

Rockville-Vernon William Pope Appointed Adult Evening School Head

The only applicant for the position of director of the Adult Evening School was selected to the post by a narrow margin. William A. Pope, guidance division at Rockville High School, was approved for the post by a four to three vote of the new Board of Education last night.

Opposition to his selection was not based on his ability. Disputers on the board felt that Pope's post is work enough without the added responsibility. The post pays \$2,000 per year.

Three applicants for the post of assistant principal at the high school will meet May 5 with board members for interviews. They were screened from a total of 35 applicants applying for the post.

The vacancy occurred when Joseph McCusker resigned. Martin Pagan, assistant principal, was promoted to the top school post.

Approval was voted to install five outside lights at the Skinner Road Elementary School. The board discussed promotion policies for the school. No action was taken to change the policies.

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Greeks Shell Positions at Castle, Pass

U.N. officers were reported trying to arrange a cease-fire. The twin objectives of the Greeks were the castle itself and the high point of the Noelia - Kyrenia highway, a pass over the mountains about a mile east of the castle.

Capture of these points would remove the last important Turkish threat to the Kyrenia area, a student at St. Paul's College, New York Jewish Theological Seminary.

The Turks have controlled the highway since the start of the civil war. The Greeks could drive south and open the road to the capital and the Kyrenia.

At Ayios Theodoros, scene of fighting for the past five days, shots were reported during the night and also during the day. Parties were seen outside the village. A tenuous cease-fire arranged by the United Nations Monday called for the armed Greek troops to withdraw from hills outside the town.

Incidents were reported at the base of Limesos, north of the Paphos. There were shots and a grenade blast were heard near the true line of the front.

At Mamonia, northeast of Paphos, U.N. troops reported 100 shots fired during the night. Shots were also fired during the day.

Two Firms Bid On New Pump

Bids for supplying the town fire department with a 750-gal. fire-minor pump were opened in the Municipal Building this morning, with only two companies, both of Elmira, N. Y., in competition.

The Ward LaFrance Truck Co. was the apparent low bidder, with a price of \$21,800, while the American LaFrance Co. (no relation) bid \$24,800.

The new pump will replace one of 1942 vintage, which will be retained for emergency use only.

Specifications call for the new piece of apparatus to be of the cab-forward-of-engine type, with a six cylinder engine of a capacity of at least 2,000 feet of fire hose, while the water tank will hold a minimum of 500 gallons of water.

The vehicle will be lacquered in fire-engine red, with the stripping and lettering in gold.

Ward LaFrance has promised delivery within 10 working days from the day the contract is awarded.

President John F. Kennedy, in his lone appearance at a chamber session, received the warmest of applause. Although former President Dwight D. Eisenhower never missed addressing the chamber's annual meeting in his eight years in office, the friendly reception he received never approached the storm of applause that Johnson won Monday.

The chamber's alarm for Johnson was the more recent, because Edwin F. Nelson, retiring chamber president, has been stumping the country for months denouncing the administration's domestic policy. Nelson, a Detroit lawyer, has accused Johnson of wearing "the false face of fragility." He has used such terms as "moralism," "sedition by subterfuge," "treason," "bribery" and "desecration" to describe the administration's foreign and domestic programs. Johnson warmed his business friends by telling them that the profit after taxes will nearly \$3 billion this year, up nearly \$2 billion over 1963.

But some were not so industrious. About 100 businessmen are going to call on industrial leaders to try to persuade them to reduce prices for the benefit of consumers.

They may have been a little impatient to find out what he meant, but they clapped loudly when he added: "And then, in the same week, I am going to call on the leaders of the workers' union and tell them the same thing."

The general feeling among businessmen is that Johnson is presented with a number of opportunities to try to persuade business leaders to reduce prices before the election. His toughest task may come in the latter part of the year when workers' bargaining will be in full swing.

Top labor leaders have expressed their doubts about Johnson's ability to reduce prices. They have demanded that he go beyond his usual government role to right to set wages and price guidelines and to exert pressure on the bargaining table.

The President has laid down the general guidelines for his economic program. He has cautioned against inflationary settlements. The area has 43 Negro churches with a membership of 2,500. This church has 307,000 members in 15 states in the South, east and Southwest.

"This is the type of coalition that will put our churches in the area in a tangle," said the Rev. John Miller of Jackson, Miss.

"It's been constitutional to have segregated presbyteries all these years," he said. "Why the push now?"

The Rev. Thomas Frye of Dallas, Tex., said, "We will be forcing some of our brethren out of the church."

The assembly defeated 276 to 198 a motion to request the integration rather than order it. A stronger stand on race relations was adopted by the assembly Saturday.

The decision to remain in the national council was made over the protests of commissioners from presbyteries serving Mississippi and portions of Tennessee and Louisiana.

The Rev. Charles L. King of Austin, Tex., told the assembly withdrawal from the council could be interpreted by Negroes as a reaction against the council's efforts for Negro rights.

The Rev. Mr. Miller said the proposed reorganization by the council of Presbyterian youth for civil rights work in Mississippi would represent an "irreversible invitation from responsible Protestant churches of the South."

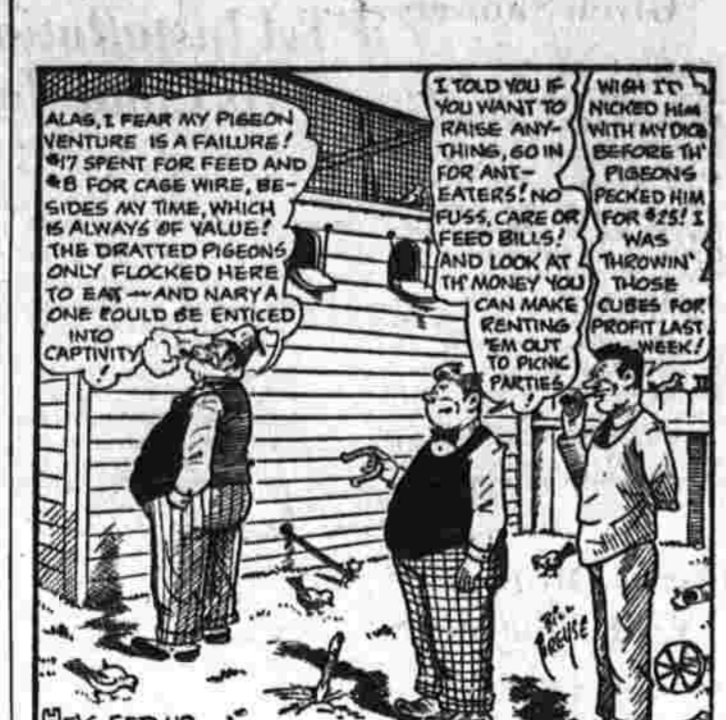

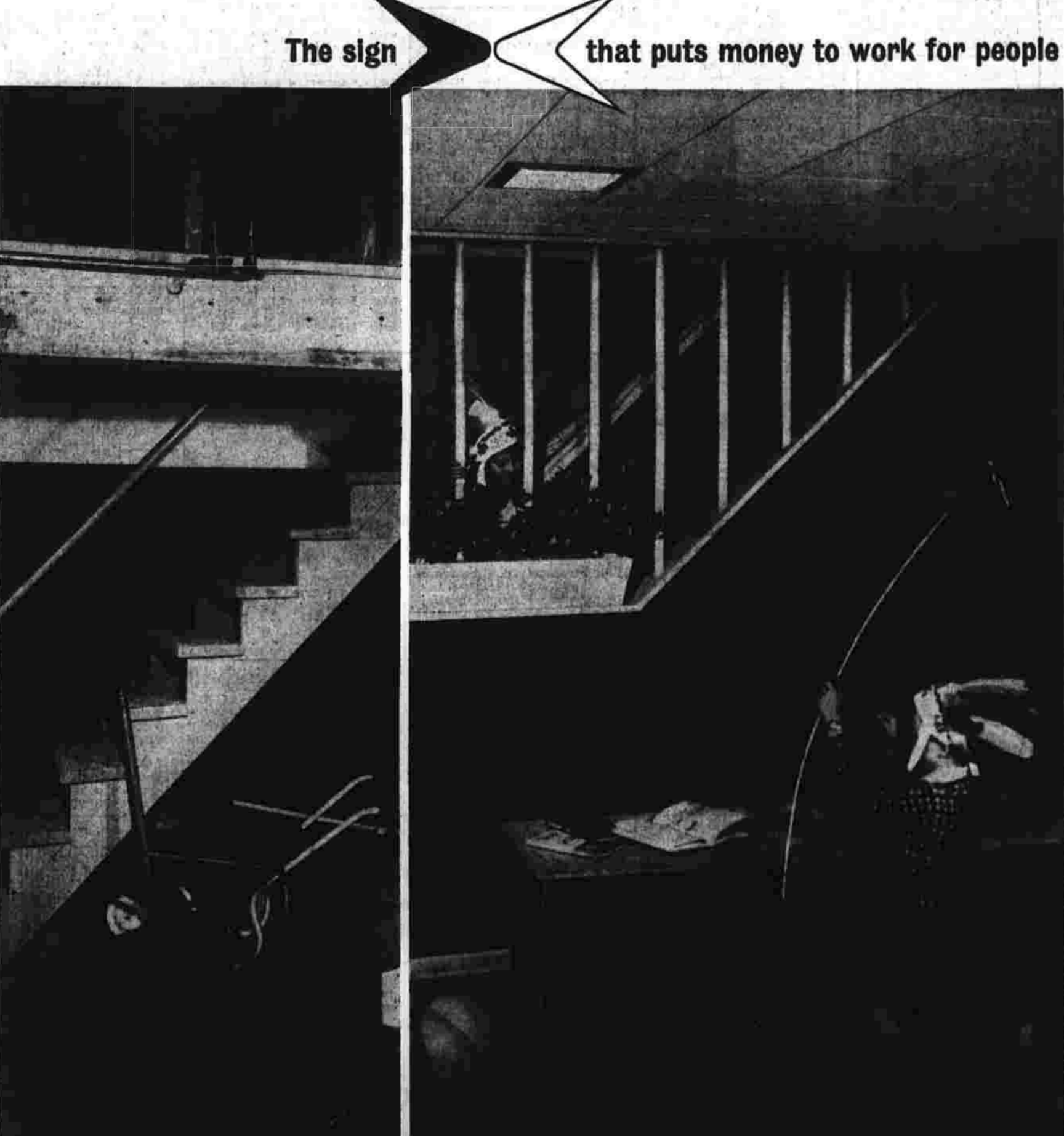
