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Apartment Building Value In Fiscal Year Sets Record

The dollar value of apartment building construction in Manchester in the fiscal year ending June 30—sharply in an apartment boom—was \$4,966,074, while the 12-year average is about \$2,000,000.

These were the years when Manchester had a real building boom going—when there were as many as 250 single family homes built annually.

In fact, the years when construction value is highest are regularly the years when the most single family homes are built.

For apartment construction to supply the base that single family home construction has traditionally provided will require a great deal more apartment construction than was begun in 1952.

That this year's increase in apartment building may indeed be a quirk of the building trade is suggested by two facts:

—If this is an apartment boom, it is a new one. Last year there were only two apartment houses erected, compared with 13 units the year before.

Part of the boom for this year's total was the result of a single major project, the 14-building project begun with a total of 230 units.

The increase in building valuation reflects the annual increase in building costs—and perhaps the more luxurious nature of the new structures—more than it does the number of units built.

But a boom may be easily measured in dollars and cents. To put the sudden increase in apartment dwellings into some perspective, two other kinds of questions should be answered:

—What effect does the apartment construction have on the total of building construction in Manchester?

—How permanent will the apartment boom be?

Despite the upsurge in apartment building, the total value of building construction in Manchester in 1963 was \$10,207,000, as opposed to a previous high of \$87,353.

This excludes the fiscal year 1960-61, when \$98,000 was spent on the publicly financed health care housing for the elderly.

And the 12-year average for apartment construction is about \$260,000, excluding federally sponsored projects.

Although the dollar value of construction is up, there have been more apartment units built in prior years.

Low rent permits were issued for 13 apartment buildings containing a total of 214 units. But in the year 1957-58, there were 14 buildings begun with a total of 230 units.

NEW YORK (AP)—The race for U.S. senator from New York began today as Democrat Robert F. Kennedy against Republican incumbent Kenneth P. Keating.

Mayor, Robert F. Wagner of New York, the state's leading Democrat, endorsed Kennedy Friday.

The attorney general, 38, who lives in Virginia and votes in Massachusetts, was expected to come to New York early next week to announce his candidacy. He reportedly already has selected top campaign aides and a public relations agency.

Wagner's endorsement practically assured Kennedy's nomination at the state Democratic convention Sept. 1. Kennedy is expected to delay his resignation as attorney general until then.

After the mayor's statement, all but one of Kennedy's announced challengers dropped out. That one, Rep. Samuel S. Stratton, an upstart from Amsterdam, has promised a floor fight. He contends Kennedy is ineligible as a non-resident.

Wagner said that Kennedy's talent and achievements, plus his "dazzling magic" of his non-residence, outweigh his non-residence.

Besides, the mayor said, Kennedy lived in New York as a boy, went to school here, and has "many ties of association, honor and interest."

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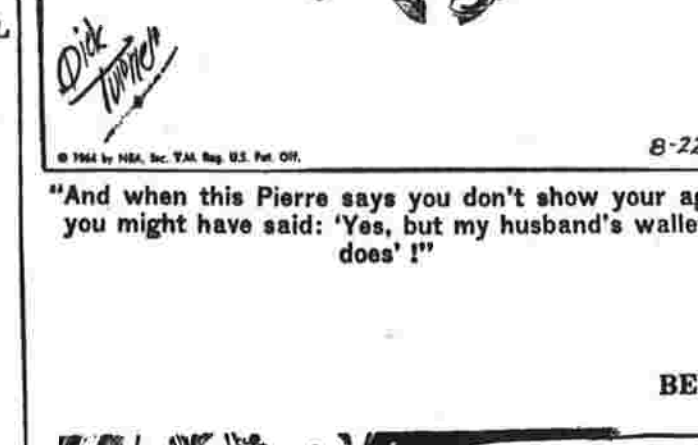

headed by Sen. Barry Goldwater.

The state GOP organization leadership, however, is behind Keating, and the national organization has not opposed him.

The Conservative party of New York, which broke away from the GOP a few years ago, is expected to field a candidate against Keating and Kennedy.

Clare Boothe Luce, former congresswoman from Connecticut and former ambassador to Italy, said she is considering accepting such a nomination, but will make up her mind next week. The conservatives also hold a state convention Aug. 31.

Wagner said he hoped Kennedy would help him revitalize the Democratic party in New York, where the GOP now holds the governorship, both U.S. Senate seats, and a majority of both houses of the legislature.

Wagner also said that Adlai E. Stevenson U.S. ambassador to the United Nations favored by the "reform" Democrats for the Senate post, had helped him round up support for Kennedy.

NRC Taking Second Look At Composting Operation

Since last October the North-east Refuse Committee (NRC) has been considering ways that four Manchester area towns could establish a refuse disposal incinerator for their joint use.

But at an NRC meeting this month—when three of the participating towns agreed to form a regional authority to build and operate an incinerator—committee member Frank Stamer of Manchester suggested that the towns might prefer instead a refuse disposal process called composting.

Ten months ago the NRC rejected composting as impractical. What brought about Stamer's eleventh hour suggestion?

Early this month Stamer received a letter from Stanley Spiegel, assistant to the president of the National Organics Corporation of Atlanta, Ga.

Spiegel said he had seen newspaper clippings about the NRC's efforts, and would like to present the NRC information about a composting plan, his firm calls the NORCO process, which suggested his firm could provide disposal on a contract basis for about \$3.50 per ton of refuse. The NRC has estimated that it would cost an average of about \$4.75 per ton for a regional incinerator.

NRC members agreed with Stamer that they would like to hear about the composting process and set Sept. 10 as the meeting date.

Along with his letter to Stamer, Spiegel sent a brochure describing the composting plan—and a raft of claimed advantages.

Among them (besides the cost saving)—no separation of rubbish and garbage required, no ash to dispose of, no unpleasant odor, no flies, no rats, no fire, not even any exposed dumping area.

There is also a certain amount of risk in adopting a process for a municipal operation that is not tried and true; often there are large benefits to be gained as well. Whether the NRC communities will adopt some form of composting as the answer to their problem and drop plans for an incinerator that were ten months in the making—remains to be seen.

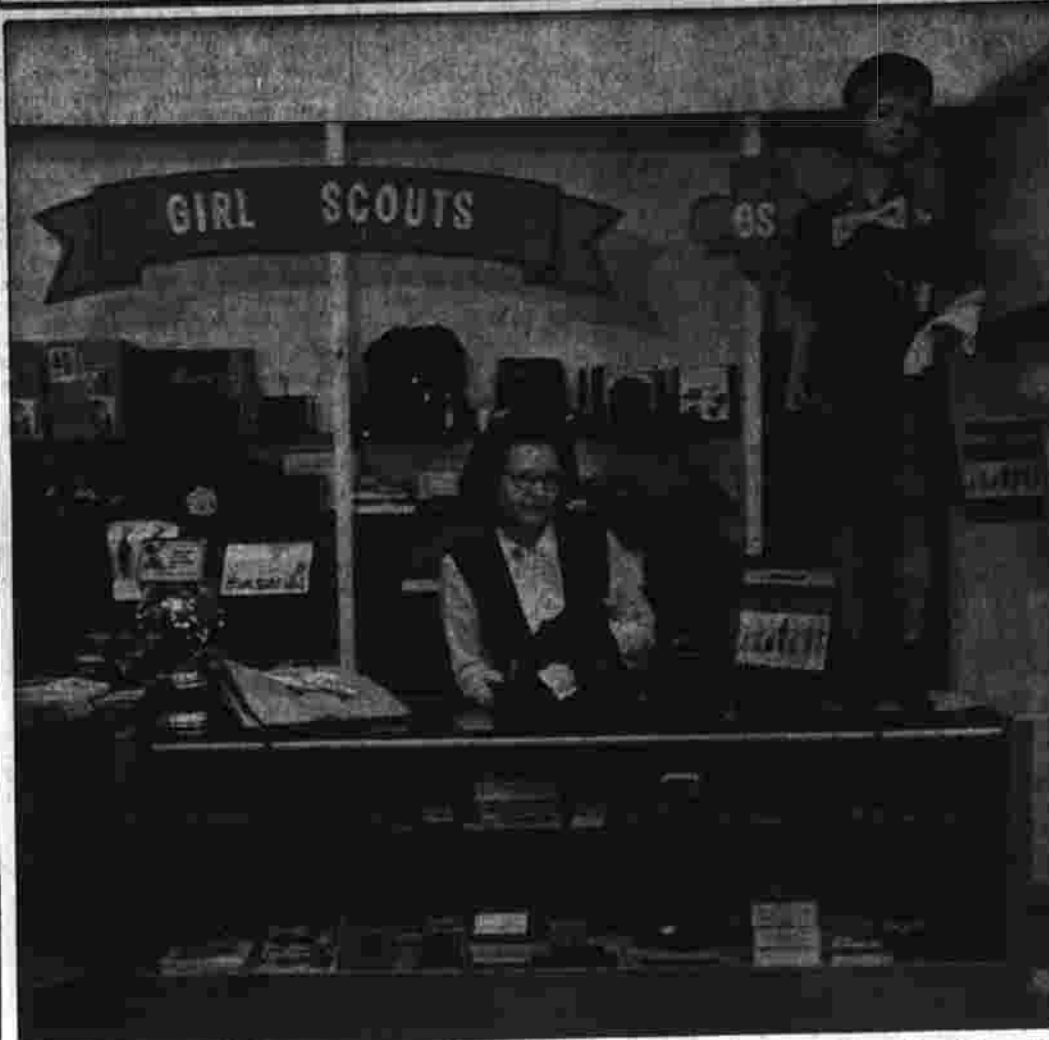

Martin-Herdic Parley Open, But Public Won't Be Heard

General Manager Richard Martin ruled yesterday afternoon that next week's meetings between himself and Rec Superintendent James Herdic "will be open to the public, who may attend as observers, but may not speak."

When contacted by phone at his Vermont vacation hideaway, Martin said that he could "understand" Mayor Francis Mahoney's apprehension at the possible effects of a public meeting, but told him not to worry, and added, "I feel confident that I can keep it under control."

Martin said that he felt compelled to "openly air the clouded dispute that has been present ever since the Barry and Macri recreation department audit was made public."

In scheduling the all-day Tuesday and Wednesday meetings, Martin told Herdic, "It is my intention to explore the administration of the recreation department to the extent necessary for a determination, by me, as to its merits."

He asked Herdic and Town Controller Joseph Clementino

to "be in the Municipal Building from 10 a.m. to noon, and from 1 to 3 p.m., Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 25 and 26."

Martin instructed both men to bring with them "all directives to the recreation department related to purchasing and employment procedures from July 1, 1960, date."

The Herald learned yesterday that the Senior Citizens Club is one of several recreation department affiliated groups which are rallying in support of Herdic's management of the department.

A committee of five Senior Citizens, representing a group of 150, will meet on Monday with Martin, to express confidence in Herdic's management.

Martin said yesterday that "because of such expressions of confidence, plus others of criticism, I am convinced that only at an open hearing can I determine the true merits of the dispute."

Two U.S.-made T28 planes equipped with machine guns and rockets pounded rebel positions. They were reportedly flown by anti-Castro Cuban exiles.

An American transport plane evacuated 60 wounded Congolese soldiers and 10 dead to Leopoldville.

The rebel tribesmen stormed the city Wednesday and pushed the army back. Then the tide turned and the rebels fled.

A radio message received in Elisabethville said rebels snipers killed 2 Belgians. However, there was no confirmation from Belgian authorities.

U.S. officials have not given up hope for the missing Americans, Vice Consul Lewis R. MacFarlane, 25, of Seattle, Wash., and Col. William A. Dodds, 50, and Lt. Col. Donald V. Rattan, 39, of Alexandria, Va., members of the U.S. military mission to the Congo.

An unconfirmed message reaching the United Nations had said that papers belonging to Rattan were found on the body of a dead rebel warrior.

U.S. Consul Richard Matheron of Fresno, Calif., who fled with embassy personnel into neighboring Rwanda, said there had been no Americans in Bukavu other than those in an official capacity.

In Washington Friday, U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., urged that the United States avoid increased involvement in the Congo.

Undersecretary of State Averell Harriman said in Baltimore Friday night that the United States will continue its support to the Congo.

Fall Preview: Back to Comedy

By JOAN CROSSBY
HOLLYWOOD (NEA)—The moguls of the miniature movie-land that is television have decreed that viewers will laugh if it kills them when the new season rolls around.

The season begins officially on Sunday, Sept. 13, when NBC telecasts "The Rogues." It is a season that:

— Sees a return to the half-hour format. There will be 51 half-hour shows on the air, compared to 32 for last season.

— Marks the entry of big-name motion picture stars into weekly series. People like Charles Boyer, David Niven (NBC's "The Rogues"), Bing Crosby (ABC's "The Bing Crosby Show"), Mickey Rooney (ABC's "Mickey") and Carolyn Jones (ABC's "The Addams Family").



'Profiles in Courage' and Brian Keith

— Sees the return of 47 performers who have previously appeared on series. The three stars of "The Real McCoys" are back. Walter Brennan in ABC's "The Tycoon," Richard Crenna in CBS's "Slattery's People" and Kathy Nolan in ABC's "Broadside." Dennis Weaver has left Chester's limp in Dodge City to play a horse trainer and reluctant father to a Chinese refugee in NBC's "Kentucky Jones." Craig (Peter Gun")

Stevens is playing a suave, Gunny, Broadway public relations man in CBS's "Mrs. Broadway."

"Peyton Place" in Chapters

— Launches a show that could be a major trend-setter, ABC's "Peyton Place." Adapted from, but not necessarily based on, the clinical Grace Metalious novel, "Peyton Place" will be telecast twice a week, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 9:30 p.m. Each episode, producer Richard Goldstone said, will be "an act of a play—the first 104-act play ever attempted. Our only problem will be long intermissions." Dorothy Malone, Ed Nelson, Ryan O'Neal, Mia Farrow, Warner Anderson and Patricia Breslin head a cast of 12 regulars. Reports are if the show is successful, it may go to three times a week in mid-season.

— Hides three separate, half-hour situation comedies, "Karen," "Tom, Dick and Mary" and "Harris Against the World" under one title, "Ninety Bristol Court" (study those initials and you will have an idea of the network presenting the series). All the families involved in the shows live in a Los Angeles bungalow court. The stories are linked together by a snoopy handy man given to talking to the camera.

The Monster Circuit

But most important of all, the new season numbers 22 new half-hour situation comedies which, added to the holdovers, makes 20 hours a week available for mass chuckling.

Among the comedies are two about the normal, ordinary monsters next door, ABC's "The Addams Family," with Carolyn Jones as Morticia, and CBS's "The Munsters," with Yvonne De Carlo as an All-American ghoul.

One of the most promising series, and one sought by all three networks, is ABC's "Bewitched," starring Elizabeth Montgomery as a "house-haunting, broomstick-riding, cauldron-stirring witch" married to advertising executive Dick York, who realizes all new marriages have their little problems to be worked out. One of the problems is Miss Montgomery's mother, another witch, played with great hammy humor by Agnes Moorehead.

Sergeants And Robots

ABC, which has the most new shows (16), also has the most new comedies (9). Besides those already mentioned, there is "No Time For Sergeants," starring an ingratiating newcomer, Sammy Jackson, as the ingenious farm boy whose very innocence is an Army bottleneck; and "Valentine's Day," which derives its charm from Anthony Franciosa's portrayal of a publishing executive with his mind devoted to chasing females.

There are two hour-long, action-adventure series on ABC. "Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea" stars Richard Basehart and David Hedison and a far-out submarine that has picture windows. "12 O'Clock High," starring Robert Lansing, is a serious World War II-oriented series, based on the movie of the same name.

CBS has a dozen new shows, seven of which are comedies. "Living Doll" presents the droll idea that Julia Newmar is a robot. "Many Happy Returns" stars John McGiver as the head of a department store's complaint department. Cara Williams is back as a working wife. "Baileys of Balboa," with Paul



'The Addams Family,' a sort of 'Monster Knows Best.'

Ford, is a wet "Beverly Hillbillies." "Gomer Pyle, USMC," is a spin-off from Andy Griffith's show, with Jim Nabors as a bewildered Marine trainee. "Gilligan's Island" is about a bunch of castaways on a desert island. One of them is Tina Louise, which should set male viewers dreaming.

NBC Buels the Trend

CBS' serious effort is the hour-long "The Reporter," created by Jerome Weidman and starring Harry Guardino as a New York newspaper columnist and Gary Merrill as his managing editor.

NBC has the fewest new shows, seven, and is the one network to buck the half-hour comedy trend. Early Saturday is being turned over to family shows with the delightful, filmed-in-color "Flipper," followed

by "Mr. Magoo," a cartoon series with the Quixotic hero (and Jim Backus' voice) starring in epics from Robin Hood to the Paul Revere story. "Kentucky Jones," Dennis Weaver's series, leads into "Saturday Night at the Movies," back at the same old stand.

Two of the brightest NBC shows appear to be a pair of tongue-in-cheek adventure shows. "The Rogues" is about a family of utterly charming connivers who will work very hard to get money illegally, but never lift a finger for a legitimately earned penny. Charles Boyer and David Niven are costars with Gig Young, but it is Young who will carry the acting burden. Gladys Cooper and Robert Coote complete the family.

Bottled in Bond

"The Man From U.N.C.L.E." is bottled in Bond (James), and has Robert Vaughn as the suave, sleek, unruffled agent surrounded by beautiful women and madmen out to capture the world.

A sample of the sly dialogue comes when our hero and the beautiful-lady-of-the-week have been captured by a madman. They are handcuffed to and suspended from an iron pipe. Steam has been turned on so they will be cooked alive. "Your death will be slow," says the madman as he leaves. Says Vaughn to the lovely lady (tersely) "Sorry." She says (nobly), "I knew there was danger when I took the job. You mustn't blame yourself." He

Hollywood on TV

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — Be of good cheer, television fans. I know that during the summer there are times when it seems advisable to convert the set to a spice rack, but hold fast. The Hollywood film factories are even now beginning to grind out the new fall programs.

Of late, I have chatted with the stars of two of the upcoming shows. One is an old friend, John Dehner, probably the world's most popular amateur oca man, who will do his conning for CBS this season on a show called "The Baileys of Balboa." The other is Ron Harper, who has gone from an "87th Precinct" detective to a situation comedy called "Wendy and Me."

Both are enthusiastic. They'd better be, else all is lost. Dehner's enthusiasm is more exciting to watch because he's a veteran who's been around a long time and it's probably harder to become enthusiastic. "After all these years of doing this and that," Dehner says, "I feel the need of belonging. Doing the series will give me a psychological security I've never had."

Bad Taste Delicious
He's been in two series before, but in both cases he joined an existing series—"The Westerner" and "The Roaring '20s"—and appeared on them only sporadically. Here he's in on the beginning.

And he's virtually fallen in love with the character he plays—Commodore Cecil Wynthoon of the Yacht Club. He's particularly delighted with the uniform in which he'll be a thorn in Paul Ford's side.

He'll wear a blue blazer with white pearl buttons, ascot, light slacks, white shoes, a yachting cap replete with navy-type scrambled eggs and a flashing insignia, a spy glass with which he opens and shuts gates (so as not to soil his upper-class hands), and a huge emblem on his blazer—a pair of lobster claws holding a ship's wheel.

A Peaceful Face
Harper, a clean-cut, American-boy boy type, may be hard for you old "87th Precinct" fans to recognize. Instead of combing his hair straight back, he is

now parting it on the side, making a tremendous difference in his appearance.

"I wanted to soften the lines of my face," he said, "and someone suggested that I part my hair. It was all right to look a bit tough for '87th Precinct,' but on 'Wendy and Me' I ought to be more peaceful."

He'll be an airline pilot, newly married to Connie Stevens. They live in an apartment building owned by George Burns and run by J. Pat O'Malley. Burns' monologue will open each show, after which we'll segue into a situation comedy.

Year of Big Laughs
The two shows—"The Baileys of Balboa" and "Wendy and Me"—are only two of a great flock of comedies heading your way. This would seem to be the year of the big laugh. West-erns have ridden off into the sunset and quizzes quit't.

But the comedy performers are deadly serious. Harper, for example, is brilliant Princeton graduate who is given to such flights of self-analysis as:

"I am a fervent believer in studying acting. Of all the creative arts, only acting is without mechanical aids. Every other creative artist uses some kind of tool—the painter's brush, the writer's pen, the composer's piano—to help him build an emotion.

"Only an actor must do it alone, without mechanical aids. And the idea that this can be done without study is preposterous."

See? A barrel of laughs.

Coming Shows

The Democratic National Convention at Atlantic City, N.J. gets underway Monday and will occupy the major networks for much of the week. Whether viewers will receive a choice or an echo, now that CBS has joined the team coverage format, remains to be seen.

ABC will have Howard K. Smith and Edward P. Morgan as its mainstay. CBS will experiment with its recently-installed Robert Trout and Roger Mudd. NBC will display its winning combination of Chet Huntley and David Brinkley.

Some non-convention programs: "Rally 'Round the Flag, Boys," with Paul Newman and Joanne Woodward, will be shown on NBC-TV's Saturday Night at the Movies" tonight at 9.

The Beatles will appear on CBS-TV's "The Ed Sullivan Show" tomorrow from 8-9 p.m. in a rebroadcast of their February appearance.

"A Conversation with the First Lady," an interview with Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, will be presented tonight on ABC-TV from 8-8:30 p.m.

NEW LATE-NIGHT SHOW
HOLLYWOOD (AP) — ABC, after studying the generally enthusiastic comments on a recent five-day test run, has awarded interviewer-commentator Les Crane a late-evening weekday network show starting Nov. 9. This will bring him into head-on conflict with NBC's Johnny Carson and, in many communities, Steve Allen's syndicated series.
