### Rockville-Vernon Local Truck Firm Merges With New Jersey Company

Three trucking firms, one of which announced a merger that will unify their efforts in the Northeast section of the country. Charles Chibberg, president of Nelson Freightway Inc., said today that his firm is merging with Gilbertville Trucking Co. of Camden, N.J. and has purchased Crown and Co., a Waterbury trucking firm.

Authority for the action was permitted by a temporary permit issued recently by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Headquarters for the operations will be in Rockville.

The merger is now being effected from Vernon, Virginia to Massachusetts. Chibberg will head the merged firm; officers from the other two firms will remain as officers of the company.

Chibberg is taking place because of computer equipment which is being used to handle the larger operation.

There are about 70 local employees of the firm. Payroll for the three companies runs in excess of \$2 million annually.

Expansion of the firm has already begun with the construction of a terminal in Westbury, Mass. Chibberg said that by the end of the year, the firm's extensive, efficient operation will be provided to customers.

### School Board Gets Reports On Social Work, Museum

"Our society has decided that every child has a right to a safe, healthy and productive education to the limit of his individual capacity."

Miss Beth Hoffman used these remarks to introduce her report to the board of education last night on the school's social work department.

"Since a child's school attitude is a reflection of his home life, it is the responsibility of the school to help the child to grow."

She said, however, that such a change depends upon the strength of the child's desire for growth.

Miss Hoffman went on to discuss the length of time spent in the social worker's office, the social worker's difficult task to provide the child with a feeling of desire and recognition of his own capacity.

"For it is on his own concept of his value that a child fails or succeeds, and it is the school's job to help him to realize his own worth."

Miss Hoffman said that being a social worker in the Manchester school system is like trying to escape an octopus. When entering a school building, teachers come running from everywhere to plead for help.

She said that the social workers handle as many as 187 cases per person in comparison to the national standard of 90 cases per person, she said.

Miss Hoffman estimated that in addition to the 187 cases, there are 100 to 150 cases of child neglect.

### TPC Delays Decision on Parking Bid

The Town Planning Commission (TPC) last night concluded a sparsely attended public hearing on a request by John DeWassay, owner of the Highland Park Market, to change a part of the zoning ordinance.

DeWassay's request was to change the zoning ordinance to allow for a parking lot on the west side of the street, to offset parking spaces.

No decision was reached last night, pending completion of the hearing. The TPC and Town Council will bring a decision on the parking bid.

The only person present at last night's hearing were four members of the TPC, its secretary, John DeWassay, Joseph DeWassay, DeWassay, his counsel, Eugene Kelly, Atty. Wesley C. Gray, and Police Chief James Reardon.

He and Atty. Kelly presented different interpretations of zoning regulations and building codes concerning relocation of the house in question, Kelly insisting that no permission was needed, Gray just as insistent that it was.

TPC Chairman Martin Alvord, in an attempt to arbitrate the dispute, called for the opinion of the town council.

At the close of last night's meeting, the TPC, as required by State Statutes and regulations of the Federal Housing and Home Financing Agency, adjourned until the next meeting.




