The bill, which was introduced by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., and cosponsored by Sen. Edward Brooke, R-Mass., passed the Senate by a vote of 79 to 25.

The bill prohibits discrimination on the basis of race in public accommodations, including hotels, motels, restaurants, and other places of public accommodation.

The bill also prohibits discrimination on the basis of race in the provision of services, including the sale of housing.

The bill is expected to be signed into law by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

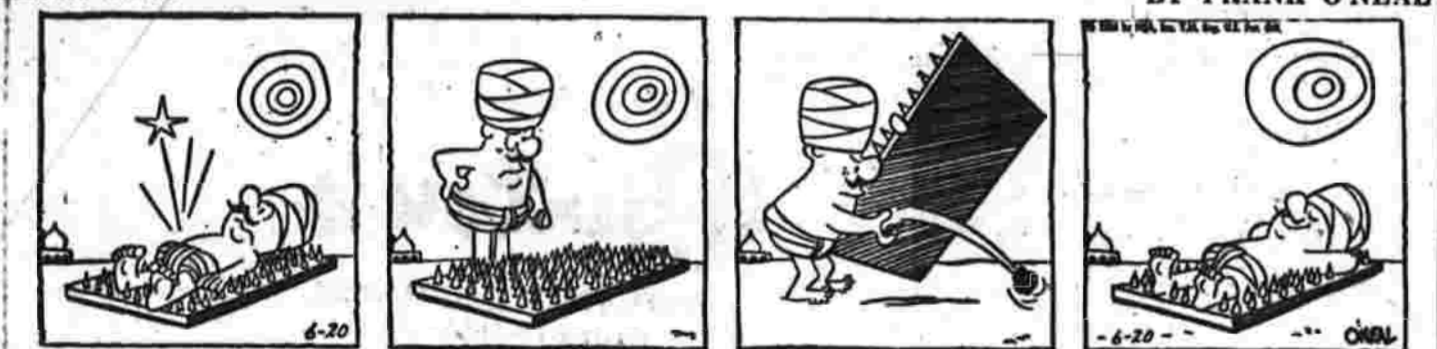

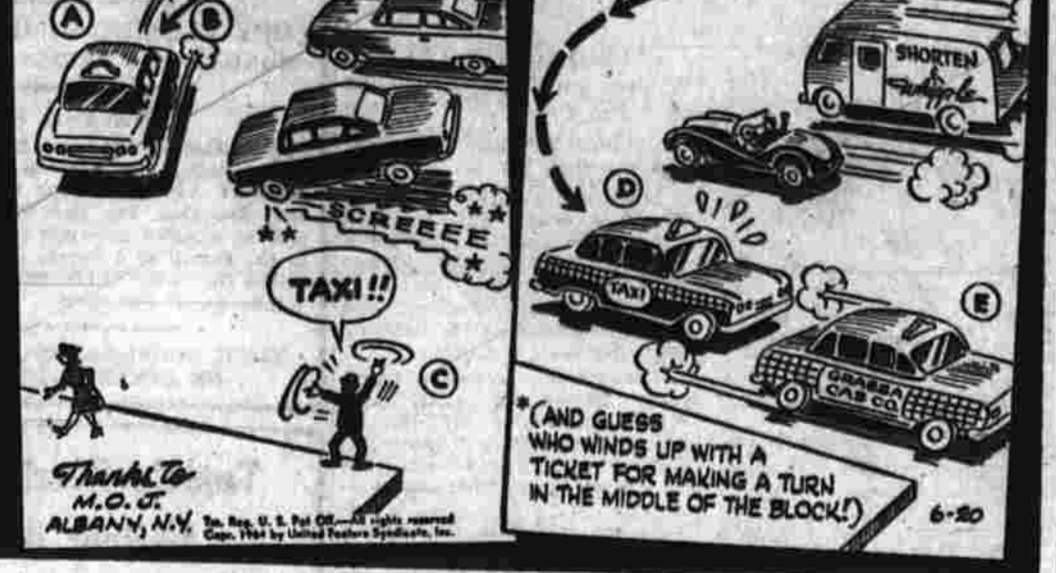

Cummings Cites Party Stand on Charter Issues

Ted Cummings, chairman of the Manchester Democratic Town Committee, this morning explained his reason for an "about face" on a May 19 promise not to re-submit defeated charter revision questions at the November elections.

He said, "Over the years, Democratic members of the board of directors and the board of education have had the courage to change their minds on controversial issues when public expression proved them wrong. They have always felt better for the change."

He added, "We believe that the voters, on May 19, expressed a desire for most of the changes, believing, as we have, that they would strengthen the town's charter."

Cummings concluded, "If the new Charter Revision Commission decides to eliminate from the machines the controversial issue of a mandatory review of the general manager's performance, we will honor its decision, as an expression of the voters' wishes."

The board of directors, on Tuesday night, will consider the appointment of a new CRC, which would review the defeated proposals, revise some, eliminate others and perhaps, suggest new ones.

Both Mayor Francis Mahoney and GOP leader and Director Francis DellaFera have indicated that they will appoint the same 5 Democrats and 4 Republicans that served on the previous commission.

Whereas the special May election required a majority equal to at least 15 per cent of the town total electorate for passage of the revision question, passage in November, a regular election date, could be affected by a bare majority of those voting.

### Dick Van Dyke Had Share of Failures

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—It's not in the cards for Dick Van Dyke's Emmy to go to his head. He has been too familiar with the sour smell of failure.

Dick can match his failures with any star in the business and have a few days left over. "Dick got in more or less by default. He and a pal tried to start an advertising agency in Danville, Ill., after the war but the town wasn't big enough to support one. The pair began playing around the area with a record not-mixing to the records of famous personalities.

Encouraged by their success, they came to California, and scored a hit in several small night clubs. Then they were booked into the bigtime—slippery Maude's, where Martin and Lewis made their Hollywood debut.

"It was a disaster," Dick recalled. "A lot of big stars were there opening night. I remember Joe Lucille Ball, Don Aron and Barry Sullivan. They just got a laugh in the whole show. When we came onstage, we were handed our salaries and told to leave."

The act also was canceled out of the Blue Angel in New York, and Dick and his partner, Phil Erickson, took to the road for jobs. That wasn't easy, since they had two wives and six children between them. They finally broke up the act in Atlanta in 1953, and Dick took a job as announcer with a local television station.

He started his own show which he wrote and performed

## Jungle War Stepup Seen After Malay Summit Flop

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP)—Indonesian guerrillas made one of the biggest attacks of the Borneo jungle war Sunday night, only 24 hours after the collapse of the second Malaysian summit conference, a security forces spokesman announced in Sarawak.

Five Gurkhas were killed and six others wounded in the six-hour battle near the frontier about 50 miles west of Kuching, the spokesman said.

The number of guerrilla casualties was not known. The dead and wounded were reported carried back across the frontier as security forces forced the guerrillas to retreat after some of the fiercest fighting of the campaign.

Government officials predicted a major stepup in the Indonesian guerrilla campaign following the collapse of the peace conference Saturday in Tokyo.

Radio Indonesia voiced a tougher new stand against Malaysia.

The State Security Council in the Malaysian Borneo state of Sarawak scheduled an emergency meeting. The situation on the frontier is grave, Chief Minister Stephen Kalong Ningkan said. Ningkan said, however, that British and Malaysian security forces could handle the situation if Indonesia tried to send more guerrillas into Sarawak.

## Heavy Guard For Nikita's Sweden Visit

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev sailed into Sweden on a chilly Baltic wind today. He was told straight away that Swedes are dedicated to their neutrality.

He also was met by newspaper demands for information about a Swedish diplomat captured by the Russians.

Promptly, the Soviet leader tried to warm up the atmosphere.

He came, he said at dockside, on "a mission of friendship and good neighborliness" that fully appreciated Sweden's neutral policy. He wanted "sincere talks" with government leaders, he said, to strengthen good relations.

"I do not think we will have anything to argue about."

Many Swedes are not keen about Khrushchev's coming here. The government mounted heavy security. There have been threats against his life.

About 5,000 spectators watched Khrushchev's arrival from across the harbor five miles away. At dockside were the official government reception groups, honor guards and the diplomatic corps, minus the U.S., British and French ambassadors—and, so far as news-

### Repairs Finished On Water Main

HARTFORD (AP)—Repairs were completed today on a water main that serves Hartford and nine surrounding towns. Until it was fixed, the area's water supply had been cut in half.

Water gushed out of the ground at the site of the break yesterday on a wooded hillside in Collinsville, which is about 10 miles northwest of Hartford. The water rushed down the hill into the Farmington River, and washed out some small trees along the way.

Even with the repair made, officials of the Metropolitan District Commission urged that citizens "sharply restrict" use of water for the next 24 hours so that the depleted reservoir may build up again.

The commission said the main carried about 40 million gallons a day. Another water main, which runs parallel with it and which serves the same area, was not affected.

The session, announced today, will be the first since members of the Federation of Utility Employees struck the company at 11:59 p.m. Thursday.

The company provides electricity to about 300,000 customers in the New Haven-Bridgeport area. Service has continued without interruption despite the strike—the first in the company's 65-year history.

## Rights Bill Faces Last Dixie Delay

WASHINGTON (AP)—The final stage of the year-long battle to pass a civil rights bill opens in the House today with Southern foes determined to delay its final approval for another week.

The opponents are down to their last round of ammunition, however, and Speaker John W. McCormack has promised President Johnson the bill will be at the White House by July 4.

With the action shifted back to the House, the Senate dig-ins an enormous backlog of legislation built up during the historic 83-day debate over the civil rights bill. Scheduled for action this week are bills appropriating funds to run the Interior, Treasury and Post Office departments during the coming fiscal year.

The delay in bringing the sweeping, Senate-passed civil rights bill to a final vote in the House is made possible by a requirement that the House Rules Committee approve a resolution sending it to the floor.

## Later Visit Scheduled by Papandreou

WASHINGTON (AP)—Prime Minister Ismet Inonu of Turkey arrived today for talks with President Johnson who wants to ease tensions between Turks and Greeks over Cyprus.

The 59-year-old Turkish leader flew from Williamsburg, Va., to Washington in a helicopter that landed on the ellipse—a parklike area behind the White House.

Johnson, in welcoming remarks, said the talks will add "solution of problems which trouble us all." Inonu said Turkey "believes in peace, but this peace cannot be lasting if based on injustice."

The two-day visit of the Turkish leader begins in the wake of a U.N. Security Council decision to extend the U.N. peace-keeping force on Cyprus another three months.

It also comes amid menacing signs of increasing domestic pressure on Inonu to abandon his moderate policy on the Cyprus issue.

The meetings between Johnson and Inonu today and Tuesday are to be followed by similar conferences Wednesday and Thursday between the President and Greek Premier George Papandreou. No direct talks between the Greek and Turkish leaders are planned.

Talks with Johnson, a White House luncheon and a reception at the Turkish Embassy are on Inonu's schedule today.

Johnson invited Inonu and Papandreou in the wake of reports that Turkey planned to put troops ashore on Cyprus. The President then ordered Undersecretary of State George W. Ball to Athens and Ankara to express this government's concern over the situation.

However, the State Department has made clear the United States has no preference for any of the solutions proposed to take the steam out of the Cyprus situation. The United Nations is trying to mediate the crisis.

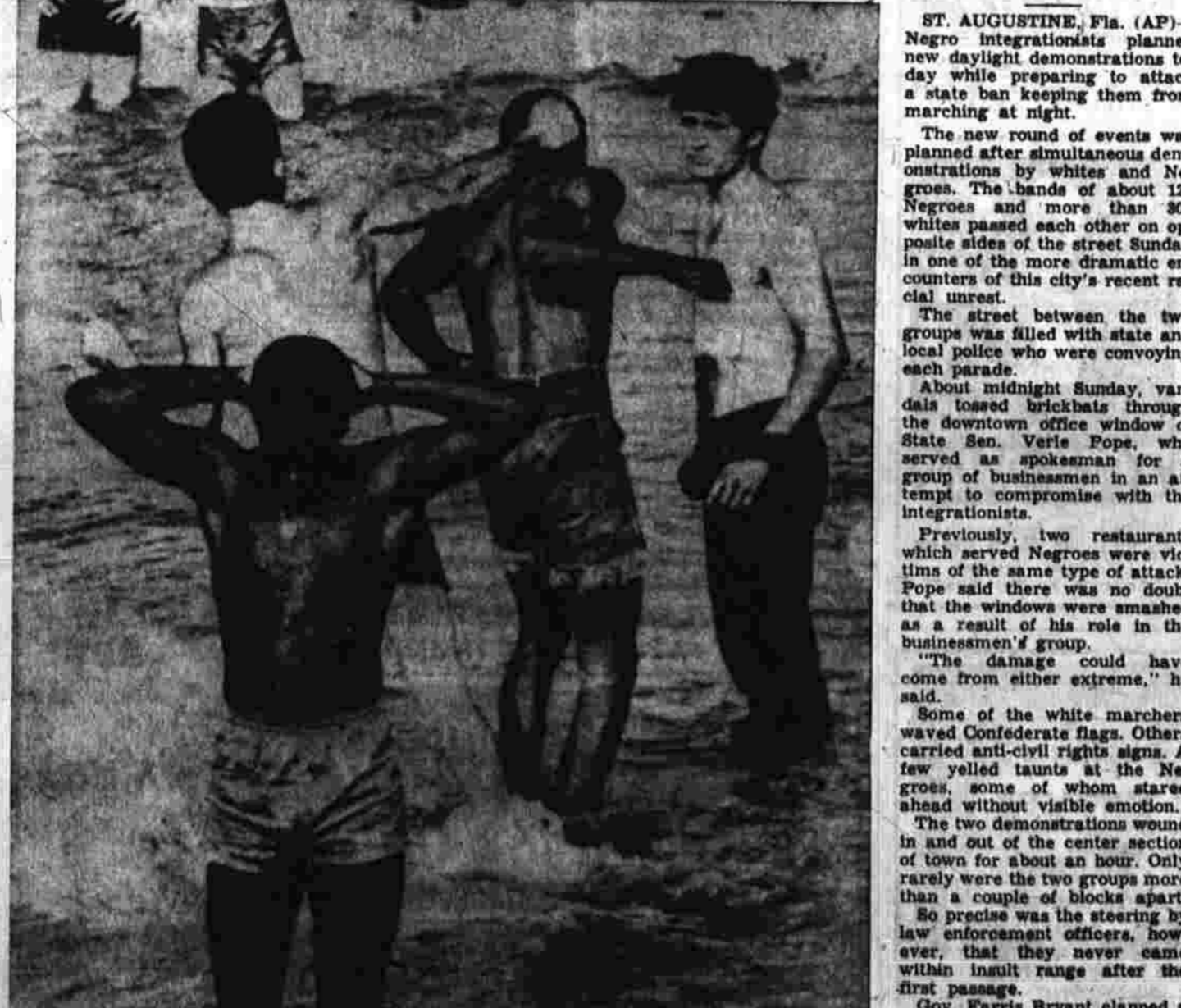
FRATERNITY BLAZE  
DURHAM, N. H. (AP)—At least two students perished today in a fire that roared through a fraternity house near the University of New Hampshire. The body of the first student was found about three hours after the flames had been brought under control. The body of the second was found shortly before noon. Three other students were still unaccounted for, and firemen continued to sift through the ashes of the Pi Kappa Alpha residence. Authorities were unable to immediately determine the identities of the victims. In all, 17 students were believed in the building when the fire broke out shortly before 1 a. m. Many of the survivors fled down fire escapes. The cause of the blaze was not immediately determined, but authorities were checking into the possibility that it started in some over-stuffed furniture in a television lounge in the basement.

AFRICA SABOTAGE  
CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP)—Saboteurs struck again in South Africa late Sunday night. Two explosions brought down an electric power pylon on a farm near Stellenbosch, 31 miles east of Cape Town. It was the fourth case of sabotage since Friday in this country, where the government policy of apartheid, or racial segregation, has brought internal resistance and external pressure.

URGES AID OUT  
WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Chamber of Commerce called on the Senate today to slash a minimum of \$280 million from the \$3.6-billion foreign aid authorization bill passed by the House. The chamber's spokesman, John O. Tester, vice president of Pfizer International, New York, endorsed the aid program in general as one which "can promote our national interest" by "promoting the cause of freedom everywhere." But he urged the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to cut back President Johnson's original request for nearly \$4 billion "not to exceed \$3 billion."
