Union Pickets Union Outing

About 200 textile union members crossed a union picket line Sunday to go to their annual picnic. The textile workers were members of Local 68, Textile Workers of America, all Cheney Mills employees, who were attending their annual summer outing.

The picket line was manned by about 26 members of Local 68 of the Hotel, Restaurant, Employee and Bartenders Union, who were unhappy that the picnic was being catered by non-union Garden Grove, Keeney St.

The restaurant union picketers carried signs proclaiming the textile union members were 'unfair to organized labor.' The picketing, which was forest by union business agent Leonard LaPenta, was in protest to the textile workers' refusal to recognize its common cause with the restaurant workers by switching to a union caterer.

But textile union local president Tude Vince says he tried to arrange a meeting between telephone pole company and owner of the catering service.

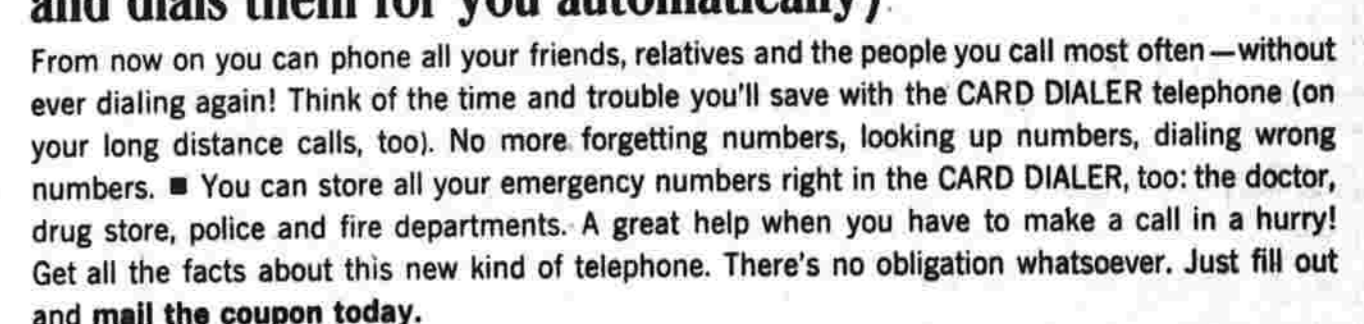

In New York City, which would be the natural leader in such a statistic, old cars are now being abandoned on the streets at the rate of 250 a week.

There are the pictures. Millions of cars being abandoned every year, fewer and fewer of them worth any salvage process, more and more of them spread in disgrace across the countryside.

Now for the kind of remedies being discussed. One kind of remedy, which would forbid such public abandonment of old cars, intensifies the problem without solving it.

Another kind of remedy—which would involve the operation of salvage and disposal plants by government—would be costly and difficult to get from the taxpayers.

Another kind of remedy—taking these old junk cars and throwing them into the deep sea—might be practical in some ocean areas, but still involves a final and complete waste of materials which old earth has mined out of itself.

None of these suggested attacks on the problem seems very satisfactory. There remains one possible approach to the problem which nobody has yet discussed, yet which it seems to us worth at least the time it might take our automotive engineers to figure out some reason or reasons it couldn't possibly be done.

Why not try to design and build a kind of automobile which would be composed of only two kinds of materials, one clearly and easily disposable and the other clearly and easily capable of becoming valuable salvage?

We have, it may occur to the reader now that we have begun to enter such a discussion, succeeded in designing for everything else conceivable. We design for beauty. We design for speed. We design for power. We design for prestige. We design for longevity. We design, also, for deliberate obsolescence. So why not design, as well, for salvage?

Why not try to design and build a kind of automobile which would be composed of only two kinds of materials, one clearly and easily disposable and the other clearly and easily capable of becoming valuable salvage?

When one considers what wonders the automobile industry has performed to date, one cannot resist believing that it could come up with some remarkable answers to the problem of disposing of old cars. If it once decided this was a problem important enough for its engineers to take on, it would be disposed of at the end of his life!

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McNamara's Millions
"Let me assure you that our strategic forces are and will remain in the 1960's and the seventies, sufficient to insure the destruction of both the Soviet Union and Communist China, under the worst imaginable circumstances accompanying the outbreak of war. There should be no doubt of this in the mind of any American. There is some in the minds of our enemies."

That was Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, performing his official duty, and his political duty, before the Democratic Platform Committee in Washington yesterday. It is his official job to be responsible for some such statement of military might as he was describing in the paragraph we are quoting. It was his political responsibility to talk this way because there is one American, by the name of Goldwater, who quite naturally, considering his own political position, questions the perfection of our nuclear strength and the completeness of our preparations for destruction.

Later in his testimony, Defense Secretary McNamara ventured a small description of what he might possibly have meant by the phrase "worst imaginable circumstances accompanying the outbreak of war."

"A full-scale nuclear exchange between the United States and the Soviet Union, lasting less than one hour, would kill almost 100 million Americans—the equivalent of over 300 World War II's. The loss would be little comfort to know that over 100 million Russians would also be killed."

We should all be grateful to the Secretary of Defense for the exact words of his testimony. It is a touching admission that there might not be too much joy in the death of 100,000,000 Russians if their death happened to be matched by that of 100,000,000 Americans.

Now should we condemn him too much because that sort of back-door entry for the gentler and more humane considerations is the only touch of his kind he could manage in his testimony. He is doing exactly what we, the taxpayers, hire him to do. He is talking precisely the way our policy in this respect requires him to talk. He is reflecting, with complete accuracy, the sum of our civilization we human beings have attained in the year 1964.

Our momentary instinct to cringe and draw away should not be to draw away from the Secretary of Defense, but from ourselves. Or, if we do not cringe over such matters, but rather smile and rejoice at such good news, let us not hide our satisfaction under mere compliment to the Secretary of Defense, over the job he is doing for us. Let us beat our chest and give out with our own Texas yell. Viva! Oie!

America, The Junkyard
There are a few statistics available on America's junk car situation. If anybody wants figures for what the traveling eye cannot fall to notice.

There are now between 30,000,000 and 40,000,000 abandoned automobiles piling up in the American landscape.

We are now adding to this mass of junk at the rate of 5,000,000 cars annually.

With the automobile industry producing 7,800,000 new units this year, the rate of abandonment of old cars is likely to go higher still in the future.

Such basic statistics are something to be considered along with changes which have been taking place in the disposal problem. There is a time when it paid junkyards to accumulate these old cars, strip them, and then smash them together in a bundle which could be sold to the nation's steel mills for the production of new steel.

Improvements in processes in the steel industry, plus its dislike for the metallic impurities which could be cut out of the junk bundle, have lessened demand and price for this crumpled junk.

As a consequence, fewer Americans with old cars are finding it possible to sell them when they are through with them, fewer junkyards are interested in processing them, and some people are now just beginning to abandon old cars on city streets, and forcing the cities themselves and their taxpayers to expense of carting them off and disposing of them somewhere and somehow.

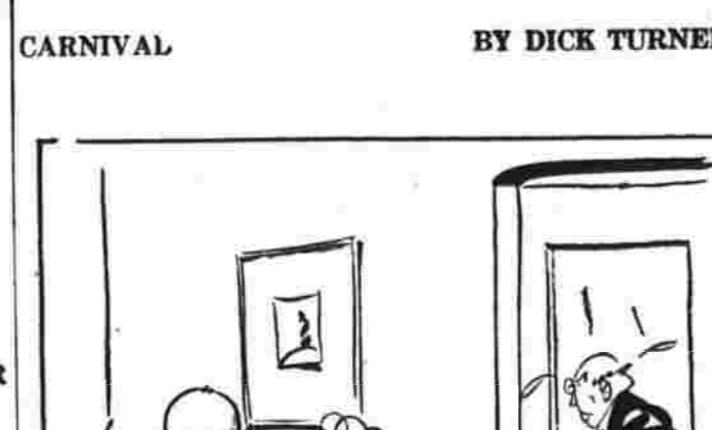

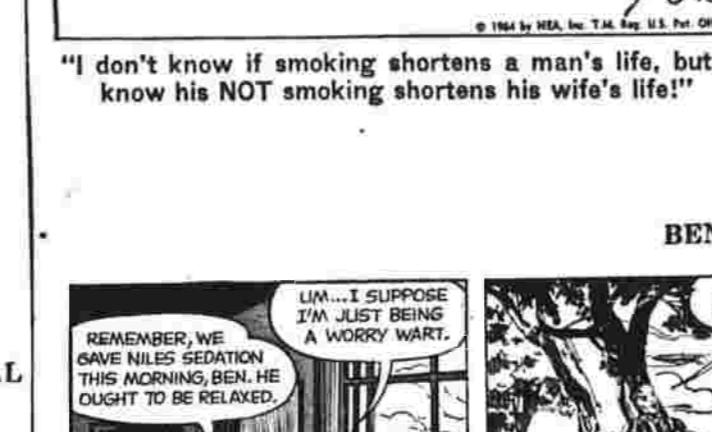

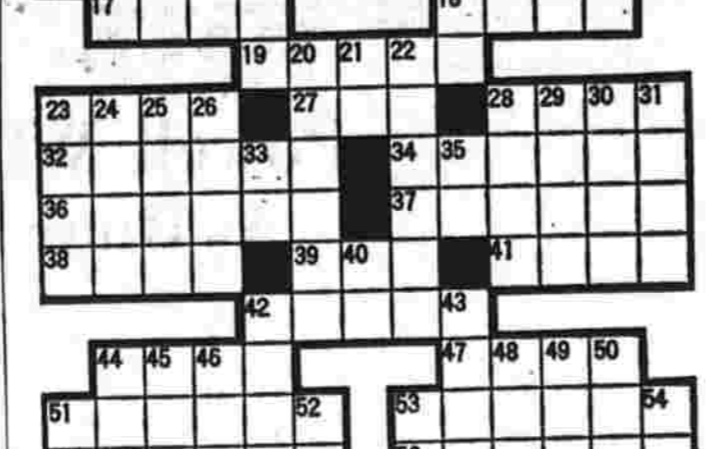

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Barry Says Weak Policy Invites War

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Sen. Barry Goldwater challenged President Johnson today to debate foreign policy.

Sen. Norris Cotton, D-R.I., charged that it was "very evident some influence has been exerted from higher up to push this bill because of the exigencies of the campaign."

"You are voting now by orders from higher up not to per-

mit this kind of confrontation? Why does Cotton now say that because somebody has decided it is better to be 'chickens than to be strong and forthright about it," Cotton asked.

Sen. John O. Pastore, D-R.I., the keynote speaker for the Democratic National Convention opening Monday, argued against tabling the compromise measure which he had supported.

But he tore into Cotton for suggesting the Democrats were chicken. He thundered: "Why did not Goldwater debate with Sen. Pastore at the Republican convention? Why did Goldwater say

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"If agreement can be reached at this caucus, we will have a sound basis for discussion when the Democratic and Republican leaders hold a joint meeting tomorrow," the governor said.

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Finio Offers New Threat To Keating

NEW YORK (AP) — Rep. Paul A. Finio, Bronx County Republican chairman, has challenged Sen. Kenneth B. Keating of Rochester for the GOP nomination to the U.S. Senate.

Finio said Keating, who formally announced for a second term yesterday, "cannot and should not" ask for renomination as long as he continues to withhold endorsement of presidential nominee Barry Goldwater.

Goldwater, in a speech prepared for delivery at the Illinois State Fair, said the Democrats want to shove foreign policy, a campaign issue.

"I say that foreign policy is a major issue in this political campaign," he said. "I say it must be discussed. I only wish it were."

Finio's move raised the possibility of a floor fight at the meeting, but nomination of Keating appeared certain. Keating's announcement was favorable to the Republican Party.

Finio said "Keating's failure and refusal to support the national ticket is tantamount to bolting the Republican Party."

Finio declined to estimate how many of the 300 members of the Republican State Committee might support him. He said, however, that he expected backing by two congressmen from the mid-December.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A series of lightning bolts, which caused considerable damage on the Project Gemini launching pad apparently has erased any possibility of a two-man orbital flight this year.

Officials said the mishap probably means that astronauts Virgil I. Grisson and John W. Young will have to wait until early 1965 to make the first tandem flight. They were to take a three-orbit, five-hour space ride in mid-December.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Hundreds of persons were routed from their homes by noxious fumes Tuesday night after a 55-gallon drum of underwater weed killer exploded at a chemical plant.

More than 100 persons were treated at hospital emergency rooms for eye and nose irritations, cramps and nausea.

The fumes, from a chemical called acrolein, billowed from open doors and windows into the heavily populated, mostly Negro neighborhood. Many traffic jams caused by curious onlookers hampered firemen, and police trying to reach the area in gas masks.

"First you choke, then you get abdominal cramps and nausea," said Vernon Barchard, photographer for the Tampa Tribune. "I vomited 15 minutes."

Police Capt. L. J. Buchanan and fireman Lionel Hernandez were hospitalized for observation.

Herbert Friedman, president of Southern Mill Creek Chemical Co., where the explosion occurred, said the chemical fumes were not poisonous.

Friedman said he was in the plant office when he heard an explosion about 8 p.m. He said the chemical apparently built up pressure inside the container, blowing off the top and opening a hole in the side over a store room.

Within minutes, the fumes blanketed the area around the plant.

Firemen, wearing gas masks and rubber suits, entered the four-story building to cap the

HARTFORD (AP) — Gov. John N. Dempsey expressed gratification today with the reports of progress made by Republicans in reaching a general agreement on proposals for a state constitutional convention.

The governor told his press conference that he hoped the progress made thus far was "an indication that we can expect similar agreement in complicated order requiring legislative restricting and reappointment issues."

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Cigarette Consumption Rockets Out of Slump

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cigarettes have rocketed back from the slump that followed a government report in January linking them to lung cancer and heart disease.

While cigarettes were making their comeback, cigar sales dropped sharply. Small cigars, which many switched early this year, took a nosedive. Shipments dropped from 190 million in May to 88 million in June. But the June figure was still double that for small cigars in June 1963.

The slump in cigarette sales had set in right after the government committee headed by Surgeon General Luther L. Terry issued its report in May. There was a considerable rebound in April, but June was the first month to show a decline over the corresponding month of 1963.

June's 85 per cent increase compares to a normal year-to-year increase of 2 or 3 per cent. Total sales for the fiscal year ending June 30 were 448 billion, 11 billion below the preceding 12-month period.

The new monthly report was the first this year to show a decline in cigar smoking. Cigarette sales had boomed from 1962 through May.

Other cigars shipped during June totaled 100 million, compared to 73 million in May and 50 million a year ago. Shipments of cigars increased 7.4 billion, an increase of 1 billion over the previous year.

A report issued by the Council on Tobacco Industry, N.Y., said 10 years of tobacco industry-supported studies had produced no evidence linking a link between smoking and lung cancer or stomach cancer.

Dr. Wendell G. Scott, president of the American Cancer Society, said Tuesday in New York that the report by the industry group was "misleading."

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Syncom 3 communications satellite, intended to relay television pictures of the October Olympic Games in Japan quickly to North America and Europe, rocketed into a preliminary orbit today on route to a planned stationary post high above the Pacific.

Officials were cheered by the early success of the mission. The tiny community was still in no danger, Bureau of Land Management officials said.

About 700 men were working on the fire. It has not crossed the Tuncora-Willow road, said Chuck Putnam, BLM assistant district director.

"On the other fires we look pretty good," Putnam said. "But then, we're usually in pretty good shape on cool mornings. Our luck with this fire all depends on the weather."

The weather forecast was high winds and low humidity, which would help the fire spread. Cloud seeding planes have not been used but the plan was discussed as a possibility if night cloud formations come up.
