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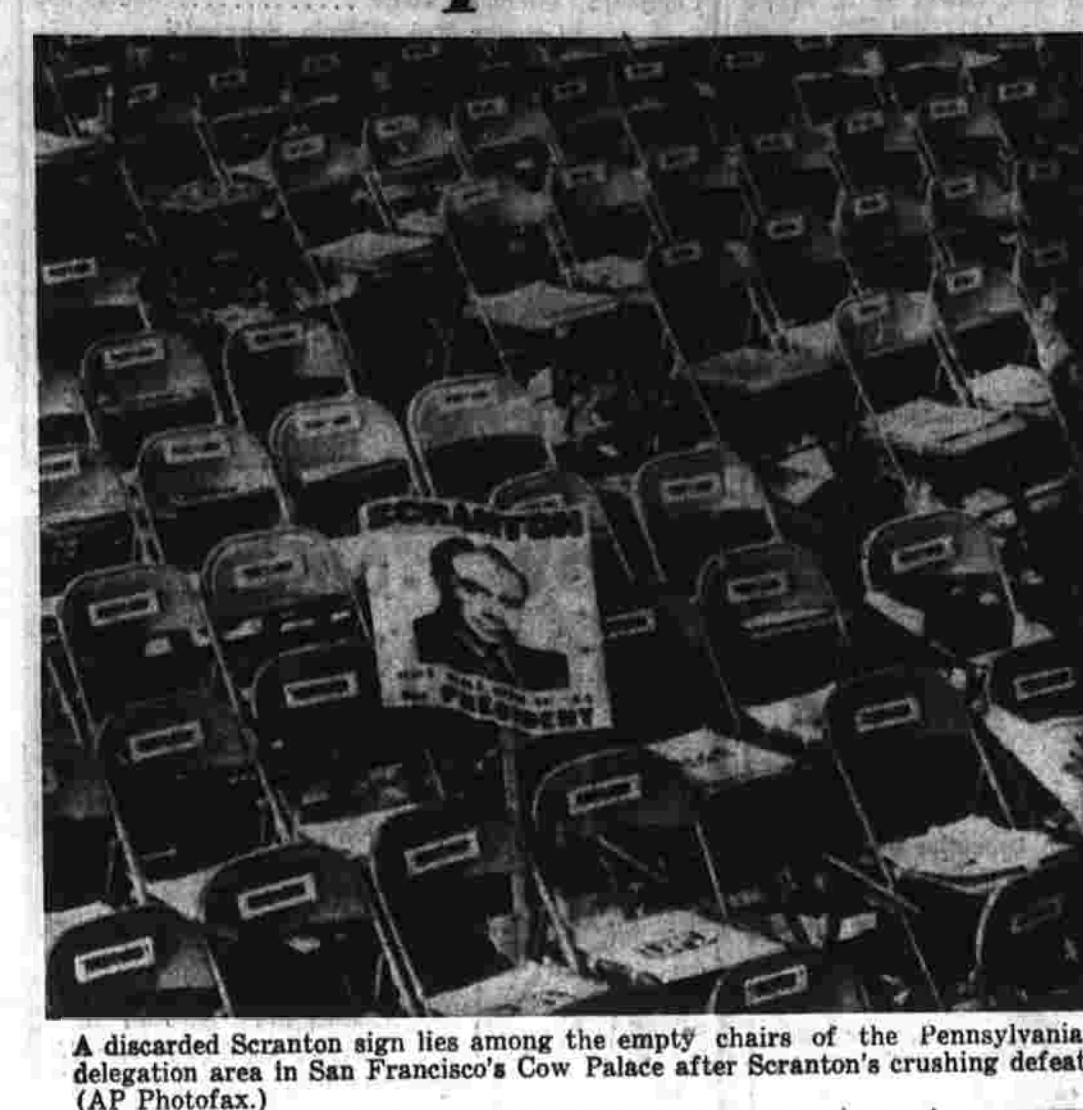

Congressman Ahear W. Sibal of Norwalk, who had labored hard for a platform plank on anti-communism, commented briefly.

"I stand for Gov. Scrantom's policies fully," he said. "I will support the ticket."

Malcolm Baldridge of Woodbury, chairman of the Connecticut Republican Party, said that the Scrantom and Goldwater organizations in Connecticut had agreed some months ago to work equally well for whichever was the nominee.

"In Connecticut," he said, "where the Republican Party is in a minority, no thinking Republican can afford not to support our national ticket, wholeheartedly. We intend to do just that."

As everyone here, the Connecticut delegates went to the Cow Palace yesterday with little doubt that Goldwater would be the winner.

Both sides carried placards to the convention hall, but only the Scrantom supporters paraded the placards during the demonstrations.

The Goldwater delegates merely held their signs aloft from their seats.

It is a 10-man Committee headed by Theodore S. Ryan, co-chairman of the delegation, cast the ballots for Connecticut, giving "twelve to his native son, William W. Scrantom." The governor was born in Madison.

As Ryan stood for one of the state's delegates during the spotlight at this convention, Pliny Sanchez, his rival, said: "I have never been anti-Goldwater and have offered to be the fourth Goldwater delegate if it was needed to keep the contest going."

The national committee newsman said she was not very proud of what's happened to the Republican party since 1940 according to the Gallup poll figures.

"We have constantly lost Republican registration to the Democrats," she said. "This has been the moderate Republican leadership of which I was a part."

"I personally have become more conservative and I'm willing to give voters a chance to do a better job than perhaps we have."

"One thing I want to get across to people," she added, "is that this Goldwater thing can't be brushed aside under the John Birch label, which is what so many are trying to do."

She predicted that Goldwater would run surprisingly well in Connecticut.

"You don't have the kind of organization Goldwater has without grass roots support. There are thousands of dedicated Goldwater workers in Connecticut."

Although they have not said so publicly, most of the top leaders in the state believe that Goldwater will carry badly in the state.

They fear the November election may cost them both the only congressional seat they hold (Sibal's) and the House of Representatives in the state legislature, which they have controlled for all but one session in the last 30 years.

Defeat Shadows Scranton Future

(Continued from Page One)

Two factors weigh heavily in an assessment of Scranton's prospects in the years ahead—particularly 1968, another presidential year.

Mr. J. Paul Scranton is a governor who can not succeed himself. Thus, his position is different from that of two other notable politicians who turned conventional defeat into victory four years later—the late President John F. Kennedy and the new Republican presidential nominee, Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, defeated at the 1960 Democratic convention in a bid for the vice-presidential nomination, came back like a whirlwind during the next four years to win the top spot and the election.

Goldwater was placed in nomination at the 1960 GOP Convention, but withdrew in favor of front-runner Richard M. Nixon. The move set Goldwater up as a major contender four years later in the wake of Nixon's defeat by Kennedy.

But both men had a political base. Both were U.S. senators—one of the best records in politics to use for political advancement.

But under Pennsylvania law Scranton may not succeed himself, though he could again run for office after an intervening term. Elected in 1962 by a margin of 10,000 votes, he now is in the middle of his four-year term.

Scranton means the base of his political power—chief executive of a major state—will be cut off at the end of 1966. With one possible exception there would be no office open that year that he could seek as a springboard for 1968, should Goldwater fail to win his bid. There is no formal election in 1966.

Consequently, should Scranton bid for reelection as governor in 1968, there would be a two-year gap in his public career.

The bill young Scranton—he'll be 47 Saturday—is the multi-millionaire son of the family that gave the city of Scranton, Pa., its name.

With his private resources, plus his prestige as a former governor and presidential aspirant, Scranton probably could keep himself in the public eye on the lecture circuit and by writing articles.

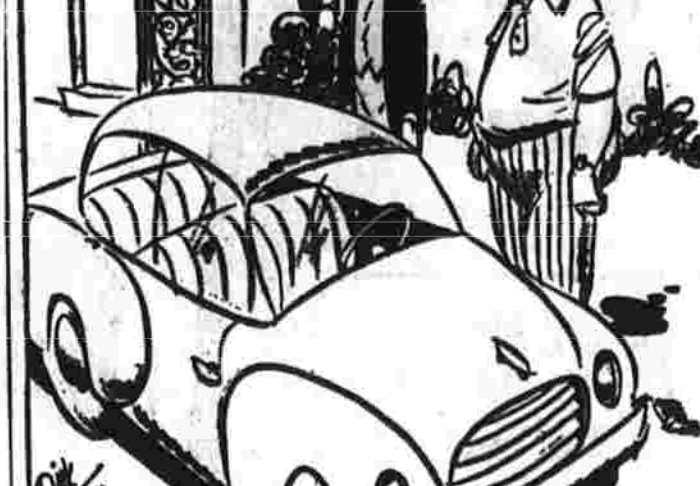
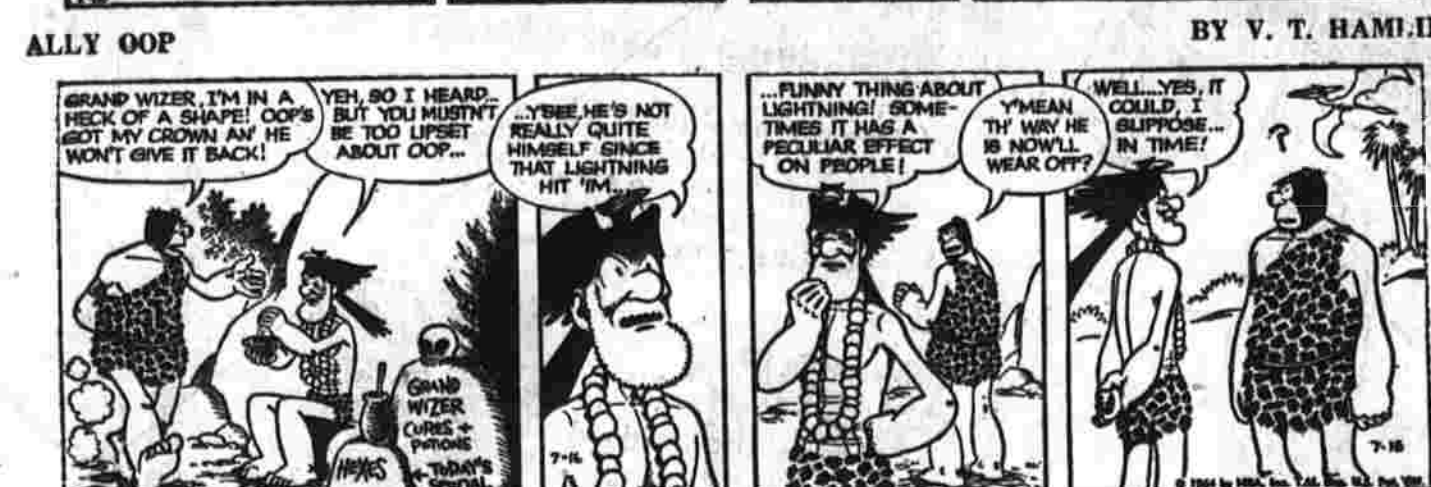

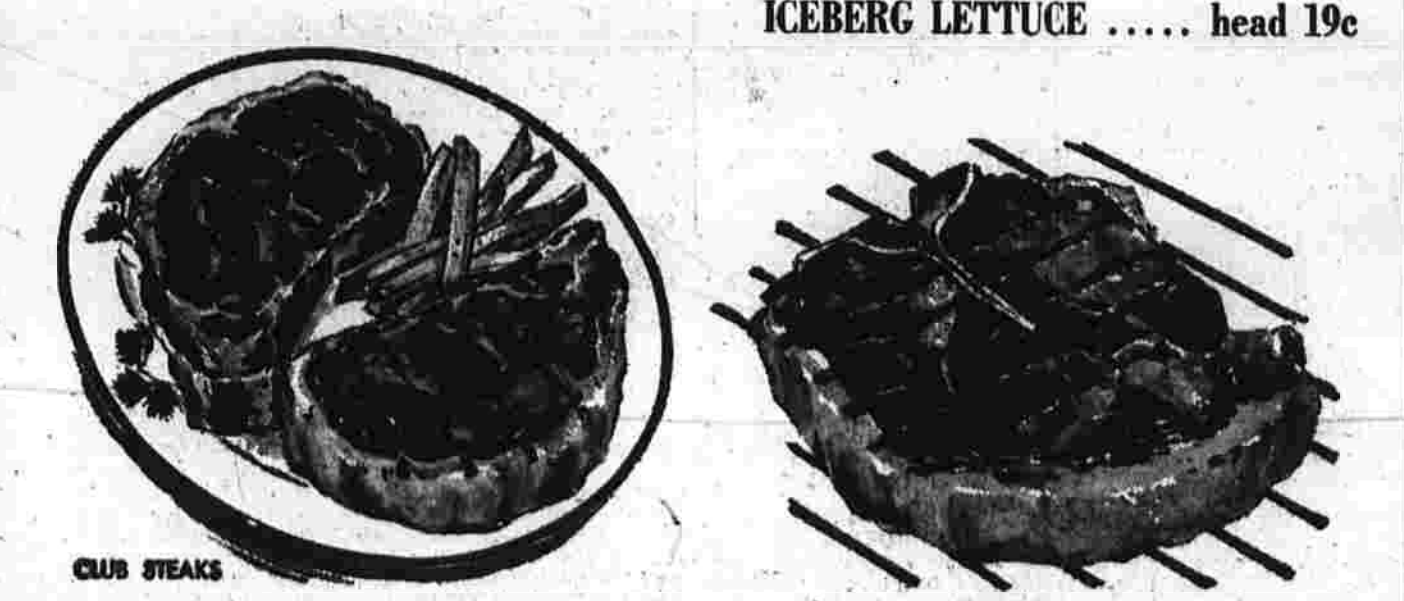
