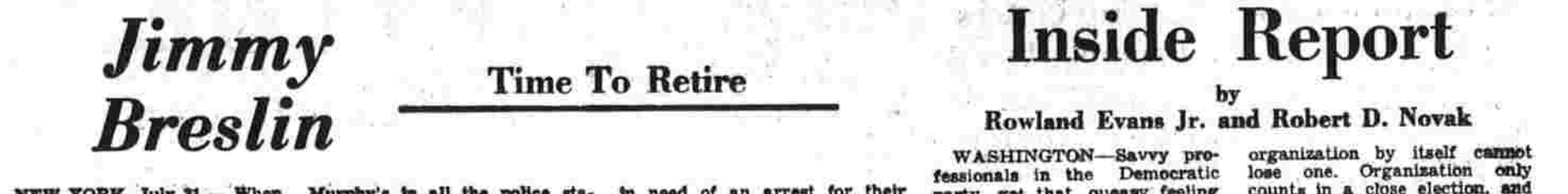

But neither seems fitted to direct a national campaign. The two most influential figures among the Democratic National Committee today are Cliff Carter, the President's personal representative, and Richard Maguire, a Kennedy holdover as the party's National Treasurer.

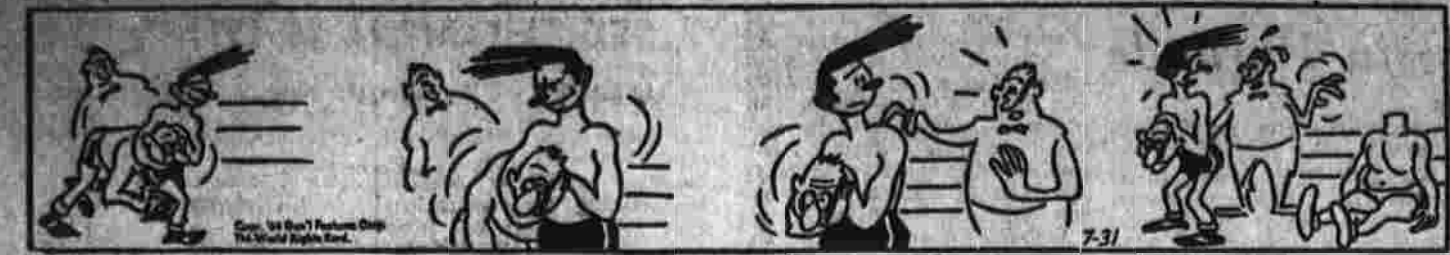

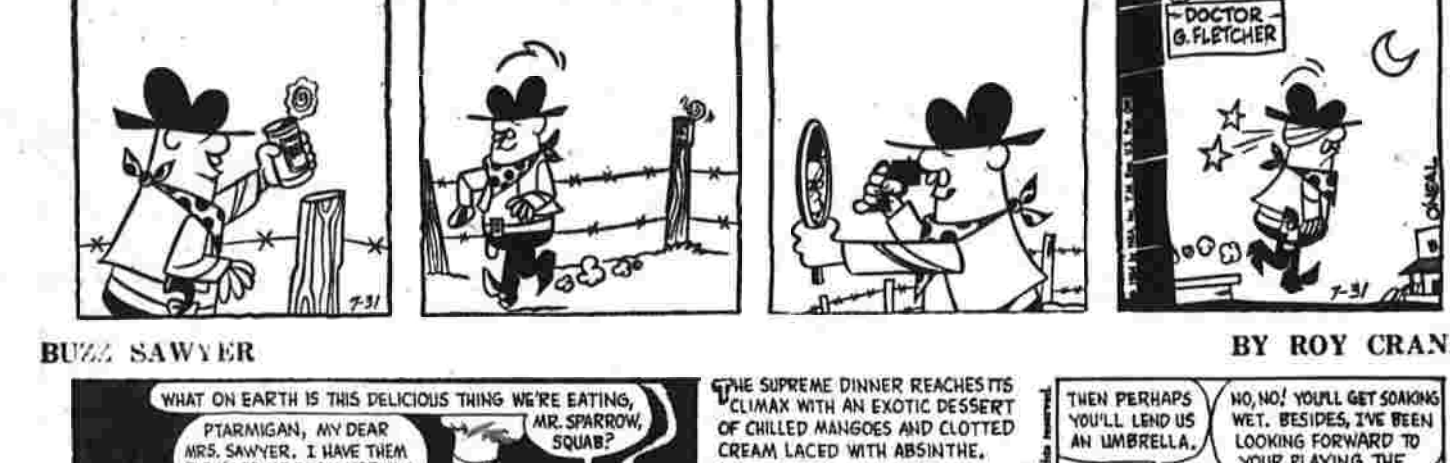

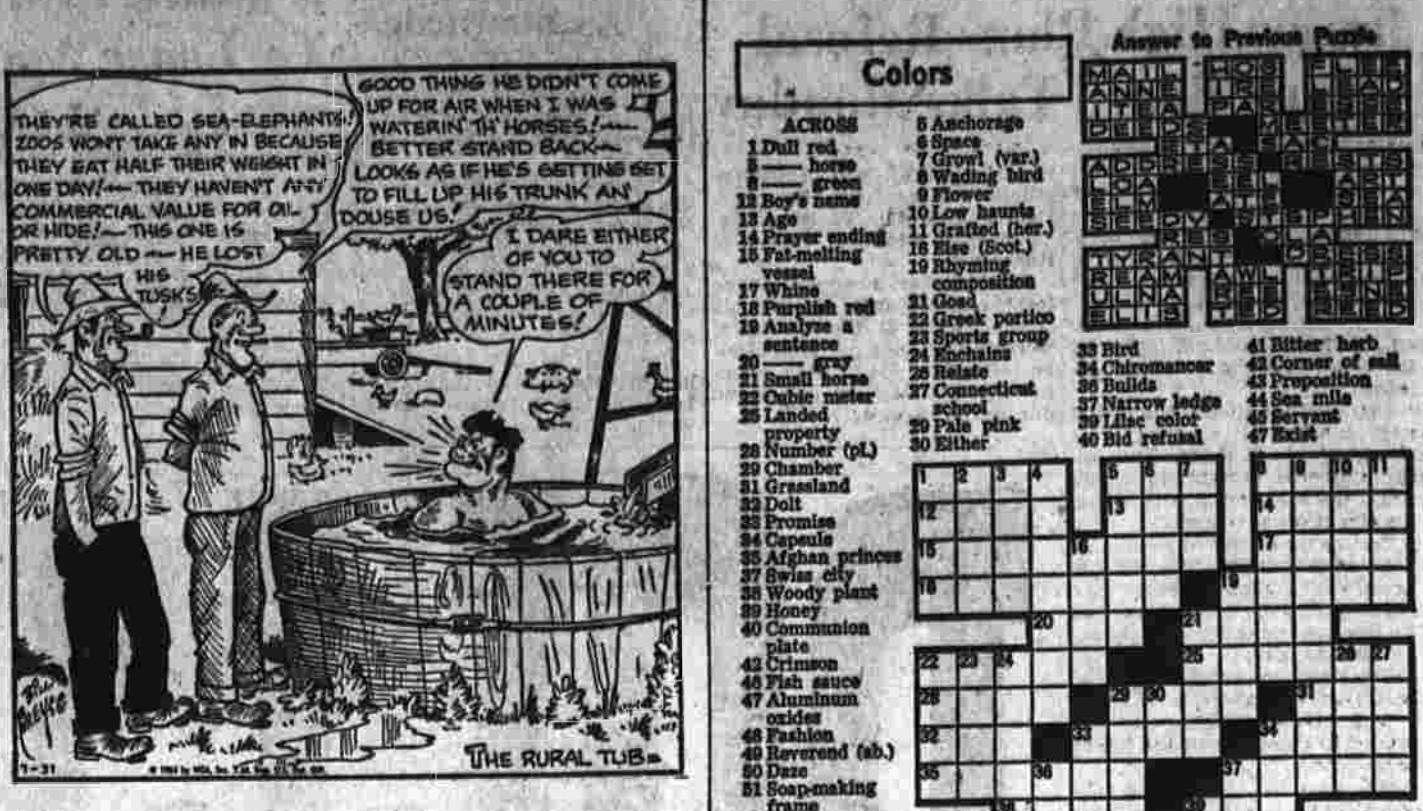
