Cloture Vote Set Tuesday Over Rights

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey said today he is reasonably optimistic the Senate will vote to shut off the marathon civil rights debate. He expects 99 senators to be on hand for the crucial test next Tuesday.

Humphrey, assistant Democratic leader and the bill's floor manager, told newsmen the only absentee he knew of would be Sen. Clair Engle, D-Calif., who has had two brain operations. Earlier there had been speculation administration forces might be able to invoke the debate-limiting cloture procedure by persuading some foes of the bill to stay away.

But the Minnesota senator discounted this. He said the vote was so important and the time was announced so far in advance that a senator really would have an excuse for being absent.

"We are expecting to have to produce 90 votes to obtain cloture," he said.

This would be exactly the required two-thirds if 99 votes are cast.

Humphrey said his optimism for success in the vote Tuesday had risen somewhat because "we had a good day yesterday." He referred to vote commitments but would not elaborate.

His official position, the senator explained, still is that "we will get more than 40 Democrats." Other party sources said prospects now were good for 43 or 44.

Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen has said he expects 23 or more Republicans will vote in favor of cloture.

Pressed in the Senate Thursday by Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., as to whether the votes for cloture were nailed down, Humphrey replied: "If I have to give an opinion now, I would say yes."

But he added, with a grin: "Provided all our colleagues are here, provided the winds of good luck blow our way, and provided I have not miscalculated."

Morse had said it would be a great mistake to file a cloture petition until the vote for it were certain.

Humphrey said he, other leaders and Senate leadership staff have been struggling with this problem for weeks.

"We are convinced," he asserted, "that at no time has it looked better for the Senate to obtain cloture."

Humphrey, before the Senate quit late Thursday, arranged for a show-down to come at noon Eastern Standard Time Tuesday. He did this by obtaining consent for the body to meet that day at its normal hour, A.M. cloture vote come automatically one hour after the Senate convenes.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate is set to vote next Tuesday on cloture in the civil rights debate.

Here are some questions and answers on what is involved:

What is cloture? The rule by which the Senate ends a filibuster.

How is it applied? By the approval of two-thirds of the senators present and voting — 67 if all 100 are on hand.

Has it ever been used? Never successfully when a civil rights bill was filibustered; five times on other measures, the last on Aug. 14, 1962 to break a filibuster against a bill to set up the Communications Satellite Corporation.

Why a cloture vote now? The Southern filibuster.

Mood Calm For Parley In Hartford

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Connecticut Democrats, sailing along with no one rocking the boat, open their state convention tonight.

U.S. Sen. Thomas J. Dodd will be routinely renominated for a second term tomorrow. And National Chairman John M. Bailey, serving his 18th year as state chairman, will be chosen by the State Central Committee for a record 10th consecutive two-year term.

The convention's 953 delegates also will pick 43 delegates to the national convention in August and adopt a 1964 state platform.

The convention gets under way in the Bushnell Auditorium at 8 p.m. After a keynote speech by U.S. Sen. Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin, committee reports and routine business, the delegates will go back to their hotels until tomorrow's session at 10 a.m.

The State Central Committee will meet after adjournment tomorrow.

The only resistance to the 63-year-old Dodd is understood to come from a few small towns, but no one has suggested publicly that he not be renominated.

The party leadership this year is firmly behind the white haired former FBI agent and Nuernberg prosecutor.

Gov. John Dempsey will deliver the nominating speech. Six years ago, Dodd had to fight for the nomination. He won it over former Gov. Chester Bowles and former U.S. Sen. William Benton and went on to defeat Republican Sen. William A. Purtell in the election.

Bailey and U.S. Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, who served as governor, had remained neutral in the pre-convention battle for the nomination.

They said they would support whoever was leading after the first ballot. But Dodd won a first ballot victory by a decisive margin.

Two years ago, the state convention was livened by a bitter fight between former Congressman at Large Frank Kowalski and Ribicoff for the Senate nomination.

This year there will be no nomination for congressman at large. The post was abolished in a revision of the state's congressional boundaries in April.

The present congressman at large, F. Christopher, is a candidate for nomination in the newly created sixth district.

In contrast to the Democratic unity, Republicans will hold their state convention next Friday and Saturday in Hartford.

MARKET REVIVES NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market turned around and advanced briskly today after suffering a sharp Thursday. The Thursday decline was the most severe since President John F. Kennedy was assassinated last Nov. 22. Trading this morning was heavy.

Washington, D.C., was surprised at the quick about face. The market moved ahead from the start and widened its gains as trading accelerated. Blue chips were bought on a broad front with stocks, metals, airlines, chemicals, utilities, oils, office equipments and electronics gaining.

U.S. RETALIATES WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said today that appropriate retaliatory action against Soviet military attaches in Washington is being taken because of the new restrictions and charges against U.S. attaches stationed in Moscow.

He said he did not know details of the retaliatory move being made here but that it is similar to that of last April when Moscow began harassing U.S. military men attached to the embassy there.

LAOS LULL BROKEN VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Communist Pathet Lao forces attacked a neutralist hill position today northwest of the Plain de Jarres, but were beaten back, an army spokesman reported. The spokesman said that the target of the Red attack — first military action reported in the civil war in five days — was Phou Kouat. The hill had been captured by neutralists last week.

OMAHA BEACH, France (AP) — The Allied nations of World War II start two days of ceremonies today to salute the living and honor the dead of the Normandy invasion on the 20th anniversary of the assault.

Hundreds of D-Day veterans were assembling in the invasion area where Americans, British, Canadian and French soldiers stormed the beaches on June 6, 1944. Most were on private pilgrimages.

The official U.S. delegation, headed by Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Deputy Secretary of Defense Silas Vance, and Gen. Maxwell Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was to arrive this afternoon. Gen. Bradley commanded the American forces on D-Day. Gen. Taylor parachuted with the 101st Airborne Division, which he commanded.

Events In State Connecticut Co. Sold to Gengras

HARTFORD (AP) — The new owner of the Connecticut Co. says he has no plans to ask for a fare increase on the bus firm's route in Stamford, New Haven and Hartford.

E. Clayton Gengras, a West Hartford businessman, gave the government a \$3,000,000 check yesterday and took over the company.

He bought a bus line whose 26,000,000 million passengers a year drop about \$9,000,000 into the fare meters of some 452 buses.

Gengras says he plans to purchase 28 new buses and attempt to economize on maintenance costs. The State Public Utilities Commission says only the Hartford division of the bus line is making money at present.

The utilities commission yesterday gave its blessing to the sale at a hearing. Assistant U.S. Atty. Gen. Paul A. Sweeney said the state commission had no power to approve or disapprove the actual transfer.

The stock of the bus line, a subsidiary of the New Haven Railroad, had been held by the federal government for collateral on loans made to the railroad after damaging floods in 1955.

Ocean-Bound Nuptials Get Union Frown

By NEIL GILBRIDE WASHINGTON (AP) — The Seafarers' Union has a word of warning for lovers who think it would be romantic to get married at sea: "The ocean-bound wedding may be more romantic than binding."

Couples who let ship captains tie the marital knot in the middle of the ocean may find themselves still legally at sea when they return to port, says an article in the union's "Seafarer's Log."

The maritime trades department in AFL-CIO headquarters here said it didn't know if some of its sailor members had been having trouble following ship-board marriages.

But whatever prompted the article, it hinted it virtually takes an international lawyer to be certain a seagoing marriage is legal.

"Lovestruck couples involved in such an at-sea idyll would do well to check the laws of the nation whose flag the ship flies and also take a look at the laws of the state of the vessel's port of registry before they decide to ask the ship's captain to tie the knot," it said.

The article cautions: "Contrary to popular belief, the captain of a ship has no special authority to merge ocean-bound lovers."

If the ship is registered in New York, for instance, "states

Challengers Bar Stop-Barry Move

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two potential challengers of Sen. Barry Goldwater for the Republican presidential nomination—Richard M. Nixon and Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania—have announced they will have no part of any stop-Goldwater drive.

Some Republican leaders who oppose Goldwater's candidacy have hoped that one or the other would leap into the GOP race, become the rallying point for a coalition and take the play from the Arizona conservative at the national convention.

But as Goldwater rested away from the political storm and strife and his bandwagon appeared to be taking on more steam, Nixon, the party's standard bearer in 1960, said on Long Island Thursday night he would not take part in any stop-Goldwater movement.

The former vice president said such a move "would so badly split the party that whoever got the nomination would find it wasn't worth anything at all."

In Harrisburg, Pa., Scranton said he would not be "part and parcel" of any movement to stop Goldwater and that after

winning the California primary the senator appears to be the likely nominee. New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller talked of the platform the Republicans will adopt at their convention next month and peppered the Johnson administration, charging "failure at home and abroad."

In Cleveland, Gov. Paul Fannin of Arizona, an early arrival for the governors' conference which opens Saturday, predicted flatly that Goldwater will be nominated on the first ballot.

"I do not expect any great drive to stop him, now that he's won the California primary and has enough delegates to win on the first ballot—over 600," said Fannin, an early Goldwater booster.

According to the latest Associated Press survey of delegates to the San Francisco convention, Goldwater can now count on a first ballot total of 446—just 209 short of the 655 required for nomination.

Rockefeller, who lost the winner-take-all race with Goldwater for California's 86 votes, did not mention him in his address

Weekend Settlement Predicted in Hillsdale

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Michigan's mediation director today sounded hopeful that a weekend settlement could be reached in the violent Essex Wire Corp. strike which brought the National Guard to Hillsdale.

Malcolm R. Lovell Jr., chairman of the State Labor Mediation Board, said he was "hopeful that we can finish this (barge)ing up today or Saturday."

"We're meeting in an atmosphere that is cordial and constructive," he said after company and union negotiators emerged from a 10-hour session at 2:30 a.m. They scheduled another meeting for 3 p.m.

"Most of the minor issues have been cleared up," Lovell said. "We're down to the major issues."

There also were developments outside the bargaining room. A union leader accused Gov. George W. Romney of ruining chances for a settlement soon. And a leader of a non-involved union added his criticism of Romney for allowing Essex to operate with nonunion employees.

The National Guard to keep peace. Romney angrily accused the company of "unfair labor practices and worse" in the bitter day-old strike, and sought a legal means to shut down the firm's Hillsdale plant a second time.

The governor called out the National Guard one week ago, and closed the plant as part of an emergency order issue in the wake of a series of violent incidents in the strike.

He allowed the plant to reopen Tuesday, however, saying he had no choice once law and order was restored. International Union of Electrical Workers Local 519 struck the Hillsdale plant Feb. 28. The local, which replaced the Teamsters Union as bargaining agent

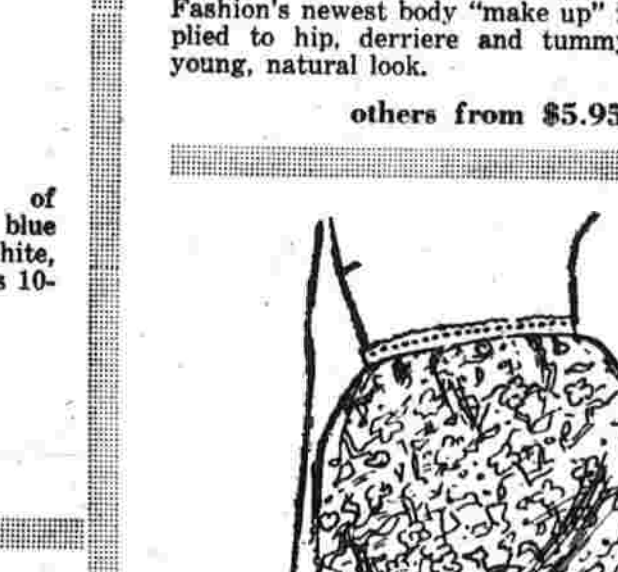

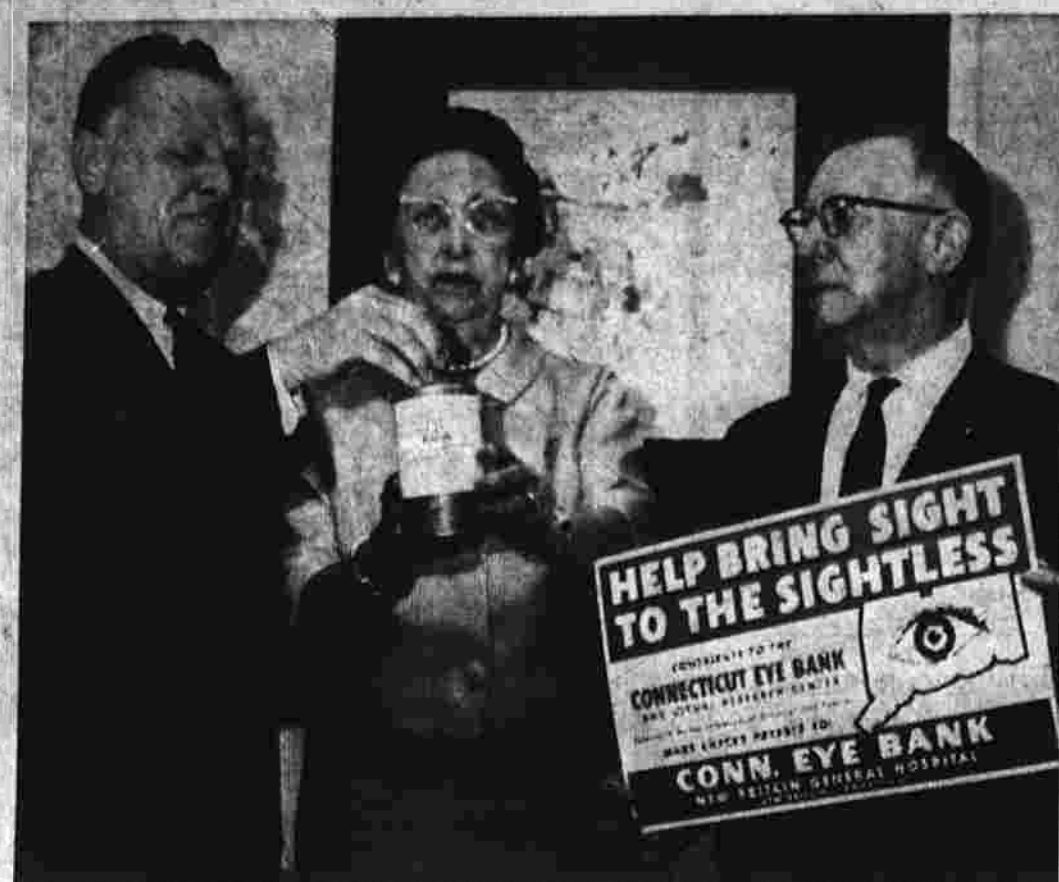
