### PUC Approves Trial Of Buses to Parkade

The Connecticut Public Utilities Commission (PUC) has approved for a 30-day trial period a three-phase plan to route bus routes to serve W. Middle Tpk. and the Manchester Shopping Parkade.

A spokesman for the Commission said today that the new route would be added to the bus schedule as soon as the company receives notification of the PUC's approval.

Approval was also awarded to the Connecticut Co. for a route change that will permit buses to turn around in the Depot Square area without backing. A temporary permit was granted last month.

Since the W. Middle Tpk. route is only for a trial period, the PUC has instructed the bus line to "maintain records, patronage and revenues derived from the route extension, in order to assist the commission in determining whether its continuation would be warranted at the close of the trial period."

Both requests were presented to the PUC at a hearing in Hartford on March 12. At the hearing, the W. Middle Tpk. bus route request was supported by a representative of the First Interstate Realty Corp. who said the Connecticut Co. was the support of the request, the First Hartford representative testified that the route would aid patrons of the Manchester office of the State Employment Service. The state office is moving to the Parkade from a Main Street office building owned by Alexander Jarvis.

The route was approved by the PUC at a hearing in Hartford on March 12. At the hearing, the W. 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### Democrats Pick Delegates To Three June Conventions

Manchester's Democratic Town Committee last night approved a slate of delegates proposed by its executive committee to attend three June party conventions — but amidst opposition to the summary nomination in which some committee members said the slates were premature.

The opposition — which was voiced only after the slates in question had been approved — was expressed after Matthew Moriarty, a town committee member for about two months, was named a delegate to the Democratic State Convention.

Although the residents stated they opposed only that the executive committee overlooked long-time town committee members in choosing the slates, Moriarty rose to defend his party loyalty and his reason for wishing to attend the convention — to support Thomas J. Dodd's bid for re-nomination to the U.S. Senate.

Slates to the state and both other conventions were approved, however, without any substitutions, and Town Committee Chairman Ted Cummings later closed the meeting with a promise to be re-nominated (small "d") and an expression that "give and take" at the meeting was all for the best.

The meeting began last night shortly after 8 as about 50 Democrats packed into the Municipal Building hearing room. Election of convention slates came up as new business about an hour later.

### From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

By DOBBS BELDING

With the picnic that accompanies April Fool's Day, it might be different to serve Strawberry Fool Cake for dessert at the family be pleasantly surprised by the usual fooliness. Mrs. M. Adler Dobbin of 56 Clyde Rd. says this is one of her favorite cakes. When asked why it was so named, she referred to Webster's Dictionary and its definition of fool: "A desecrated, made of pulp, fruit, cream, with a custard and cream." Mrs. Dobbin also said that she was best known for her Fool Salad, a very simple recipe to prepare.

#### Strawberry Fool Cake

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons grated orange rind
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup baking powder
- 1/2 cup sifted all purpose flour

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter and flour a 10-inch tube pan. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add grated orange rind. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift together flour and baking powder, twice. Add dry ingredients alternately with orange juice mixing well after each addition. Spoon into pan and bake one hour. Cool and fill with fool.

**Fool**  
1 pint strawberries  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
Stems strawberries through stems and mix in pan with cream. Boil two minutes and add lemon juice. When hot, fold in cream, which has been beaten until stiff.

**Fool Salad**  
1 package lime gelatin  
1 large can peas  
1 small package cream cheese  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
Drain peas and heat juice almost to a boil, pour over gelatin and cream cheese, which has been creamed. When gelatin and cream cheese are dissolved, put mixture in refrigerator until partially set. Chop peas, and mix with cream. Add to gelatin mixture and pour into mold. Chill until set.

#### Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY—My husband always used to have trouble getting his tie tied so the ends were the proper length. I had him tie and retie one until it was correct. Then I cut it in two at the center back while he was on and tied. The raw edges were turned and gripper tape attached to each side. Now he just opens the tape, puts the tie in, closes the tape and pulls his collar down over it. All his ties have had this treatment and he is pleased and always looks assured. —MRS. D. E. GIRL—A hook and eye could be used to fasten the tie together in the center back.

DEAR POLLY—Last week I decided to entertain, so I called some of my girl friends and asked them to a Polly's Pointer party. DEAR POLLY—To insure the safety of emblem pins and also protect the dress fabric when the pins are worn, cut a small piece of iron-on tape and press it to the underside of the dress where the pins are worn. This makes a good base to pin to as well as being a protection to the dress. —MRS. JOE

### The Doctor Says

MANY CLUES HELP DOCTOR SOLVE HEADACHE PROBLEM BY WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT, M.D.

Newspaper Enterprise Assn., 10-11 am '76, and I have a constant headache in my head. It is usually worse at night. What causes this? Is there any help for it?

A—The most annoying thing about head noises is that you can't shut out the sounds by using earplugs, or by going into another room and closing the door. Head noises are usually worse at night because there is less background noise. There are many causes of these noises.

You should have your doctor determine the cause. The earlier corrective measures are applied the more likely you are to get relief.

In some persons allergy may be the cause. In others it may be an accumulation of hardened wax present in the ear drum.

Obstruction of the Eustachian tube leading from the throat to the middle ear is another cause. Such drugs as aspirin, quinine and streptomycin and heavy smoking will cause head noises in some persons. Sometimes, if they stop smoking, the noises will go away.

Relatively small amount of the drug will do it. In a person who is over 65, arteriosclerosis is the most likely cause. Here, one of the many drugs that dilates the arteries may give relief.

Otitis media, an inherited disease in which there is hardening of the eardrum that connects the middle ear of the inner ear, which enables you to hear, can be corrected by an operation.

Q—What would cause the corners of my mouth to crack? One corner will split and, just as it seems to be healed, the other side will crack.

A—Cracking of the corners of your mouth may be caused by low-grade infection. Different germs have been implicated. Anomalous mercury element or sulfadiazine ointment will usually clear up the infection. If this fails, a lotion containing amphotericin B should be applied two or three times a day.

Q—I have been taking Decadron for arthritis. Are there any harmful side effects?

A—Decadron (Dexamethasone) is closely related to cortisone and may cause the same side effects—peptic ulcer, moon face, softening of the bones, insomnia and hemorrhages in the skin. These effects occur only when large doses are continued for a prolonged period. This drug should be taken under regular medical supervision.
