Gwynne and Al Lewis; "The Balleys of Belboon," also on Thursday, with Paul Ford playing a marina owner in a yachting community; "Gomer Pyle" on Fridays, with Jim Nabors, in spin-off from the Andy Griffith show, playing a Marine recruit, and "Gilligan's Island" on Saturday, about a group of shipwrecked people.

There will be three new dramatic series. "Slattery's People" on Monday evening is the story of the minority leader of a state legislature. "Yours Truly, Danny Taylor" on Friday nights is a newspaper tale. "Mr. Broadway" on Saturday nights, with Craig Stevens, is an action-adventure series about a press agent who does amateur detecting.

Three Artistic Giants Who Aren't Retiring

Three giants in the world of the arts, all past 70 — sculptor Jacques Lipchitz, photographers Edward Steichen and operatic singer Lotte Lehmann — are the focus of attention on "The Best Is Yet To Be," to be broadcast on "Chronicle" this Wednesday from 7:30 to 8 p.m. on CBS-TV. Charles Collingwood is host-narrator.

The broadcast will show how these three people, and others, have maintained the spirit of creativity and intense driving devotion to active life after passing the commonly accepted age of retirement in our society.

Lipchitz, whose sculptures are on exhibit at museums the world over, is still steadily working at commissions that fill his day. The 73-year-old sculptor will be seen at his studio at Hastings-on-Hudson, N. Y.

Steichen, who will be 85 two

days after the broadcast, is currently at work on a film. He is famous for many photographic essays through the years and created "The Family of Man" exhibition for New York's Museum of Modern Art.

Mme. Lehmann, now 76 years old and living in Santa Barbara, Calif., was, for many years, one of the most renowned voices of opera and concert. "The musician's singer," as she was called, is now passing on her years of experience to a personally selected group of voice students in the studio that she maintains at her home.

Films of George Bernard Shaw at the age of 76 also will be included in "The Best Is Yet To Be," showing Shaw's wit and intellect in full flower. There will also be film footage of artist Pablo Picasso, at the age of 80 plus, illustrating his technique by painting on glass.

Wallendas — Show Goes On

"Why must the show go on?" and fell to her death.

Like the time that Karl's younger brother broke his neck in a fall into a net; or the time that Wallenda's nephew Gunther lost his wife in a circus accident; and as recently as last spring when Karl's sister-in-law blacked out while doing a headstand high atop a pole.

The reasons for the decision to continue, despite the many setbacks, and the very real emotional adjustments faced by the members of the troupe, are shown on the "Du Pont Show of the Week" special, "High Wire: the Great Wallendas," tomorrow from 10-11 p.m. on NBC-TV.

During a Sarasota, Fla., rehearsal of the act on a 12-foot practice wire, an accidental fall plunged the troupe to earth. And for a time, the very spirit of the troupe, which had soared so high for so long, appeared to have plunged to its lowest level.

But the spirit of Karl Wallenda remained undaunted. This was the man who had climbed to the top of a tent once with a broken pelvic bone and a 102-degree fever to perform his act.

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Tweedy 'Jane Hathaway' Really Sporty Nancy Kulp

HOLLYWOOD — The off-camera television identity of a certain blonde, blue-eyed young actress would come as a distinct shock to the uninitiated who might chance to glimpse her sipping around the West Coast in a sporty convertible.

Viewers who get plenty of laughs out of the prissy, tweedy, super-efficient secretary called Jane Hathaway of "The Beverly Hillbillies," presented Wednesdays on CBS-TV, would never recognize her as the attractive, personable young lady named Nancy Kulp who drives that snappy car around the Hollywood hills.

Off-screen, Miss Kulp is neither prissy nor tweedy nor spinterial. She loses her stolid face and manner when she takes off her makeup, and becomes something far removed from her Wednesday-night image as banker Drysdale's girl Friday.

Although she changes personality, Miss Kulp still retains a built-in ability to make people laugh. This in itself is a contradiction, since she is a serious-minded young woman who is funny in spite of herself. The fact is, Miss Kulp would really like to be a news broadcaster or a politician, rather than a comedy actress.

"But when I'm being serious, people think I'm being funny," she says. "I used to bother me, but I'm getting used to it. Now when I say something witty like 'Hello, I'm really hurt if I don't get a laugh.'"

Jane Hathaway's lines are created-producer-writer Paul Henning's, but they are tailor-made for Nancy Kulp's special brand of talent, which Henning himself helped develop in her role as Pamela Livingstone, the indomitable bird-watching spinster of "The Bob Cummings Show."

"I never realized I was funny until I did a bit part in my senior-class play in high school," Miss Kulp says. "I was supposed to be the prim and proper wife of a nutty professor, but it didn't turn out that way. The audience was so hysterical laughing at me that I went backstage and cried."

Fortunately, she has learned not to take herself so seriously. She now says, "A sense is the greatest saving grace any human being can have."

Miss Kulp's mirth-provoking personality overshadows her every attempt to be serious and leads to untold complications in her busy private life. A simple matter such as going shopping is likely to turn into an hilarious comedy of errors.

"One time I went into a department store to buy a small but expensive bottle of perfume. The clerk was so busy laughing and giggling every time I sniffed a different brand that she forgot to have me sign the sales slip."

"Another time I went to a lumber yard to have \$80 worth of painting cut to size for a room I was refinishing. The salesman just stood, stared and laughed when I gave him the measurements. Every plank was the wrong size."

If Nancy Kulp ever realizes her ambition to be a television reporter, she's likely to have the first comedy news broadcast.
