Board Hopes to Work Out 48-Hour Week for Firemen

The town board of directors last night indicated that it is sympathetic to the idea of placing town firemen on a 48-hour week as of July 1 of this year, as instructed by General Manager Richard Martin to confer with fire department officials on a definite plan.

Martin estimated that the change will result in a \$45,000 increase in the payroll, plus about seven additional men, and would cost about \$1,575 more than the present 40-hour week. He noted that the fire department could be paid a minimum of \$1,575 more than the present 40-hour week.

The directors felt that they could keep the fire district budget at its present \$4 million rate, and still grant the men their request.

In discussing the budget, Martin and the directors agreed that provision should be made to handle all fire outside the town, from last year's \$25 per call to \$75.

Martin said that by adding an extra fireman to the town fire department, all calls can be handled in the town, thus avoiding the charges.

Moving Soldier Not Easy Chore

It appears that moving the Civil War Soldier in Center Park is a much more complicated procedure than meets the eye.

Although the board of directors voted earlier this month to authorize the move, ways and means must be worked out at a minimum cost, and with safety.

Estimates for the job reveal that a minimum of \$1,575 would be needed to build a new pedestal. He now faces south. He is the old soldier on the present pedestal, and faces him north. To turn the statue around on its present base would require an outlay of about \$400.

The problem arises from a fear that removing the statue that fasten the statue to the pedestal may result in serious damage to the 87-year-old soldier, with no insurance coverage available.

The statue built in 1877 for \$25,000 would cost \$15,000 to replace.

Scranton Wins Home State, Backers Now Hope for Bid

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Richard M. Nixon, 28,281 Gov. of Pennsylvania, will be elected in the state-wide primary Tuesday, establishing a state record for write-ins and rolling up more than 60 per cent of the total GOP vote for president.

It seemed open to interpretation whether this showing would be regarded by the 46-year-old, first-term congressman as a favorable endorsement of a popular clamor from his home state to become a presidential candidate.

Henry Cabot Lodge, U.S. ambassador to South Vietnam, was an impressive second, with more than 20 per cent of the vote in at least one instance.

None of the leading presidential possibilities campaigned in the state and no names were on the ballot.

With 4,125 of 8,281 precincts counted on the Republican side, Scranton had 186,546. Lodge had 68,638. Sen. Barry Goldwater, 28,281, former Vice President.

Scranton had said that none of the GOP candidates campaign in the state, saying he wanted to lead an unpaid delegation to the convention as a "favorite son," leader—not a candidate. All observed this, but some Goldwater supporters had argued that a candidate should be named.

Scranton had said he does not want the presidential nomination. He said he felt it is something he would accept only if it were offered to him in the state.

There was no organized Democratic write-in campaign in the state and no names were on the ballot.

Lodge topped Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona in the write-in vote in the preference column by a margin of better than 7 to 1 in incomplete returns. President Johnson topped the write-ins on the Democratic ballot.

To The Tax Rate Nine

The members of the Board of Directors of the town of Manchester—Francis J. Mahoney, David M. Barry, Francis P. DellaPera, Theodore C. Powell, Robert M. Stambler, Robert M. Stone, Harlan D. Taylor, Harold A. Turkington, and Richard C. Woodhouse—are now engaged in the final phase of their work on the budget for the next fiscal year.

They are about to adopt a budget and set a tax rate. They are functioning quietly and privately, without the customary molestation of town officials in Manchester here to learn to take philosophically.

It is their intention, as it should also be their duty, to weigh all the factors at their command—the justice between the various distributions of the town tax dollar—the distinction between what is unquestionably sound and incapable necessary and something else that may seem wonderful but is not optional—the question of a balanced concern for the people and taxpayers of Manchester, who want decent civic possessions and services and who also want to be held that, some day, the tax burden in Manchester will again become something that can be lived with.

Nelson Sounds A Charge

Something, we are not quite sure what it is, makes politicians on the outside of responsibility think that the American voter is just janting to hear big tough talk.

The more desperate the politician is to win public favor, the louder he bangs the drums. Yet there has never been any indication that this really says off.

The American public, hearing some political aspirant recommend more dynamic military strategy in some foreign field, is more likely to give the speaker credit to him to go off there and lead a charge if he wants to than it is to consider his military a reason for advancing him to high public office where he would have the power to send the rest of us there.

Still, the formula keeps repeating itself. And out in Oregon the other day, Governor Rockefeller finally revealed that he himself has come to the desperate admission that his campaign had better get some vigor somewhere quickly if it doesn't want to fade out of sight.

So, in Oregon, Governor Rockefeller accused another little Rubinov of toughness and advocated that somebody—carefully refrained from specifying American troops as yet—carry the war in South Vietnam into Communist sanctuaries which he located in neighboring Laos, Cambodia and North Vietnam.

This was not all, dependence on Governor Rockefeller's part. It was probably some cynical strategy too. He and Senator Goldwater have the potentially decisive California primary all to themselves. There is no moderate or liberal candidate present to take votes away from either one of them.

Rockefeller might as well try to raid Goldwater in his own territory by moving a little closer to the Goldwater position. The war in South Vietnam? A good guess would be that most Americans, including those who are going to vote in the California primary, would choose to have it be handled prudently. But the California voters will find no spot or name on their primary offering that.

One Divided Of Alliances?

One can suggest at least a subsidiary purpose for all the regional military alliances against Communism which have been our legacy from the Acheson-Dulles school of foreign policy. If we are lucky, perhaps some of these alliances against the Communists will at least keep their own free members from fighting too seriously among themselves and with each other.

Thus, President de Gaulle removes his naval officers from cooperation with NATO, but France and Germany, the historic enemies, are still formally members of NATO.

Thus, although Pakistan, a member of SEATO, abruptly rejects President Johnson's suggestion that some members of that alliance other than the United States should eventually have their military flags showing in South Vietnam, the fact that Pakistan is a member of such an alliance with countries like the United States, Britain, and France, may keep Pakistan from becoming our avowed enemy.

Events in Cyprus keep focusing attention on the fact that both Greece and Turkey are members of NATO, in which they are pledged to fight together against Communism, and on the further fact that Turkey is also a member of CENTO, still another regional alliance which we sponsor and are even now entertaining in Washington even though we ourselves have never become a member.

Perhaps, if such alliances can help persuade Turkey that Turkey should be very mild and long-suffering and not give what was once what would seem to be a rather persistent and intentional campaign on the part of the Greek Cypriots to make the minority Turkish Cypriots subservient rather than co-sovereign in Cyprus, perhaps in such a case the alliances will have done something to preserve some kind of peace after all.

So far, Turkey has, unwillingly, and without much trust in it, accepted the United Nations effort to police and mediate the situation in Cyprus.

It is at high time the government of President Makarios began doing the same, and ceased conducting new and intentional military operations under the nose of the still under-strengthened United Nations police force on the scene.

Pompidoon Proposal Tested

As a footnote to recent discussion of French Premier Pompidou's suggestion that the ultimate fate of Formosa be left to a self-determination plebiscite, there was a kind of election held on the island the other day.

It was an election to elect the new mayor for the island's major city of Taipei, and it was featured by a contest between the nominee sponsored by Chiang Kai-shek's Kuomintang Party and an independent candidate who was running on his own.

Chiang Kai-shek's candidate, apparently realizing he had odds against him, featured a campaign in which he promised everybody just about everything. But the voters apparently refused to pay any attention to any of the issues except. They apparently insisted on casting their vote for the candidate who was running on his own.

And the independent candidate won by more than 18,000 votes, thus lending considerable weight to the possibility that if the people of Formosa ever did get a chance to vote on their own political destiny, they would not choose to go with the Communist mainland, and they would not choose to continue under the rule of Chiang Kai-shek, but would choose to have their own country, a Formosa ruled by Formosans.

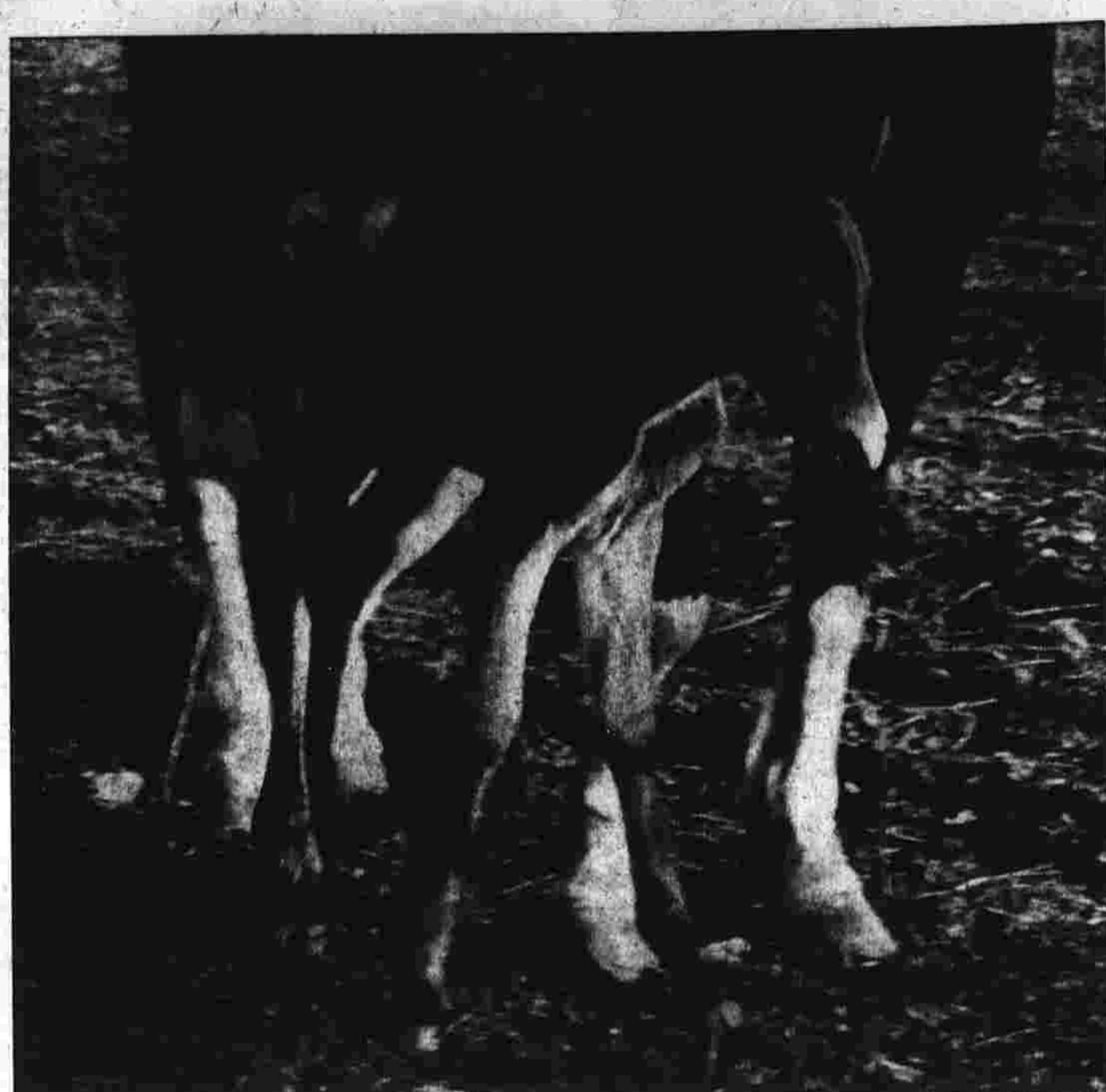
The Little Mermaid

Under relaxed but still awesome threat of nuclear annihilation, in the shadow of the degradation disclosed in the Acheson's mass-murder trials—that is to say, in an age when horror takes on planetary proportions and reaches its highest possible source, that kind weeps because a doll is broken.

The vandals' famous mermaid statue may prove relatively meaningless and motives understood. We cannot know until a couple of months. But the response of the Danish people, and of their friends in nations near and far, is not meaningless. The cruel and cunning act has affronted feelings and roused thoughts which have motivated all of us.

The feelings are of mutual protectiveness—but particularly of the young, the smaller and weaker—and the thoughts are about safety and the least of it, and only because there the weakest are exposed the strongest are themselves in danger. No. Much more than that. Such thoughts are profoundly natural. They are that men and women in their hearts are made of, as well as what they have learned from practical experience.

It might seem ludicrous to dwell on the idiot violence just perpetrated in the greatest of world capitals if it were not for the reminders it gives us of what human beings really are. There is suffering enough among living folk to employ all our sentiments and sorrow; we have no need to turn to a broken statue to excite our sympathies. But of course it is not just of a wistful figure inspired by a Hans Christian Andersen fairy tale that we are thinking.

WASHINGTON

In the White House Cabinet Room last week, under the incredulous eye of the president of the railroad and the chief of the rail union, Lyndon B. Johnson, President John F. Kennedy... Presidential style came into full bloom.

It was right there, behind everybody's chair, watching even the doodles on the little pads of paper... one of the union participants burred.

When Mr. Johnson made his 11th hour appeal to the carriers and the unions to give him 15 days to settle the dispute, the chief railroad negotiator, J. E. Wolfe was skeptical. He counseled the railroad presidents not to come to Washington. Obviously fearing a settlement favorable to the unions, he was delaying tactics after another. He had managed to stall the inevitable effects of diesel locomotives, the automation and other labor-saving devices.

But the railroad presidents had already headed for Washington. O'Connell of the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, "Who the President of the United States asks me to come to Washington, I come."

One who had the carrier and union leaders nose-to-nose with him in the Cabinet Room, President Johnson made it clear that there would be a settlement, with no ifs, ands, or buts. Although professing only that he was anxious to get the parties to enter into genuine collective bargaining, actually Mr. Johnson was the linchpin without which an agreement would have been impossible.

For example, when the two sides made their progress report to him, he received the railroad president's first together, then individually. He then did the same thing with the union chiefs, and with other labor leaders. He did not work from any position paper or mediator's summary. By examining each side's proposals singly, he exposed small differences and then invited the parties to enter into genuine collective bargaining, actually Mr. Johnson was the linchpin without which an agreement would have been impossible.

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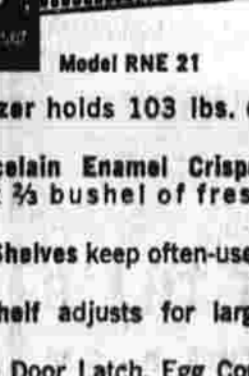
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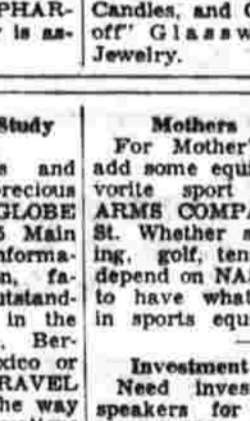
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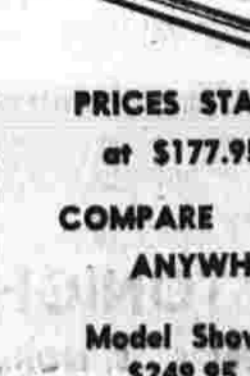
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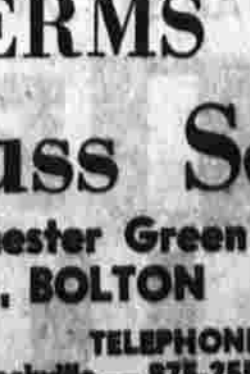
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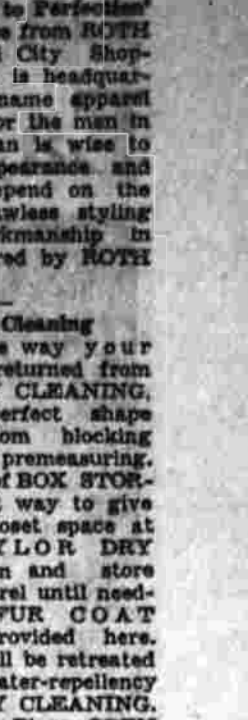
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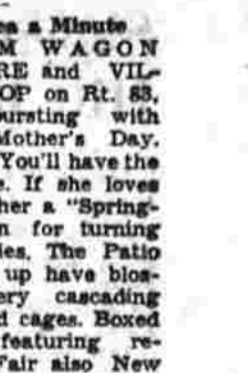
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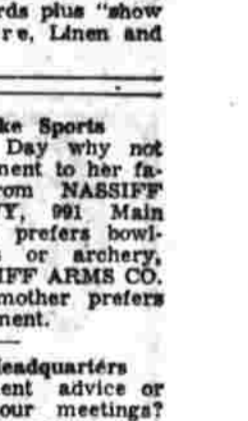
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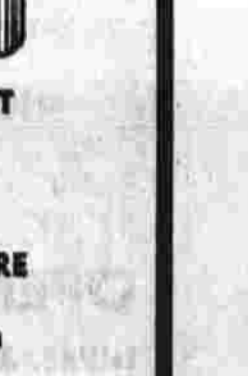
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LaGace Fans 25 Batsmen, East Nips Bloomfield, 5-4
