Rogers Firm Starts Work On Addition

# Africa Riots Led By 'Prophets'

LUBAKA, Northern Rhodesia (AP) — Northern Rhodesia's British government and African prime minister flew today to the bushland area where 1,200 African troops, police and their white officers are trying to put down a religious outbreak that has cost at least 40 lives.

The outbreak, which broke out Tuesday after a week's rampage of murder, arson and looting by the spear-wielding Lumpa sect of religious fanatics.

The Lumpas are led by an African "prophet," Alice Lenhema, who claims she died and returned to life three days later to lead a religious crusade against witchcraft.

"There will be no appeasement with the sect. This witch-sneeze has got to end," Prime Minister Kenneth Kaunda told newsmen as he and Home Secretary Chinnaili, 800 miles northeast of Lusaka and the center of the violence.

Utilizing a blend of Christian theology and superstition, Alice has taught her followers that the sect was cry of "Jericho" will turn bullets into water. They reportedly charge into police gunfire without fear.

The current wave of violence stems from a long history of friction between the United Nations and the government of this central African territory when it gains independence from Britain later this year.

Composed of southern and midwestern delegates he said the group was apparently working for a forced inclusion of Christianity in the public schools in opposition to the Supreme Court's ruling that they did not succeed.

But northern delegates also understood that program to obtain a supreme court ruling on the use of tax funds to support private parochial schools. The NEA itself does not endorse either view, Wolfert said, although it considers its main purpose the integration of religious instruction.

With the convention's actions on the record, and the election of Wolfert as president, the NEA has taken its most forceful and progressive stand yet.

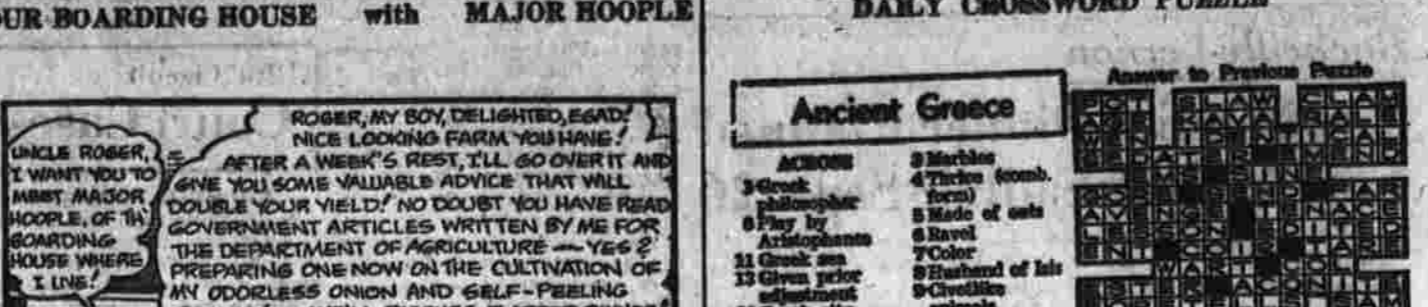
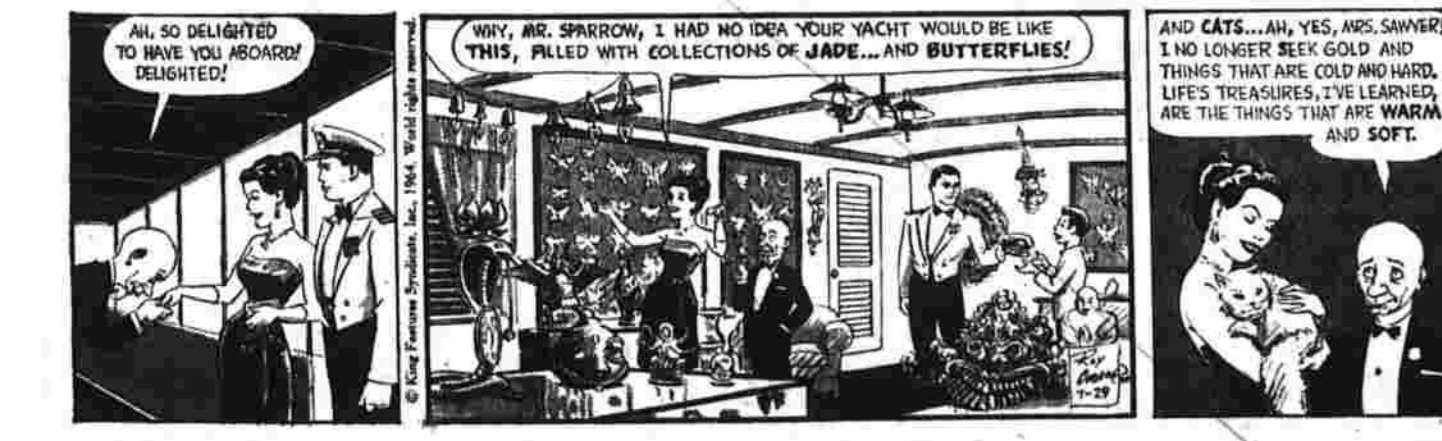

Olympic Berth Threatened by Monocloisis

NEW HAVEN (AP)—An attack of monocloisis is standing between hurdler Jay Lock and a trip to Tokyo as a member of the U.S. Olympic team.

Cows Provide Odd Hazard On Rustic Vermont Course

BARTON, Vt. (AP)—The sign on the first tee of the Barton Country Club entreats golfers not to hit them.

"They're cows all right and they speak the appropriate, well-groomed, first fairway. They munch, they moo, they mander."

The club, carved more than 50 years ago in the hills of Vermont's rustic northeast kingdom, makes no pretensions toward the tony atmosphere associated with haute establishments sufficed by "country club."

"Yes," agrees club vice President Ken Elliott. "I guess we're not like most country clubs. But we have a lot of fun."

The nine-hole, 2,786-yard course is laid out smack in the middle of the farm of Amos V. Amri, who leases the grazing land to the club, doesn't play golf himself. He's too busy tending to his milk to protect them from the golfers.

"We've had to modify our insurance agent, explained Elliott.

"For example we play winter rules here all year 'round. Winter rules permit a golfer to improve his fairway lie without moving the ball appreciably close to the hole."

"We have to have preferred lies at all times," he said, "because of course, the cows aren't very considerate."

The cows necessitate other modifications.

"We have fences around all the greens—about three feet high—to keep the cows away," Elliott said. There are turnstiles in each fence to allow the golfer to pass through when he wants to putt.

What happens if the apertures about strikes the fence? Elliott was asked.

"Oh, we just allow the golfer to take it over—usually right up to the golfer's back of the green. We have to count those."

"Nobody tries to run their approach shots on here," he said. "We all sort them with a wedge or a nine iron."

There are almost no sand traps at the Barton Country Club.

"There wouldn't be much use trying to keep them smooth with the cows walking through them all the time," Elliott said.

The cows create problems not familiar to prople.

"We have to carry insurance against the cows being hurt," Elliott said.

"And we've had to pay off a few times."

Farmer Vesina, it seems, brought suit on several occasions claiming "under damage." The insurance company paid up without a whimper. The cows, it seems, don't respond to "fore" or even "fore, bossy."

"It's a lot easier playing in the spring," Elliott said, "because the cows aren't used to the golfers then and they're a little frightened of them."

But as the season goes along they become downright friendly and they aren't used to the golfers. They think cows are dangerous.

"Pella" was visiting me once," Elliott remembers, "and he remarked that the course looked kind of stodgy. He didn't think we had a prosperous club."

"I took him out to the first fairway the next day. The cows had been grazing there all morning and had eaten away every bit of rough—clear up to the woodline."

"Can you tell me of any other course? I asked him. He said 'No fairway now-ers.'"
