### South Windsor Construction Underway On New Eli Terry School

Construction began yesterday on the Eli Terry Elementary School on the site of the old school building on the corner of Elm and Main streets.

The school, designed in the shape of a "T", was laid out to take full advantage of the site. The first all-electric school in Connecticut, it will be constructed by the C. A. Welmer Co. of Danbury.

The building was designed by the architectural firm of Russell, Gibson and vonDobson of West Hartford.

The decision on an all-electric school was made on the basis of engineering reports submitted to the public building commission by Koton and Donovan of West Hartford, consulting engineers. A special rate has been guaranteed by the Connecticut Light and Power Co. for a period of five years.

Reports submitted showed an electrical heating system would be most economical over a period of years on the basis of installation, maintenance rates and other factors.

The original bond issue approved for the school amounted to \$600,000.

The total estimated cost of the school is \$900,000. This includes the bid contract price, addition of city water to the school site, interest on bonds, architect's fees, movable equipment, clerk of the works operating expense plus fees and contingencies.

Welmer Company submitted a bid on the project of \$113,774.

arrived and as he left Monday. The gallery was crowded. The bent old figure shuffled to his seat at question time. For nearly an hour he listened, then rose unaided.

He walked slowly to the side, gave a brief glance back at the scene of many battles and was gone.

One of the text of the Commons motion:

"Sir Winston Churchill: That this House desires to take this opportunity of marking the forthcoming retirement of the Rt. Honorable Gentleman a member for Woodford by putting on record its unbounded admiration and gratitude for his services to Parliament, the nation and the world.

"Remembers above all his leadership until victory was won; and offers its grateful thanks to the Rt. Honorable Gentleman for his outstanding services to this house and to the nation:

"That a committee be appointed to wait upon the Rt. Honorable Gentleman and convey to him the thanks of this House; that the prime minister, Mr. Harold Wilson, Mr. J. G. C. Gifford, Sir Thomas Moore and Mr. Kenneth Robinson be members of the committee.

"Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home leads the Conservative party; Wilson the Labour party and Gifford the Liberal party members.

"By coincidence the tributes came 20 years to the day after a typically Churchillian episode.

On Tuesday, July 28, 1944 seven days before Britain was swept into World War I, the British fleet was exercising off the south coast. Churchill was in the cabinet. Churchill's name was on the list of names to be inscribed on the Cenotaph in London.

Without consulting his colleagues in the cabinet, Churchill ordered the fleet to battle stations at Scapa Flow, north of Scotland. The battle fleet, stretching 18 miles in line, slipped safely through the Dover Straits to its war zone without the risk of attack by German submarines.

### Columbia 16 Acres Allotted for Dump Site

First Selectman Clair Robinson has presented 16 acres of Doubleday Rd. for the town to use as a new dump site.

Robinson said the land owned by Charles Sedon, presently being collected for Columbia, Robinson's only stipulation was that the land could still be used by the town for a dump should Sedon terminate his collection. Details and financial arrangements will be worked out shortly.

Robinson became ill at Saturday night's special town meeting and was taken to Windham Community Memorial Hospital where he has been reported as resting comfortably.

Among other ordinances adopted by the town was one concerning sewerage facilities. The town voted that no dwelling, apartment, boarding house, hotels, commercial buildings or camps shall be constructed in the town unless the sewerage facilities in connection with them have been approved by the director of health services of the state.

All applications for approval must be filed with the inspector and approved by him. All applications should be accompanied by a plan of the proposed sewerage facilities. The fee has been set at \$10.

The owner or agent of any building who violates any provision of the ordinance will be fined up to \$25 each day the violation continues.

**Nature Is Still A Problem**  
 To give away a minor trade secret, when two pieces of reading material, that is likely to make an editorial. We were reading, just the other day, an account of one of the surprising brilliant civilizations which flourished in the jungle of Central America centuries before the Spaniards came. Suddenly, the civilization collapsed, not from any lack of food or water, but from a force, not very apparently, from any sudden disease. And one theory advanced was that the civilization in question was visited by a few slight changes in its weather. These slight changes in its weather pattern upset the elaborate agriculture the people had evolved for producing its food under jungle conditions. Confronted with an experience it could neither explain nor correct, the civilization turned in frustration and anger against its established intellectual and religious leadership, and without such leadership, became merely a dwindling thing at the mercy of the environment which had once given it life and prosperity.

That, at least, was one theory, of how a change in the weather may have ended a civilization. The recent flood in New York Times the other day, an absorbing account of the problems which have been created in our own Great Lakes region by a general decline in rainfall since 1960. Lakes Michigan and Huron are down to the lowest levels ever recorded. The overall statistics for both lakes show they are down 2.5 feet from their average depth. There are several ways to express what such a shrinkage means. To bring the lakes up to normal, for instance, would require the equivalent of 100 years of rain. For months instead of for weeks. This is possible. Only 12 years ago, the Great Lakes waters were abnormally high, causing millions of dollars worth of damage because they were flooding over their banks. The big immediate thing the water shrinkage does is to alter the usefulness of Great Lakes ports and force costly remedies. One is to keep dredging ports and channels deeper, and money is now being spent every day on this process. Another is to build locks and dams to hold water back, so that it can be used in channels and docks. For one large cargo ship to load itself enough lighter to make itself float on the Great Lakes can cost it something like \$100,000 a year in extra revenue. But particularly when the experts say the situation is almost certain to get much worse before it gets any better, the chain of possible effects goes on and on.

**The Kids Come First**  
 The recent audit of the Manchester Recreation Department charged it was a sin to pay departmental expenses for hours they did not actually work. Whether or not the audit in question was a politically inspired fishing expedition, everybody bowed head and acknowledged that henceforth the sin of paying people for more hours than they had actually worked should not be committed. What happened with the town's summer recreational program yesterday, involving both swimming pools and playgrounds, resulted from General Manager Martin's strict application of the audit rule policy. If General Manager Martin was seeking to prove that some of the criticisms and recommendations of the audit were nonsensical and impractical, the point may be considered proved. We think most people realize that the good young people who serve the town's recreational program as seasonal employees must be guaranteed a fair and reasonable income for their services, and that the best practical way for giving them this is to give them the stated amount of pay a week even if the week does include rainy days on which they do not actually perform their duties. In other words, a practice which can be criticized by some sensation-seeking investigation can also be the only common sense way for a town department to operate.

The merits of the dispute, then, have been with the Recreation Department's summer employees, rather than with the much discussed audit or General Manager Martin's strict enforcement of its supposed reforms. Even before this trial began, the union itself had begun to come apart, and to put restrictions around its regular treasury so that it wouldn't be paying Hoffa's legal fees forever. **Good For Sibal**

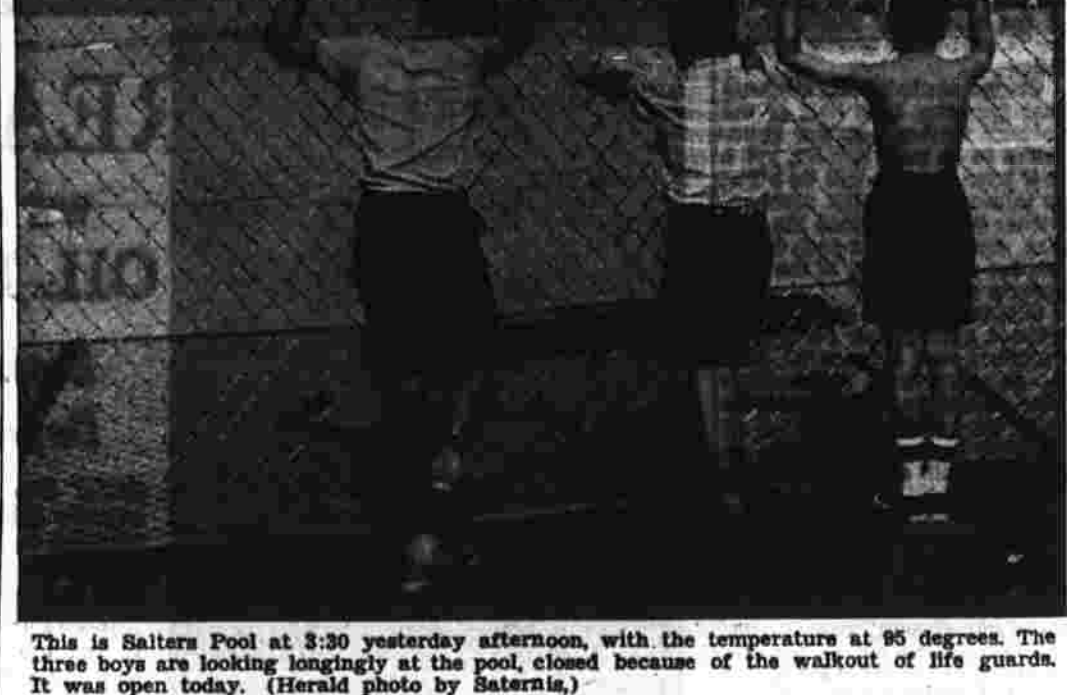
