Rockville-Vernon West Ender Protests Lack of Swim Pool

A west end resident last night asked the city council for the "same benefits" as the "East Enders" — a swimming pool for children in the area.

CCC Work Recalled by Rep. Roybal

WASHINGTON (AP)—One congressman has a right arm more muscular than his left arm, according to a report in something called the Congressional Record, also known as the CCC.

The initials may be unfamiliar to you, but the CCC, known as the Civilian Conservation Corps, was very large in the depression years in the 1930s. It was one of Franklin D. Roosevelt's weapons against joblessness, set up especially for unemployed youths.

Rep. Edward R. Roybal, D-Calif., remembers well. In 1935 he was just out of high school, oldest of three children of a Mexican-American family, living in a tough Los Angeles neighborhood. There was no money, and he was working for the Conservation Corps.

"The days I spent in the CCC were the happiest days of my life," he said recently. "Had I not been in the CCC, I would not have gone on to an institution of higher learning."

"The CCC was a program, not a poverty program, and it was not a job program," he said. "It was a program to help young men like me get out of the slums and into the country."

Asked what the CCC had done for him, he said, "It gave me a chance to see the country and to meet people from all over the country. It was a great experience."

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Peru Leader Says Nation Progressing

LIMA, Peru (AP)—President Fernando Belaunde Terry is starting his second year in office proud of his record and confident of the future.

In reply to questions submitted by the Associated Press, the 50-year-old president of Peru said his administration includes an amendment of the nation's first agrarian reform law, doubled dollar reserves, increased construction of highways and low-cost housing, increased foreign investment and prospects of stronger relations with the United States.

"I said elections have proved that this communism lacks backing" in Peru, and that the identification of Peru with communism "limits that foreign influence to a very small following."

Belaunde, elected for a six-year term, said he considered the revival of municipal elections as a major achievement during his first year in office.

"For more than 40 years Peru has suffered from a lack of social justice, within constitutional bounds."

In order to attain this goal, he said, "the government has been able to do this by the revivification of the million hectares. This plan seeks to establish the man-labor basis."

Such a plan calls for irrigation projects in the coastal area and irrigation improvements in the Andes Mountains, as well as a vast settlement program on the eastern slopes of the Andes through construction of marginal lands.

System Change at Hospital Cabinets Giving Way To New Supply Carts

Manchester Memorial Hospital has purchased a new and efficient system of departmental supply system at a cost of \$6,000. But the hospital expects to recoup half the purchase price the first year in labor-saving.

The purchase is being made possible through funds supplied by the hospital's Women's auxiliary.

The new system improves the floor supply cart and can devote the two hours of nursing time supplies used to take to patient care.

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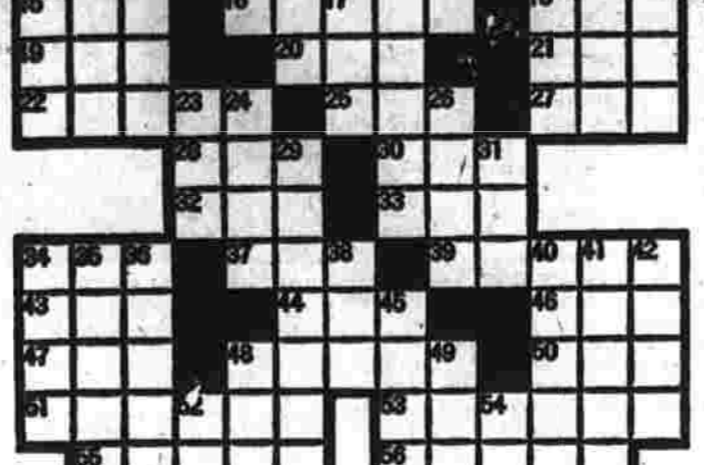
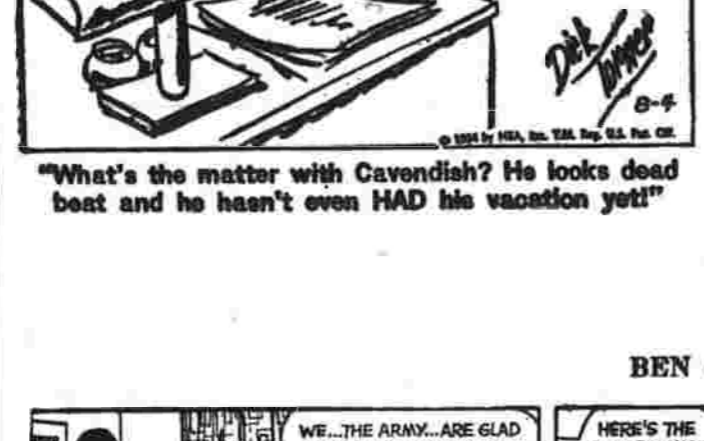

The only representative of the MRA to speak at the hearing was Atty. George C. Lesmer, who asserted that the MRA should not be "rigged" in appraising the properties of its clients, Elizabeth Olcavage and Ann Haskins — the properties needed first for the school wing.

Keith explained that the agency would gladly entertain any new information that might alter its appraisal of the properties. Atty. Lesmer pledged his clients' cooperation. Keith asked — with no response — for additional comment or questions on the land acquisition, and the hearing was adjourned.

No mention was made of the price being offered for the four properties by the Federal Urban Renewal Administration (FURA) has not approved the local agency's offer yet — nor of the asking price for the Olcavage-Haskins property.

Keith explained that "it is the policy of the redevelopment agency not to make offers of purchase until the local agency has approved the sale price." Keith also noted in opening the meeting that federal and state regulations, which the North End urban renewal project, with which the Robertson School addition is associated, is largely financed by federal and state funds.

Two directors hitched the school to the renewal project, when they voted to approve MRA an appropriation of \$60,000 to buy the four properties needed for the school under a federal "early acquisition" program.

Under the "early acquisition" plan, the town will buy the four school properties in advance of the rest of the renewal project but receive credit toward the town's eighth share of the total project cost for the \$60,000 spent for the school tract.

Before the MRA can buy with the purchase of the four lots, it must have final federal approval of the amount it tends to offer for them. All the properties have been appraised by the agency at least twice; but the appraisals have yet to be approved by the FURA.

Ryboczyk says that a representative of the federal agency will be in Manchester toward the end of the week to check out the MRA's proposed prices.

The MRA announced some weeks ago that it intended to offer the property owners the maximum amount the federal government would allow, rather than try to dicker for a better price. Offers have already been made for the Olcavage-Haskins property and another owned singly. Whether negotiations over the price of the Olcavage-Haskins piece will delay the project was unclear last night.

The town is already on tenterhooks awaiting the closing of the property transfers and the clearing of at least one of the four properties. If the deal cannot be closed and the land cleared within 14 days, the town could lose what it considers a favorable bid on the construction of the Robertson School wing.

Bids for the school project were taken on June 23. The low bidder, Jack R. Hunter Construction Co., offered to build the new wing and remodel the existing building for \$628,500. The firm of architects which designed the structure, Scuderi & Mankey, had estimated the work would run about \$645,000.

Under the terms of the bid, the town pledged to sign the reconstruction contract within 30 days. Subsequently General Manager Richard Martin and Superintendent of School William Curtis obtained an extension of an additional 10 days for Hunter, putting the present contract signing deadline

Racial Strife A Factor in Trade Plans

NEW YORK (AP)—Political uncertainties in the summer have been added to the uncertainties of business planning.

Businessmen have to plan ahead for the summer and have seemed to offer far less than the usual number of uncertainties. As the planners look to the woods or the beaches, all the signs still pointed to a further climb in the economy—and the signs still do.

The businessmen—the big corporations and the stock market—obviously were counting on good times in the spreading plans, for updating equipment or adding to existing production facilities and these plans are not necessarily looked well into the future.

The stock market has been hitting the nearer term. Prices, especially of many blue chips, have been bid to record highs. The meaning seemed to be that the big investors, individual or institutional, expected increases in earnings, and, perhaps dividends, and certainly higher market values for outstanding shares.

Regular uncertainties that plague the planners were still there, of course. International strife could always upset any predictions. Natural catastrophes such as weather or earthquakes could hit some industries or regions. The always predictable "consumer" could change from his present state of confidence to one of doubt and then consumer spending would fall and so would business sales and earnings.

And the aging business upturn could end in a recession, which would trigger a downturn.

But the economic signs on the whole were, and are, remarkably near unanimous in predicting continuing good times.

For many business planners, however, there are new uncertainties to deal with.

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India's Poor Ravaged by '64 Monsoon

NEW DELHI (AP)—The rain beats harder and faster. Weeds bend under the piling. Puddles form. Rivulets ooze into crooked channels where families huddle against the downpour.

All across the vast subcontinent the hard, driving rains of the monsoon have unleashed their fury. And India's ragged masses, always stalked by hunger, disease and poverty, are prey to the rampaging elements.

To four out of five of India's 460 million people, existing conditions in remote villages of festering stumps, the monsoon means two to four months of mud, mildew and massive misery.

Downpour day after day turn much of the world's second most populous nation into a nightmarish scene. The fact of hot, dry India is transformed. Quiet rivers and streams churn out of their banks. Arid plains are flooded. Hundreds of villages, drought-stricken before the rains, are swept by muddy water. Dusty roads winding through parched wastelands are suddenly awash. Scourged plots where peasants scratch out a living become miry graves of ruined crops.

Summer rains are vital for food production in India. But when the monsoon is severe, as it was in June and most of July, the always troublesome problem of feeding India's hungry millions becomes critical.

Farmers able to salvage their crops can't move them to market. Food prices spiral, and the penniless hungry get hungrier.

The Indian government has smothered the flames of crisis this summer through huge wheat and rice purchases from the United States, Pakistan and Australia.

The monsoon deals a hard blow to India's ragged five million homeless. These souls of the street exist without shelter
