"Balance" is a matter which is usually taken for granted. It is a matter of fact, not of opinion. In music we use the term in two senses. We speak of a "balanced" program in which the selections are chosen with care, lively numbers against serious ones, early music against late, and so on. We likewise use the term "balance" with reference to the relative loudness between soloist and accompanist, etc.

Both are important, but it is the balance between soloist and accompanist that is most commonly misunderstood. Balance in a musical program makes everybody happy and that's all there is to it, even though there may be a number of things that you personally do not enjoy. Somebody else in the audience enjoys it, and probably should enjoy one of the numbers you find most entertaining.

Rockville Vernon Raymond Dunham Named Sergeant by City Police

A new sergeant for Rockville Vernon Police Department was named in ceremonies today at police headquarters.

Raymond G. Dunham, 29, a policeman for more than four years, was promoted by the city council's police committee upon recommendation of Chief George Trapp and Lt. Emilio Magrini.

Dunham, a native of Munson, Mass., has lived in Connecticut since he was two. He is a veteran of three years service in the Pacific, serving with the Army during World War II. He became a policeman with the Rockville Vernon Police Department in 1959.

Dunham was cited for his efforts several years ago when, during his time off, he aided in the capture of a man wanted by the State Police. The man sought was spotted on Rt. 15, stopped his car and ran into the woods. Dunham was one of four Rockville Vernon officers who were on the scene.

Dunham serves as a photographer for the department in addition to his regular duties. His promotion was based on state-administered examinations given about a year ago.

Dunham is married to the former Mary Anne Dunham of Norwich. They have two children, Raymond Richard, 14, and George, 10.

Alderman Thomas McCusker, chairman of the police commission, said that Dunham was chosen for the promotion by state personnel department officials and by Rockville's police administrators on the basis of his performance.

McCusker indicated that his commission will ask the city council for three additional policemen for the fiscal year starting in November.

"We wish to give the department personnel the same benefits as other city employees, a 40-hour week," he said.

Rockville presently has nine patrolmen and five administrators. One of the new patrolmen would replace Dunham, bringing the force up to 12 men.

McCusker pointed out that some of the duties now handled by superintendents would be handled by the proposed additional men.

The budget and the schedule has been worked out for next year, McCusker said. "We'll discuss the proposal with the city council."

McCusker reported that the department has had an increase of more than 65 per cent in activity.

His strategy is more apparent, and there is less reason to forgive him for it. At the moment, as Eisenhower tries to decide whether to lift or cut this or that candidacy, as Governor Scranton, probably gazed into the picture by the Eisenhower on-again-off-again tactics, watching the general display his public stand part the time when it would be of any practical value, and as the Goldwater camp, which Eisenhower opposes on odd days of the week, grows openly scornful of his waning influence—at this moment Eisenhower is probably at the lowest peak in his entire career so far as public estimation is concerned.

Even this page, which usually finds some defense for Eisenhower against his important critics, has been forced to wonder if he has not possibly come into his political decline. But we are still inclined to think that the present situation is more the fault of the times, of the party, and of many lesser men than it is the fault of Eisenhower. Everybody, who we have been able to note, spent many months presumably waiting for Eisenhower to pick a presidential candidate or lead a soft Goldwater movement. Perhaps if some of them had made their own choice, or started leading something themselves in their own right, they could have made whatever Eisenhower was going to do more effective.

During this long period during which everybody was waiting for Eisenhower to make a move, he did make a move. It then became a pity to see what those who might have benefited from it did with it. Eisenhower made a move very early after the Oregon primary, he named the late Ralston as the king of candidates he thought the Republican party should have. It was a statement which spoke for a long time that people don't strive hard enough to get out of it, for persuasion toward a soberer kind of thinking, show themselves in some statistics presented in a Wall Street Journal survey of the infant mortality rate in this country. For one thing, the United States, this wonderful of cure, raises not first but tenth in the world in the losses of its infant mortality rate. Nine other nations, led by the Netherlands and Sweden, keep more babies alive than we do. For the second big thing, this relatively poor record of ours—poor in relation to the other nations, and poor in relation to the way we like to think of ourselves—comes directly from a very pronounced difference in the economic background of the babies born in this country.

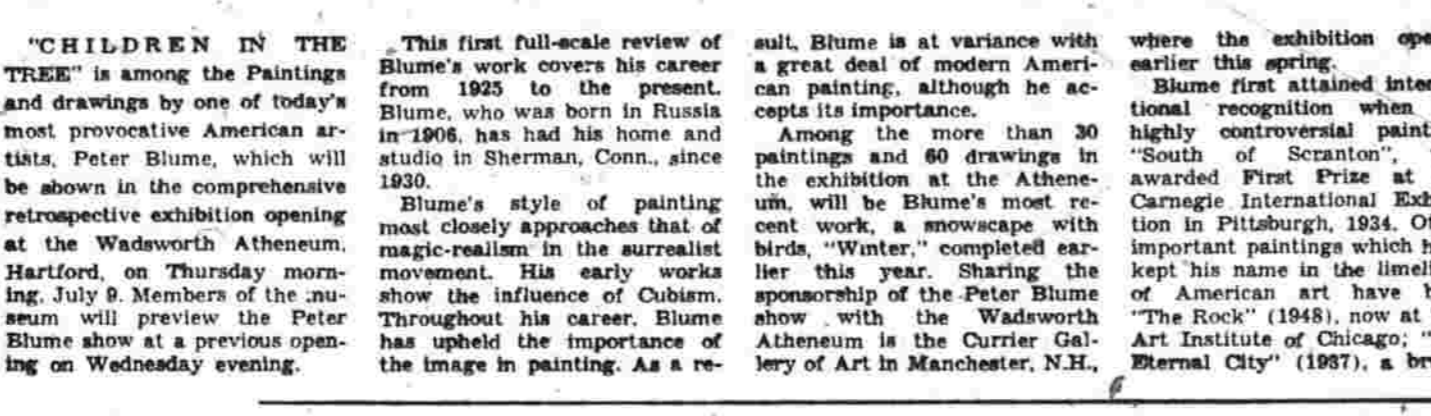
In some of our cities, as many as 41.7 out of each 1,000 babies born die at birth or during the first year. In some of our fine suburbs, the figure is as low as 12.6 per 1,000. Some of the economic statistics happen, inevitably, to coincide with racial statistics. On the whole, the infant mortality rate in our non-white population is double the national figure for white babies. This poverty business, then, is real enough to be costing human life. It is no will of the wisp being pursued by some popularity-seeking demagogue. It is no soft fantasy to be scorned and ignored by some demagogue of the extreme right. These big national poverty pockets of ours cost human lives. An improved economic status—money—could do much to save these lives almost instantly, if it were available. One of the simplest ways to improve the statistics for infant mortality is to increase the amount of clinical care available for expectant mothers. Just medical care and advice can do much. Improved living conditions, improved diet, could do more.

We are tenth, not first, in our infant mortality statistics. The world's richest nation still has great pockets of poverty so real it costs large numbers of human lives every day the poverty continues. Let us try to handle it as the great national issue it is—our greatest and most pressing national issue, obviously, next to that of racial relations, with which it also has its obvious connection. Politics should end and reorganize itself at the edge of every poverty pocket, just as it is supposed to halt all the water's edge when foreign policy is given and decisive. And then the advance upon the problem, pledged to its defeat, should be national. Let us save lives, first, and as many as we can. Then let the theologists debate, if they still want to, whether these babies might have been saved by themselves, all this time, if they had merely chosen to fight for breath a little harder. PETER BLUME PAINTING LOANED TO WADSWORTH FOR SPECIAL EXHIBITION

This first full-scale review of Blume's work covers his career from 1925 to the present. Blume, who was born in Russia in 1906, has had his home and studio in Sherman, Conn., since 1930. Blume's style of painting most closely approaches that of magic-realism in the surrealist movement. His early works show the influence of Cubism. Throughout his career, Blume has upheld the importance of the image in painting. As a result, Blume is at variance with a great deal of modern American painting, although he accepts its importance. Among the more than 30 paintings and 60 drawings in the exhibition at the Athenaeum will be Blume's most recent work, a mosaic with the title "Water," completed earlier this year. Sharing the sponsorship of the Peter Blume show with the Wadsworth Athenaeum is the Currier Gallery of Art in Manhattan, N.Y.

The exhibition opened earlier this spring. Blume first attained international recognition when his highly controversial painting, "South of Scranton," was awarded First Prize at the Carnegie International Exhibition in Pittsburgh, 1934. Other important paintings which have kept his name in the forefront of American art have been "The Rock" (1948), now at the Art Institute of Chicago; "The Eternal City" (1957), a brutal statement on Mussolini; and "Stam's Oak," a monumental work which focuses on a tree near the Vatican under which the 16th century pope, half-mad, Torquato Tasso, was supposed to have meditated. In the Wadsworth Athenaeum exhibition is Blume's "Falling Street Hat," painted in 1952. Your editorial of June 28th, "Faster Than The Job," displays a gross misunderstanding of the function, capability and limitations of computers. The contention that computers can "think" is wholly misleading unless "thinking" is defined, if mechanical, as making decisions based on concrete fact is considered "thought," then indeed, computers are becoming more human, since most human decisions and actions fall into this category. If "thinking" is defined to include creative actions involving human emotion, feeling, instinct and "hunches," then computers definitely cannot think. Inter-computer communication is not "talk" in the human sense of the word. There is no possibility of a computer "misunderstanding" another's transmission since the information is cold, hard fact and is not subject to the ambiguity of facial expression, inflection or mispronunciation. One wonders how the Herald would prosper if the publishers simulated a computer and made the business "on a low, restrained, purely machine level" and "for any company or departmental policy which might have in it any risk of failure." A computer can do no more or less than the programmer who instructs it. It is no more accurate than the people who prepare its input or those who design and maintain its circuitry. You seem to be a computer, professional computer people and the general public are disservice by perpetuating the myth that computers are electric brains of their own.
