Columbia Olympic Canoe Trials Highlight Weekend

The Columbia Canoe Club has pulled off a really big coup in having the national championship races for the Olympic trials held at the lake this weekend.

The local club, organized only three years ago, has burgeoned into one with racers to be reckoned with.

Dennis Murphy, 15, and Robert Fletcher will defend their record of the fastest time for C-2's, and Dennis happens to be the youngest boy in the nation to hold the title as a member of the C-2 senior team since 1950.

Winners in the nationals will be able to enter the North American Championship races and the Presidential Cup races to be held at Washington, D.C., the following weekend. These winners will be eligible for the Olympic trials at Orchard Beach Sept. 12. All contestants are amateurs.

Registrations have already been received from Hawaii in the names of Anona K. Nacane and Karen Kimbren and Bernard McKeanee and Thomas Schroeder. FTC Rules Gum Cards Constitute Monopoly

NEW YORK (AP)—Tops' bubble gum cards with pictures of baseball players may look like kid stuff, but a Federal Trade Commission examiner has ruled that the firm has a monopoly in them.

In a 115-page decision, examiner Herman Tockler proposed Monday that the company should limit the length of the contracts it signs with players.

He said that Tops—with annual sales of \$14 million in the largest of bubble gum makers—had by extensive missionary work secured the rights to sign virtually every major league player.

A spokesman for the company said any adverse decision by the full commission would be appealed.

Tockler cleared dozens of most items in a long list of secondary charges made by its two chief competitors.

One of them, the Frank H. Fleer Corp., makers of Double Bubble, was accused by Tockler of using "subversive efforts and espionage to obtain copies of Tops' contract."

The company announced that it would soon begin distributing gum with pictures of President Johnson and Sen. Barry Goldwater.

It is the first time we've ever used presidential likenesses," said the spokesman.

In 1963 Tops had on its roster 416 of the 450 major league players. The young fans trade cards or buy more bubble gum to get the cards they want, and the progress of a player during the season can be checked by his value on the bubble gum card.

Big stars, like the New York Yankees' Mickey Mantle and the San Francisco Giants' Willie Mays, can be traded for quantities of bubble gum.

Tockler accused the company of contributing to the "regimentation" of the baseball-card buying public.
